SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Seventeenth Annual Meeting of the Infants' Home and Infirmary was held in the Board-room of the Home on the 25th of November, Sir William Howland in the chair. The meeting was opened and closed with prayer. The reports of the officers were read and adopted; after which the visitors were shown through the Home, and entertained at afternoon tea by the Managers.

MANAGERS REPORT.

Few institutions can chronicle from year to year an unbroken record of health and prosperity. The Infants' Home, the Managers of which have now the honour of submitting their annual report, has proved no exception to this general rule, and while rendering devout thanks to Almighty God for His many mercies to the Home, we bow with submission to the heavy blow our Institution has sustained in the terrible visitation of diphtheria, under which we laboured from February to August of the present year. Many private homes in Toronto have suffered with ourselves, and only sympathizers, such as they must necessarily be, can realize the enormous distress, loss, and general disorganization to a

public charitable institution when confronted with a pestilence so alarming in itself, and so wide spread in its ravages. The Government grant to this Home is regulated by the length of stay in the Home of each inmate. Very little reflection will show how very greatly the financial condition of our Home was reduced, owing to the enforced closing of our doors to the admission of women and children. Our pecuniary loss was far from being our greatest distress. No one can assume the position of Manager, in such a charity as the Infants' Home, without becoming interested in the women and children under our care. It was therefore with great anxiety that early in the year we found that diphtheria had broken out in the streets surrounding our Home. Precautions were at once taken in order, if possible, to avert from our helpless family this dread visitation, but alas, in vain; and for five months we could only wait in patience for the end, which, with the precautions taken, had surely to come. We reopened our doors in August with sadly diminished numbers, and in many ways this sorrowful episode in our history has been a most serious hindrance to the well-being and prosperity of our Home during the past year. We trust, however, with the aid of a generous public our pecuniary losses may be repaired, and can only hope and pray that God in His great mercy may protect our Home from ever again suffering from another such visitation.

When listening to the stories told by applicants for admission to the Home, it would be impossible for even the most careless person not to realize that in this city of Toronto there is a vast field for philanthropic and elevating agencies. Want of moral restraint, the great ease with which alcoholic drink may be procured, the scarcity of regular employment, the low wages paid by shops, and the

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preference shown by young girls for factory labour, instead of entering domestic service, all these causes tend to produce a most unsatisfactory condition of affairs, most difficult to deal with, and well nigh impossible to improve; therefore so long as these evils exist, we shall hear the same stories, and the necessity will always be with us of providing a harbour of refuge, where the destitute wife or wayward girl may find shelter for the present, and take courage to face her future burden of life. The crimes of infanticide and child desertion have greatly decreased of late years; not, we are sorry to say, because people are living higher and purer lives, but for the reason that the various "homes" act as a description of prevention; these crimes being the usual outcome of friendlessness and despair. Illtreatment of infants on the baby farming system, under proper management, is greatly lessened. Owing to the improved legislative precautions, persons desiring to take infants to board, must apply for a certificate or licence.

This care for infants is entirely due to the action taken by the Infants' Home Managers in 1887, in petitioning the government and the city on the matter. Each infant life lost to this country by neglect, is a very much more serious matter than appears to the careless observer. All students of ancient history, and all professors of political economy, will tell you that those countries where infant life and training are considered, have been the foremost among nations. As an institution aiming at these first principles, the Infants' Home Managers feel that, notwithstanding the adverse criticisms cast upon their work by unthinking persons, the fruit of their arduous labours can never be in any instance wholly lost. Could we but trace the future career of the children sent out from our sheltering care, doubtless we should

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find that our country has greatly benefited by the men and women whose early lives have been developed under the love and care bestowed upon them in the Infants' Home. The protection of infants is part, but only part, of our work. "Let him that is without sin cast the first stone at her," was said in the past by our Divine Lord; and the words are as clear and decided to-day as in the time of old. Are we to gather our skirts and pass by on the other side, when we come in contact with a woman—far too often a child woman—who has been cruelly wronged? A thousand times no. The Managers of the Infants' Home, careful to guard against wilful known sin, open their institution to protect from themselves, and carefully watch over those weak, but far too often, much wronged fellow women who can be induced to accept the shelter offered. "Prevention is better than cure," is an old and very true proverb; give our adult inmates an opportunity to reflect over the past; also time to love and care for their helpless charges, and in almost every instance we find they leave our Home with true motherly love in their hearts, and with a strong determination to lead a new life. "Gone to service, taking her child with her;" "Gone home with her child to friends," is the usual record against our mother nurses.

