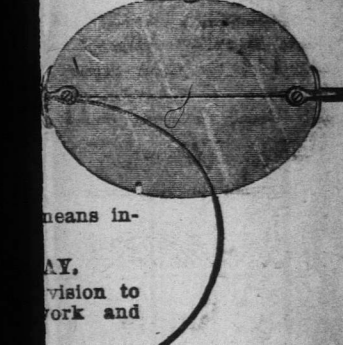

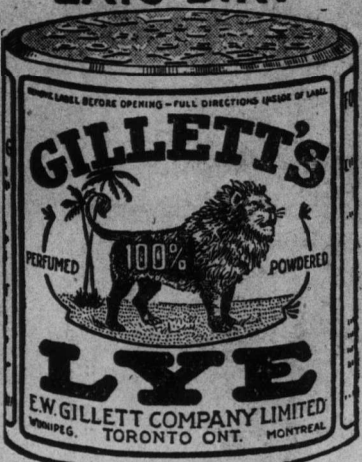

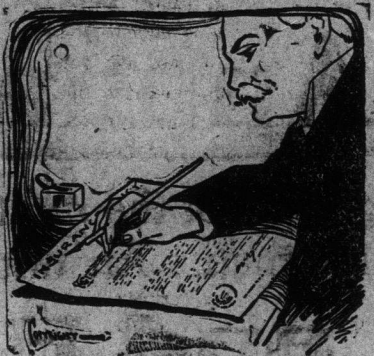
CHAPTER IX.  
While looking at the rocks and islands which present themselves from Channel Head, we were interested in one particular rock which seemed to stand out in bold relief to the others. For the time being we thought it was a real rock; but soon found that we were mistaken, and what we took to be a rock, was none else, than part of a huge iron ship, which some four or five years ago had struck at this particular place and became a total wreck. As far as we could learn, the ship's name is the "S. S. Metapedia," and is of quite large tonnage. She is still in the hands of the underwriters, and therefore, cannot be interfered with by irresponsible persons; but we understand that our local department of Marine and Fisheries have been endeavoring to enter into negotiations with Lloyd's for the purchase of the hull, with the intention of painting it white, so that it may be in future used as a beacon to passing ships.

found, and even until this day an occasional sovereign is picked up. Because of this she has been spoken of by some as the "sovereign ship." If we remember rightly the Captain's names was James, and with his crew of twenty-two men he sleeps on the rugged height of the sea shore near by.

About eight miles west of this same spot one of our local coastal boats known as the "Mary Hough" met her fate one fine summer day, and her timbers and machinery has since lumbered the bottom where others had sunk before. Still nearer our vantage ground, and quite within sight of the harbour of Port-aux-Basques, lies the timber of a large sailing ship called the "John E. Sayers." We happened to be at Channel the day she grounded, and the sight was one that we have never forgotten. The ship had left the Phillipine Islands with a load of sugar packed in matting, each package weighing about five hundred pounds. She had made a splendid run from her southern latitudes and was bound for Montreal, but was overtaken with a dense fog. The Captain considering that he was west of Cape Ray altered his course, and hauled his ship in thinking that he would run into the Gulf of St. Lawrence, but to his great sorrow he found himself fast aground in sight of Port aux-Basques and quite near the Isle-aux-Morts. Every effort was made to pull her off, but all in vain, she was hauled and fast aground upon a treacherous shore; and there she lay for several days; a full rigged ship in all her beauty, but only to be broken and dashed by the power of the sea when a north-east wind showed its teeth. The ship was two thousand four hundred tons, which for a sailing ship was very large.

Such are some of the sights and scenes which impress one while strolling near Channel Head, and though these occurrences may now be somewhat out of date, a passing reference to them and to those who met loss and death by them, may not be out of place. We are, and ever have been a maritime people, and for generations we have faced the storms and dangers of the deep, and our hearts always feel for those who, like many of our own sons, have gone down in the struggle. Strangers though they were, they were our brothers none the less, and in some home they were missed, and in some heart they were enshrined. These pieces of ships, and the rocks and shoals upon which they foundered are silent tell-tales of what we here write about; and to the traveller who will stop for a moment and pause, there is always something to learn, and something to make one feel like being better.

