Harry Heathcote of Gangoli.

BY ANTHONY TROLLOPE.

'It's out of the question,' he said.—
The very firmness, however, with
which he spoke gave a certain cordial-
ity even to his refusal. 'I must be at
home, so that the men may know
where to find me till I go out for the
night.' Then, after a pause, he con-
tinued, 'As we can't go to you, why
should you not come to us?'

So it was at last decided, much to
Harry's own astonishment, much to
his wife's delight. Kate, therefore,
when she lay awake, thinking of the
one word that had been spoken, knew
that there would be an opportunity for
another word.

Medlicot drove his mother home
safely, and, after that he had taken
her into the house, encountered Nokes
on his return from Boalabong, as has
been told at the close of the last chap-
ter.

On the Monday morning Harry
came home as usual, and, as usual,
went to bed after breakfast. 'I
wouldn't care about the heat if it were
not for the wind,' he said to his wife
as he threw himself down.

'The wind carries it so, I suppose.'
'Yes, and it comes from just the
wrong side—from the Northwest.—
There has been half a dozen fires about
to-day.'

'During the night, you mean.'
'No; yesterday—Sunday. I can not
make out whether they come by them-
selves. They certainly are not made
by incendiaries.'

'Accidents, perhaps.'
'Well, yes. Somebody drops a
match, and the sun ignites it. But
the chances are much against a fire
like that spreading. Care is wanted
to make it spread. As far as I can
learn the worst fires have not been
just after mid-day, when, of course,
the heat is greater, but in the early
night, before the dews have come.—
All the same, I feel that I know
nothing about it—nothing at all. Don't
let me sleep long.'

In spite of this injunction, Mrs.
Heathcote determined that he should
sleep all day if he would. Even the
nights were fearfully hot and sultry,
and on this Monday morning he had
come home much fatigued. He would
be out again at sunset, and now he
should have what rest nature would
allow him. But in this resolve she
was opposed

Academy the patronage of the Government, while doing all in its power to overturn the administration.

Messrs. Langley, Hamilton, Gough and others supported the resolution, but the prevailing feeling in the House was averse to the perpetuation of two languages, when one was sufficient.

Mr. Gough argued in favor of the resolution, and said that carriers could be broken down by letting the French know and feel an interest in what was going on in the public departments of the country. More competition in public works would result from the publication contemplated, and he believed public money would be saved.

He moved a resolution that all notices emanating from Public Works Department be made and published in French and in French newspapers when deemed of advantage to the public interests.

Hon. Mr. Crawford said that in the allusion made by him to the matter, he referred to the fact that he would himself patronize a friendly rather than an unfriendly paper.

Hon. Mr. Kelly said that when he had sent notice to the *Montreal Académie* in reference to bridge tenders, references were put near it stating that the contract would be unfavourably given to that or that person.

Mr. Hamilton challenged the Chief Commissioner to cite an instance of what he had stated.

The Chief Commissioner said that if Mr. Hamilton read the papers as much as he professed to he would have seen them. He had never seen any complaints from the French people, because notices were not published in French. The French got many contracts and were good contractors.

Mr. Adams could not say that the resolution, though he thought the *Montreal Académie* should publish notices relating to the Public Works in Westernland, Kent and Gloucester. No resolution, however, is necessary. On the same principle all country papers must be similarly provided for. He thought the Government had no right to withhold advertisements from an opposition paper as such.

Hon. Mr. King said the Government had no desire to coerce any member but all Governments favored friends in preference to enemies. If the *Montreal Académie* pockets money for an advertisement and says no one need apply for what is advertised in it, he tries to render it valueless. The resolution is an entering wedge for the establishment of a system of two languages.

Mr. Blanchard said the French were rising in importance every day; and the treatment they received at the hands of the Government was a lesson to them; and the Government might find that the increasing power of his people would be felt to hold a balance of even greater weight in the House than now. He referred to the publication of the Government and Legislative matters in both languages in Quebec, and claimed some privileges for the French here.

Mr. O'Leary said that in Kent the French do not know when contracts are to be given. He stated that the French settlers in one parish had to build some thirty miles of roads and large bridges, and they had not been given one cent by the Government.

Mr. Groulx said he had made it his business to see if his country and its settlements had got justice in this matter from Govt. He found they were as well treated as any other country. Mr. O'Leary said one of those who grumbled with his arm folded. The more you do for some people the more they want. Most of the French people who interest themselves in Public Works can read English, and it would be partly a waste of money to subsidize one paper as attempted by the resolution.

