Christmas Day in the World's History. Of all the days of the year, Christmas has become the most memorable. Looking backwards into history, we also hold true - but with limitations. Few of the big events of history happened on Christmas day. On the top hand a surprising number of interesting episodes in the history of the nation occurred on the great day of all holidays. Many of these too, seemed to be peculiarly appropriate to the day.

America in search for historic Christmas, one comes upon the first Christmas of the Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth, Mass. They landed Dec. 21, 1620 - just four days before Christmas. The great day itself brought forth no observances of the day as a holiday.

With so honest to shelter them from the icy blast, and with death and sickness in their midst, their thoughts and their feelings were anything but joyous. Christmas for them was a day of prayer and of work. In groups they knelt on the snow covered ground and offered prayers for the sick, the hungry and the dying. They felled trees and cleared the ground, amidst the howling winds that were heard across the water, now in the midst of their joyful celebration of Christmas in the good old English way.

Nor was their second Christmas on American soil any different, indeed, the stern Governor of the colony, Wm. Bradford, ordered that anyone found observing Christmas Day by either absence from labor or in any way should pay a fine of five shillings. It was not until a full century later that this anti-Christmas sentiment was relaxed, from then on the old-fashioned New England Christmas was developed and indulged in.

On Christmas Eve, 1814, the treaty of peace between Great Britain and the United States was made, concluding the war of 1812. In the Civil War in the United States Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, 1864, witnessed the bombardment of Wilmington by the Federal troops. An expedition against the approaches of Wilmington was organized by Admiral Porter and General Butler late in 1864. On Christmas Eve Porter exploded a powder ship near Fort Fisher, without injuring the fortifications, however. Then the Federal fleet opened fire and finally silenced the guns of the enemy. On Christmas Day federal troops were landed to take the fort by assault, but General Butler soon realized that his task was foolhardy and he withdrew his forces to Hampton Roads.

On Christmas Eve, 1851, a portion of the old home of the Capitol at the Library of Congress, at Washington, D. C., were burned. More than half of the books in the library, along with many valuable paintings, documents and over a thousand bronze medals of great age were destroyed. Several pieces of statuary were injured beyond repair and the dome of the capitol itself was demolished.

A Christmas Day peculiarly significant in its events and strikingly impressive through the sheer nature of them was that of the year 495, when Clovis, King of the Franks, along with his army, was baptized into the Christian faith at Rheims. The Franks were a confederation of German tribes who had dwelt since the third century on the right bank of the Rhine, and who eventually migrated into Gaul. After many incursions they became masters of the left bank of the lower Rhine, as well as of their own territory.

In 496 one of their chiefs, Hlodowig, or Clovis, as he is more generally known, expelled the Romans from northern Gaul and settled there with his tribesmen. Thus he came into contact with Christianity at once, and Remigius, bishop of Rheims, became his friend and adviser.

Finally in 496 he vowed to accept Christianity if the God of his wife would give him the victory over the Allemans. His army victorious he kept his oath, and on Christmas Day he, along with thousands of his warriors, who followed him as implicitly in this matter as they had in battle, were baptized into the Christian faith.

Who has not heard of the merry old tale of Sherwood forest - Robin Hood? Famed in song and story, the romance of his depredations upon the wealthy and his lavish distribution of the spoils of the highway among the lovers of the poor.

So the year dies, and so into the afterglow All the year's days go.

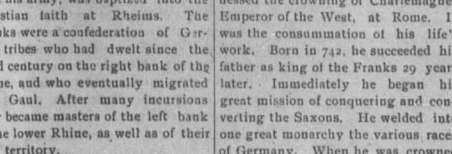

Christmas Day of the year 800 witnessed the crowning of Charlemagne, Emperor of the West, at Rome. It was the consummation of his life's work. Born in 742, he succeeded his father as king of the Franks 29 years later. Immediately he began his great mission of conquering and converting the Saxons. He wedded into one great monarchy the various races of Germany. When he was crowned emperor of the Romans on that Christmas Day his power became supreme.

