Resolutions of Conference.

1. That St. Thomas village, the Five Stakes, South Yarmouth and Captain Morlatt's neighborhood, be set apart as a station; and, that the remainder of the St. Thomas circuit be called the Westminster Circuit.
2. That Brock be received as a station, and that a preacher be supplied by this Conference.
3. That Colborne be continued as a Mission Station.
4. That the Midland and Victoria Districts be taken up as Missionary ground.
5. That the Blanchard appointments be annexed to the London North Circuit.
6. That a Fund be established to be called the Chapel relief Fund: and that all our Ministers be required to make collections at their regular preaching places, and to forward all monies thus raised to the next Annual Conference.
7. That the Revs. H. O. Crofts, W. McClure and T. T. Howard, with Dr. Browne and Messrs. J. Cummings, R. H. Brett and W. Judd be a committee to investigate the state of our chapels throughout the connexion, and to secure deeds for the same, where the thing has been heretofore neglected.
8. That this Conference deeply regrets that some of the Preachers have neglected to furnish a correct and regular return to Conference, of the state of their Circuits; thereby involving much inconvenience and loss of time.
9. That a printed form of circuit returns be forwarded to Superintendents of circuits, and that a quarterly return be made to the General Superintendent to be laid before the English Conference.
10. That this Conference in view of misunderstandings prevalent on several circuits, as to who compose the Quarterly Conference—records its explanation of the discipline Sec. 6th. and 2nd. paragraph, as follow:—
 - I. Circuit Preachers, Circuit Stewards and the Secretary of the Local Preachers' Meeting are members of the Quarterly Meeting, or quarterly Conference *ex officio*.
 - II. Each circuit shall fix its own scale of representation on which the several classes shall elect from their membership the number of representatives to which they are entitled; who, together with the above named shall compose the Quar-

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terly Conferences, and be entitled to vote and act on all Questions, coming within the province of said Conference, or meeting.

11. That hereafter the accounts of deficiencies in Preachers' salaries be presented to the Annual Conference, through the several Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits, and signed by the circuit Steward.

12. That the present state of our Connexion in Canada, renders it desirable, that our field of labor be divided into *Districts*; one Minister in each division to be known as *Chairman*, who shall be stationed as centrally as possible and hold a general supervision of such Districts.

13. That the districts contemplated in the foregoing resolution be formed by the Stationing Committee, who shall also select the Chairmen for the ensuing year.

14. That the following regulations respecting Chairmen of Districts be adopted:—

I. Chairmen of Districts shall be Ministers in full Connexion: they shall be chosen annually by the Stationing Committee and shall preside at all District meetings held within the limits of their respective Districts; regular District meetings shall be held twice every year, and special District meetings shall be convened at the request or by the concurrence, of two or more stationed Preachers, as the case may be.

II. District meetings shall be composed of the Preachers in charge of Circuits and the Lay Representatives to the previous Annual Conference, they shall appoint a secretary who shall take exact minutes of the business transacted. Nevertheless, circuits having more than one travelling Minister, shall send such Minister or Ministers accompanied by an equal number of Lay Representatives chosen by the quarterly Meeting in the usual way: the Editor of the Christian Messenger to be included in the foregoing.

The business of District Meetings shall be to inquire into the state of the work in the several Districts during the year, and to report the same to the annual committee: to give advice in cases of difficulty and to aid in adjusting any differences that may be referred to them; and otherwise to stimulate to effort and promote the spirituality of the membership. Chairmen of Districts shall not preside at the quarterly meetings within the bounds of their districts, except those of the circuit or station where they reside; unless by special re-

quest of the Society, and with the concurrence of the Superintendent preacher: nor shall the Chairman of a district receive any remuneration for his services as such.

When either the General or Assistant Superintendent is present at any District meeting he shall preside as chairman of such meeting *ex officio*.

15. That a financial Secretary be now appointed, who shall have a seat in Conference *ex officio*, and whose duty it shall be to keep all connexional accounts and to present annually to Conference an abstract Balance sheet.

16. That R. H. Brett Esq. be requested to act as financial Secretary.

17. That the Editor of the *Messenger* be appointed Librarian of the Preachers' Library; and that those who have in their possession, any volumes belonging to said library, be requested to forward an account thereof to the Librarian at the earliest convenient opportunity.

18. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to T. Lottridge Esq., for his services as Treasurer of the Connexion during the past year; and that he be requested to continue his services the ensuing year.

