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

THE BULGARIAN TREATY.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 19. The summary of the Bulgarian treaty of peace cabled to the State Department by the American Mission at Paris shows the pact to follow the same general plan as the Austro-Hungarian treaty. "Many clauses are identical with the Austrian treaty, except the substitution of names, such as League of Nations, labor, aerial, litigation, penalties, prisoners of war and graves." Says the summary: "Regarding the change in the Bulgarian frontiers, important changes are to the south, where Bulgaria exchanges territory with the Principality of Serbia and Associated Powers, and agree to accept whatever disposition this territory the Powers ultimately decide, but it is stipulated that any event Bulgaria's western frontier shall be modified slightly in places to Serbia's advantage. Bulgarians are required to recognize the independence of the Serbs, Croats and Sloven States, and provisions made to change the nationality of the inhabitants of the territory formerly Bulgarian and transferred to other States. Provisions are made for the protection of minorities of race, language, nationality and religion. Within three months the Bulgarians are required to demolish

Polish Activity.

ZURICH, Sept. 19. The Poles have succeeded in cutting the railroad communication between Kiev and Petrograd, according to despatches from Minsk. They are making important progress toward Dnieper, Mohile, and Orsza.

Kaiser's Trial Is Near.

LONDON, Sept. 19. Sir Gordon Hewart, the Attorney General, has completed the case for the prosecution of the former German Emperor, according to the Mirror. The place for trial has not yet been settled.

Von Bernstorff Gets Job.

BERLIN, Sept. 19. The Zeitung Amittag announces that Von Bernstorff will become permanent State Secretary of the Foreign Office.

Execution Postponed.

PARIS, Sept. 19. The announcement was made this morning of the postponement of execution of Pierre Lenor, who was tried with Senator Sambert and others on a charge of communicating intelligence to the enemy, and who was to have faced a firing squad at dawn. Lenor repeated his demand to be confronted with Joseph Caillaux, former Premier, and his request was granted.

Will Strike on Monday.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 19. Complete tie-up of all ore carrying vessels in the Cleveland District, which includes six other lake ports between Erie and Sandusky, will go into effect at six o'clock on Monday morning until the proposed demands are met of steel workers, was the ultimatum issued to-day by George Martin, Union Business Agent of the Lake Seamen's Union, in the form of a vote of 2,200 sailors to support the impending strike of steel workers.

French Airflight to Australia.

PARIS, Sept. 19. An airplane flight from France to Australia will be attempted shortly by the French aviator Bouloit, it is announced by the Excelsior to-day. The airman plans to start on Sept. 28th from Paris, with Melbourne as his destination.

Steel Workers Will Strike on Monday.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Sept. 19. The Steel Worker's national committee late to-night made public a letter it has drafted and sent to President Wilson, giving eleven reasons why it could not comply with his request to postpone steel worker's strike called for next Monday.

The Boston Police Strike.

BOSTON, Sept. 19. The abandonment of plans for court action in behalf of the striking policemen, and calling of a special meeting to-night of the committee of the Central Labor Union delegates to receive reports of votes taken by individual locals during the past week, revived discussion to-day of a possible general strike to support the strikers in their demand for union recognition.

Not Yet a Worker.

(From the New York Tribune.)
In his recent letter the younger Hohenzollern expresses the hope to be permitted to return to Germany to go to work. What is the idea of the former prince concerning what constitutes work? What is his conception of a job? Would he busy himself as a general or a legislator, or would he carry a hod, or handle a pick, or swing a hoe? It is greatly to be feared the young man has a restricted notion of what constitutes work—he probably entertains no notion of tiring himself physically, or of being compelled to live or starve as best he may by the labor of his own hands and brain. If by some miracle it were possible to convert princelets into laboring men the world would find it easier to see the poor timber that is beneath the veneer of kingship. Peter the Great of Russia is the only monarch one can recall that cared for exercise with a hammer, and it was not the real thing even with Peter, for he knew he was Czar and could quit when his mood shifted. The poor prince! His weaknesses are not all their own fault. They are not educated right, as Huck Finn said to Jim on the raft. They are cut off from the culture discernible in no way except by living an unbelated life. If only there was some way of putting Friedrich Wilhelm really to work! And with him his father, and Cousin Karl of Vienna, and Rupprecht and Ferdinand, late of Sofia, and all the others of the German royal crew. It would be a consummation devoutly to be wished. But the poor old sentimental world is not sensible enough to try the experiment, and Friedrich, smoking cigarettes and stroking his long nose with his thin fingers, has no purpose of experimenting on his own account. He is a parasite at Wierengen. He is not supporting himself. He is among an industrious people, and probably could get employment cow milking, but does not apply for employment at pre-

