The schr. Howard L. sailed from here on the afternoon of Aug. 27th for Sydney, N. B., and arrived back here on Monday forenoon, loaded with a cargo of coal for Peake Bros, making the run in less than four days.

LORD RUSSELL of Killowen, Lord Chief Justice of England, is now in Canada. He came to Montreal from Toronto on Thursday last, and on Saturday went to Ottawa, where he was the guest of Lord Aberdeen.

At a recent examination for admission to a Summer School in Chicago, the following questions were asked: (1) Were you ever in the woods? (2) Did you ever see the lake? (3) Did you ever pick a flower? His LORDSHIP BISHOP McDONALD returned from Halifax on Saturday evening last.

The new screw steamer "the Princess" is expected here about Oct. 1st to take the place of the St. Lawrence on the Picton route.

MARSHAL STEPHENS, Superintendent of the Manchester Canal, arrived in Montreal on Wednesday last, and will interview the railway and steamship corporations as well as the Government regarding direct trade with Manchester.

FRANK HOLDEN, aged eight years met with a sad and fatal accident at Windsor, N. S. on the 25th ult. He, with a number of other boys, was playing in the round house of D. A. R. The boys started the turn table. Holden fell forward his neck becoming pinned between the rails. He was terribly lacerated about the back and breast and died instantly.

NICHOLAS MOSHER of Windsor, N. S. fell from a car on the Dominion Atlantic railway, and was instantly killed. Mosher was 72 years of age, and on Wednesday morning last he left Windsor, for a pleasure trip, on a train which conveys plaster from the quarries at Newport to Windsor. He was sitting on the forward end of the last car and when the driver was shunting the cars came together with a jerk. Mosher fell to the ground striking on his head, on the wheels passing over his body. He leaves a widow and three children.

A SCHEME for manufacturing counterfeit coin, imitating silver dollars of the United States mintage has been exposed to the federal authorities in Waco, Texas, by Daniel Ennis, the head of the concern in Waco. Ennis attended a revival and under religious emotion, confessed that he was a counterfeiter, told where all the equipments were to be found, and that the supplies had been shipped to Birmingham and other points. Two men were arrested and the equipments captured. The bogus dollars were being sent to Mexico and exchanged for genuine Mexican silver dollars.

A most disastrous fire occurred at Tignish, on Sunday afternoon, burning about seventy houses and leaving fourteen families homeless. About 2.30 p. m. the fire broke out in Mr. Peter Kinsch's carriage factory, in consequence of his little daughter setting fire to some shavings. A strong wind was blowing at the time causing the flames to sweep through the houses with such rapidity that all efforts to stay the conflagration were in vain. In three hours from the time the fire started the village was almost totally destroyed. The places burned were as follows: Peter Kinsch's factory, residence, and outbuildings; J. S. Chabasso's residence, store, and two warehouses; Dr. Murphy's residence, buildings, and nearly all his furniture and wearing apparel; A. J. Bernard's store and contents; John Carter's house and outbuildings, occupied by Theo. Bernard as a hotel; the entire Myrick block and most of their goods; Patrick Hogan's premises, occupied by the Misses McKenna as a hotel; Chas. Dalton's two stores, three dwellings, and warehouse; Edward Hackett, M. P.'s residence and outbuildings; John J. McAllister's residence, store and contents, books, and some money; J. Albert Brennan's residence, store, and outbuildings; Mrs. Weeks residence and outbuildings; Mrs. Carruthers' factory and contents; John Richard's residence and outbuildings; also, the Post Office, the Railway roundhouse, one engine, and a number of cars. A number of people who occupied rented houses lost their furniture, etc. The loss is about \$100,000. Insurance \$30,000. A relief committee is organizing for the relief of the poor people who have suffered by the fire. Any contributions will be thankfully received by the parish.

Mr. W. W. STANLEY, of Stanley Bros, who was in the old country selecting goods for his firm, returned home Saturday night.

JAMES E. McCAULEY, attorney-at-law, and Dr. J. J. McPhoe, both of New York, formerly of this Province, are at present visiting the Island.

HILTON HUGHES & Co., one of New York's largest and best known dry goods retail firms are bankrupt. On Wednesday last they assigned in favor of George M. Wright.

CHARLES POTTER, a guide at Mineau, Maine, was shot and instantly killed on Saturday at Deer Island by C. T. Russell, a boy of fifteen years. Russell was a nephew of the late Governor Russell. Potter was mistaken for a bear.

REV. THOMAS CURRAN, brother of Rev. Peter Curran, Rector of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, who was ordained in Rome on Trinity Sunday last, reached home on Saturday last after making an extensive tour of the Continent and the British Isles. We are pleased to see the Rev. gentleman looking so well and extend to him a hearty welcome home.

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Charles Jenkins, alias John Clare, one of the most notorious bank and post office burglars in the United States, died in the Long Island College Hospital on the 23rd ult., as the result of a wound received while attempting to rob the post office and general store of Walker B. Adams, at Bedford Station, New York, a few nights ago. The attempted robbery at Bedford Station has already cost two lives, those of Walker B. Adams, the postmaster at that place and Charles Jenkins the burglar. James and Byrnes, the other two burglars, are in a precarious condition and are likely to die at any time.

On Friday last, the Bank of England raised the selling price of bar gold a half penny. \$1,000,000 worth of gold was shipped to San Francisco from Australia, a few days ago, and about \$15,000,000 worth is about to follow.
