



The future savior of the Soudan however, differed from the surgeons and steadily refused to believe i their gloomy prognosis of his case, and, though he had to endure a jour ney down the Nile to the hospital at Cairo, confined in a small cabin in sweltering heat, his thin, muscular physique and iron will-power kept the dreaded fever at bay. The hospital doctors also failed to find the bullet, and came to the conclusion that it had worked its way out during the voyage down the Nile. Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this. amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on ts premises, after experience with the electric light .- Dr. Jamieson

He would merely add that no men ber who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Dudfield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.




