No one in this country wishes to see these developments, or the United States retarded for half a century, as it would necessarily have been if the Government at Washington had seen fie to enter, on so trivial a pretext, upon so unequal a contest. The decision of the commission to withhold its report is an obvious, but effective way out of an awkward situation," In its criticism of the tribunal, the Globe refers to the fact that Venezuela is not represented, "in spite of Lord Salisbury's early assertion that the question at issue only con-cerned the United Kingdom and Venezuela." The article concludes: "It must clearly be understood that the constitution of the new tribunal of arbitration is not to constitute a precedent for arranging all future disputes between the United States and the United Kingdom in North and South America, and that we are not ready to recognize Monroeism as in-ternational law."

STRICT RULES IN GERMANY. Strict regulations govern cycling in Germany. The sport everywhere is subject to police regulations. Alarm bells, brakes and lamps are indispensable. The lamp must be kept lighted from a half-hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise.

Two bicyclists may ride side by side if it does not interfere with other rid-ers or vehicles. More than two machines abreast is not permitted under any circumstances. When meeting or overtaking other bicyclists on roads where it is impossible to see a long distance, or when reaching a steep descent, the rider is obliged to give frequent signals with

his bell. Scorching is not permitted

under any circumstances. At steep grades the rider must dismount and guide his wheel until the descent is passed. The police also have the power to make a rider dismount at any time. A disregard of these regulations is punishable by a fine not exceeding \$14 28, with imprisonment in not more than two weeks, or both.

### THE STERNAMAN CASE.

Extradition Proceedings Continued -

Buffalo, Nov. 11.—Extradition proceedings in the case of Mrs. Olive Adell Sternaman, of this city, charged with poisoning her husband, George S. Sternaman, was resumed yesterday. A number of formal witnesses were heard, identifying the policies and other papers, and testifying to Sternaman's good health when examined for the insurance.

Mr. Thomas, attorney for the Canadian Government, attempted in his examination of these witnesses to show the fabrications resorted to by Mrs.

Sternaman in order to cover her alleged guilty deeds and obtain her husband's insurance. Mr. Thayer, her attorney, tried to prove the genuine-ness of the policies and the absurdity of the supposition that she entertained any schemes at the time of the death of her first and second husbands. Detective Murray, of Toronto, testi-fied that he was a duly authorized detective in the Sternaman case, and that he had obtained all the expert medical evidence read at the first ex-

Drs. W. C. Phelps and Edward L. Frost, who attended Sternaman and Mrs. Sternaman's first husband during their illness, testified to the condition of the man when they were called, etc. Dr. Frest said that in his opinion a man might suffer from chronic poisoning months after taking a dose of arsenic, and that death might come a month or more afterward from the same dose. This evidence, while interesting, is not relevant to the points at issue, and was not contradicted by the attorneys and the officials who were trying to get the extradition man while he resided at 27 Elsie Place, Buffalo. He first visited him on June 24. He urged Mrs. Sternaman to have her husband removed to a hos-pital, but she absolutely refused to do this. Dr. W. C. Phelps was called in consultation, and agreed with Dr. Frost in advising Sternaman's removal to a hospital. Sternaman, when he saw his wife objected to such a procedure, said that he would remain at home, where he could receive he attention. Dr. Frost treated Sterna-



In looking over the grain situation as compared with a week ago, we note cuite a number of changes. Wheat shows more strength; oats a weakness; peas, strength, and the rest of the list no alteration.

The sales of wheat were made at an advance of 1c per bushel, or 2c per 100 pounds. There was a good emand, and the offerings were chiefly of red wheat. The inquiry for white wheat was very much better; prices at the close were \$1 33 for good red and \$1 35 for the same quality of white.

Oats sold lower during the latter half of the week than the former. Best lots of new were worth 65c at today's session-a week ago they were 68c, and even today an extra heavy lot would sell at over 65c, but the quality demanded is such as is almost impossible to get. The ordinary run was sold at 60c to 62c, and the thin. light, and unsound lots 10c and less below these figures. Peas were about 2c up on the bes

anything but satisfactory, being damp. This has a tendency to keep buyers off, as it is impossible to grind or store it in the present shape, and the sales for feeding purposes are not numerous. The price paid was 50c; one lot sold at 60c, surprising every-

Rye was scarce at 50c to 52c; demand Barley was quite active, and the range of sales very wide. Feeding samples ran all the way from 42c to 48c per 100 pounds; bright lots, fit for malting, 50c to 65c-mostly at 60c. Beans have been slow; very few lots in marketable shape offered; those that were dirty and discolored were hard to dispose of. Saleable beans brought 50c to 65c per bushel; the other lots were bought at prices low enough to make feed of them, and

dealers did not care for them even at that price. Eggs were quite firm at 16c to 17c per dozen, according to the sample and quantity.

C., had a big catalogue to put before their patrons yesterday, consisting of some 170 Canadian horses, which included heavy draught horses, vanners, 'bus horses, seasoned harness horses, etc. The attendance was good, and the competition proved excellent, with the result that the prices reached a really nice average. average. Among a lot consigned by Mr. Elliott, of Montreal, a 6-year-old black mare fetched 34 guineas,, a 5year-old roan 29 guineas, a 5-year-old chestnut 32 guineas, and a 5-year-old black mare 28 guineas. Messrs Hay & Kidd, of Listowel, Canada, did even better, as a consignment of fifteen, a bay gelding (5 years) sold for 35 guineas, another 5-year-old bay 40 guin-eas, a grey gelding (5 years) 34 guineas, a chestnut gelding 38 guineas, and a 5-year-old chestnut mare for 40 guineas. Among a lot sent from Friesland, Holland, an entire black horse was disposed of for 50 guineas. A second black entire went for 45 guineas, and a third for 40 guineas. The biggest price, however, was obtained for a 5-year-old grey mare from Bos-ton, Mass., and stated to be quiet in harness, was a prize-winner in Amer-ica, and had trotted a mile in 2:40. She went for 66 guineas, while a 5-yearod bay mare in the same lot fetched 38 guineas, a 6-year-old grey 35 guineas, a 6-year-old bay gelding 30 guineas, and a 6-year-old black 26 guineas."

BRITISH MARKETS. The 4,332 sheep for sale were all from Canada; the trade was slow, without much alteration in


