

The notification further states that the only organization now recognized by Congress with membership of class of G.B.R.E. is the International Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees.

LABOUR COMMISSION'S CHARGES. LONDON, Dec. 29.

Brigadier General C. B. Thompson who accompanied the Labor Commission to Ireland, declared at the Labor Convention to-day that the soldiers in Ireland were to a large extent merely children and "the army of occupation is masterful and criminal. Black and Tans are violent in thought and deed. In addition to being perpetrators of the worst outrages they are the most provocative element in that unhappy country." 



Swells to Enormous Size.

As a matter of fact, this sort of thing does actually take place when deep-sea fish are hauled to the surface by means of a deep-sea traw The body swells to an incredible extent, the stomach and interior organs are forced out of the mouth, and the fish is so mangled that its anatomical study becomes very difficult.

In spite of these difficulties, however, many of the denizens of the abyssmal ocean depths have been reconstructed and their extraordinary organization made clear. Though nothing in the shape of the veritable sea-serpent has so far been discovered, yet the dredge of the ocean has a strange tale to tell, and some of the creatures he has brought to light are little less fantastic than the creations of a nightmare.



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

Mr. Rescoe's Discovery.

That matter has, however, been cleared up by the Rev. John Roscoe, who has just returned to England from a year's sojourn in the Bunyoro district, which borders the eastern shore of Lake Albert in the Northern Province of Uganda.

Mr. Roscoe, who is one of our greatest othnologists, has now proved, beyond all possibility of question, that an Asiatic people (Semites) traversed the Nile from Egypt as far South as Zululand long ago. These people, no doubt, brough with them many of the customs of a tent Egypt, which died out elsewher a thousand years ago, but which st survive in some parts of Central ica, and, incidentally, tainly instituted stick-

carving on It is stated that this tribe has kept itself almost entirely separate from other tribes and that the men and women, who are light-brown in colour are very handsome, even when judged by our Western standards.

The fact that these people are light in colour. European in appearance, iginally have travelled right through Central Africa, long ago, bringing with them new and strange customs, is quite enough to account for the East African legend that a white race is still extant in the interior.

Quite recently an American explorer, returned from a sojourn in the African wilds, electrified the ethnologists by announcing that he had discovered an entirely new race of pigmy negroe in the forest mass bordering the semliki River between Lake Albert and Lake Edward.

Descendants of the Aztecs?

This American stated that his pignies were known to other natives as the Mbatti, and were not in any way to be confused with the Wambatti, a race of pigmis discovered by Stanley

in the same locality. This statement has a distinctly musing side since in the Swahili language "M" is the singular and "Wa" the pleral prefix to the same

Danger of Profit Sharing

SCHEMES . THAT MAY LEAD TO SYNDICALISM.

Mr. Austin Hopkinson, M.P. for the Mossley Division of Lancashire, in a lecture under the auspices of the Labour Co-partnership, in London, recently, said that in his own works profit-sharing was introduced, not as an incentive to higher production an incentive to higher production, which was unnecessary, but as an acknowledgment of the men's work during the war.

The danger of profit-sharing was in the direction of Syndicalism and guild Socialism. That was proved during the war in the munition trade. He asserted that in that trade there was an understanding between em ployers and men that their interests coincided, and they were in a posi-

tion to bleed the country white. This scheme was not one in which by fostering production greater profits were made and shared among employers and men. It was a scheme for sharing existing profits after pay ment of taxation, interest on capital. etc. Of the first £1,000 of net profit the employers too £900 and the men £100, on the second £1,000 the employers share was £300 and the men's £200, and so on. When the employer ceased to have an interest in the profits the consumer came in. and the profits were reduced.

Gloves." One of Vienna's most debonair social vampires has just been arrested in the person of Julius von Szemszo, a Hungarian aristocrat, aged thirtynine. He has been in contact with the police on previous occasions, but the arrest has been made this time on the charge that at a game of baccarat in his private house he and his brother won no less than 28,000,000 kronen, or, nominally, more than £1,-000,000, from a Viennese, aged twentyone, whose name has not been dis-

"A Social Evening."

It seems that the two Szemszo brothers were nearing the end of their financial resources, and resorted to the shearing of this young lamb, who is the son of a rich manufacturer. They invited him to the house of Julius for a social evening, but the young innocent found that only the two brothers were present. They proposed a game of baccarat, and stipulated that though they played for kronen, losses should be paid in some foreign currency, dinars being ultimately agreed upon. The dinar is a Serbian coin, twenty-five of which

peace time equal £1. The "Innocent" Aghast. At the end of two hours' play the young innocent found, to his horror, that he had lost 28,000,000 kronen, and was obliged to sign seven bills of exchange for 2,000,000 dinars, this, it was said, being the convertd value. In case of trouble with the police the sum was stated on the bills to be in consideration of a loan of 28,000,000 kronen received from Szemszo. Even here, however, the young innocent had been swindled, Szemszo having calculated

the dinars at twice the rate of exchange prevailing. This Julius Szemszo is well-known in certain strata of society as "The man with the yellow gloves," owing to his habit of wearing such gloves when playing cards at various clubs. He lives in a house called "Palais Szemszo," where he keeps a large establishment of servants, six motor cars, seven racehorses, and two milch cows, these being a considerable rar-

ity here nowadays. Sir Edward Marshall-Hall, K.C., who has now been briefed for the defence in the Eastbourne case, which will be tried next week, has become during the past twenty years the world's greatest murder-trial specialist. 



NEW SHILLINGS FOR OLD. The Treasury have apparently been orking quietly and stealthily to meet the situation caused by the rise in the rice of silver, which made our coinage worth more than its face value. They have prepared a new issue of 'silver" coins, containing just over half the amount of silver that is in hose at present in circulation. Large supplies of this new coinage have been lready minted, and the great English panks have been generously stocked. Now that all the preparations have een completed, the secret has been divulged, and the banks are putting the new coinage into circulation this week The new shillings, floring, and half crowns can hardly be distinguished in appearance from their more valuable predecessors, in design, weight, and size the newcomers are similar to the old, but they are harder and a shade whiter. To every 925 parts of ilver contained in the old issue the ew can boast of only 500 parts of that metal. It is intended to withdraw the ld coinage as fast as it can be replaced by the new issue.

NAVAL POLICY.

The money to be spent on the Navy next year is now being discussed by the Cabinet, and in view of the modthing in hand. At the same time many ern big demand for economy in all national expenditure very diverse views are being expressed. One thing is clear, however, and that is that the new Navy expenditure must provide for the refitting of a large number of ships. Otherwise the discus sion will probably turn largely upon the so-called capital unit. Whether the replacement ought to follow in the line of existing practice may be a moot point. Strategical and tactical experts seem to be, at any rate, in profound disagreement as to whether the capital unit should be a Hood, or a ship that flies, or a submersible battleship, or both. The Borad of Admiralty's belief is that it should be an improved Hood, and that the ship which works under water should be developed as auxiliaries to it. The Board may, of course, be wrong, but if it is as right as it believes itself to be it has as little to fear from a committee of experts as its predecessor had from the Dreadnought Committee. In any case, the public opinion, which regards it as absolute dictator of policy in all matters maritime, exaggerates the importance of the role it plays. The duty of the Board is to ascertain the requirements of the naval position, and indicate how, in its opinion, they ought to be fulfilled. It cannot ignore the battleship and battle cruiser programme of




