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#### ONTARIO CONFERENCE.

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#### CONFERENCE JOURNAL.

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#### FIRST DAY--Forenoon Session.

The Ontario Annual Conference convened in its forty-fifth session at Bloomingdale, Waterloo County, Ontario, on October the Twelfth, 1899, at the hour of 9 a.m., with Bishop Kephart presiding. Conference was opened with prayer by the Bishop, after which he delivered a very earnest and inspiring address, dwelling at some length upon, and emphasizing the hopeful outlook, regarding the future interests of the Church, as a source of encouragement for earnest toilers in the Master's vineyard to labor on, being sure of final victory.

The former Secretary, I. W. Groh, called the roll, when those marked with a star in the roll were present and responded to their names. The vote for Secretary resulted in the election of W. A. Robins, and the Conference bar was fixed at the first three rows of seats. The hours of meeting were fixed at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m., to adjourn on motion.

The Rev. Menno Bowman, Presiding Elder of the New Mennonite Church, being present, was introduced to the Conference.

By general consent, the Bishop appointed the various Committees.  $\hfill \triangle$ 

Rev. R. Head and Miss Lutz were appointed correspondents to the local papers.

The Bishop having selected, read the names of the following Committees;

The report of the Presiding Elder, I. W. Grob, was called for, read, and no objections being raised, report and character was passed. See Report No. 1.

The following ministers without charges were passed in the examination of their characters: Wm. Cornell, who during the year passed to his Crown and final reward; J. Davey, I. M. Comfort, D. H. Ferguson, Wm. Charlesworth, J. McCombs, A. Cooper, G. Rott, J. Michigaer, J. B. Backus.

On motion, the Conference adjourned.

#### Afternoon Session.

Devotional exercises were led by J. W. Newbery.

Applicants for the Ministry were called for, and John Dodd was recommended from the Listowel charge, and referred to Comittee on Candidates for the Ministry.

Ministerial Reports were then taken up, and the characters and work of the following brethren were passed:

J. F. Durkee, W. H. Dafoe (at this juncture Rev. Mr. Damm, of the Evangelical Association, was introduced to the Conference.) The examination of Ministerial Reports was then resumed: G. W. Houseman, R. Jamieson, C. H. Elliott, J. W. Newbery, D. C. Dafoe, J. Geach, Geo. Backus W. A. Robins, Jos. Showers, J. Mager.

Committee on First Year's Course of Reading reported, and report was adopted. See Report No. 2.

Committee on Second Year's Course of Reading reported no candidate before them.

Committee on Third Year's Course of Reading reported, and it was adopted. The Bishop asked the usual disciplinary questions of the candidates, who gave satisfactory answers. See Report No. 3.

The Chair appointed Geo. Backus and J. W. Newbery as a Committee on Memoirs, to report on Saturday at a suitable hour

J. Mager not being present, R. Head was appointed Committee on Resolutions.

Adjourned on motion.

#### Friday Morning.

Devotional services were conducted by Jackson Moore.

Conference roll was called, and the chair was taken by Bishop Kephart at 9 A.M., and business resumed

Committee on Candidates for the Ministry reported, but was laid over, by common consent, for further consideration.

Committee on Boundaries reported.

An amendment was moved, that the name recommended by the Committee for Novar and Scotia field be changed from Parry Sound G

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Circuit to Parry Sound Mission The amendment prevailed. The report was then adopted as amended, and passed.

Novar and Scotia's report was presented by the P. Elder. The name of J. U. Robins, pastor of Novar and Scotia, was passed.

Rev. J. Mager asked for fransfer to Eric Conference, and the request was granted. Rev. D. H. Ferguson was granted an open transfer.

Election for Presiding Elder resulted in the choice of I. W. Grob, on the first ballot

Report on Church Erection was presented. Discussed by Geo. Backus, D. C. Dafoe, J. Geach, Jos. Showers, J. Moore and the Bishop. Report was adopted. See Report No. 4.

A motion to adjourn was then entertained.

