LORD TENNYSON DEAD

Alfred Tennyson, poet laureate of England, died at Aldworth, Haslemere, England, last Thursday morning at 1.30. It was known for days that the aged singer could not long survive. His feeble frame had become rickety and his whole system showed signs of breaking up, and on Wednesday afternoon his friends gathered about his dying bed awaiting the end. His death is described as being a most glorious one. The night was brilliant with moonlight and the wind moaned softly through the trees about the house. There was no artificial light in the room and the darkness of the chamber was broken only by a flood of moonlight which came in through the window. Towards the close the beams fell with all their radiance across the face of the poet, and he lay looking up at the foot of the dying poet in a flood of soft moonlight forming a picture which touched the hearts of the watchers. So calm and peaceful, was his death that the exact moment of his passing away is not known. No spasm of pain or anguish marked his features as his soul went to the great beyond. During the afternoon he called for a copy of Shakespeare and turned to the drama in Cymbeline. Whether he read or not he gave no sign, but with his left hand on the open page he breathed his last.

Alfred Lord Tennyson, D. C. L., F. R. S., was born on August 6th 1809, at Somersby, England where his father was rector. His mother was a daughter of Rev. Stephen Fytche, and from both he inherited literary tastes. His early education he received at home and later at Trinity College, Cambridge. In 1829 he won a medal for a poem entitled "Timbuctoo". In 1830 he published a volume of poems "Chiefly Lyric". In 1842 he wrote almost continuously and his flight to fame began. Locksley Hall, May Queen, and The Voices followed, and in 1850 when In Memoriam appeared and Wordsworth the laureate died, he was awarded the laureateship. Since that date he has written much which will live long after his death has been forgotten, and so long as pure English word songs are admired.

Tennyson has written many beautiful poems; so many that the lovers of his writings are lost in the selection of a masterpiece. "Maud" brings out the poet's rare genius and thought. "The Prince" is a study of woman and her social position, but it is in "In Memoriam" that he finds his way into the human heart. Who have not, who bowed by grief and wept, found in the cantos of this sublime song a balm for every wound? In his touches those chords which carry the note of sadness to the sorrowful. It was written under great stress of feeling over the loss of his friend Hallam and although it was years after the poet's death that it was published, it is undoubtedly the greatest living writer but it is too democratic and has written much that would be better unwritten. William Morris comes next but is a poetist. The other names are Sir Edwin Arnold, Lewis Morris, Alfred Austin and Robert Buchanan. Arnold has the highest place in the list of probable appointees.

THE CAMPAIGN.

From all quarters of the province come encouraging reports for the opposition candidates. Not only in Westmorland are the people waking up to the realization that Mr. Blair's term of office had better terminate, but in nearly every county the opposition has placed a strong fighting force in the field and the prospects of their election are brightening every day. During the past week, Messrs Powell, Wells, Melanson and Sumner have addressed the electors and have met with every show of enthusiasm, even in the government strongholds, and their friends are sanguine of their return on the 22nd. Terrific efforts will be made to shut Mr. Powell out of the house. Every means will be used to the front ranks of provincial men he has been one of the thorns which has fastened in Mr. Blair's side. His wide knowledge of law, his undoubted power of sarcasm and invective, and his never resting faculty for prying into the dark corners of shady transactions has made him one of the men whom Mr. Blair has just cause to fear. Soon after Mr. Powell's election in 1890, Mr. Blair realized the force of the new acquisition to the ranks of the enemy and his desire to get him out found utterance in the protest and by election which followed. But the people of Westmorland are aware of Mr. Blair's desire in this respect and will return Mr. Powell together with Messrs Wells, Melanson and Sumner.

In Albert the opposition are the field, Mr. W. B. Jones, Dr. Lewis and Mr. R. R. Emerson. In this county the opposition candidates' prospects are considered excellent. Mr. Jones who appears for a second time before the electors is a man of high intellectual qualities and as a representative would do the county honor.

The friends of the opposition to the Blair government held a convention at Moncton on Thursday afternoon last. About 80 delegates representing every parish in the county responded to the short notice. After the preliminary formalities, the following nominating committee was drawn up and retired to select the candidates: Moncton City—John I. Harris and E. C. Cole.
Moncton Parish—W. F. Humphrey, Thos. Hennessey.

The announcement was received with loud and repeated cheers and approval. In response to the call the candidates, Dr. Belliveau and W. A. Russell made short addresses.