### Portia Returns.

The S. S. Portia, Capt. J. Kean, reached port from the Westward at 3 o'clock this morning after a tedious round trip. The prevalence of fog delayed the ship going West and conditions were practically similar on the return, though heavy ice had to be contended with when Cape Race was reached yesterday morning, since then and for several hours afterwards the ship was continually battling. The Portia got down off Cape Spear at 5 o'clock last evening, but for sometime had to remain almost stationary owing to the floe being tightly packed. Capt. Kean took a northward course and after a tedious delay found a place where the ice was loosened and came to port, though the Adventure which left here yesterday afternoon got no further than the Northern Head until the coastal boat came along and then her Channel was used. The Portia brought a full freight, including a large consignment of fresh frozen codfish and halibut. Five saloon and 25 steerage passengers came.

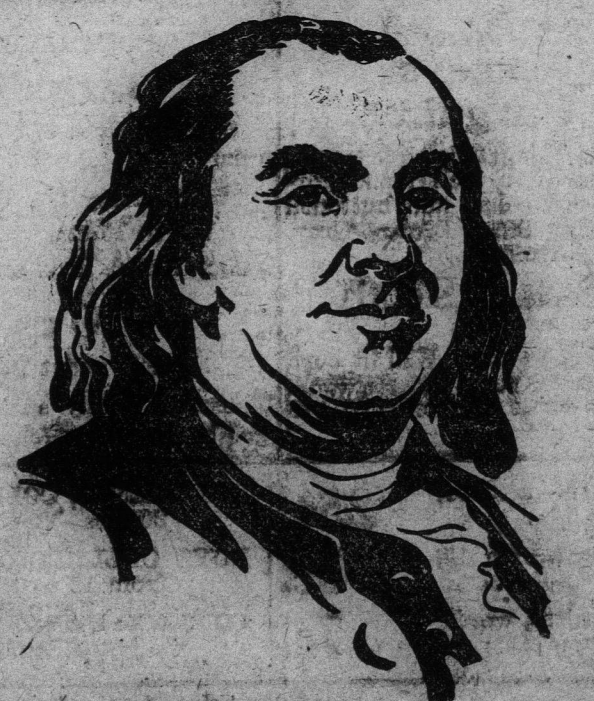

### The Labour Situation.

The prospects of improvement in the demand for labour seem to be poor as disclosed at the meeting, convened by the Chairman of the City Commission. Mr. Gosling showed that some 26 firms, according to the information furnished confidentially to him by them, had paid \$18,000 less in wages during the first six weeks of this year, and that he estimated there was a shortage of another \$20,000 in pay, on account of large firms who had not furnished information or on account of small employers who had not been asked to furnish information. In addition Mr. Gosling estimated that the extra cost of living called for an expenditure of some 15 per cent. more than usual. Mr. Gosling held out little or no hope of an improvement in the demand for labour. The Civic Commission held they had no extra labor to give while the frost was in the ground. Employers generally either by themselves or through Mr. Gosling, held out no prospect. Nor was there any word from the Government of labor giving by them. The only hope held out that immediately the frost came out of the ground, work could be given in pipe-laying, street repairing and the like. The extent of the pipe-laying would depend on the ability of the Municipality to borrow money to go into the Longley proposition on a large scale. We hope the Civic Commission will be successful in its effort to borrow and that the frost leaves the ground earlier than usual, which we understand is about the middle of April. This morning we learn that Messrs. Harvey intend building a shed in the near future, which they intended to build at a later date, but which they will begin much earlier, in order to give some employment. All honor to them for their example, which we hope will stimulate other employers to give what work they find they can. As to the Government, we have already pointed out that they are finding wages for some 1,100 soldiers, and that this must have relieved the situation somewhat. The monthly wage bill of the regiment is about \$35,000. But it should be remembered that only the portion provided in the allotment papers by the soldiers themselves will afford aid here, when the soldiers leave, and that the greater portion have already left. What we should like to hear is what the Government itself intends to do in other directions. There is for instance, railway construction work under the building contract, the operation of branches like Heart's Content and Bay de Verde already built, and the effect on labor in the railway shops of the city and work which falls to small workshops from this. What are the Government doing and what do they intend to do? People prefer work to charity, and it is desirable to know what the Government are doing and what they can do. From the remarks of clergymen, however, it is clear that immediate help must be afforded by charity. There are people who must have food and coal and cannot wait until the frost is out of the ground. The committee appointed last night will take up this aspect of the situation, as well as some machinery to prevent overlapping, but the machinery is not urgent as the need and if necessary it can wait. A charity fund is needed at once, but the Government and the Civic Commission are the only bodies which can deal with the providing of labor on a scale such as is necessary.

