PLAIN BECOMES A PLATEAU.


Mountain Side Falls.


While the peasants were working n the fields at Arvier, Switzerland, just outside Villeneuve, at the east-ern end of the Lake of Geneva, a huge slab of the mountain side, 1,000 feet high and estimated at 1.308.000 cubic rards, fell with a terrific crash. Fissures having appeared in the ocks owing to quarry workings at the foot, the inhabitants had been warned to leave their dwellings in the neighbourhood, and consequently no loss of life is reported. greater part of the rock buried itself in the soft soil of the plain, thus causing an unheaval of land for a radius of several hundred yards. Several houses and sheds were

thrown forward and deposited at fanbastic angles. Peasants working 200 yards away vere alarmed to see the ground rising underneath them, and they rushed helter-skelter for safety. A stretch of land, formerly a flat plain, is now a plateau rising in parts to a height of 50ft.

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on the ground that the register of voters is defective. Both at the Dail. sessions and in correspondence with President Griffith he has contended that the register is stale, including many names that ought to be removed and omitting many names that ought to be included. His correspon-dence has demanded the immediate preparation of an up-to-date register but the demand was resisted on the ground that it would be certain to delay the elections which the Free Staters desire to hold at the earliest possible moment. It is admitted that owing to the conditions of conflict that prevailed in Ireland last year the ordinary work of revising the register was not uniformly performed. Ac-cording to Mr. De Valera the errors affect tens of thousands of names. In the few districts where revision was carefully done the changes made amount roughly to about 16 percent. ACCURATE ENOUGH FOR PURPOSE The deficiency concerns two classes

in whom Mr. De Valera is specially interested. These are the young men who have come of age in the qualifying period and who are not, under the existing register, entitled to vote, and women under the age of thirty, who reached that age during the qualifying period but are not yet on the register. The Republicans attach importance to the woman's vote, which they believe to be favorable to them. The reply of President Griffith while conceding that the register is not ideal, argues that it is quite as accurate as the register on which elections were carried out last year, and he charges that Mr. De Valera's insistence on a new register might delay the elections for 12 months. Mr. De Valera rejoins that the register is not so accurate as the old one, for the latter was at least uniform and the one now in force was corrected for
