As has been said, a great deal of the history surrounding St. George is legendary and traditional, but enough evidence has been saved from the past to furnish proof that he was a real personage, though not an Englishman-or a Briton to be critically correct, though the author of a most interesting book entitled "The Seven Champions of Christendom," makes St. George to have been born at Coventry, near Birmingham, of English parentage, but for this there is no authority whatever. All other writers make Lydda his birthplace and Cappadocia the city in which he was reared. On the whole the history of St. George is more obscure than that of any other saint of equal eminence in the calendar. 

Sealing Case Judgment. IN THE CENTRAL DISTRICT

COURT. Abraham Kean, vs. William Bradbury and Others.

This is an action taken by Abrahar Kean, Master of the S.S. "Terra Nova," a ship engaged in the prosecution of the seal fishery just terminat ed, against certain sealers, members of his crew.

The defendants are charged, that while engaged on board the "Terra "Nova," they did combine with other "members of the crew to impede the "progress of the voyage contrary to "Sec. 225 Merchant Shipping Act, *1894."

The usual sealing agreement was entered into between the Captain and the defendants, and signed by them at the office of Bowring Brothers, owners of the ship. The agreement is dated the 10th day of March as beginning the service, but no date is fixed for the termination of the yoy-

In the year 1918, the Governor-in-Council, under the provisions of the "War Measures Act," fixed the 15th day of April as the day upon which the Sealing Voyage should terminate and prohibited the killing of seals after that date. This Order-in-Council was in force and operation on March 10th last, when the sealers signed on and afterwards proceeded to the fishery, and Bradbury stated in his evidence, the crew were aware of that fact, as a paper was read for them in the forecastle containing the

The Birth and Death of Shakespeare.

calendar of genius, being that of the peare, who was born at Stratford-en yon, in Warwickshire, in the year 1564. What credit should be given o the stories which tradition has anded down to us of his earlier lays, is difficult to say, but after a somecome to London when he was about twenty-two years of age, and after having been married for some years. His circumstances at that time are said to have been so destitute that he was wont occasionally to perform the very humble service of holding the horses at the theatre doors of persons who went to the play. He is also reported to have officiated in the capacity of call boy, or attendant, to the prompter. From this condition, however, he was certainly not very long in emerging. It has been conjectured that he produced his first dramatic composition—the first part of Henry VI.—as early as 1589, when he was only twenty-five years old. It is certain that some of his happiest productions, for example, "Romeo and Juliet," "Richard II." and "Richard III." were printed in 1597, though possibly they may have appeared on the stage some some years before. He continued to write for the stage for a number of years, occasionally appearing himself as a performer. At length, having secured by his exertions a fortune of two or three hundred a year, he retired to his native town, where he purchased a small estate and spent the remainder of his days in ease and honour. He died there on his birthday in the year 1616, at the age of fifty-two. Besides his plays, he was the author of numerous poetical productions, and especially of a collection of sonnets of great sweetness and beauty.