### A DIABOLIC FALSEHOOD.

**WASHINGTON, To-day.**  
Sir Edward Grey has sent to the State Department characterizing as falsehood the recent statement from Berlin, attributing to British intention to destroy American ships in the naval war zone and charge it to German submarines with the expectation of precipitating a crisis between the States and Germany.

### FEAR AN ATTACK ON CONSTANTINOPLE.

**COPENHAGEN, To-day.**  
The Deutsche Tages Zeitung publishes an official despatch from Sofia, which says the Russians are concentrating large forces at Odessa in readiness to ship them to Midia on the Black Sea, 60 miles Northwest of Constantinople for an attack on Constantinople.

### ROUGH DIES OF WOUNDS.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
Brigadier General Gough, who took a prominent part in the retreat from Mons, and who since then has several times been mentioned in despatches, died of wounds received last Saturday.

### COMPLAINT OF NO REPRISAL.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
Complaints at the Government's delay in enforcing blockade or whatever reprisals have been decided upon against Germany is voiced again in the editorial columns of the morning papers. The Mail says the British nation is labouring under a delusion that Germany is being subjected to a strict blockade, while the very reverse is the fact. Food and raw materials, the paper says, still are being imported into Germany. The Graphic similarly complains that while the British Cabinet hesitates a large part of Belgium has been reduced to semi-starvation by German military pressure. The morning papers also discuss the sinking of the American steamer Evelyn and the possible complications which may arise between the States and Germany because of the incident. The Graphic says that if the German people were guided by pure reason they would try to discover some method of conciliating American opinion.

### LUXEMBURG CABINET RESIGNS.

**LUXEMBURG, To-day.**  
The Cabinet of the Duchy of Luxembourg resigned. No reason has been given for Ministers' retirement.

### NO RIGHT OF WAY.

**PARIS, To-day.**  
When the tension between Turkey and Greece was greatest last week, says Petit Parisien, the Turkish Minister at Sofia asked the Bulgarian Government if it would permit the Turkish troops to pass through Bulgaria for an attack upon Greece should war be declared. Premier Radostavoff replied, the paper asserts, that neither country would be permitted to transport troops across Bulgarian territory.

### 48 YEARS OLD CALLED OUT.

**GENEVA, To-day.**  
Germans up to the age of forty-eight eligible for service with the Landsturm troops have been recalled from Switzerland, and it is reported here that those living in other neutral countries also have been directed to join the colors not later than March 3rd. Austria likewise has summoned from neutral countries men of Landsturm up to age of forty-five. The order affects 2,000 living in Switzerland.

### AIRSHIP RAID ON CALAIS.

**CALAIS, To-day.**  
Warning of the approach of a Zeppelin, which bombarded this city, was given sentries by the throbbing of the engine as it approached from the sea at a height of about a thousand feet. The airship flew straight across the city toward Ponthinette station, dropping no bombs on the way. The first missile fell when the Zeppelin was

above a point where the railway tracks intersect. It went through a foot bridge and struck a track leading to Dunkirk. The airship then rose somewhat higher in the air and dropped five bombs in rapid succession. All fell in vicinity of the railroad; one burst in courtyard of houses close to the grade crossing, demolishing a shed and breaking windows. Occupants of houses, who were awakened by the explosion, escaped without injury. Other bombs fell in a garden and on the roof of a little house in the Rue d'Ognir. An old man and a little girl, who were asleep in a garret, and a family which had a cottage on ground floor, consisting of father, mother and two children, were buried in the ruins. All were killed except one child, a baby five months old, which was taken uninjured from the twisted mass of brick and plaster. The violence of the explosion shook the neighbouring houses to their foundation and broke all windows within a wide radius. After dropping the bombs the Zeppelin disappeared rapidly over the sea. It evidently was manned by pilots well acquainted with the locality, since it came from the sea directly to Ponthinette, crossing the city at a point of its greatest width.

