The annual meeting of the Loyalists Society will be held this evening in the rooms of the Historical Society in Market Street.

CANADA'S EVERY SPEAKS.
The following dirty and contemptible paragraph appeared in the editorial columns of the Globe yesterday:

The government has taken a grant of many thousands of dollars this year for the purpose of settling the Loyalists in the Northwest.

The Loyalists Society has a large amount of documentary evidence in regard to the Loyalists, and this information, of the greater part of it, is embodied in a volume which is to be published in the near future.

The Globe, which sneers at everything British or Canadian, sneers at the Loyalists Society when it is first formed, but that rather soon it has been an advantage to it in any way that it did not initiate in any way against its success.

On the 13th of May the Loyalists landed at St. John from the first ship which went out from New York since the close of the war, and that day has ever since been celebrated and held sacred by the Loyalists.

It is said that the grant for immigration purposes this year will be increased by the sum of \$200,000 to be expended mainly in the propagation and distribution of literature in regard to Canada.

The Toronto Mail blames the National Policy for the depression in the value of farms in eastern Canada, and states that a farm of 116 acres, about five miles distant from both Colby and Port Hope, was offered for sale by auction, and was sold for \$40 per acre.

We need hardly comment on the fact that in the case there was a forced sale and that the other offer was a spontaneous one. Six years ago, however, the National Policy had been in force for five years and the Grit papers had been vigorously preaching war and ruin as its result.

The Moncton Telegraph says: The population of Canada has not increased since 1875, when as the federal taxation has doubled. This is due to the fact that the fiscal system which creates the agricultural and manufacturing industries has not been maintained.
