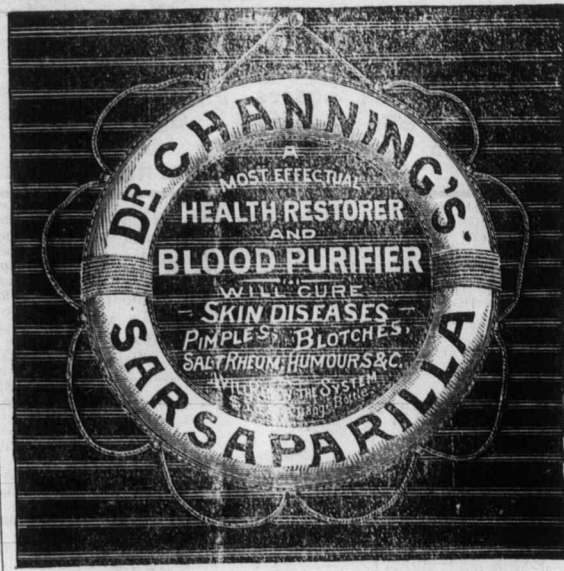

CAVALRY TACTICS. How Horses Are Trained to Lie Down at a Signal. Troop H. of the Third United States Cavalry, stationed at Fort McIntosh, Tex., has, according to the St. Louis Globe-Democrat correspondent, won so much credit for its unique exhibitions of drill, in which the horses seem as much interested as the men, that it is frequently referred to as the "famous circus troop of cavalry." It goes through what is sometimes called the "mounted infantry drill" with great precision and invariably attracts quite exceptional notice. Three score strong, well-trained horses display an amount of equine intelligence that is at first most bewildering, obeying the bugle calls with the promptness and accuracy of old soldiers. The work of training commenced about the middle of November, 1877, the drills being for four hours daily, two in the morning and two in the afternoon. The modus operandi was as follows: The horses all appeared fitted with surcingle and watered bridle, only each surcingle being provided with two leather straps, one about two feet, and the other about ten feet long. At a given signal each man led his horse to a short distance from the others, and fastened the long strap to the horse's right fore leg, just above the hoof, and carried the end of the strap under the hock and over the horse's back, so that the end trailed on the ground on the horse's left side. He then fastened the short strap to the horse's left fore leg, and the long strap was carried over the leg of the horse, above the knee and firmly buckled, thus leaving the animal free to move about as he pleased, and wandering who on earth his rider meant. At the next signal the trooper seized the bridle of the animal in his left hand and grasping the reins in his right hand, he commenced to pull upon the strap, at the same time pressing against the left side of the animal with his right shoulder. The result was that the horse, in all cases, except with the most vicious horses (of which there were not a few), to bring them down with both knees on the ground as the strap pulled up the right hoof with jerk. A firm and sustained pressure with the shoulder then brought the horse over so that he lay on his side, and the trooper, when upon, after quieting him both by the voice and by stroking him, a carbine was held in front of him, rabbit and cat being held so that he could smell it, and then discharged. With the majority of the horses this, of course, produced an amount of terror and, suggesting the roaring of the lion, like the scene between the parrot and the monkey, can be more easily imagined than described. This was repeated during the morning, when the man and horse were fatigued. In a week at least ten horses would lie down at the bugle-call without straps by simply patting the hoof with the hand, and the horse would be wanted. The real work of perseverance and patience lay with the remaining less brilliant horses. There were not less than a dozen such horses, and it was the firm conclusion that nothing would ever induce them to submit to the indignity of lying down at full length in the dust. With these animals, however, the trick, it is true, but it was done in such a way that the horse was not terrified, but was made to understand that his trooper was his master, whom he must in all things obey. It may be said, en passant, that the trooper in certain cases found out this fact only at the end of the drill. With these high-strung and sometimes vicious horses four men were necessary, using two long straps to throw them, and these were necessarily aided by the aid of the troop commander. In six weeks the horses would lie down at the bugle call, and this still required the horse to be quiet. While lying down single shots and volleys were discharged by the men firing under the horse's nose. Two or three of the most stubborn brutes were conquered by sheer patience and perseverance. One of the worst broncos, in particular, was so bad that the trooper who had to handle him never been shot, nor had he ever been ridden without serious accident. He was simply wild, woolly, and hard to cur. "We trouble with this imp in our hands," he would say, "and he will not let me put the straps on him in the first place. It was like the mice agreeing that under the circumstances they would not catch his hoof, but the imp was too quick and would never walk into any such trap again willingly. However, one day he was finally thrown him one day and held him down. Then his protests commenced. He hid feet flew out, and continued to fly out with a velocity and power that were wonderful and in the highest degree alarming. And the rider averts solemnly that if there had been any shoes on that horse's hind feet, no matter how tightly nailed on, they would have flown off and landed probably somewhere across the river in Mexico. Kind measures were used, however, and in a few days the imp was finally quietly quieted and allowed to go. After a time an attempt was made to throw him on an exact day as he was to be of the other. This time, after throwing him, the lash was applied with a stinging cut to his legs as well as kick, and this finally triumphed. In a few days he lay quite quiet and submitted to putting on every part of his body, including his feet. In ten days he was gentle as any horse in the troop. By the last of January, 1888, every horse in the command would lie down at the bugle call, also bring over him in any position, and at the call of a bugle. The best result of the training was the fact that the horses had a complete understanding between the horse and his rider, so that the latter had a perfect confidence in his own ability to ride and manage the former, and the former, while feeling that the rider was his master, was not cowed by cruelty or intimidation.

STUDENTS IN GERMANY. Interesting Statistics Concerning Their Work and Studies. The following interesting statistics occur in an article on "Students in Life in Germany," by Dr. F. M. Warren, in the Chautauquan: "We find in the twenty schools of Germany some twenty-five thousand students, of whom over twenty thousand are foreigners, the Russian, Austrian and American, in numbers that do not vary far from two hundred for each nation. As might be supposed, the largest towns contain the largest institutions. The most university, like the medieval, appears to demand the multiplicity of students. The University of Berlin numbers over five thousand students, those of Leipzig and Munich more than three thousand each. To raise this number to the present day, the great urban foundations, favored to the utmost by states which they peculiarly represent, the institutions of the smaller central powers and those less favored by the pride of a dynasty exert themselves to excel in some one specialty—in which effort they are often aided by tradition and habit. Thus, in the University of Leipzig, the great aggregate of the three universities noted above, certain of the provincial faculties have successfully maintained an international character, and an absolute pre-eminence. The order of attendance in theology (both Protestant and Catholic) faculties being reckoned together, when in the same institution was Berlin (704), Leipzig (672), Halle (598), Tubingen (514). In law, the capitals of the largest two States come first, Berlin (4,188) and Munich (4,100), followed by Leipzig (738), and Tubingen, a bad fourth (348). In medicine, the capitals again lead, but in reversed order: Berlin (1,884) and Leipzig (1,940) lead the others far in the rear.