### PRIEST WOUNDED.

**HAZEBROUCK, To-day.**  
A soldier priest was saying Mass yesterday in a church at Elverdinkede, near Ypres, when a German shell exploded over the building. A portion of the missile came through the roof and struck the priest on the head. He was taken to the nearest ambulance where an operation was performed.

### FRENCH AIRMEN BOMBARD BARRACKS.

**BELFORT, France, To-day.**  
French aviators successfully bombarded a German barracks at Muelhausen, Alsace, Monday morning. They made a flight as far as Friburg, in Breisan, only eleven miles from the Rhine, and on their return dropped several bombs upon Muelhausen barracks, according to reports received here today. Bombs killed about a dozen German soldiers and caused extensive damage to barracks. All French aviators returned safely to Belfort.

### HEADING FOR ENGLAND.

**AMSTERDAM, To-day.**  
Dutch officers at frontier post of Eede sighted a Zeppelin airship and a squadron of a dozen aeroplanes flying westward early Monday morning.

Cucumber pickles are made in the following way: Wash the cucumbers clean and lay them in a crock or jar. Dissolve fine cooking salt in boiling water, making it quite strong, and pour over the cucumbers while it is hot. Cover and let stand twenty-four hours, then pour off the brine and put the cucumbers in the pickle jar with layers of mixed spices between, and pour over them enough vinegar brought to the boiling point to cover. In a few days they will be ready to eat.

## Representative Citizens Discuss the Labor Problem

At the meeting convened by Chairman Gosling, of the Civic Commission, and held at the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday afternoon, to discuss the labour problem, the following were present:—

Messrs. Gosling, Harris, Ayre, Anderson, Withers, Jackman, Mullaly, McFadden, and Bradshaw, representing the Civic Commission; Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche, V. G., Rev. Dr. Kitchin, Fr. McDermott, Revs. Canon White, Stanok, Clifton, Uphill, Hemmison, Guy, Boyle, Sutherland and Thomas, Staff-Capt. Cave, S.A.; Hons. W. C. Job, John Harvey, G. Knowling, J. R. Egan, J. A. Rodison, F. T. McGrath, M. G. Winter, Sir Joseph Outerbridge, Messrs. M. J. Kennedy, A. Harvey, J. M. Kent, J. S. Mann, W. S. Monroe, W. B. Grieve, A. McDougall, W. F. Lloyd, C. Ryan, Inspector O'Brien, Dr. Fraser, Dr. Macpherson; and the following ladies representing the various charitable organizations:—Mesdames D. J. Greene, W. C. Job, John Harvey, J. M. Kent, R. Simms, W. G. Gosling, Mr. W. G. Gosling, Chairman of the Civic Commission, Convenor, stated the object for which the meeting was called. He felt sure that all were aware of the destitution that existed in the city at present, owing to the lack of employment and increased cost of living. An idea had been prevalent that the city government should find work as a matter of charity, but the Municipal Act does not provide measures for the same. The Board after careful consideration of the matter have come to the conclusion that there is no work which they can economically undertake immediately. Later in the season when the frost leaves the ground water pipes may be laid which work would give employment to about 200 men all the summer. The extent of this depends on the ability to borrow. The work of sewerage extension and road making could also be taken up in the spring, but to relieve the present situation there appears to be no immediate work in sight.

In response to enquiries concerning the amounts paid by employers of labour from the first of the year up to Feb. 13th, statistics received from 26 firms showed that \$75,000 had been paid for labour against \$93,000 for the corresponding period last year, which practically means a reduction of 20 per cent. There were firms from which information had not been received. In addition to this shortage, the cost of living had increased about 15 per cent. Altogether he estimated there was a shortage of \$50,000 in purchasing power during this period.

