# KAISER'S DASH FOR SEA HITS STONE WALL

SMASHED BACK AT MESSINES RIDGE AFTER PRODIGIOUS SLAUGHTER

Offensive Operations On New Grand Scale Must Be Viewed of New Perspective-Cold Proposition as to Which Side Can Kill Most Men and Fill Up Ranks.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, THURSDAY, APRIL 11 By the Associated Press.—Determined enemy attacks continued today against points of strategical value along the new battlefront north and south of Armentieres, from which the British have withdrawn, the Germans having placed it in a pocket by driving a wedge on either side of it. On the extreme right the Germans today were pounding away against the British defences at Givenchy, which has changed hands numerous times since the initial enemy onslaught Tuesday. North of Armentieres the Germans were showing an equal desire to possess Mes. sines ridge and Wytschaete, which are dominating positions, and which changed hands several times yesterday and last night. The Germans got a footing in Messine village, and they were still there this morning, but the British were clinging to the west ridge, and were keeping the enemy from Wytschaete. In the neighborhood of Ploegsteert the enemy again surged forward, and hard flighting was proceeding in this section, at the surged forward, and hard fighting was proceeding in this section ate today. South of Armentieres the enemy also delivered violent assaults. PARADIS REGAINED.

The British this morning made a successful counter-attack and forced the enemy from Paradis, southwest of Lestrem. This is on the front between Estraines and Givenchy.

Armentieres was evacuated yesterday afternoon, but was still reeking today with clouds of poisonous gas, and was a most inhospitable place for the enemy. The British withdrawal became necessary when the Germans on the north drove forward to the vicinity of Steenwerck, bottling up the city. By their operations, the Germans had gradually thrust for-ward lines on either side of the city toward the west, until at noon yesterday Armentleres lay at the bottom of a sack-shaped sallent, whose sides were 12,000 yards long, and whose mouth, near Steenwerck, was only 3.000 yards across.

## MEN OF ULSTER **BLOCKED PEACE** AGREED IN ERIN SAYS PLUNKET1

Majority Report of Convention Is Handed Out.

MINORITIES STAND IN WAY Unionists Unite Against Customs Control.

URGES ACTION ON WORK

Interests of Allies Demand That Action Be Taken Upon Report.

London, April 12.—The Irish conven-on laid the foundation for an agreement on the Irish question which is un-precedented in history. Sir Horace Plunkett, chairman of the convention, says in a letter accompanying the re-port of that body. "We had every reason to believe the Government contemplated immediate legislation upon the results of our labor," says Sir Horace. "The work of a Irish settlement, it is now felt, admits of no further proposition. In the dominions and the United States as well as the allied countries, the unsettled Irish question is a disturbing factled Irish question is a disturbing fac-tor, both as regards war effort and peace aims."

After every possibility of After every possibility of an agreement had been explored, Sir Horace writes, he was instructed to draft a report which would be a narrative of the convention's proceedings, with a statement for the Government's information of the convention of t Minority issues Reports.

Sir Horace adds that the public has
een provided with no majority repor

favor of conclusions upon which the majority agreed, but has been left to gather from the narrative of the proceedings what the contents of such a report would have been. The issue of minority reports by the Ulster Unionists and a minority of Nationalists has minimized the agreement reached and emphasized the disagreement.

The convention did not find it possible to overcome the objections of the Ulster

opposing a separate system of custon regarding the decisions of the Irish convention, which had been prohibited in advance of official publication.



#### THE WAR SITUATION

Having pushed back the British positions on a front of 25 miles, north and south of Armentieres, to an average depth of a little more than two miles, the Germans are struggling desperately to increase their gains. The brilliant defence of Field Marshal Halg, however, is beginning to tell, and the enemy advance has slowed up greatly, although the German attacks have although the German attacks have not diminished in intensity, especially on the north and in the centre. 

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

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

### HIGHER FARES MAY BE DECIDED BY RATEPAYERS

Committee Will Very Likely Take a Vote of the People.

#### MAYOR OPPOSES INCREASE

Says That Citizens Are Being Asked to Pay the Stockholders' Dividend,

Discussion of the application of the

ondon Street Rallway Company for higher fares, at a special meeting of the finance committee of the city council last night indicated the determinacil last night indicated the determination of the councillors to send the question to a vote of the people.

From the discussion it would seem as if some of the city fathers, and the mayor in particular, are opposed to increased fares from the start. The mayor left no doubt as to where he stood. He said he was strongly opposed to it. He said they were asking the people to reach down in their pockets and give the stockholders of the company a 6 per cont dividend. He said that their estimates were 25 per cent above their expenditures last year, and they must cut down as the council has. The city is not going to turn over what it is is not going to turn over what saving to the street railway, he clared.

Would Not Consider.

At another stage of the discussion the mayor said: "I don't think the matter hould be considered for a moment."

President Currie said the people want-

President Currie said the people wanted good service and good equipment, and it was impossible to maintain this with the present charges.