19. That the thanks of this Conference be presented to the acting printing committee for their past services and that the following Brethren be the committee for the ensuing year:—Revs. W. McClure and T. T. Howard, with Messrs. T. Lottridge R. H. Brett J. Doel J. Good W. Sharpe J. Hartman W. Hamilton and J. Tyner.

20. That Revs. H. O. Crofts W. McClure, with Messrs. B. Pickard R. H. Brett and J. Plumery be the annual committee for the ensuing year.

21. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Missionary committee for their services during the past year; and that the following Brethren be appointed for the ensuing year: Rev. H. O. Crofts, *President*; Rev. W. McClure *Secretary*; T. Lottridge *Treasurer*; J. Foster W. Sharpe J. Doel, R. H. Brett J. Tyner, and M. Aikman Esqrs.

22. That the thanks of this Conference be presented to the General Superintendent for the efficient manner in which he has discharged the duties of the past year.

23. That this Conference deeply regrets that through bodily indisposition, the Rev. F. Haynes is unable to travel the ensuing conference-year, and earnestly hopes that with proper medical treatment, exemption from labor and the

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blessing of God, he may soon be able to resume the labors of an itinerant Minister.

24. That the Editor of the *Messenger* and a layman to be appointed by the Printing Committee be the Representatives of our Connexional Journal in the next Annual Conference.

25. That our next Annual Conference be held at Whitchurch, Home District, commencing the 5th of June, 1850.

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Address

TO THE
CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST NEW CONNEXION
CHURCH IN ENGLAND.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—Having been spared by a gracious providence to meet in our twenty-first Annual Conference, we would renew to you our assurances of unwavering attachment, and profound respect. The confidence we at first placed in you, as the Parent Body has by a train of circumstances been strengthened and matured; and most devoutly do we thank Almighty God that ever in his providence, he directed your missionaries to Canada. The very happy connection existing between us, we hope may long remain, and prove a means of preparing us for a closer and happier union in heaven, where we shall be united in closer, sweeter bonds "Never to be broke off again to all eternity." It is a pleasing feature of the christian religion, that while it suppresses all boisterous, and irregular feelings, it develops the more amiable and benevolent dispositions of the soul, and predisposes its subject to the friendship, and eminently prepares them for the Society of Heaven. Thus connected with you by the ties of christian friendship, as well as by the obligation of gratitude under which we are laid to you, we rejoice to hear of your prosperity, and most earnestly do we pray that the Great Head of the Church may abundantly bless your efforts, and make you a thousand times as many more as you are.

Our present Conference has been one of the most interesting character we have ever yet held, and has been more extensively occupied than any previous session in important measures, affecting our extension and increase. As might be expected, the increase of our numbers as well as our business in Conference, tended to increase the general interest of this session; and while warmth and interest has characterized the discus-

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sion of many subjects, yet no spirit was permitted to obtain among us contrary to brotherly love; and the great object of each, seemed to be, to extend our Zion, and to advance the Divine Glory. Whatever difference of opinion may have existed in reference to measures, yet all were agreed in reference to the *great end*. And through our entire sittings we felt the force of the Psalmist's exclamation—"Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." The committee appointed to station the preachers have experienced great inconvenience arising from the want of ministers to fill many important stations. Though our General Superintendent, and our Assistant Superintendent are both appointed to fill stations, still we want several more efficient labourers in order to meet the present pressing demands upon our Congregations. "Truly the harvest is plenteous but the labourers are few, pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he would thrust out more labourers into his harvest."

Our movements are to a great extent aggressive. In proportion as our truly scriptural and reasonable church polity is understood by other branches of the Methodist family, it is admired and approved, and one place after another anxious to exercise the rights secured to them in the word of God, appeal to us to supply to them the same privileges which we enjoy. Thus one place after another is opening to us and inviting our labours and the establishment of our principles, and the increase of openings being more extensive than the increase in the number of Ministers to fill these places subjects us to the greatest inconvenience. In endeavoring to meet as many calls as possible with our present limited means, many of our Ministers have been put to serious inconvenience; and dividing their labors to some extent their own stations have suffered. The arrival of Mr. McClure has proved a valuable addition to our staff of labourers; but we exceedingly lament that circumstances have rendered it ne-

cessary to restrict his labors almost exclusively to the City of Toronto. It was with feelings of gratitude to God as the moving cause, and to you as His Agents, that we received Mr. McClure into our Colonial Conference, and raised him to the Presidential Chair; and we most earnestly pray that his life and energies may be long preserved to bless our mission.