The situation was a grave one and called for immediate attention, and the object for which the meeting was convened was to devise ways and means for the alleviation of the distress that at present was being felt all over the city.

Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche in addressing the gathering said that he felt sure there was no difference of opinion as to the destitution existing in the city, as all the charitable organizations had been inundated with petitions for relief. Under ordinary conditions the resources of these societies had been heavily taxed to cope with the wants of the poor that "we have always with us," but this year conditions were abnormal, due, no doubt, to the scarcity of employment. In his opinion there were only two solutions to the problem—employment and charity. Since it was not feasible to find employment a system of organized charity was in order.

Rev. Canon White was the next speaker. He, too, was of the opinion

Every one of us believes that he could amount to something worth while—do something big—if he only had the chance! In one of our newspapers I was reading the other day how the man who heads England's great fleet got his chance. He was a young lieutenant then and in command of one of the several squadrons placed ashore in a sham battle, with orders to get their guns to the top of a steep hill. Jellico's squad got there first. It was only a little thing, but—

The Admiral asked who the young lieutenant was and from that day Jellico was given chance for promotion.

How a Little Chance Became a Big Chance.

In a magazine article I read recently of how Sidney B. Williamson, head of one of the three great divisions of the Panama Canal, got his chance. Williamson, in 1889, worked under Colonel Goethals as the foreman of a gang of negroes on the Muscels Shoals Canal. The day after he was hired the colonel found Williamson down in a sandpit with the negroes, working away himself. The explanation of this unusual conduct was that the negroes were afraid of a cave-in and hung back, until Williamson threw dignity to the winds and led the way.

A little thing, that incident, but twenty years later Goethals still remembered and when Williamson asked for a job on the canal he got it, and a big one at that. The way in which he filled it is, of course, canal history.

This is the way two men "made good."

### BLAME CURRENTS FOR COLLISION.

Montreal, Feb. 16.—On the question of currents in the St. Lawrence River it is understood, depends largely the fate of the C. P. R. Company's \$2,500,000 suit against the steamship Starstad, for sinking the Empress of Ireland, and as the C. P. R. sought in the Admiralty Court to-day to show that the up-current caused the upward-bound Starstad to ram the Empress, which was going down-stream, both vessels having supposedly been standing still in the fog prior to the collision.

The C. P. R. enlisted its side of the case to-day, when Pique Berlier, of the Empress, between Quebec and Father Point, testified to the phenomenon of upward currents in the river. He was positive that the Empress' steering gear was working well the night of the collision. He said if there had been anything wrong with it he would have noticed it.

The hearing of the case for the defendants may last several days.

## Youthful Perpetrator

Of Serious Assault on Police Officer Peet, Rrounded up. Made Severe Threats for anyone who would tell on him.

The mystery surrounding the dastardly assault on Head Constable Peet is cleared up, and the perpetrator of the rash act is Ronald Simpson, aged 16 years, who is now behind lock and key, having been sentenced in the Magistrate's Court to-day to six months imprisonment, without the option of a fine, that being the severest penalty that could be meted out to him by that Tribunal.

It was on the night of the 16th that the episode happened. From the evidence disclosed it appears that two boys named Skeans and Hayes were together on the night in question and noticed Simpson, who was seldom a chum of theirs, standing in the dark near Holdsworth Street. They saw Simpson pick up a large portion of a brick. Just then Head Constable Peet happened to come along the thoroughfare mentioned. Skeans and Hayes saw Simpson throw the missile at the officer who was at once seen to put his hand to the back of his head, where he was struck. Simpson then fled and up to the time of his capture had been keeping himself in secluded places. During the investigation of the authorizing Simpson warned his comrades not to tell on him threatening them with a knife that he would have revenge. Detective Byrns interviewed Simpson on Saturday night last, and he informed that officer he had been to-night school on the 16th, which, on enquiry, was found to be untrue. Working on this clue sufficient evidence was established for an arrest and last night Constable O'Keefe rounded up the suspect. While at the Police Station, Simpson was interviewed by Supt. Griffin, who was told by the accused he would have revenge on the man who said that he committed the assault. He was arraigned before Judge Knight and convicted. On being asked if he had any questions to ask or anything to say for himself, Simpson replied "No." His Honor commented strongly on the offence, intimating that it was beyond his recollection anyone could so liberally and without malice, commit such a foul deed. He then sentenced the accused. The charge of threat was not brought into account.