#### Afternoon Session.

After devotional exercises, a report of the Trustees for Dundee and Manheim churches appointed by last Conference, was called for, reported and passed. See Report No. 5.

The disposition of the funds from the sale of said churches was then taken up. A motion was moved to the effect that the Mission debt be paid, and the balance go to the Blenheim charge to assist in liquidating the debt on the new church at the Windfall appointment. By general consent the motion was laid on the table until the Branch Missionary Treasurer be enabled to report.

Report on Sabbath Schools was read by Committee. Discussed by R. Jamieson, G. H. Backus, R. Head and Bishop Kephart. The paper was then passed. See Report No. 6.

Report of Committee on Candidates for the Ministry was called for, reported and passed. See Report No. 7.

Committee on Education reported. R Head represented Ofterbein University, also the Bishop gave some timely remarks on the need of a better educational standard in the ministry. Paper was adopted. See Report No. 8.

The Committee on Conference Finance made their report. Report was adopted.

Levi Stauffer was re-elected Trustee for Otterbein University.

Jos Showers and R. Head were appointed Auditing Committee of Branch Missionary Treasurer's and Preachers' Aid Treasurer's Books.

J. F. Durkee was granted Supernumary relations at his own request, for one year.

Adjourned on motion, C. H. Elliott pronouncing the benediction.

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#### Saturday Morning.

Miss Adelia Pratt led the devotional service. The Bishop occupied the chair, and the Secretary called the roll.

Report of Preachers' Aid was called for, read and passed. See Report No. 9.

Wm. Michiner was continued Treasurer of Preachers' Aid Fund.

and the other officers were re elected.

Report of Branch Church-Erection Treasurer was called up, but the Treasurer not being present a motion prevailed that he make out a report and hand it to the Editor of the Minutes. See Report No. 10. J. U. Clemens was re-elected Treasurer of C. E. S., R. Head Secretary, and Jos. Showers President.

A motion prevailed that the Conference Secretary publish the Minutes at his discretion, drawing on the Branch Missionary Treasurer for expenses.

It was decided by a standing vote that the next session of Conference be held at Shelburne.

Report on Elders' Orders was given and passed. See Report

Report on Missions was called up and read. The discussion on this paper by R. Jamieson, I. W. Grob, and the Bishop, was of an interesting character. The report passed. See Report No. 12.

Privilege was granted the Trustees of Port Elgin church to

sell said church.

The report of the Finance Committee was read and passed. See Report No. 13.

C. D. Bowman was elected Sabbath School Secretary and Treasurer.

Report on Y. P. C. U. was read, discussed by R. Jamieson, G. H. Backus, D. C. Dafoe. The report was adopted. See Report No. 14. Adjourned on motion, benediction pronounced by J. Geach.

#### Afternoon Session.

Devotional by W. H. Dafoe.

The Bishop called the Conference to order, and appointed the Standing Committees.

The Branch Missionary Treasurer reported, and his report was passed. See Report No. 15.

Report of Conference Auditing Committee was rendered and passed. See Report No. 16.

Isaac Hilborn was re elected Branch Missionary Treasurer.

The motion regarding the disposition of funds from the sale of Dundee and Manheim churches was lifted from the table, and disposed of in harmony with the tabled motion.

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Rep of t Report on Publishing Interest was rendered and passed. Discussion on paper by D. C. Dafoe, R. Jamieson and others. See Report No. 17.

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At this juncture Bishop Kephart made an appeal in favor of the Century Library publication, giving some needful information.

The officers of the Branch Missionary Society were re-elected.

Committe on Manairs was called and reported, and Geo. II. Backus conducted appropriate services. Remarks were made by J. Moore, J. W. Newbery and others.

The stillness of deep respect seemed to settle down upon the Conference while these brethren spoke tenderly and hopefully of the earthly life of the departed, not knowing which one of us the hand of Death had marked for another year. See Report No. 18.

It was moved and carried that the Rev. J. F. Durkee receive \$200 out of the Preachers' Aid Fund, \$100 of which be paid within thirty days.

Report on Resolutions was read and adopted. See Report No. 19.

