Midnight Mass at the Oratory.
"The Christmas Eve, and none must fail, To tell their beads at the Midnight Mass."
—BAGLIONI.
England can boast of more stately monuments than the Oratory at St. Philip Neri, which nestles modestly among the stately trees of Edgemoor, at Birmingham, but of none that contains more interest for the Catholic scholar of to-day, associated as it is so closely with the name of one who is a light in religion as well as in literature, and whose writings will always stand as models of pure Anglo-Saxon. It is at the Oratory that the saintly John Henry Newman has put forth his best powers for Catholicity, and enriched with his thought and work the literature of the religion which he combated so fiercely in his younger days, before the answer came to his beautiful petition, "Lead Kindly Light," whose sobbing monotony proceeds with all the strength, earnest, passionate yearning of a soul at sea:
"The night is dark, and I am far from home."
The Oratory has been a home indeed—a haven of rest, where the weary heart might repose, free from the jarring discords of the busy, unsympathetic world. I shall not presume, in this fugitive sketch, to review the life of John Henry Newman, or the history of the Oratory, but rather to reproduce, in the form of a reminiscence, the impression made upon me "twenty golden years ago" as an attendant at the great Cardinal's place of worship, before he became Cardinal. It is an impression that lasts like the fragrance of some imperishable perfume, and that becomes intensified always as this solemn season returns. The Oratory is far enough removed from the throbbing activity and the bustle of busy Birmingham to be undisturbed by the noise of the great town, but not so far away that it cannot be reached easily by residents of the borough desiring to attend divine worship there, particularly if the worshippers be young, active, vigorous, and in the wide, well-lighted room, with its handsome and venerable shadings, that leads to the famous church, is suggestive of quiet and comfort, not to say ease and elegance. Here, for the most part, have their residences, and to live in Edgemoor is almost as good as a patent of nobility, since it is an evidence of one's social standing. The Oratory is an unpretentious building, or rather cluster of buildings of simple and almost severe exterior. It stands a short distance from the road on the right, and at the time of which I speak the walk leading from the main thoroughfare to the door of the church was prettily covered with evergreen. Pious Catholics and great numbers of those who were not Catholics, went there every Sunday to witness the solemn ceremony of the Mass, and to hear the exquisite singing of the boys' choir, while the organ, trained by a competent proctor, rang out gloriously in the striking passages of the sacred music. The modest exterior of the Oratory does not prepare one for the simple and elaborate interior upon which the eye rests upon entering the sacred edifice. The main altar, fronting the principal entrance, rises up to the ceiling, and is a masterpiece of art in full view of all, and is approached by a series of steps leading to a wide platform, around which priests, choristers and attendants are seated in the highest and most conspicuous place of the sanctuary. One feels the solemnity of the scene, but it is a solemnity that is elevating, restful and heart-stirring. Presently the stillness, which it was almost painful to break, yields gently to the soft melody of the organ, as it begins its lofty strain in a sacred whisp, which increases in volume until it reaches its full tones, as it heralds the procession which enters from the little side chapel, full-robed for the Mass. The central figure, upon which every eye is immediately riveted, is that of Dr. Newman. He is not yet a Cardinal, but as he stands, he holds public attention. He moves slowly. His face is thin, and he seems to feel the weight of years, although he lacks two years of seventy at this time. The fathers at some particular point in his sermon, the Gospel of the day is read he comes slowly down the centre aisle until he reaches the raised "pulpit," which stands about the middle of the church, in view of the congregation. His step is feeble as he ascends the stairs, and when he begins to read his voice trembles. Now we have an opportunity to get the great and momentous divine. His prominent nose, with its aquiline tendency, tells of force of character; his cheeks are wrinkled and sunken; his eyes large and expressive, and he grows earnest at some particular point in his sermon, the face, which at first seems that of an ascetic, becomes illumined with intelligence, warmth and inspiration, and the speaker is young again. Ordinarily he speaks with deliberation. His language is clear and simple, but sublime in its vivid portrayal of the truth he wishes to teach, and the scholar shines out between his words rather than in them.
As Doctor Newman stands there he reminds one of an animated picture of one of the saints. I could not help thinking of his eventual life, as I heard the words of hope from his lips. Here indeed was a sacrifice for truth, a scholar, a modern saint of Turin, who began by persecuting