Five days before Christmas of the year 1091 Ignatius, the bishop, was condemned to be torn to pieces by wild beasts at Antioch. From then on his martyrdom was celebrated in the churches at Antioch on Christmas Day. He was said to have been one of the children whom Christ took up in his arms and blessed.

St. John, the Evangelist, is said to have died at Ephesus two days after Christmas in the year 95. One of the most sensational Christmas Eves of history was that of the year 1800, when an attempt was made upon the life of Napoleon Bonaparte in the streets of Paris as the Little Corporal and his suit drove to the Hotel de la Ville. By sheer good fortune the bomb which was designed to kill him went off between the carriage of the emperor and the one following, in which were Josephine and her ladies, and the interval between them was sufficiently great to prevent any but minor injuries and shock to the occupants. Napoleon continued to the opera, calmly seated himself in his box and surveyed the audience through his opera glasses.

On Christmas Day, 1066, William the First was crowned King of England, at Westminster three months after his landing, citizens of Wexsar and London, after a siege agreed to accept him as their sovereign. He reigned not as a conqueror, but as a lawful king.

The day after Christmas, 1153, at the death of Henry, the Plantagenet, Stephen, a son of William the Conqueror's daughter, was crowned king of England. Without a following of nobles, and with only his sheer personality to back him, he was accepted by popular acclamation. The day before his coronation - Christmas Day - must have been an exciting and busy one indeed.

A day or two preceding Christmas in the year 673, the Saracens attacked Constantinople. Their fleet was destroyed by a Greek fire invented by Callianus.

Parcels by Post. Our present rate for the carriage of parcels by mail is 16 cents a pound. Within the confines of Great Britain parcels weighing 11 pounds are carried for 2 cents a pound. Smaller parcels are rated on a graduated scale beginning at 6 cents for the first pound.

The parcel rate from England to Mexico, Egypt and China averages less than 8 cents a pound. From England to the remotest part of Russia the price is 7 cents a pound. It costs twice as much to send a parcel from Toronto to Weston as from Liverpool to Vladivostok. Here surely is a condition that should be remedied. Our rates are far too high and there is no sane reason for their continuance at the same exorbitant level. - Toronto News.

The plan suggested is that the present law be amended to allow the opening of such terminals of a series of polls representing the electoral districts in which the train employees live. The railway men want such polls opened a day in advance, so that by the time the polls close, generally on election day, practically every trainman will have had a chance to cast his ballot.

Disappointing and no doubt disappointed people are always telling us that the old Christmas idea is passing, that the spirit of Christmas as it existed in the minds of Dickens, Charles Lamb, Washington Irving, and those other big writing fellows, is dead. We sincerely hope not, we know it is not. The manner of our celebration of the great anniversary may not be quite the same, we may have grown away to some extent from the conception of a genial Santa Claus presiding over our household and making us all feel benevolently nappy and at peace with the world. But behind our keeping of Christmas—for, of course we do keep it—is the consciousness within us, if perhaps sometimes dimly realized, that we are in tune with the Christmas message. Peace on earth, goodwill to all men.

Playing Politics.

It is more than regrettable that the question so vital as that of Imperial Defense should be made the shuttlecock of political convenience. It was not upon any such basis that the British supremacy of the seas was built up and fostered. If the navy is to become a question of embittered party strife, tactics of this character are certain in the long run to impede its efficiency. If we believe in the Power which has obtained us for so long, without even asking any reward, then it is our duty at a time such as the present to support, with the most good faith, the advice for which we have asked, and to follow it and wholeheartedly, strong in the belief that it is the best that can be offered and the most likely to lead to immediate and speedy results.—Victoria Columnist.

But recalling the fact that in similar cases women had lost their lives by rushing into the open air she stopped at the door and seizing a mat which lay on the veranda, smothered the flames from her shoulder and back.

Bugle occurred within a few seconds. Mrs. Cox, for her presence of mind from being seriously injured. Her outer clothing was fatally burned through and the hair of her neck and forehead scorched.—Middleton Outlook.

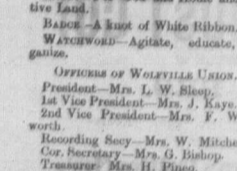
