

ANNUAL MEETING OF CURLING CLUB

The annual meeting of the Newcastle Curling Club was held in the Town Hall Wednesday evening. The usual business of an annual meeting was carried out and the officers elected for the following year were: President—Capt. John Russell. Vice-President—A. Stewart Demers. Treasurer—J. E. T. Lindon. Secretary—H. P. Zinck. Managing Committee—E. Dalton, P. N. Brown, and L. J. Jeffrey. Newcastle is third in line for the McLeilan Cup, Chatham being first and Fredericton second, and the Newcastle rinks will play about Jan. 17th. The next meeting of the Curling Club will be on December 15. From the enthusiasm shown at this meeting a banner year is assured. A drive is to be made for new members to the Club and as an inducement to this end the membership fee was reduced to \$5.00 and in order that current expenses for the year may be met it will be necessary to have at least 100 members. The Secretary is having 100 membership tickets printed and same will be given to members on payment of their dues. The date set for the payment of same is Dec. 15th, on which date the managing committee will make up RINKS for the coming season from paid up members. The next meeting will be held in the Town Hall on the 15th inst. and everybody interested in CURLING should make an attempt to have their dues paid by that date so that the curling schedule for the coming season can be drawn up.

FEAR DISRUPTION IN THE CHURCH

Toronto, Dec. 6.—An overture for the Toronto Presbytery to request the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, at the next annual meeting of the General Assembly, to take steps for the enactment of legislation for church union was presented at a meeting of the Toronto Presbytery today and was the cause of a somewhat heated discussion. However, it was left over to be dealt with at the February meeting of the Presbytery. Rev. N. A. McEachern, who opposed the overture, declared that there was disruption in the church. "You can hear it talked in every congregation," he said. Rev. T. L. D. McKerrill took the ground that the supporters of church union were pushing the matter too fast, and he urged that it be left to the judgment of the General Assembly, instead of the Toronto Presbytery attempting to "bludgeon" the Assembly into quick action. "Disruption," exclaimed Rev. R. B. Cochrane, who favored the overture, "why, the Scottish Church was founded on disruption!"

Expected Revision Of The Bank Act

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—It is not expected here that a royal commission will be appointed to enquire generally into the Canadian system of banking in view of the expected revision of the Bank Act during the coming session of parliament as recommended by the Canadian Council of Agriculture. It was intimated in government circles, last night, that the matter was one for a committee of parliament and not for a royal commission.





MADE IN CANADA

P.E. Island Will Vote On January 22

Charlottetown, P.E.I. Dec. 7.—Monday, January 22, is the date fixed by the federal government for holding a plebiscite on Prince Edward Island on the question of bringing into force in this province part four of the Canada Temperance Act. If the majority vote is in the affirmative one of the results will be the prohibition of importation of liquor for purposes of export.

MONCTON BIGAMIST WAS REMANDED

Hallifax, Recorder, Friday: Edwin Cuthbertson of Moncton, who was re-arrested on Wednesday on a charge of bigamy and who confessed to the crime, came up before Stipendiary O'Hearn to-day for sentence. His Honor stated that he was not prepared to sentence him to-day as he wished to know more about the case. As he understood it the defendant had deserted his wife and child at Moncton and had masqueraded in Halifax as a single man and had imposed upon the feelings of a respectable Halifax girl and had married her a week or so ago. It was a despicable crime and therefore he wished to consider the proper punishment.

Will Be Benefit To Both Countries

Work of Postal Conference at Ottawa

Washington, Dec. 9.—Increased mailing conveniences and facilities will accrue both to the United States and Canada as a result of the first postal conference between the two countries, which has just adjourned at Ottawa, it was announced by Postmaster General on his return from the Canadian capital. He said: "The reception accorded the American delegates to the conference was overwhelming in its cordiality and throughout the negotiations the spirit of reciprocity and amicability existed that has always characterized the relationship between the United States and Canada."

The December sitting of the Supreme Court opened here last Tuesday morning, but was immediately adjourned until Tuesday, 12th inst., the presiding Judge Chandler not being able to be present.

Among the cases on the docket are the King vs. John Sullivan, charged with attempted murder of Rev. Father Timothy Augustine in Rogersville on August 31st, and the King vs. Albert, for attempted murder of George Royal at Grand Downs on Oct. 8th.