the church of Christ, and whose mature judgment led him to be its most devoted servant. The appearance of the man and all that he represented in his life personality, his discourse, the music, the church, made upon my mind a life-long impression, and the entire scene comes back to me with an agreeable distinctness, even now, as I write these hurried lines. One other picture witnessed at the Oratory is remembered more vividly, and that is the celebration of a midnight Mass. At most of the churches in the principal cities of England this beautiful service, that seems to bring men and angels near, is observed every Christmas, but nowhere, it seems to me, is it more divinely impressive than at the Oratory, where the inspiring music and the chanting of the choir, the boy's choir voicing the "Adeste Fideles" like a song of silver, turn the night into a dream of Paradise, while the glad tidings of a "MIDNIGHT" birth are reborn in our hearts, and we are nearly two thousand years ago on the Judean hills.
While this solemn and beautiful scene is in progress at the Oratory, streets of the great town in the distance are echoing with the music of the "waits" and the "carols" of the belated worshippers at the shrine of Bacchus, who have no thought for the sacred things that are touching the hearts of the women and men of Dr. Newman's devout congregation. The trodden snow on the side of the street leading to the Oratory tells that many feet have pressed it at that unseasonable hour, and the worldly wonder what power can so stir the Catholic heart as to attract a large congregation at such a time. At last the benediction is given, and hundreds who were once loth to leave, and whose thoughts are with the Christ-child, trampled in the manger nearly two thousand years ago, linger behind and spend some little time in devotion. All the Christmas services at the Oratory are sublime, and those who have the privilege of attending divine worship there always look forward to them with pleasure and feel a tinge of regret when the advancing seasons carry them forward to other ceremonies.
The present Duke of Norfolk, who stands next in rank to royalty, was a student at the Oratory school at the time of which I was present, and was wondered at that he remains true to the faith of his fathers, who were loyal to the church in the darkest days of England's persecution of Catholicity. The Oratory has become celebrated since then as the home of a cardinal, and John Henry Newman is now a prince of the church; but no honors or titles, which are conferred upon him could add to the sublime sense of beauty with which it impressed me twenty years ago while attending midnight Mass.—*Edgemoor, in Catholic Standard.*

Our Saviour's Mother.
Next to the Infant Saviour, the most prominent figure in the birth of our Blessed Redeemer is His Immaculate Mother. Hence, as this sacred time, when so many hearts will turn to Mary, our Mother, it is eminently fitting that we should impress upon Catholics the many merits which they can gain for their souls by creating and sustaining in their hearts a love for her, and that the Mother of the Babe in Bethlehem, and conforming their lives to that purity, that humility and that spirit of obedience and resignation to God's will, which characterized the life of the Mother of divine grace during her painful earthly pilgrimage.
Sincere devotion to the Mother of God takes root only among the honored people, that are chosen to be that favored one in which devotion and love to her, O Mother, shall take root and flourish. "Take root among My elect," and the Virgin seems to answer that she will abide with those who are "in the tabernacle of the Most Holy," and that the Virgin is in the assembly of the saints. Happy those souls who are thoroughly infused with this devotion. They have good grounds for hoping that they will be "in the tabernacle of the chosen few," and this is the view entertained by the saints of the early as well as by those of modern times. The blessed Simon speaks to a member of his congregation who was tortured with great mental anguish: "Fear not, my son, only persevere in thy devotion to Mary and heaven is thine." St. Alphonsus Liguori often writes to his penitents: "If I honor Mary I am sure of heaven." St. Philip de Neri, St. Charles, the blessed Leonard of Port Maurice, and many other persons of sainted memory, declare that devotion to Mary is a clear sign of predestination to glory; and this same doctrine can be said to be the universal belief of the ancient Fathers. St. Anselm says, whoever is privileged with frequently thinking of Mary, and thinking of her with tender affection, has in this life a strong sign that he will attain to eternal felicity. "Let him to whom it is given to think often of her with affectionate emotion, take this as a sign for an infallible sign that he shall be saved." This, however, did not at all imply that merely thinking of her sufficed for salvation; the means of which were expressed in the fact that it is impossible to occupy one's thoughts frequently about Mary, and not at the same time entertain great affection for her. The affection that we feel for her facilitates us in the imitation of her virtues, and it is in this imitation that consists the principal fruit of the homage we pay to our Blessed Mother. Still more plainly does St. Bonaventura teach the doctrine that devotion to Mary is a sure sign of predestination. This sacred client of hers maintains that devotion to her is, as it were, a mark set upon the forehead of those who are predestined to be in the Book of Life: "Whoever bears on his forehead the sign of her

name, shall be written down in the Book of Life; even so the angel marked the foreheads of all those who were to escape extermination."
The same teaching is delivered in very plain terms by St. Bernard, who calls devotion