Hon. Mr. Kelly replied to Mr. O'Leary, and said Mr. Groulx had looked out well for his country, which drew largely from the public funds for its roads and bridges. There were a great many bridges built by the people themselves.

Mr. Gough, in closing the debate, said the resolution was no attempt to subsidize any paper, as he had suggested it himself. The Editor of the *Montreal Académie* knew nothing of it. The French contribute their share of public money, and have a reasonable right to ask that notice be given to them when money is to be expended in their locality. The opposition of the Government to this resolution is aimed at the *Montreal Académie* rather than at the principle involved in it. Mr. Blanchard having accepted Mr. Gough's amendment, a division was taken on it as follows:

Yeas—Messrs. Gough, Alward, Blanchard, Langley, O'Leary, Gillespie, Hamilton, Maher, Covert—9.

Nays—Hon. Fraser, King, Kelly, Stevenson, McQueen, Crawford, Williams, Tibbitts, McPherson, Montgomery, Hibbard, Beckwith, Phillips, Donald, Napier, Robinson, Nowlan, Butler, Palmer, Ryan, Humphreys, Gironard, Williams, Harrison, Irvine, Lindsay, Brown—27.

Mr. Gough moved for papers relating to the Rivière du Loup grants according to notice.

The Commissioner of Public Works laid his report on the table, and the Secretary laid on the table a number of papers asked for by Mr. Hamilton and others.

February 28.

Mr. Lindsay took the chair this morning in the absence of Speaker Vall.

A message relating to bills was received from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Hibbard presented a petition from George M. Peters and others, asking a definition of what income tax is; also a petition of William H. Murray and others, praying that they may be heard in reference to the Beaulieu Boon Bill.

Mr. Hamilton said the Chief Commissioner had asserted yesterday that the same time the *Montreal Académie* inserted an advertisement for bridge tenders, it published editorials that no Frenchmen need apply. He (Hamilton) said he had enquired of the editor of the *Montreal Académie* by telegraph, if that or any similar thing had been inserted by him. Mr. Hamilton read the answer from F. X. Robideaux, stating that no such statement was ever made in his paper. Mr. Kelly had refused to pay for the advertisement of the Monoton bridge, three years ago, and he had said to Mr. Kelly, at Kirk's Hotel, personally, that no Frenchmen need apply.

Hon. Mr. Kelly denied having said in the House yesterday that the words were "No Frenchmen need apply."

He said certain parties need not apply. He had never refused to pay a bill presented by Mr. Robideaux.

This matter caused considerable further explanation by Messrs. Gough, Kelly and others, which the Speaker said was out of order.

Mr. Hamilton asked if the Commissioner would inform the House, as asked by him a few days ago, in reference to the length of the bye roads of the Province.

The Commissioner said he would be hardly justified in putting a survey on the bye-roads, at considerable expense, without a resolution of the House asking him to do so.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Feb'y 25th.

Bill to allow Rev. Jno. D. Pope, an alien, to solemnize marriage, passed in committee.

Hon. Mr. Young delivered a message from the Lieutenant Governor, containing the remonstrance of Hon. Messrs. Young, Fraser and King to the Costigan Resolution, and also a message relating to the Export Duty.

Hon. Mr. Seely directed the attention of the House to the fact that four vacancies existed in the Council, and asked if the Government intend to fill them up.

Hon. Mr. Young stated that there was nothing in the law to compel the Government to keep the number up to eighteen, but he would say the matter was under the consideration of the Government, and at an early day the vacancies will be filled up. The Government was fully aware of the importance of the matter, and believed the appointments should not be hastily made, but be an honor to the House and a credit to the country.

Hon. Mr. Seely said two sessions have passed without filling up the vacancies, and in view of important measures coming up he considered the House ought to be filled.

Hon. Robinson-Owen believed the Council was a check on the hasty legislation below, and the men appointed need not be from different Counties, but good men should be obtained without reference to residence.

Hon. Mr. Hamilton believed it was the feeling of the country that the members should be from the different Counties.

The bill to allow the Diocesan Church Society to sell or lease certain lands deeded in trust for the Church, by the late Governor Campbell, passed in committee.

The following bills were brought up from Assembly:

To establish a separate polling place at Colburn, in the County of Restigouche.

To incorporate St. Mary's Grand Lake and Sarny Bay Railway Co.

To incorporate King's County and Grand Lake Railway Co.

Hon. Mr. McInerney presented a petition from Rev. P. Farrall and 188 others to amend the School Act. The roll of the House was called, and Hon. Mr. Harrison found to be the only member absent without leave.

Hon. Mr. Seely presented a petition from James McMillan and others to remove doubts as to Licence Law.