In the evening a ratification meeting was held in the Opera House, at which a large number attended. Chairman E. C. Cole introduced Mr. H. A. Powell who was received with much enthusiasm. After returning the welcome, Mr. Powell pointed out the increased responsibility which rested with the members of the government, now that the council had been abolished. He knew of no more important legislative duty than that which fell to the lot of the members at Fredericton. Every act passed bore directly upon the people. In referring to the abolition of the council he gave some historical facts. The first year he was in the house, Hon. Robt. Young introduced a bill to abolish it. If Mr. Blair had really desired that end it could have been done at that time and the province saved some \$25,000. Instead of helping the bill through however he posted his colleagues with the result that the bill was buried. In his manifesto Mr. Blair said the cause of the opposition has been one of calumny and cowardice. He reviewed the action taken in reference to the charges made against the government and the appeal for a royal commission. With the experience of past committee investigations in mind, he was many reasons why a committee of the house was unfair. These committees were made up of two supporters of the government, two opponents and a chairman, who was a government supporter. In the Leary scandal investigation the Baleon scandal and the Leary investigation their experience was the same, when a witness for the prosecution was needed or the relevancy of evidence questioned, the government supporters took one side and the opposition supporters took the other. It was the same in every case and the opposition knew what the "Wilson committee" meant. About the governor's refusal to grant the request for a royal commission he said everybody knew that the governor was in all cases only the mouthpiece of his advisers. In this case His Honor's reply was written on a type writer in Mr. Blair's office on Sunday afternoon and it was ready for the governor's signature on Monday morning. The governor's answer was Mr. Blair's reply. As to the constitutional question he referred his honors to the Quebec investigation as to whether the request was constitutional or not. In reading Mr. Blair's progressive acts he spoke of the Northumberland deal of which \$25,000 were given to the

Northumberland lumbermen, and to the O'Brien bridge claim.

In the latter claims, Mr. O'Brien offered at one time to settle for \$3,000 which the government refused. The latter after the election when Mr. Blair was hard pressed it was settled for \$1,300. In speaking of the railway subsidies Mr. Powell carried out his promises for subsidies. In the case of the North Shore road and the line was subsidised from Shediac to Wm. Avar's barnyard, Shemogue. In dealing with the question of finance Mr. Powell stated and said he would like to have it carried to Mr. Blair that the public accounts of the province were falsified, and a letter showing made that as actually existed. The policy of the opposition called for a curtailment of expenditure. The expenditure must be kept within the revenue. It was the great provincial debts which were sinking the country and every annexation openly said that the great provincial debts would drive Canada into the arms of the United States.

Mr. A. W. Melanson was loudly applauded when he stepped to the front and gave an account of his stewardship as their representative. When elected he had intended to give an independent support to the government but the stumpage bill involved so great a sacrifice of people's money that he voted against it. He wanted a railway from Shediac to Cape Tormentine and the members of the government said he could not get it unless he did not consider the opposition. Afterwards however when that county spoke against him with four loud voices and he would have been sent from his seat of administration he openly bought them with the people's money to retain himself in power. He spoke of the attempt of Mr. Blair had made to throttle Westmorland by buying one member and in Albert by encouraging a coalition. He dwelt to considerable length upon the financial condition of the province and asked the people to rise and put an end to expensive political joggery.

Mr. F. W. Sumner of Moncton followed and developed upon the financial management of the province. This was Mr. Sumner's maiden speech to a large political audience upon the questions of the day. He asked for a hearty support for his ticket on the 22nd.

Mr. W. W. Wells was the last speaker. He spoke of the attempt of Mr. Blair had made to throttle Westmorland by buying one member and in Albert by encouraging a coalition. He dwelt to considerable length upon the financial condition of the province and asked the people to rise and put an end to expensive political joggery.

THE GOVERNMENT TICKET.

As stated last week the friends of the Blair government held a convention at Moncton on Wednesday night, 5th. President W. B. Chandler explained the object of the meeting and referred to the claims of the government for support. A letter from J. A. McQueen was read thanking the association for past favors and declining any nomination which might be tendered him. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. McQueen for his past services. Mr. A. D. Richard said he accepted nomination with pleasure. He had long been an admirer of Mr. Blair but as a law student of Mr. Hanington he supported that gentleman from necessity rather than from choice but he had never shed his eyes to the good legislation of Mr. Blair nor to his excellent qualities.

Mr. A. E. Killam referred to his past services in the legislature and his confidence in the administration. He pointed out the work it had done for the country.

Mr. G. C. Copp thanked the convention for the honor it had done him and expressed his confidence in the administration.

Speeches were afterwards made by Messrs W. B. Chandler, David Grant Dr. Gandet, C. C. Hamilton and John Hickey.

On Thursday Mr. Smith vied a flat refusal to run but later from St. John withdrew until he arrived home. On Friday he consented to run and Mr. Copp declined. On Sunday Mr. W. Woodbury Wells, barrister of Port Elgin was chosen and is now in the field.

THE ISSUE.

The principal issue brought before the electors to consider this morning in the present campaign is one bearing upon the management of the finances of the province. During Mr. Blair's regime the debt of New Brunswick has been allowed to accumulate at a rate which is calculated to give alarm.
