
History informs us that all attempts to cast a bell of 15.000 pounds and over have resulted in as many as five unsuccessful attempts,

it having taken as many as from year 1895 the Buckeye Bell Foundry, of Cincinnati, under the personal supervisihn of Mr George W. Vanduzen, succeeded in making a perfect bell casting weighing 26,000 pounds at the first attempt, thereby breaking the world's record, thus placing Cincinnati paramount over every city in the world and giving her an enviable record so far as bell founding is concerned.