At this time the Bishop delivered an address full of wholesome advice to the members of Conference.

The Presiding Elder was appointed Corresponding Secretary to the Historical Society.

A collection for the Secretary, of \$5.75, was lifted. The Minutes of the day were read and approved.

A motion to finally adjourn on Sabbath evening prevailed.

#### Notes.

On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings the pulpit was yery acceptably occupied by Revs. Grenzebach, Head and Newbery.

On Saturday evening Bishop Kephart delivered his very interesting and instructive lecture on "The Jew in History" to a large and attentive aucience.

Sunday morning the love feast was led by Rev. I. W. Groh, after which the Bishop preached a sermon founded on Mark 8: 8, and Hebrews 2: 3, full of Gospel meat, and accompanied with that measure of spiritual power, which could not but make it a means of helpfulness to every willing listener.

At the close of the preaching service on Sabbath, the three brethren who were recommended for ordination, were ordained by the Bishop, assisted by Revs. Groh and G. Backus, then the one brother who was present, J. H. Dodd, was presented, by the Bishop, with the Annual License granted by Conference.

The Bishop then read the Stationing Committee's report. See Report No. 20.

Thus closed one of the most spiritual and profitable Conferences of the present quadrennium.

#### REPORTS.

#### Report No. 1-Presiding Elder's Report.

To the Ontario Annual Conference:

Dear Bishop and Brethren,—In presenting to you this general report, I acknowledge the presence of the triune God, and the courtesy and faithfulness of the ministers and people.

The District is composed of two mission stations, five missions,

and seven circuits—fourteen in all

Waterloo and Niagara circuits are too large, they cover too much

territory to be properly worked.

Brothers J. B. Backus and J. Mager resigned the fields assigned them by the last annual Conference. Brother J. U. Robins took charge of Novar Mission with Scotia Mission and worked the two fields, and Brother J. W. H. Newbery was appointed to Vienna circuit, and worked it very acceptably. The rest of the fields were served faithfully, generally speaking, as arranged by the last Conference.

The ministers were well, with the exception of Brothers Geo. H. Backus, J. Showers and R. Jamieson, they having been incapacitated for work through sickness for a couple of weeks, but had their fields

supplied very satisfactorily. The business and general interests of the church have been care-

fully looked after. Owing to the extremely cold and stormy winter, and so very much sickness among our people, we were materially hindered in revival efforts, hence have not had the ingathering of souls we had honed for. The interest in the Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies is very good,

especially that of the Sabbath Schools The Ministerial Association and Young People's convention were held in our church at Elcho, Gainsboro circuit, both of which were well attended, and were interesting and profitable. We were most happily favored with the presence of our honored Bishop Kephart, whose sermons and addresses were very highly appreciated by all present.

At Windfall, on the Blenheim mission, a new church hasbeen built,

to be dedicated by our honored Bishop the Sabbath following Conference. Quite extensive repairs have been made on several of our churches

in the district.

Personally I have received the kindest treatment from all. Have held all the quartertravelled by rail over four thousand miles. lies, fifty-six in number, but two, Brothers Houseman and Mager each

On the 1st of February I dedicated the Maple Grove church on Shelburne circuit, assisted by Bros. Durkee, Houseman, Showers and

J. Geach, pastor. Have delivered two hundred and nine sermons and addresses. Baptized nineteen; Licensed one; Received one with quarterly conference license from the Methodist Episcopal church.

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Brothers George Comfort and John Dodd were recommended by their quarterly conferences to the annual conference.