In consequence of an important opening for our Connexion in the Town of London, our General Superintendent has been prevented from travelling through our Circuits and Missions, to aid and encourage our Ministers by his labours and counsel. In consequence of the local engagements of our General and Assistant Superintendents, our Missionary operations have been considerably trammelled; however by the vigorous efforts of the various deputations appointed by our Missionary Committee, a considerable sum has been realized, placing our receipts in advance of last year. But could our General and Assistant Superintendents be relieved from their local engagements so as to employ their energies in our Missionary operations, we have no doubt that our Mission fund might be considerably increased, and at the same time a greater influence in favor of our cause might be enlisted. The urgent necessity for their labours, however, in the stations where they have been employed has utterly precluded the possibility of their engaging to any considerable extent in the Missionary department of our work.

We have been pleased to find that while no very marked revivals have attended our labours through the past year, we have still made advance in point of discipline; our members are as a general matter in a healthful state, and prepared to move forward in the work of the Lord. We are of opinion that we have enjoyed a revival in the Church, in the increase and refinement of christian graces, and this we regard as a harbinger of more extensive achievements. Amid the mighty political agitation that has almost convulsed the world through the past year, it might have been

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expected that many would have suffered extensive spiritual loss, while others too much absorbed in those pondrous events which the past year has recorded would have "made shipwreck of faith, and of a good conscience." But in these respects we have suffered less than we anticipated—we have been sheltered under the Almighty's wing, and secure from the storm we have reposed in safety. While others by seeking to attach the church of Christ to the chariot wheels of the state, have produced confusion in their own ranks,—we have kept from that sin which so degrades the church, and from its consequences which are so prejudicial to the interests of true piety. It is our decided conviction that the claims of Christ as the Great Head of the Church, take the precedence of all others, and that hence, to bind it subservient to the state degrades the church, and mars its prosperity.

Our Connexional Paper has proved a valuable auxiliary to our prosperity, as well by diffusing a knowledge of our church-polity as by repelling the malicious attacks made upon our Body, and the misrepresentation of our principles and movements, by those who wished not well to our Zion. It has also been extensively useful, as a medium of conveying connexional intelligence through all our circuits and stations, thus encouraging and stimulating to increased effort in the work of God. We have no hesitancy in stating that our Paper while it has embarrassed us, to some extent, in a pecuniary point of view, has been made extensively promotive of the general interests of our Connexion, and we regard it as essential to our prosperity and increase.

Over our wide-spread field of missionary operations, we have abundant proofs of your unabated zeal for the Glory of God, and your abounding liberality toward the work of missions. Many of the back-settlers of our province, are now enjoying the blessings of a regular ministry, who, had it not been for the men, and means you have supplied, must have remained destitute of a preached Gospel to this day. Nor can we behold the

chapels and parsonages, your means have enabled us to erect, or those missionaries travelling the vast wild forests of Canada, with the glad tidings of salvation to publish to the destitute and benighted emigrants without feeling the purest emotions of gratitude to God as the Author, and to you as the Agents in such extensive beneficence. But after all your benevolent exertions to supply men and means to our field of labor, and our co-operative exertions for the same end; you can still with difficulty perceive the inconvenience experienced by most of our missionaries, and our difficulty in supplying with suitable means, the numerous openings presented to us. In almost every part of our province, we see fulfilled this scriptural promise "Behold I set before you an open door." Deeply anxious to improve every opening, and to keep pace with the rapidly increasing population of our province, we feel the deepest pain arising from the fact that when all our hosts are rallied, and our means exhausted, there still are open doors into which we cannot enter, and inviting fields which we cannot cultivate.

It is a matter of thankfulness in which you will participate with us, that while disease has raged relentlessly and unmoved by its numerous victims, and though it has slain the companions of some of our Standard-bearers, and torn away the offspring of many more, still it has not been permitted to select and slay any from our ministerial ranks. And though the health of several of our Ministers has sustained injury, yet only one or two have been compelled to quit the field through want of health to pursue their labours, and we are encouraged to hope and pray for the speedy restoration of these to our ranks. But while some have stepped from our ranks, the Lord has provided others to fill up these vacancies, and help on the battle of the Lord. We learn with pleasure through our General Superintendent that it is the design of the committee to send us two young men from England for whose safe and speedy arrival we most earnestly pray.