The mayor rejoined with an unkind one: "If we got good service here, we would not know what to think of it."

Ald. Holmes and others asked additional information, and the discussion was adjourned until this is prepared.

President Charles Currie, Manager C. B. King, Secretary-Treasurer Leonard Tait, and Supt. Harry Hummeston appeared to present the case of the company.

The mayor, in reference to the company's claim that it is defaulting its capital obligations, stated that he has stock himself which is paying him no dividends, while Ald. Ashplant carried the point one further in voicing the view to President Currie that "Your funeral is our holiday."

Want An Extension.

Before the fares question was taken up the petition of residents of Quebec street for an extension on that street was considered, Mr. Currie stating that when extensions are to be considered Quebec street no doubt will be one of the first choices.

In this connection, however, he claimed that the city has now more mileage than it pays the company to operate. He contended that perhaps 50 per cent of the 30 miles of track in London does not earn anything now.

London does not earn anything now. As an example, he stated that the new Hamilton road extension means a loss to the company every time a car passes. #### Finding Precise Pneumonia Type the Way to Speedy Cure

By DR. LEONARD KEENE HIRSHBERG, A. B., M. A., M. D. (Johns Hopkins University.)

Then came the wonderful discovery by Dr. Rufus I. Cole of an anti-pneumonia serum for Type I. of the four common, garden varieties of pneumonial germs.

The Bureau of Laboratories. Department of Health. New York City, has taken up the study of these different pneumonia bacteria, because it has become essential quickly to identify the particular microbe involved. Loss of time in doing this may cause death.

As the result of the observation that a certain solution—alkaline hypochlorite—when boiled would not destroy dead bacteria, Dr. Charles Kriemurede developed a rapid method for the preparation of a concentrated extract of germs. In from one-half to one hour after receipt of the sputum expectorated by a pneumonia patient, the exact type of bacteria concerned in pneumonia is identified. bacteria concerned in pneumonia is

From one to three teaspoonfuls of the sputum is poured in a glass test tube. This is placed in boiling water until clotted. Salt solution is added to this—just enough to carry out the test. This is shaken a few minutes in boiling water to extract the bacterial substance.

Determination Method.

A centrifugal machine is then used to throw down the clot. Two drops of blood serum from the patient's ear are placed in narrow tubes, and the bacterial substance from the sputum is allowed to drop slowly down the side of the tube.

### Our Consumers' League

It is said that the secret of the French housewife's thrift lies largely in her buying. She knows to the greatest nicety exactly the number of portions she can serve from a given amount. She was mistress of the fine art of rationing long before this great war imposed the necessity for such measures in ertain countries.

She buys thriftily and she prepares the food so carefully that not a particle is wasted. She takes care of the pennies, believing in the old adage that the pounds will take care of themselves. For the Canadian housewife who has always been accustomed to order lavishly for her table, and who has considered herself fortunate in having an abundance at her command, even two of three years of necessity for food conservation is a short period of time in which to acquire through experience and exact knowledge of quantities to serve. A food expert offers the following suggestions for guidance in buying and serving:

One can of corn will serve from eight to ten persons. One can of peas will serve eight persons.

One can of No. 2 tomatoes will serve eight persons.

One can of No. 2 tomatoes, used for tomato sauce, will serve twelve persons.

One pound of oatmeas will serve from fifteen to twenty persons. One pound of prepared breakfast cereal will serve from fifteen to eighteen persons.

One pound of flour will make two small loaves of bread. One pound of flour will make pastry for five pies.

One pound of flour will make about two and three-quarter pounds off

One pound of flour will make about two pounds of cookies. One pound of butter will cut from forty to sixty chips. One pound of shortening will be required for every twenty-five per-

sons for cooking purposes. One-half pint of syrup will serve from eight to ten persons for hot

Four ounces of macaroni will serve from four to five persons when. used as a principal dish, Three ounces of rice will serve four or five persons when used as a

Four ounces of beans will serve four persons when baked. Two ounces of beans will serve four persons when used in soup. Three ounces of cheese will serve four persons when used in place of

Are you going to be one of the one hundred women and girls privileged to take a three weeks' course in practical farming at the Gueph Agricultural Codege, beginning the first of May?

The course has been especially arranged for women and girls of the towns and cities of Ontario to fit them to do their part in the greater production drive of 1918. The coilege, of which Dr. Creeiman, the president, is also the commissioner of argiculture for the province, has arranged the course in recognition of the right way of doing things and the best and shortest methods. So much information will be packed into the three short weeks that the girl or woman who takes the course will be just so much more valuable to herself and her employer, because of the knowledge she has acquired. It is knowledge which Early Seed Cobbler Potatoes will stand her in good stead through her life, even if she only devotes to actual farming the four months this summer, which constitutes one of the conditions Just arrived. The chances are that once she has taken the course and served her term in agricultural operations, she will not again be content without a garden, some chickens, or even one or two berry bushes or fruit trees of her own. In any case, it will extend her horizon, enlarge her experience, and broaden her sympathles. If she takes to it wisely she will benefit her health. Undoubtedly such an offer as that made by the college, three weeks' tuition and transportation paid, with the only item of expense to the student \$15 for the three weeks poard, will receive an eager response from would-be "farmerettes." Since the time is short until all applications must be in to the superintendent of Government Employment Bureau, April 24th is the date, it behooves those desiring t take the course to seek early Miss Ethel MacRobert, supervisor of the Londor Women's Government Employment Bureau, through whom applications from this district go to Dr. Riddell.