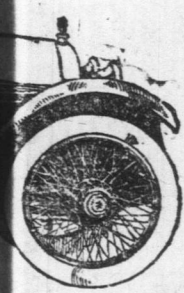

Some time ago the American printed a statement regarding the new issue of postage stamps of the Dominion of Newfoundland. A correspondent of the Harbor Grace (N.F.) The United States and the Prince.

(From the New York Times.)
The Prince of Wales, after his visit to Canada will be the guest of the American Government at Washington upon Mr. Wilson's invitation, and will afterwards stay in this city for a short time. Here, doubtless to the disappointment of many Mrs. Leo Hunters, he will live on a British naval vessel. Fifty-nine years ago, his grandfather, the late Edward VII., visited the United States and had a most cordial welcome. The young Prince of Wales has the reputation of a brave, modest and democratic young man. He comes to us, however, rather as a symbol than as a person, though both for himself and as the son of his democratic father, George V., whom Americans respect and like, he would be more than amply welcome. He comes not as the representative of a family, nor of a sovereign who is himself but a symbol of the sovereign parliament and people of Great Britain. In him the Government and people of the United States will honor that mighty people and nation wherefrom the traditions and foundations of our liberties, our law and representative institutions sprang, and which in all the course of its splendid history never was so great and heroic as in its desperate battle with Germany. They will honor our gallant comrade in that battle wherein it made sacrifices far exceeding ours, our friend, our honorable competitor and associate in the parts and works of peace, a fellow guardian of the peace of the world.


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Cruel to Be Kind.

The Society for the Protection of Animals certainly justified its existence in Newfoundland Thursday afternoon and we must "take off our hats" to the Hon. Mr. Justice Johnson, President, Mrs. A. N. Gosling, Mrs. J. B. Mitchell and others who have kept the Society in funds. The work horse parade recently held was only a feature, but Thursday afternoon Mr. John Diamond's fine truck mare was standing near the Mechanic's Hall attached to a long cart when suddenly owing to it is said the machinery of Mr. Harry Dickenson's motor car giving out, the car crashed into Mr. Diamond's horse standing by the curb "on its daily round of duty." The poor animal was struck so hard that the left foreleg was broken near the knee joint. Veterinary Furneaux being called pronounced the leg broken, and nothing could be done but put the poor beast out of its suffering. Here the Society for the Protection of Animals finds its usefulness, instead of some amateur gunman being called in with probably a shot gun, an axe or other suitable weapon to further prolong the animal's agonies. Mr. Gus Bastow, the Society's Inspector, was rushed to the scene by Mr. Ern. Spry, the popular salesman of Colin Campbell Ltd., who is always a "handy man" in emergencies, and promptly Inspector Bastow shot the animal with his special army horse pistol with a suitable bullet, and simultaneously at the sound of the explosion the horse—the faithful servant and companion of Mr. Diamond—dropped and in three seconds had "passed out" from its suffering to the horses' long rest where accidents from man and motor cars never trouble them. We congratulate Inspector Bastow on his business-like way he did his duty and while it was "cruel to be kind" everybody present could not help but admire that "Bastow knows his job" and the Society has more than justified its existence. This is only one of the many incidents in the ordinary year's work of the Society which deserves the support of the public.

We feel sorry for Mr. Diamond losing his noble beast and we feel sure nobody regrets it more than Mr. Dickenson himself, but this time it was not the fault of the horse standing doing its daily duty on the curb.—Q.