The work of a charity such as this is far reaching. Picture a home in the country where anxiety and grief is felt over perhaps the favourite daughter of the house, and the relief to the distressed parents or friends, when a letter comes telling them of the safe shelter into which the erring one has strayed.

A young wife is left to take charge of two or three tiny children, while the husband and father finds work at some distant lumbering shanty. After two or three months money

The Infants' Home offers shelter to the poor widow with her little ones, where she can recover her strength and take courage to face the battle of life alone.

Owing to the five months' closing of our institution to visitors, the Managers of the Home have not been able to give as many children for adoption as have been asked for from time to time.

The story of one pretty little girl is one of the many we record in our books. One cold November night a child's cry was heard, and diligent search made by kind-hearted men. In a basket under the G. T. R. freight sheds a female infant of about three weeks old was discovered, the child being nearly dead with cold and hunger, the finder took it home to his wife longing to keep it, as they had no child of their own; but as they were boarding felt obliged the next day to take the baby to our Home. Both the man and his wife during the past two years visited the wee girl, but said nothing of their hopes, until a short time since, when being comfortably settled in a good home, they applied for, and adopted little Edith. The happiness of their home is now complete. Another of our children owed to the care and skill of our medical staff her restoration to health, and is now the joy and comfort of her adopted parents. These two are only samples of the many cases we could cite in order to show the widely spread benefit accruing to the country at large through the medium of our Infants' Home.

We are now entering upon our eighteenth year of work, during this period we have admitted and cared for 957 women, and 2,244 children, at a cost of \$79,534. It does not take many moments either to write, or repeat these

figures; but they represent many hours of toil, anxiety and patience. There is no charity so misunderstood as the Infants Home, and the Managers most earnestly ask, that in all cases where a prejudice exists, often unconsciously, a report of our work should be asked for and *read* without bias, and with a large heartedness which "hopeth all things, believeth all things, for "charity never faileth." Each report sent forth yearly by the Managers is with the hope and prayer, that by its perusal, the general public may realize more clearly the necessity for their work, and more fully appreciate the grand results following from perseverance in the same. We have to record many shadows, but also some cheering incidents during the last few months. Not long after our Treasurer had announced the startling fact that the expenses consequent upon the diphtheria outbreak had mounted up to over \$1,200, a letter was received stating that a legacy of \$2,000 had been left to the Home. Mr. Keterson could not know what a weight of anxiety he lifted from the Managers by this timely bequest.

The resignation of our Lady Superintendent, Miss Boulton, after seven years of faithful service, could not but prove a serious blow to the welfare of the Home. Miss Boulton possessed a rare amount of executive ability and clear judgment, and her loss to the Managers is very keenly felt. This report would be most incomplete did it not most clearly set forth and publicly state the heavy debt of gratitude owed by the Managers to the Medical Staff of the Home. Of Dr. Spencer in particular, we feel that his self-denying labours during our terrible epidemic, and his constant care and oversight of the sanitary arrangements of the Home are beyond ordinary thanks. To him, and to the acting staff, and to our consulting physicians, we tender our most

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grateful thanks. The Infants' Home is a charity particularly dependent upon the warm personal interests of its friends; and the Managers most gratefully acknowledge the untiring devotion of the ladies of the workroom, who continue from year to year their work of love. We have many children and nurses to clothe, many little and big beds for which to provide, and to friends who so persistently and continuously sew for the Home, we are most grateful. Miss White still continues a most liberal contributor to the wardrobe and playroom of our little children.