#### PROPER CARE OF THE BODY.

"Personal Hygiene, lectures and instruction in the proper care of the body, with special application to the work in prospect." The foregoing paragraph caught the eye of the writer, away down, the very last item of the brief outline of the short course in practical farming for women (over eighteen years of age), to be given at the Guelph Agricultural

College in May. In this last paragraph is summed up the concession of the Ontario Agrialtural College to the importance of conservation of health and strength on the part of the young women who will assist in the 1918 food drive. Just as precautions are taken by veccination, inoculation and quarantine to guard the fighting men against contagious diseases, so precautions must be taken to keep he young women in good physical condition who wage warfare against carcity and thus, on the second line of defence, against the terrible Hun.

A girl who had the fun of her life berry-picking last summer, shook her head sadly the other day, when asked if she was going out on a farm again this summer. "The doctor won't let me," she said, "I overdid it last summer, and haven't been well all winter. I got so interested, I never knew when to stop, then when the evenings came it was such a temptation to go buggy riding and motoring. The people all around were so good to us. I didn't get half enough sleep. I always did the wrong thing when I got overheated, it seems, and I finally contracted such a severe cold, I thought I would never get rid of it. No berry-picking for me this year, I'm afraid. Indeed, I have been used up all winter.'

Is there any common sense in that? Isn't it just like the German advance in solid formation, to be mown down by machine guns and rifles? Yet, aren't there many, many other girls and women who ruthlessly squander their resources of physical strength in big drives, literally, and in such cases, foolishly, obeying the injunction, "Take no thought for the morrow." Circumstances will arise where it is necessary to keep going till one is ready to drop with weariness, but such circumstances, permitted to be repeated too often, lower the vitality to such an extent that entire recuperation becomes impossible. It is all very well to be virtuous enough to prefer wearing out to rusting out, but with good people badly needed to "carry on" at home, while the armies are engaged in saving the Empire for liberty and righteousness, conservation of health becomes an imperative patriotic duty. One very difficult thing for people who get interested in their work to learn is the importance of lasting. Is the country much the better for the enthusiastic spurt of energy of the woman who uses herself up in a few months, when a special drive is on, and is entirely out of the running next time, say, when a special rush order comes to the Red Cross?

3. Hogs give a greater weight of dressed carcass in proportion to live weight than any other animal, 4. The carcass of the hog contains more edible meat in proportion to bone than that of any other animal.

5. Pork and bacon contain a large proportion of edible fat which is vitally needed in the rations of soldiers. 6. Bacon is the most compact form in which meat can be shipped abroad. 7. One or two pigs can be kept in the backyards of thousands of urban

Talking of the subjects of raising pigs in towns, cities and villages, a country reader writes this week: "I was very much interested in reading some weeks ago in your column about the Kingston hotelkeeper who has gone into pig raising. In the small town near us, the hotelkeeper, at whose place we used to put up before we got our car, has gone into pig raising and found it profitable. Automobiles have made a great deal of difference to the hotel-keepers, especially in the small towns. Travellers and others do not stay all night as formerly, when the roads are at all passable. They drop into the towns in their cars, do their business, and are off on their way again. A hotel that offers good, clean, well cooked meals, though, gets about all the business it can handle. People, driving motors, make a point of getting to the town that has such a hotel at meal-time. The hotelkeeper, who has been experimenting in keeping pigs, keeps that kind of a hotel. Since it is pretty hard to tell just how much food will be wanted, there has been quite a bit of table refuse as well as peelings. He has boiled this and fed it to his pigs, and is finding pigs a good paying business."



#### Davlight Rule Is Going Into E fect Early Su day Morn

Third Reading Given to Bill by Canadian Senate Yesterday.

OTTAWA, April 11.—The daylight-saving bill, which was put through the committee stage and given third reading in the Senate today, will in all probability come into effect at 2 o'clock on Sunday morning, April 14. A semi-official intimation to this effect was given by Senator Robertson, minister without portfolio, when the bill was being considered. Senator Robertson gave as the reason for the bill becoming operative on Sunday morning instead of on Sunday at midnight, the circumstance that fewer trains ran on Sunday. He said that less inconvenience would be caused by advancing the clocks 60 minutes at that hour in the morning because late trains would have arrived at their destinations and morning trains would be made up at a later hour.




