



CRIME IN FIGURES.

Statistics For England and Wales For the Year 1904—Enormous Total of Persons Tried.

A bluebook was issued recently, says Lloyd's Weekly, by the Home Office giving the criminal statistics of Eng-land and Wales for the year 1904. It shows that the total number of persons tried for various offences during the 12 months was 807,139, as compared with 808,696 in the previous 12 months, the convictions being 665,379 against 660,convictions being 665,379 against 660,300. The persons imprisoned numbered
199,153, as compared with 189,727 in
1903, and the number of convicts in
prison on March 31 was 20,099. The
figures, it is stated, are not all of equal
value as criteria of the state of crime,
but they all indicate an increase of
criminalty. The total number of persons for trial for indictable offences
were 59,960, or 177.59 per 100,000
population, being an increase of 1,516,
or nearly three per cent.

population, being an increase of 1,516, or nearly three per cent.

There has been a continuous growth of crime since 1899, when the number of persons tried was 50,494, or 156.97 per 100,000 of the population. For many years prior to that year, however, there was a steady decline, with occasional interruptions, in the number of persons tried, and in 1899 the total was less than in any previous year since 1875. During the quinquennial period 1860-4 the annual average was 280 per 1860-4 the annual average was 280 per

1875. During the quinquennial period 1880-4 the annual average was 280 per 100,000 population, compared with 182 in the last quinquennial period. The increase in 1904 was wholly in offences against property. The only offence against the person which showed a marked tendency in increase is bigamy, for which the figure was 138, the quinquennial averages for 1895-9 and 1909-4 being 104 and 112 respectively.

It is satisfactory to observe that those classes of offences usually committed by habitual criminals have ceased to increase at the same rapid rate as formerly. Cornwall is still one of the counties with the least crime. Chamorgan and Monmouth are all the worst counties, but the footbon of London has slightly improved. The worst counties for drunkenness are Northumberland, Glamorgan, Durham, and London, the best position as regards the offence being taken by a large group of cural counties. Minor offences of dishonesty and serious frauds and herach-

offence being taken by a large group of rural counties. Minor offences of dishonesty and serious frauds and breaches of trust had increased, and offences of the vagrancy class are growing rapidly.

During the year 9,918 persons were convicted in Courts of Assize and Quarter Sessions, of whom 28 were sentenced to death, 970 to penal servitude, 7,899 to imprisonment, and 91 to detention in an inebriate reformatory; 55 persons were found guilty but insane; 1,896 were acquitted, and in 38 cases a jury found the accused to be insane inry found the accused to be insane and unfit to plead, while 16 persons were ordered to be whipped or flogged. The total number of persons dealt with by Courts of Summary Jurisdiction was 794,981, of whom 655,661 were convicted.

84.160 being sentenced to imprisonment During the year 36,269 coroners' in-quests were held. In 2,257 cases open verdicts were returned, and, deducting one case of justifiable homicide and 16 executions of persons condemned to death, 4,888 deaths were ascribed to death, 4,888 deaths were ascribed to criminal violence or culpable neglect. Of these 3,327 were cases of suickle, a decrease of 153 as compared with the previous year. The continuous increase in suicides, frequently referred to in previous volumes of the criminal sta-tistics, has thus received a check, Verdicts of wilful murder were returned in 191 cases, and of manslaughter in 126. The number of criminal lunstics received into asylums during 1904 was 235, and at the end of the year the total number of criminal lunatics under detention was 904, of whom no fewer than 407 had committed murder.

Toronto, May 17, 1906.

My Dear Sir,—I have your letter of the 11th instant, enclosing oopies of bill to regulate the exportation of electrical power, etc., and of the proposed amendments thereto.





THE SNARLS OF TIME

POPE GREGORY'S CORRECTION OF THE JULIAN GALENDAR.

At One Time October Was the Year's Shortest Month-It Contained Only Twenty-one Days In 1582-Commo tion the Change Made In England.

Did you ever hear of the famous short month of October, which had only twenty-one days? Some three centuries ago in southern Europe men tried to correct an error that had been growing continually for more than a thousand years, and the result was that they called the day after Oct. 4, 1582, Oct. 15 instead of Oct. 5. We get our ideas and principles re-

garding the calendar from two sources, Roman and Jewish. Every one knows that the names of the months are Latin, and in the histories we read how the various Roman rulers changed the distribution of days within the month, etc., to suit their pride or political schemes, much as modern politicians hasten or postpone a convention, and brought things into great confusion until Julius Caesar decreed that the coming year should consist of 365 days and every fourth year of 366. The ex-tra day was to be inserted between the 24th and 25th of February. In their way of numbering the days of the month, which seems to us so awkward, the 24th was sexto calendas, or the sixth day before the calends of March. When the extra day was inserted it was called the second sixth, or, in Latin, bissexto calendas, whence our bissextile.

From Jewish sources we get other features. The great Jewish festival of the passover was celebrated on the very day of the first full moon after the spring equinox. The early Christians, or many of them, took the same day, but this led to charges of heresy, discussion, criticism and even c tempt; so it was decreed probably by Constantine the Great in 325 A. D., in connection with the council of Nicaea, that the Christian festival Easter should be observed on the Sunday following the passover, and the other movable feasts of the church were made dependent on this. So the ele-ment of a fixed day of the week was brought into the calculation.