N.S. Winnings at Royal Winter Fair

In the last issue of the Maritime Farmer we mentioned the fact that eight carloads of pure bred live stock had gone forward from Nova Scotia to the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto. We are pleased to extend our congratulations to animals on the large number of prizes won by them.

This Province stands easily first in the Dominion in its herds of Guernsey cattle. The fact that Nova Scotia breeders practically swept the boards in every class for this breed should prove an advertisement of value not only to themselves and their own Province but also to the other Maritime Provinces as well.

A remarkable series of winning was made by Dickie Brothers, Truro, in the Holstein classes. Needless to say the competition in this breed was exceedingly keen. As nearly as we can learn from reports to hand, they have won three First prizes on their herd and a Grand Championship for their Senior Holstein bull. A fuller summary of these wins will appear in this or a subsequent issue of the Maritime Farmer.

In the Jersey breed, J. R. Semple & Sons, Truro, with the strongest possible competition, succeeded in winning a Second for a Senior yearling Jersey bull. Those who know the keenness of the competition state that this is a most praiseworthy win and should go a long way in advertising the value of Messrs. Semple's stock.

Nova Scotia winnings were not confined to live stock. In the College Judging Competition the Ontario Agricultural College won first place. Out of the eight members composing the team, three were graduates of the N. S. Agricultural College, namely: A. W. MacKenzie, Elmsdale; H. K. MacCharles, Baddeck Bridge; and R. C. Parent of Fredericton, N.B., R.F.D. No. 4. We extend congratulations to these Maritime boys who have proven themselves so efficient in keen competition with very strong teams.

It may not be amiss here to point out to prospective Maritime Province students of Agriculture, that these men are only maintaining the records made on other occasions by boys who took their first two years at the Truro College. It was only last year that F. W. Walsh, a New Brunswick boy who took his first two years at Truro and finished at Guelph, captured first place in the Stock Judging competition at Chicago, competing with the best judges from Colleges both of Canada and U.S. Mr. Walsh is a son of Mr. Fred Walsh, Coverdale, and was formerly on the staff of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture for several years.

At the same Royal Winter Fair there was a competition among teams of live stock judges from thirty-five Counties in the Province of Ontario. Second prize in this trial of skill fell to the County of Brant. This team of judges was trained by Howard W. Trueman, a graduate of the N.S.A.C. and of Guelph. Mr. Trueman is a son of Professor J.M. Trueman of the Nova Scotia College, who is naturally, much pleased with the good reports which are being received of his son's work as County Agricultural Agent in this part of Ontario.

It may occur to some readers that these boys are being lost to the Maritime Provinces, but, in passing, we may state that Mr. Walsh, the Chicago winner, is now in charge of the Dominion Live Stock Branch activities in Nova Scotia, with headquarters at Truro, and, incidentally, is doing excellent work. Mr. MacCharles, whose name appears above, was his assistant last summer.

The College officials are pleased to note that the Holstein bull, which won the Grand Championship at the Royal Winter Fair, was bred and raised on the College farm. His name is Henry Canary Wayne. He was bought from the College by the late W. W. ... of Waterville, N. S., from whom he was purchased by Messrs. ...

A Seedless And Coreless Variety Of Fameuse Apple


Montreal, Dec. 6.—Much enthusiasm was evoked at the annual meeting of the Pomological and fruit growing society of the province of Quebec at MacDonald College, St. Annes today by the announcement of the discovery at Abbotford of a seedless and coreless variety of Fameuse apples. Business was suspended for a time while the apple growers assembled, examined and tested specimens.

The representative of a large fruit distributing firm in Montreal assured the grower of these coreless apples that if the latter would produce the parent apple tree from which they were grown and prove that it would reproduce trees by grafts giving similar fruit, he would guarantee him a million dollars for it, as it would revolutionize apple growing in Canada.

DOMINIONS ARE NOW ENTITLED TO HELP GUIDE

London, Dec. 6.—Premier Bonar Law addressed the Empire Parliamentary Association at its annual meeting here today and declared that the dominions were "entitled to a larger share in the direction of the whole policy of the imperial machinery", and he said that "what is more important, they are now very conscious of it".

The Premier led up to this declaration by saying: "During the war, when I had the opportunity of seeing a good deal of our dominion fellow soldiers, I had a feeling, which events have since justified, that our relations afterwards could never be quite the same. It is an undoubted fact, despite all our own efforts, that if we had not received such help from the dominions the war could never have been won. The most difficult time between father and son is when the son is just beginning to feel his manhood. That is our position today regarding the dominions."
