AN INTERESTING LETTER RECEIVED FROM THE EXPLORER. He Arrives at the Albert Nyanza for the Third Time and Leaves for the Expedition to the North Pole.

By TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. LONDON, 7.—Mr. Mackinnon, the head of the British North Borneo Chartered Company, has received a despatch from Henry M. Stanley. The explorer says—"I reached the Albert Nyanza from Bangala for the third time in 140 days, and found that Emin and Jopson had both been prisoners since August, 1888, being the day after I made the discovery that Bartole's caravan had been wrecked. The troops in the Equatorial province had revolted and shaken off all allegiance. Shortly after the Mahdists invaded the province in full force. After the first battle in May the station yielded and a panic struck the natives who joined the invaders and assisted in the work of destruction. The Mahdists subsequently, suffered reverses and detached a steamer to Khartoum for reinforcements."

"I found a letter waiting for me near the Albert Nyanza, exposing the dangerous position of the survivors, and urging the immediate necessity of my arrival before the end of December, as otherwise it would be too late. I arrived there on the 18th of January for the third time. By the route taken I traversed the Semliki valley, the Awamba, the Ugonora, the Tora, the Uhiyanga, the Umpyanga, the Anthon, the Karagaga, the Uhiyanga, the Tora, the South Victoria, and the Nyanza. No hostile natives were met. Since we left Kabanga we travelled along the base of the Snowy range Rujuza. The State Journal has semi-official returns from a large number of the counties, which indicate that the rest of the ticket is holding up so well that there is a possibility that nearly all, if not all the Republican state ticket is elected, with the exception of Foraker.
