Alfred Tennyson, poet laureate of England, died at Aldworth, Haslemere, England, last Thursday ing at 1.30. It was known for days that the aged singer could not lon survive His feeble frame had be survive come palsied and his whole system showed signs of breaking up, and on Wednesday afternoon his friends gathered about his dying bed await ng the end, His death is described as being a most glorious one. night was brilliant with moonlight and the wind moaned softly through the trees about the house. There was darkness of the chamber was broken only by a flood of moonlight which came is through the window. Towards the close the beams fell with all their radiance across the bed, bathing the features of the dying poet in a flood of soft mellow light forming a picture which touched the hearts of the watchers. So calm and peaceful, was his death that the exact moment of his passing away is not known. No spasms of pain or anguish marked his features as his soul went to the great beyond. During the afternoon he called for a copy of Shakespeare and turned to the dirge in Cymbeline. Whether he read or not he gave no sign, but with his left hand on the

open page he breathed his last.
Alfred Lord Tennyson, D. C. L., F. R. S., was born on August 6th 1809 at Somerby, England where his fathe was rector. His mother was a daughter of Rev. Stephen Fytche, and fro both he inherited literary tastes. His carly education he received at hom and later at Trinity College, Cam bridge. In 1829 he won a medal for a poem entitled Timbuctco. In 1830 he published a volume of poem: "Chiefly Lyricial" and from 1842 he wrote almost continuously and his flight to fame began. Locksley Hall, May Queen, and Two Voices followed and in 1850 when In Memorian appeared and Wordsworth the laureate died, he was awarded the laureateship. 


