

HARLEM STRUCTURE NOW **TWISTED DEBRIS**

Outrage Follows Threats by Strikers-50 Pounds of **Explosive Used.**

New York, May 21.-A new bridge under construction on the Harlem branch of New York, New Haven and Hartford railway at Bay Chester, was wrecked by dynamite to-day. A charge of fifty pounds of the explosive was discharged under the first span, twisting the huge girders and practically wrecking the whole structure. To-day's outrage followed an unsuccessful at-tempt to wreck a bridge on the same ráilroad over the Harlem river early yesterday. The bridge was a modern structure

which had been erected over the tracks near the Bay Chester station for foot and vehicle traffic. For many months it had been the scene of almost constant labor troubles. It is alleged that striking workmen have made frequent threats to blow up the bridge unless their grievances were adjusted and as a result of these watchmen have been on guard at the bridge every night. Yesterday when the fullie attempt was made to destroy the other bridge an-other watchman was added to the force and all these were on duty last night. Just at dawn there one on a solution of the solution. Just at dawn there came a flash near the first span, followed by a terrific refor tand the grinding and tearing of the great steel girders. Two of the watchmen who were within fifty feet of the end of the bridge were thrown to the ground. Hundreds of windows m the vicinity were smashed. The watenmen scrambled to their feet, in time to see two, men dashing away through the semi-darkness. A fusilade was sent after them, but they failed to reach the mark.

Experts who viewed the work of the wreckers were unanimous in declaring that at least fifty pounds of dynamite must have been placed under the abutment work on the south end of the bridge. It is believed that it will take two months to repair the damage



Committee Will Go Into the **Government's New Order** on Subject.

At the monthly meeting of the Provincial Royal Jubilee hospital last night the question of transferring a hustand's privileges to his wife's account in payment for treatment was considered, and disallowed, as it was thought such action would establish an undesirable precedent. The concluding portion of this clause reads as follows: "Provided that this clause does not apply to entertain-ments organized for charitable or public purposes or organized and given by private or fraternal organizations."

When this was read Ald, Henderson remarked that this made the clause open to attack. The by-law with this in could be successfully fought in the courts by any one who desired to do so. It would be certain to, involve the council in more litigation.

Ald. Hall: "That's what the by-law is being made for." Ald. Gleason objected to any such statement being made.

Ald. Henderson said he did not know what other effect it could have. Ald. Fullerton wanted to be assured that the by-law would not interfere with Sunday band concerts, and was told it