To the clergy and to the ladies who conduct the Sunday services and the Bible classes for the women, we beg to tender most heartfelt thanks. The "little maids" have again continued their payment of \$50 towards the maintenance of a cot; their's with Mr. Wm. Mulock's, being the only two cots supported by yearly payments of \$50. The "Maurice Mason" is as yet our only endowed cot. An effort is now being made to raise the sum of \$1,000, in order to endow a "Canadian childrens' cot," and the Managers sincerely trust this effort may before very long be realized.

In conclusion the Managers desire to express the hope that the public of Toronto will visit the Home, in order more fully to see for themselves the good work carried out within our walls. We should not then be confronted with a public statement made at the City Council, that not twenty per cent. of the city grant to this Home, was used for the purposes for which the grant was made. The Infants' Home is of necessity an institution requiring a liberal outlay; 120 to 167 children with 50 to 79 mothers, require much warmth and constant attendance upon the infants; and the aim and object of the Managers is set forth in Clause No. 2 of our Constitution, viz.:

"The object of this Home is to receive, and tenderly care for

destitute infants under two years' of age." This seventeenth report of the Managers is now compiled with the fervent prayer and hope that the public-spirited citizens of Toronto will more fully understand the principles of our Home, and that notwithstanding many discouragements, and many difficulties, the Managers of the noble charity of the Infants' Home and Infirmary may be encouraged to persevere even more and more in their work of love and mercy, taking to heart the words of the Wise Preacher of old: "In the morning sow thy seed, and in the evening withhold not thy hand; for thou knowest not whether shall prosper, either this or that, or whether they both shall be alike good."

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PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

LADIES,—The report of the Physicians of the Infants' Home and Infirmary for the year ending September 30th, 1892, presents a few somewhat unusual considerations.

The total number of admissions during the year was one hundred and ninety-six infants and twenty-nine mother nurses. This would appear to be an unusually large number considering that the Home was practically closed for about four months; but it must be borne in mind that those inmates who were sent to the Isolation Hospital during the epidemic of diphtheria, were necessarily re-entered on the books on their return from that institution, and thus the number of admissions rather over-represents the number of cases which have been treated in the Home.

The total number of deaths occurring during the year was forty-three, or twenty-two per cent. These deaths all occurred among the infants. Bearing in mind the fact that the Home during the past year sustained a most severe and deplorable epidemic of diphtheria, the smallness of the percentage of deaths may excite some surprise. The fact must not be lost sight of, however, that most of the deaths from this disease occurred in the Isolation Hospital, and consequently will properly appear on the records of that institution. The deaths from this cause being thus practically eliminated, twenty-two per cent. may be taken as representing the mortality in the Home during the past year from such diseases

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as may be expected to occur during an average year among children of all classes. Keeping in view the fact that most of the children when admitted, are in a very low state of health, and that others are far advanced in disease, we submit that the above figures represent in a very favourable light the work being done in the Home.

In reference to the epidemic of diphtheria which scourged the Home during the past year, while greatly deploring the fact of its having occurred, we most heartily congratulate the Management upon the energy and vigor which they manifested during the crisis; upon the success which has attended the measures of disinfection employed, as manifested by the entire absence of this dread disease among the inmates since their return to the Home; and lastly upon the excellent sanitary condition in which the Home is found at present.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, their babies shall be admitted free.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Committee of thirty ladies, assisted by an Advisory Committee of three gentlemen, and the Committee shall elect annually their Presiding Officers and a Treasurer and Secretary out of their number.

V.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-laws of the Society, provided one month's notice shall be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the "Advisory Committee."

VI.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at the annual meeting to act as an Advisory Committee. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VII.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, etc.

VIII.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

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RULES

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BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank in the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed :—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or, in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the general committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each manager taking his duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the weekly committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

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RULES

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RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the weekly committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services for at least six months to the Institution (or as much longer as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, to be determined by the Board) in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and child.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the lady managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection.