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Finally, in view of the extensive character of our colonial operations, the importance of the work, and the value of immortal souls, for whose salvation we labour, we crave an interest in your sympathies. "Brethren, pray for us that the word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified, even as it was with you."

and effectually deliver the prey from the hand of the strong one; frequently have we had to know while met together that "He who hath no rule over his own spirit, is like a city broken down and without walls."—So also of a church not subject in all things, to the spirit of Christ: there is neither safety nor prosperity there, its members soon forsake, and its foes possess it altogether.

You will rejoice with us to know, dear Brethren; that on many of our circuits we have had a steady advance in the number of the hearers of the word preached, the members of the church, the pecuniary contributions, and we fondly hope in the piety of our Ministers and members. We have reason to know that protracted meetings when properly conducted, are usually attended with very happy results: several sound and striking conversions to God have taken place in such meetings since our last Conference, and we fondly hope that many more such things may be realized this present year. We cannot, however, but state to you, that great results never can be realized unless we carry into the means used, great faith in God, great love for the souls of our fellow men, and great readiness to take up the cross, deny ourselves, and fully to go with Jesus, wherever he may lead; nor should we consider our work over when the protracted effort is over, it is then only begun: when the fallow ground has been broken up, we have now to cast in with great care the good seed, when it has been cast in we have to watch its safety, watering it with anxious care, often with prayers and tears, that it may take root and grow; while in these cases where conversion has taken place, it is our duty to watch over their religious progress, giving their character such a direction in its early stages of formation, as shall ultimately conduce to the greatest amount of happiness, and of usefulness. Never forget how much depends on first impressions, and first habits: the character then *well* formed, is more than half perfected; while carelessness, or mistakes in the outset, deform and hinder, and vex us all the days of

our life; let us labor then to do our services in God's cause, in good season, and with all our heart.

In order to this you must have deep personal piety, you must live fully to God, you must give him all your heart—you must adopt wise and well digested plans of working, and these you must carry out in a humble, calm, and patient deportment, both when disappointed or opposed, or misrepresented: in your patience possess ye your souls; great exploits can only be performed by great efforts, and great efforts naturally imply great obstacles in the way. Oh Brethren we work for eternity, let us do it well, and in time, for the night cometh when no man can work!

Finally Brethren live nearer to God than ever you have done, and thus be "ye always ready, for ye know neither the day nor the hour when the Son of man shall come." 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Missionary Report.

The object of Christian Missions is the conversion of the world; the subjugation of every human heart to Christ, to spread gospel truth and gospel blessings, until the Saviour's reign shall extend from pole to pole, and from the rivers to the ends of the earth. An object which every rightly constituted mind must pronounce the most noble, important, and desirable, of any that has ever called into exercise the intellect, the energies, or the hearts of men.

The spirit which animates the Missionary body is a spirit of sympathy, pity, and love; a spirit that weeps over the miseries of fallen humanity, which sighs to burst from every slave of Satan, the fetters of sin, to direct the feet of every wanderer into the way of peace—to point them to the "fountain which is open for sin and uncleanness," that they may "wash and be clean,"—to lead them to the wardrobe of the Redeemer's righteousness, that they may exchange there "filthy rags" for spotless robes—that they may pass triumphantly through the pearly gates of the New Jerusalem, and be found at length in an adoring attitude before the glorious throne of the God of love.

Nor is this enterprise utopian, or the probability of accomplishing this object anywise uncertain, it is not left to the calculation of the theorist—or to be a subject of mere speculation;—no! it is gloriously certain. It does not lie far off on the fluctuating billows of desires, it rises before us as a monument reared by the hand of

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omnipotence, which is palpable to the eye of hope, and tangible to the hand of faith: a pillar against which we can safely recline whilst we gaze upon the accomplishment of the Divine purposes,—whilst we view with astonishment and delight that combination of great and mysterious events, which is now exhibited to us on the theatre of the world which presents to the enlightened christian a pleasing developement of Jehovah's plan for extending the dominion of the Redeemer—and a sure indication of the near approach of that glorious period when "the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth as the waters cover the great deep."

"Jesus shall reign where'er the sun
Doth his successive journies run,
His Kingdom spread from shore to shore
Till suns shall rise and set no more."

That Jesus shall have "the heathen for his inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possession" and that the "Kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our God and his Christ," we are warranted in believing on the authority of God's word; yes! they are facts written in that Book, the contents of which are truth; truth firm as the throne God. To that precious Book we turn amidst our toils and discouragements; its teachings cheer and stimulate us; there we strengthen our faith, renew our patience, inflame our zeal, and invigorate our benevolence.