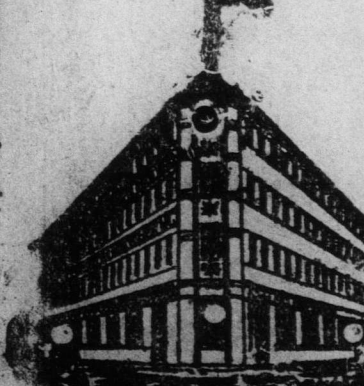

**War News.**

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

**OFFICIAL.**

LONDON, Feb. 22.

The Governor, Newfoundland:  
The French Government reports the enemy's attack against Ypres repulsed with very heavy loss. South of Verdun the French captured three machine guns and two hundred prisoners. In Champagne the French have captured trenches and taken near Mesnil two machine guns and a hundred prisoners.

The Russian Government reports Russian counter-attacks on the northern front. Obsolete German attacks were repulsed in the Carpathians. There has been progress at certain points. Two sorties by the garrison of Przemysl were repulsed with severe loss.

A German aeroplane dropped bombs at and near Colchester last night. Little damage was done and none were killed.

HARCOURT.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, Feb. 22.

Between the sea and the Aisne there has been intermittent cannonading during which the fire of our artillery was very effective. In Champagne a German counter attack, after being brilliantly repulsed, was hotly pursued, and we are now masters of all German possessions east and north of the forest which we took yesterday. On the rest of the front we have made good progress, particularly north of Les Mesnils, where we captured two machine guns and 100 prisoners. The enemy tried a seventh counter attack at Eparges in view of recapturing the positions that we had taken three days ago. The attack, like the previous ones, was unsuccessful.

In Belgium there have been a few engagements of infantry. In the section of Ypres we have captured a portion of the trenches which the enemy had temporarily occupied. Communiqués confirm that the Germans left on the ground several hundred dead. Our losses were few. In Champagne we have maintained our gains of yesterday. In Vosges we repulsed two attacks, one on the north bank of the Ticht and two on the south bank. Fighting continues.

The American s.s. Evelyn, Captain Smith, agents Bull & Co., New York, exploded on Friday, early, off Borkum. Crew saved; ship and cargo lost.

**WAR NEWS (continued)**

A FURTHER REPORT.

BERLIN, Feb. 22.

Further reports concerning the sinking of the American steamer Evelyn, yesterday, off Borkum Island, in the North Sea, show that only one man of the crew lost his life. This man was frozen to death in a small boat after sinking. The steamer Evelyn struck two mines but the crew had time to get into lifeboats. Some members of the crew were taken by

SCANDINAVIA ANXIOUS.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

Germany's submarine blockade continues the chief topic of interest in the United Kingdom, although British shipping is apparently moving with its usual freedom. The Scandinavian neutral powers are showing much alarm over the situation, and representatives of the Scandinavian Government are holding another conference to-day, the outcome of which is awaited with much interest by neutral shippers. The question of naval convoys is being seriously considered at the conference, but the guarded comments of newspapers show that it is clearly recognized that such steps lead to war. The question of the right of the crews of five Danish ships to sail for the enemy's ports is now before the court, which is considering their excuse that Germany is not likely to respect a neutral flag.

GERMAN SUBMARINES REPORTED SUNK.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

A despatch from Amsterdam to the Exchange Telegraph Company, says reports from the German frontier state that much uneasiness exists in the German fortification seaport of Cuxhaven, concerning two large submarines which have not returned to their base. The under-sea boats are said to be two days overdue, and it is feared that they have been destroyed.

AN UNLIKELY STORY.

PLYMOUTH, Feb. 22.

The Western Daily Mercury says that when the Australian mail boat Malora, with 400 passengers, was entering the English Channel on Saturday afternoon, she was ordered to stop by an unknown armoured merchantman. The mail boat ignored the order and made for Plymouth, whereupon the merchantman fired five shells at her. All fell short, and the Malora anchored at Plymouth safely.