In this year—325—the vernal equinox fell on March 21, and, if Caesar's work in establishing the Julian calendar had only been correct, this event would have happened on this date forever. But nature seems to abhor simple ratios as she was said to abhor a vacuum. Unfortunately for simplicity the year is not exactly 365 days 6 hours, but about 11 minutes 14 seconds less. So the insertion of the extra day in four years was doing the correction, as was known even in the dark ages, but after the sevival of learning and the establishment of observatories it was commented on in the council of Trent and was very much discussed by mathematicians.

And by the middle of the sixteenth century the hundreds of small errors had accumulated to ten days, so the vernal equinox fell not on the 21st, but on the 11th, of March.
This was the condition of things

when, in 1572, Pope Gregory XIII. was elected. He realized the glory that it would be to his reign if this confusing matter was settled, and so set a company of mathematicians to work out the problem, not only of rectifying the old errors, but of providing rules to prevent errors in the future. The hardest part of the work was to fix the movable church feasts without doing violence to the traditions. That a good deal could be said about the work is evidenced by the book of 800 pages written by Clavius, one of the company. The result was that in 1581 a pa pal bull was issued declaring, among other things, that in 1582 the day following Oct. 4 should be called Oct. 15 and that centuries should not be leap

years unless divisible by 400. Rulers and states that were then catholic responded to the pope's request for acceptance of the reform. In France the ten days were dropped after Dec. 9, 1582; in Catholic Germany the change was made in 1584, but the Protestant states delayed until Feb. 19 (March 1), 1600. In Switzerland and Poland there was such resistance made that the troops were necessary to sup-

The change was long delayed in Protestant England, which would not willingly accept an alleged reform due to a pope that had encouraged the armada. But the need of the uniformity among neighboring states was too great, and in 1751 Lord Chesterfield introduced into parliament a bill for the reform of the calendar. Some details of the law may be quoted from a magazine of September, 1752: "Sept. 14— This day the Gregorian style took place in all Europe, Asia, Africa and America. This day, had not this act passed; would have been the 3d of September, but it was now reckoned the 14th, eleven nominal days being omitted. Every fourth year will be a bissextile, or leap year, until 1800, which will be a mon year of 365 days, but 1804 will be a leap year. Easter and the movable thereon depending are to be reckoned according to the new tables prefixed to the act of parliament. All the fixed feast days * * are to be kept on the same nominal day as here-tofore. Payment of rent notes, • • • the attainment of majority or expiraof apprenticeships * * * sh servants' wages are usually paid at servants' wages are usually paid at the quarter days, eleven days' wages may be deducted out of the present quarter and the reckoning for the future go regularly on." Such were some of the minute provisions of the act. It will be readily believed that ignorant people could not understand this, and we are told of mobs marching through the land crying, "Give us back our eleven days!"

Our municipal authorities evidently have determined to act the part of universal providers. The new edition of the "Municipal Year Book" gives an amazing record of their activities, says. The London Daily Mail.
In many instances the local authorities are now the largest employers of labor. Thus, the London County Council, in one department alone, employs not far short of 4,000 men.

The scope of the activity of the boroughs is amazing. Merthy: Tydfil not only manages a municipal farm, but reports that "a good profit is earned each year." Brighton and Chester both own race courses, to the benefit of the rates. One bo

Lincoln proudly boasts that it is part owner of a lunatic asylum. Colchester disposes of over 1,500,000 oysters a year from its municipal fishing beds. Kingston-on-Thames, the ancient borough, is willing to instruct school children in pany a lesson. Hull swimming at a penny a lesson. Hul owns a large share of a railway. Sev eral boroughs boast of their municipal Turkish baths.

The up-to-date workman to-day lives The up-to-date workman to-day lives in a municipal house, lit by the penny in the slower and an amunicipal electric supply. His wife cooks her meals on municipal gas, and makes her tea with municipal gas, and makes her tea with municipal sterilized milk and nursed in a municipal ereche. The children go to his municipal school. The father rides to his municipal employment in a municipal electric are He spends his Satcipal electric car. He spends his Sat-urdays on a municipal race course, and has his weekly swim in a municipal bath, the wife at the same time doing

bath, the wife at the same time doing her weekly laundry in the municipal washhouse. When they die they are burled in a municipal cemetery.

Does all this municipal activity pay: An analysis of the figures shows a remarkable variation of cost for the same work in different boroughs. London loses heavily by its council lodging the control of the same with lower rates. loses heavily by its council forgans houses; Glasgow, with lower rates, makes them yield a reasonable return. Manchester pays over £50,000 a year from its tramway profits for relief of rates, and places a still larger amount for depreciation. Oldham, despite the fact that it allows nothing for depreciations of the profits of the profi fact that it allows nothing for depre-ciation, shows a loss of over £4,000.

London comes out badly in compari-son with the great northern and mid-land boroughs. The estimated "muni-cipal trading" palance, sheet of the County Council for the coming year re-veals a loss of about £63,000. The Thames steamboats are largely ac-countable for this. Much of the hous-ing policy of the County Council has been to say the least, unfortunate. The total loss for the last year on the build-ing schemes of the council is given as £14562.