The Missionary cause therefore is a glorious enterprize, worthy of enlisting our warmest sympathies, our weightiest influence, our most fervent prayers; the devotion of our energies and resources.

Nor has the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church been idle, she has responded to the call of the Great Head of the Church, and has gone up to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty. She has cast her mite of influence into this great work. Though her efforts have not been commensurate with her desires, we

trust they have been limited only by her means, and that the Head of the church, looking upon her labors of the past year, with a smile of approbation exclaims, "she hath done what she could."

Your committee in presenting their annual report to this meeting, feel called upon gratefully to adore the giver of all good, for the kind providence afforded our Missionaries during another year, in the continuance of their health, and the preservation of their lives. The arrows of death have been playing around them, but the shield of Divine protection has been placed before them, they have passed safely through the shadows of death, and are found at the termination of another year the living to praise God. But more especially are we called upon to praise him for that amount of success which he has graciously given to the labors of his servants: not only have the old settlements of our province been visited with revival influence—and thus an addition been made to the number of our membership,—but the desert places have been cultivated under the genial rays of the sun of righteousness, and amidst the fructifying showers of Divine grace and mercy: thus where formerly the upas of iniquity flourished, the rose of Sharon blooms, the lilly of the valley smiles, and the fragrance of Lebanon delights the soul.

But a wider field is opening before us, and your committee cannot listen to the many calls they have for assistance without being deeply impressed with the necessity of increased exertion in every department of Missionary labor, and of the absolute impossibility of prosecuting our work with efficiency without an increase of laborers, and a considerable augmentation of our funds. Your committee cannot record but with heart-felt gratitude the continued benevolence of the parent society, the resources which a kind providence has placed at their disposal are dealt out to us with a liberal hand, and an affectionate heart.

Nor are we unmindful of the benefit conferred upon our connexion here through the wisdom and beneficence

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of our English brethren, by the appointment of our esteemed assistant Superintendent to labor amongst us, though from peculiar circumstances his efforts have been more local, and his influence more confined (as those also of our worthy General Superintendent) than we could desire, still his influence has been extensively felt, and we pray that the Head of the Church may long preserve his life, and make him extensively useful.

Your Committee, in adverting to the efforts which have been put forth by our Collectors, and to the liberality of our contributors in this country, do it with unmingled pleasure, and the most fervent thanks; the fact that, during a season of unusual deprivation, the funds of our Auxiliary Missionary Society have been augmented upwards of fifty pounds, presents a very pleasing development of the interest taken in the work, and also a most gratifying demonstration of the approbation of our God.

Still we believe more *may* be done, and more *must* be done. The fearful situation of thousands of destitute souls, who are perishing around us, demands it—our own spiritual prosperity demands it—the sufferings and intercession of the Redeemer demand it; if we stand still it is at the peril of our souls! The fields are already white with the waving grain, let us go and put in the Gospel sickle and we shall reap a glorious harvest of immortal souls. With the following impressive remarks from the Report of the Committee of the Parent Society, your Committee will bring their report to a close.

“We must pray as well as give, and the fervour of our prayers must be, at least, equal to the liberality of our gifts. Without the union of our prayers with our pecuniary oblations, the latter will be unsanctified, and we shall look for prosperity in vain: without this union, indeed, prosperity would only produce a proud elation, alike injurious to ourselves, and offensive to God. The Macedonian cry from our stations, is uttering a loud en-

treaty for our *prayers*, as well as for our gifts; and the new and formidable barriers which are presented by a recreant and degenerating Protestantism, by a refined pantheism and transcendentalism, and by pestilent forms of absurd superstition, swarming amid the very harvest field of our labours, urge the duty upon us with admonitory solemnity. Brethren, it is our safety, as well as our success, which depends upon our prayers. Let the whole church, then, prostrate herself in the dust, and, in solemn and imploring accents, send forth the incessant cry,—‘Arise, O God, plead thine own cause. Remember how the foolish man reproacheth thee daily. Forget not the voice of thine enemies. God be merciful unto us and bless us; and cause his face to shine upon us; that thy way may be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations. Let the people praise thee, O God; let all the people praise thee. Then shall the earth yield her increase, and God, even our own God, shall bless us. God shall bless us, and all the ends of the earth shall fear him.’” Amen.