New Markets.

(Trade Review.)

The following is a partial list of the new markets that we want to see opened for our fish in Europe. In our Review next week we will mention some new markets in America.

France is one of the greatest consumers of codfish in Europe.

We missed the opportunity of one hundred years by not pushing for this market in a more energetic manner while the war was on. It is not too late yet as St. Pierre can never do what she has attempted in the past.

Russia is the greatest consumer of Pickled Herring in Europe.

The Government of this country is in a chaotic state at present but every effort should be used to extend business when the opportunity offers.

Trieste—This seaport is the gateway to the old Austrian Empire that is now in course of reformation.

Energetic efforts were made last winter to introduce Newfoundland codfish there that we hope may lead to a successful issue in the near future.

Not three hundred years ago Venice and the Adriatic Sea dominated the Mediterranean but that section is practically a closed book to our Commerce.

Greece has always been a good customer for Labrador codfish but since the Balkan wars it now includes Larger Greece with the great seaport of Salonika and let us hope to double and treble our former shipments.

Romania made a splendid beginning last year and if this country only shows its energy in Commerce in proportion to its recent military and political achievements we may expect great results.

Constantinople—There has always been wonderful possibilities for opening up a trade for Salt Codfish through this great distributing centre but the deplorable Turkish rule prevented all chance of successful business operations.

Egypt—In recent years large quantities of our codfish sent to Greece was transhipped to Alexandria for distribution up the Nile and throughout that country.

The Levant—The whole of the Eastern Mediterranean Ports in Egypt and Palestine, and from thence to Arabia and Persia are dominated now by British control and should be centres of activity for sale of our codfish.

Recently the Editor of Pearson's Weekly solicited the opinions of a number of prominent people in Great Britain on the Prohibition question. Their replies are published beneath, exactly as printed in that journal.

In view of the much-talked-of foot Campaign to make us all total, famous people here express their views on the benefits or otherwise of Prohibition.

Would Lead To Secret Drinking.

Father Bernard Vaughan thinks it would be useless to force Prohibition on unwilling people. He says: "England dry is no doubt safer than England wet—but she must decide for herself. Unless it is a self imposed measure it might lead to deceit, camouflage, or, to put it in one phrase, to private self-indulgence. As a Catholic I should say, no quid nimis (Shun extremes.)"

To my thinking there is something common and vulgar in bringing in a National Drink Bill. Each one should introduce his own drink bill for himself. Don't pay too tremendous a tribute of homage to the pressed grape.

Arnold Golworthy is sarcastic and ranges himself energetically on the side of the "Noes."

By all means let us get Prohibition. To begin with, it destroys the sweep the Freedom for which the war was fought, and thus proves the utility of war.

Once we have got Prohibition we can proceed to stop the horrid and unnecessary habit of smoking tobacco, and, the sinful practice of eating chops and steaks instead of good old hickories and nuts.

After that we can suppress with our hand the use of noxious drinks like tea and coffee, which are undraining the nerves of the community.

We shall then befit for annexation America, unless by that time we Americans, like all the other wandering people of history, have themselves become a subject race.



1. Thou shalt heed the call of Plain quiet wall papers and white woodwork wherever such is possible.
2. Thou shalt lighten dark rooms by the use of light-hued, yellow-tinted wall paper, that suggests the blessed sunshine.
3. Thou shalt see that thy walls and thine own personality are not to forward, but modestly retiring.
4. Thou shalt use no large-patterned wall papers against which to hang thy pictures. The one will kill the other.
5. Thou shalt have no centerpiece or cornerpieces upon thy ceiling, but only a very nearly plain expanse of light color.
6. Thou shalt have thy fill of bright tints, and delicate designs for bedrooms and boudoirs, but for drawing-rooms, dining-rooms, libraries and halls, thou shalt be compelled to use less frivolous papers.
7. Thou shalt, when the ceiling is not too high, run the paper of the side wall up to the ceiling, putting the border just below the angle.

9. Thou shalt use attention-compelling cut out borders, or conventionally designed strips for divisions between walls and ceiling.