Bill to incorporate Upper Mills, St. Stephen, discussed in committee. Hon. Mr. Lewis in chair. Hon. Mr. Seely proposed an amendment to 24th Sec., as in matters of riot &c., jurisdiction rests with the Dominion.

Hon. Mr. Young believed there would be a conflict between the sessions and Town Council in relation to taxes, but as the mover was satisfied with it, he would propose no amendment. Passed.

Feb'y 26th.

Hon. Mr. Hamilton presented a Petition from Right Rev. Bishop Sweeney, Geo. Cowell, Boyd Travers, and 1205 others of St. John, praying for an amendment to the School Act.

Hon. Capt. Owen-Robinson called attention to small corporation bills. He said that companies could obtain incorporation by filing their articles of association in the secretary's office by paying a fee of \$16. Scarcely a bill passed the House, but it cost \$100 to \$150 in printing and engrossing. There had been a rule in the Assembly by which private bills had to be accompanied with \$30 to pay the cost of engrossing &c.

Hon. Mr. Bailey said the object of the General Act was to facilitate corporation acts during recess.

Hon. Mr. Hamilton, said that in the Commons of England and Canada, fees were paid in, which defrayed the expenses of engrossing clerks. He did not believe in hampering legislation in favor of enterprises calculated to develop the industries and resources of the country. Confederation has left the House nothing to do, except local and private bills, and he did not think the time of the House improperly taken up with these matters.

Hon. Capt. Owen-Robinson did not complain of the time wasted, but money wasted.

Hon. Mr. Lewis said the thirty dollar rule never gave satisfaction in the House. The people preferred this mode of doing business, and he thought the money could not be better expended.

South West Boon Company considered in Committee.

Hon. Mr. Seely in chair. Hon. Mr. McInerney explained provisions of bill. A company already exists. The object is to repeal the old Act of incorporation and obtain a new Act with larger powers and a capital stock of \$40,000.

Hon. Mr. Seely thought that giving the Co. one quarter of all unmarked logs was unjust to owners of logs.

Hon. Mr. McInerney said that provision was for the mutual benefit and protection of all concerned.

Hon. Mr. Young asked to know if Mrs. Eliza Jane Wilson's rights, as exhibited by her petition to the House, were protected. The chairman said they were.

Hon. Mr. Hamilton believed it was much better for the Company to make the regular charges and take no unmarked logs.

Hon. Mr. Bailey said the Company was obtaining too much in getting one quarter of logs.

The chairman said the bill was a compromise between the Company and the owners of logs.

Hon. Mr. Beveridge agreed with Hon. Mr. Hamilton. He asked how wide should Mrs. Wilson's waterway be?

Hon. Mr. Bailey believed the Company could under the bill get one quarter of unmarked logs and expenses besides. They wanted too much.

Hon. Mr. McInerney said there was a great deal of trouble in getting un-

marked logs and one quarter was not too much. Progress reported.

Feb. 27th.

Bill to establish a polling booth in Colbourne, County of Restigouche, committed. Hon. Mr. Lewis in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Young said if Hon. Mr. Hamilton was satisfied that there was a necessity for the bill he would not oppose it.

Hon. Mr. Hamilton said the people had to travel from 15 to 18 miles to vote, and he believed it was a proper bill. House went into committee on South West Boon bill. Hon. Mr. Lewis in chair.

Hon. Mr. Young proposed an amendment making Mrs. Wilson's right of water way, the whole of her lot, which was carried, and the bill passed.

FLANNEL UNDERWEAR.—The value of flannel next the skin cannot be overrated. It is invaluable to persons of both sexes, and of all ages, in all countries, and in all climates, at every season of the year, for the sick and the well—in brief, I cannot conceive of any circumstances in which flannel next the skin is not a comfort and a source of health. It should not be changed from thick to thin before the settled hot weather of the summer, which in our Northern states is not much before the first of July. And the flannel for the summer must not be three quarters cotton, but they must be all woolen, if you would have the best protection. In the British army and navy they make the wearing of flannel a point of discipline. During the hot season the ship's doctor makes a daily examination of the men at unexpected hours, to make sure that they have not left off their flannels.—*Dio Lewis.*

A Compulsory Education Bill has just passed the Illinois House of Representatives by a vote of 87 to 48. The bill provides that children between the ages of 9 and 14 shall be sent to school at least three months in the year, which six weeks be consecutive. The bill shall be taught reading, writing, grammar, geography, and arithmetic; that school teachers shall be licensed by the State, and that the Directors of Schools shall be elected by the people.