#### Report No. 4 - Church Erection.

That there must be a church house is admitted by all in whose breast there is a spark of love for God. A place that we can call our church home, where God and the people meet. It has been so in the past, it must be so in the future. But there are two extremes to which people are likely to go which it is well to guard against, namely, not building as God has prospered, any kind of a shed will do, or there is a danger of going to the other extreme. We must not think of building a church on some sideroad as costly as the Temple at Jerusalem; the fact that the Temple at Jerusalem was a costly structure is no warrant for the building of imposing and costly churches to-day, The Temple stood for the entire Jewish church and therefore the whole nation was called upon to aid in its erection, to-day each neighborhood must build for itself and should consider its ability before the work is undertaken, or as Jesus would say, count the cost. It is a wrong idea to start to build a church without knowing where the funds with which to complete it are coming from; it is all well enough to have faith, but it is also well in church building to remember that God only helps those who plan wisely and according to the rules of common sense; it is well to remember what Jesus says in reference to the tower building. It would be a good thing if the divine plan of church building was carried out, then how much sorrow and how many mistakes would be avoided. A good general will not lead his army unprepared in front of the enemy, neither should a preacher lead his people into building beyond what

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esses. onferthey are able to pay. It is dishonorable and cowardly in any man to attempt this kind of thing with the idea that he can move off with the honor of building, while others will have to drag for years to pay off the debt. Certain rules and principles should be scrupthously observed in the building of churches. Build only where churches are needed; don't build in the wrong place to catch a few and lose many; provide the money before building; adopt the pay-as-you go plan.

Then Union Biblical Sencinary: How many, many young men and women have here been qualified and directed to useful lives for Christ.

28b. That the Ministry of Ontario Annual Conference apply themselves earnestly and diligently in preparing for the great work of leading souls to Jesus Christ.

#### Report No. 12 - Missions.

To the Bishop and Brethren of the Ontario Annual Conference:

Your Committee on Missions would submit to you the following:

First, we would "remember all the way the Lord hath led us," and guarded our way, watching over us with jealous care, permitting us to again meet after another year's mission, to greet one another and to lay the report of our gleanings before the scrutinizing eye of our beloved Bishop, who may be satisfied or otherwise that we have done what we could. I wonder how we stand in the eyes of our Great Bishop, Christ Jesus! Is he satisfied? Have we done our best?

The subject of missions is a very plain one. It is our mission to do the will of Him that sent us.

Jesus said "if ye know these things happy are ye if ye do them." Here we find two points—first, to know, second, to do.

If we read our Father's will we will find in it such expressions as these, "go ye into all the world;" "teach all nations;" "to every creature;" pray ye the Lord of the harvest," &c. By these expressions we know that the Father's will is for the trumpets to be blown and the march be continued until the walls of superstition and darkness crumble and be rased before the onward march of Immanuel's host.

Listen, brethren! Is this not the morning of the seventh day? Should we not exert ourselves seven times as much as we have heretofore with

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the l stan leave glor fore? And should we not expect the promise fulfilled? Then we may with assurance look for our glorious Lord.

Second, we should 10, and in this we are free to acknowledge that much has been done toward fulfilling God's will in the mission field, and this increases as the century draws to a close.

We see but one hindrance to the world knowing the Lord before the first quarter of the incoming century has passed from us.

We have the money and we have the workers, but a mighty Prince called Max's Will keeps guard over the treasure-house.

It is our business to impress upon this great Sovereign the truth, that if he will but open the trunsury of this world's goods, it will be but a few short periods of time until we might by this world of redeemed sinners as a trophy at the feet of our Divine Lord.

There is much yet to be done in all departments of our work. We are deeply impressed that our Home work will admit of re-adjustment.

We are persuaded that it is wiser to operate missions in a new, growing and promising district, where the gospel is needed, than in one where there are scores of churches, all depending upon missionary support, and where the resources of the country are becoming exhausted and the inhabitants are compelled to seek more promising districts.

Your Committee on Memoirs beg to submit the following:

The subject before us is that of Bro. Wm. Cornell, who died at his home near Staffordville, Ontario, Feb. 15th, 1899, in the 79th year of his age.

He was born near Sheffield, Ontario, and was the son of the Rev. J. A. Cornell. He received his early education in the village school of Sheffield, and was all his life a close student and a very extensive reader, with a retentive memory, and was considered one of the best informed men in that section of country.

His first charge was Hanover, where he labored two years, afterwards Gainsboro for three years, and Canning for three years, meeting with considerable success in all three charges.
