The cable stated that the imperial forces were completely routed and abandoned their supply trains during the retreat. OTTAWA CLAIMS 90,520

Over Four Thousand Moro Than the Population in 1910. [Canadian Press.]

Ottawa, Oct. 21.—Official figures for 1911 issued by the civic assessment department today give Ottawa's population as 90,520, an increase of 4,414 over the population of 1910, and 4,180 greater than abown by the recent Dominion census.
