THE FURNITURE INDUSTRY.

London's Central Position Greatly in Its Favor.

Mechanic Shows How Furniture
Workers Would Be Benefited
by Reciprocity.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

I notice an article in the Free Press
written by James Hay, jun., the manager of a large furniture manufacturing firm in Woodstock. It surprises me that such men with ordinary ability to "take it in." In the first place he is not a Reformer and was not during the last election, as every one who knows him or read his articles on the N. P. in 1887 should know. He says that our lumber for fine goods, such as walnut or mahogany, comes from the Western States, and that it would be easier to ship machinery there and make it a distributing point for furniture. We all know that a carload of lumber can be shipped less than one-quarter the amount that the same lumber made into furniture can be shipped for. Ontario is geographically situated in as central a location for catching the masses of the United States as any place you can name; for that reason we would be better prepared to compete against the American factories than our neighbors in the extreme East or West. Oak is now the principal wood for making good furniture and we have a great advantage in that, as we have any amount of timber right around us, and our northern forests are full of it.

THE GRAND TRUNK POSITION The most important information in yesterday's telegrams, not even excepting the great Liberal victory in North Bruce, was the statement of General Manager Seargeant, of the Grand Trunk Railway.

Mr. Seargeant does not threaten, eajole, or in any way try influence the employes of the great system under his control. But he makes a plain statement of facts that should be read and pondered over by every Canadian interested in its future prosperity, and who among us is not?

The Grand Trunk manager is forced to the one conclusion that the life of the road, "the bread and cheese," as he puts it forcibly, of both shareholders and employes, can only be assured by the maintenance of the most cordial trade relations between the two countries, in each of which the company has invested millions of dollars. This is made especially evident, as Mr. Seargeant points out, by the recent construction of the tunnel under the St. Clair River at Sarnia.

It is clear from this frank declaration that the General Manager of the Grand Trunk has no sympathy with the men who advocate restriction of commerce between the two countries. How could he or any well-wisher of the Grand Trunk, or of the hundred and one manufacturing and industrial interests that are in part dependent for support on the prosperity of the ever-widening system under its control, favor the curtailing of trade between the two countries? Such a fatuous course no patriot can take. The true interests of the Grand Trunk and of the overwhelming majority of the people of the Dominion lie in the cultivation of spirit of amity, of good will, of freedom of trade with our neighbors. Let the voting to-day demonstrate this.

THE IMPLEMENT INDUSTRY.

Gloomy Prospects Unless Change Takes Place.

Positive Proof from a Hostile Source That Reciprocity Would Be Beneficial.

AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS. It looks as if the agricultural implement trade was on a very shakey basis at the present moment, so far as the rank and file of it are concerned. Another large Western maker was in town this week to interview his bankers, and although it is believed he was successful in arranging mat-ters for the time, it is doubtful whether it is more than a temporary alleviation at the best. Outside of such progressive firms as the Massey Manufacturing Company, of Toronto, and A Harris, Son & Co., of Brantford, it is doubtful if any of them are making money. These firms deal largely in specialties and are con-stantly putting new lines and improvements upon the market, and thus can secure the cream of the business; but those house who run on stock lines only are finding that the keenness of competition is literally freezing them out. Banks are disposed to treat their accounts conservatively, and it is an open secret that certain bankers refuse to renew farmers' notes. They are tired of paper that runs for four years or even more, and they are saying so in no un-certain way. It looks as if those implement houses who are dependent upon their bankers for their finances would have a very hard road to travel before next fali. There is too much truth in this state

nent. We have a magnificent implement factory in this city, equipped with [splendid machinery, standing idle. It has been idle for years. There is no prospect of its being opened under the present state of affairs for no one wants it, even for the price of the machinery within its walls, let alone the fine lot and magnificent structure. Then we have another splendid implement factory hat before the high tax policy was doing well and employed 150 men. It is now doing little or nothing. Would times improve if we had freedom to trade with our neighbors and free raw material? Most undoubtedly. The London Free Press supplies us with proof. We would have a bigger market, and the manufacturers would get bigger prices. They would thus be able to pay nore money to their mechanics. Here is

In that hostile nation are now fully 1,000,000 of Canadians, and Englishmen and sons of Englishmen without number. Many are now the Canadians who have kinsmen on that side of the line. The Queen of England has lest no opportunity of showing her gracious desire to portunity of showing her gracious desire to cultivate the friendship of the American people, and her envoy. Mr. Chamberlain, stated not long ago in this city that he could not speak of the Americans as a foreign nation. The quarrel which ought to have died away long ago is kept up mainly by a clique who seem to think that mainly by a clique who seem to think that natred of the Americans is a mark of gentility. To this fancy we are to sacrifice the great material interests of our people.