BORDEAUX, Feb. 22.

The right leg of Sara Bernhardt, the famous actress, was amputated to-day.

A BUDGET FROM LONDON.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

The wasp of modern warfare by submarines, by means of which Germany has declared she will blockade the British Isles, daily becomes a factor of more and more importance in the great war in Europe, with respect to its influence on the policies of the nations engaged and in connection with the contraband question so vital to neutral states. Almost coincident with unofficial reports that Austria proposed to follow the example of her ally by making war on merchant

The Official Press Bureau issued an official denial to-day of the report sent from Berlin, that a British transport had been sunk by a German submarine.

ships in the Adriatic, came the announcement by Premier Asquith in the British Commons, that the much discussed retaliatory plan, though still tentative, was much broader in scope than had been previously suggested, in that it was a matter for consideration of all the allies, concerning which a joint note from the allies might be expected. A statement was likewise made in the Commons that the British Government might deem it necessary to alter its decision whereby cotton may be declared as contraband.

The day passed without any additional merchant belligerent or neutral ship having fallen victim to German submarines, but three small British craft are missing and fears are expressed as to their fate. Traffic in the North Sea remains somewhat disorganized, the Dutch and Scandinavian steamers showing reluctance to go to sea owing to the menace of both submarines and mines. Reports from Copenhagen that traffic between Sweden and England has been temporarily discontinued, are not officially confirmed.

The British newspapers print today two conflicting versions of the recent battles by which the Germans drove the Russians back over the East Prussian frontier, but naturally they are inclined to accept the Russian version. The Russians fell back in orderly fashion, fighting an effective rearguard action. As against this is renewed the German claim of capturing 200,000 prisoners and a staggered array of captured munitions. It is noted, however, that Berlin says: “The pursuit has come to an end.” British observers say this means that another costly German rush has fallen short. It will take the battle now developing on Russian soil to demonstrate whether this view is correct. In the Carpathians the armies of Russia and Austria remained swaying as if were in the gateway of Hungary. In the western war zone, it is given and take with loss or gain of a few yards of trenches. Official reports make usual claims, the Allies emphasizing their gains and the Germans theirs.

**ZEPPELIN VISITS CALAIS.**

PARIS, Feb. 22.

A Zeppelin airship bombarded Calais this morning, according to an official statement issued to-night, and dropped projectiles which killed five persons, all civilians, and caused some unimportant material damage.

**NOT YET DECIDED.**

LONDON, Feb. 22.

The allied governments have not yet decided upon the precise attitude which it is proposed to adopt in retaliation against Germany's recently initiated belligerent policy, but a speedy agreement is expected. Replying to a question in the Commons this afternoon Asquith said: “The Allied governments are considering what action it would be proper to take in the way of reprisal against the German policy of attacking and destroying British, Allied and neutral merchant vessels without warning, and without an attempt being made to save the lives of civilians and innocent crews. Pending a decision which I hope will very soon be announced, I cannot make a statement regarding the nature or scope of the measures to be taken. There certainly will be a note from Britain, and I hope that there will be a joint one.”

**FRENCH GAINS.**

PARIS, Feb. 22.

An official communication issued by the French War Office to-night tells of the bombardment of Calais by Zeppelin dirigibles which dropped bombs and killed five civilians. Our batteries demolished a heavy gun occupying a position near Lombaertzyde. The enemy violently bombarded Rheims Sunday night and Monday. The bombardment resulted in numerous victims, who represent the toll taken by Germans for their defeats of the last few days. On Souain Ceusejour front, we have made progress, capturing a line of trenches and two woods, completely repulsing two particularly violent counter attacks, taking numerous prisoners, and inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. By fresh attacks at Les Espargues we have continued to gain ground. We now hold almost the whole of the enemy's positions at Combres, south-east of Les Espargues, which is thus under our fire. At Bois Boule forest, Apremont, we captured a trench. In Alsace we have captured the greater part of the village of Stessweler which we held only the outskirts of yesterday.
