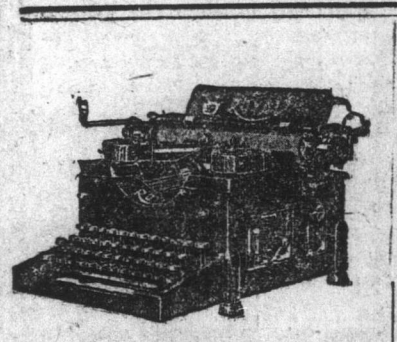

WOULD SPLIT EUROPE.
GENOVA, April 19. The German demand for a revision of the Economic Conference will prove a "mortal blow" to the Conference, it is declared in a communication issued here.

BULGARIA ASKS FOR MORATORIUM.
GENOVA, April 19. The Bulgarian delegation has asked for a moratorium on Bulgaria's reparations obligations.

WINTER WEATHER IN CHICAGO.
CHICAGO, ILL., April 19. Several persons were killed and several injured, by a sixty mile gale which swept this area to-day. Snow flurries and freezing temperature followed.

BELFAST'S DAILY TOLL.
BELFAST, April 19. Bomb thrown in Belfast suburbs, killed a woman. Five persons killed in to-day's disorders.

QUEENSLAND LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ABOLISHED.
SYDNEY, N. S. W., April 19. Queensland Legislative Council, Upper House of Parliament, has failed to exist. Premier Theodore announced that the Governor had refused to give the bill abolishing the council and that the necessary advice had been passed by the Imperial authorities.

PORTUGUESE UNABLE TO COMPLETE FLIGHT.
RIO JANEIRO, April 19. Portuguese aviators who are attempting a flight from Portugal to St. Paul's, will be unable to proceed in their hydro-aeroplane from St. Paul's. A few hundred miles short of goal on the American Continent, where they landed last night, because of damage to their machines, they were forced to return to the harbor to-day. The message their hydro-aeroplane was so damaged in affecting a landing, no longer useable. The aviators, however, expect to save the motor.

COMPULSORY WHEAT BOARD ULTRA VIRES.
OTTAWA, April 19. Reconstruction of the Canada Board with compulsory powers requested by the Canadian Council of Agriculture and pressed for by the executive members is ultra vires Parliament of Canada, according to Deputy Minister of Justice.

Exports from Labrador.

RETURNS SHOW VALUE DECREASE.

According to returns furnished the Board of Trade the exports of codfish, seal oil, furs, etc., from Labrador for the season of 1921 are as follows:

Although 51,497 qtls. of fish more were shipped than in 1920, the returns are less by \$184,736. Nineteen schooners and five steamers were engaged carrying the produce to market. The first shipment was made on August 23, by Messrs. Job Bros. & Co. Ltd., from Blanc Sablon. The last sailing was the Kinsman on Nov. 7th from Battle Harbour.

Fifteen Hundred Dollars a Year.

Average Earnings of N.S. Miners.
HALIFAX, N.S., April (Canadian Press)—Some of the competitive difficulties of the Nova Scotia coal industry are indicated by the fact that the Cape Breton mines are mostly submarine, and for every ton of coal hoisted nearly four tons of water have to be pumped. In West Virginia where ships coal through Hampton Roads, and which is an important competitor, it is said that most of the water from the mines runs away by gravitation. In most of the Nova Scotia mines the coal seams dip, probably one foot in ten, making the haulage all up-hill work. In the West Virginia district the coal output is about seventy million tons a year, compared with less than six million in this province, and, it is claimed that the production per employee in Virginia is nearly double what it is in the Nova Scotia mines.

Nova Scotia Double British.

On the other hand the Nova Scotia mines have an output per employee more than double the individual production of the British miners, according to some of the officials of the United Mine Workers. In 1920, the peak year for miners' wages, Great Britain's mines produced 249 million tons of coal, while employing 1,248,000 men. In the same year the Nova Scotia mines produced 6,687,920 tons, and the number of employees was estimated at 12,600. According to these figures the production per employee was 207 tons in Great Britain, and 477 tons in Nova Scotia. In the British Mines 1920 the average earnings, including officials, was about \$1,000. D. H. MacDougall, vice president of the British Empire Steel Corporation gives the average earnings of skilled miners in Nova Scotia during 1920 as \$1885, while in 1918 with the miners earning \$1710 the average for all classes of employees, excluding officials, was \$1235. These figures would indicate an average wage for all classes of employees in Nova Scotia during 1920 of \$1600, compared with \$1,000 in Great Britain.

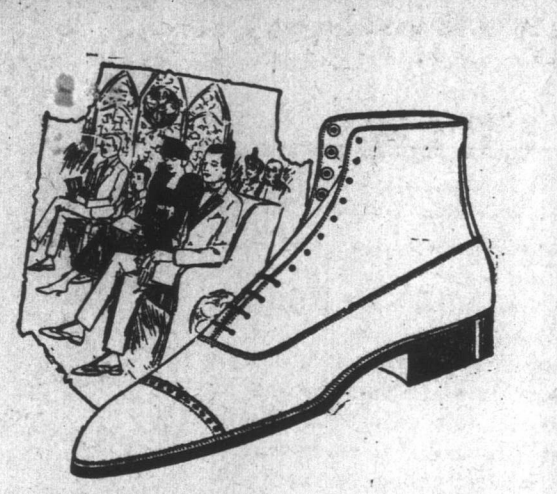

Dear Sir—It has just occurred to me that your omission, to consider the lands granted to the Reid Newfoundland Company as contributory to railway rates and railway operating credits, may not have been an oversight on your part, but have been of set purpose. You may have knowledge that those lands have been alienated by the Reid Newfoundland Company, and suppose that they are not now available for the purposes for which they were granted.

It would be well for the Government to have in remembrance that the law is only for the protection of those who take due care of their rights and property; for as a Law maxim very forcibly puts it—"Vigilantibus non dormientibus servit lex."

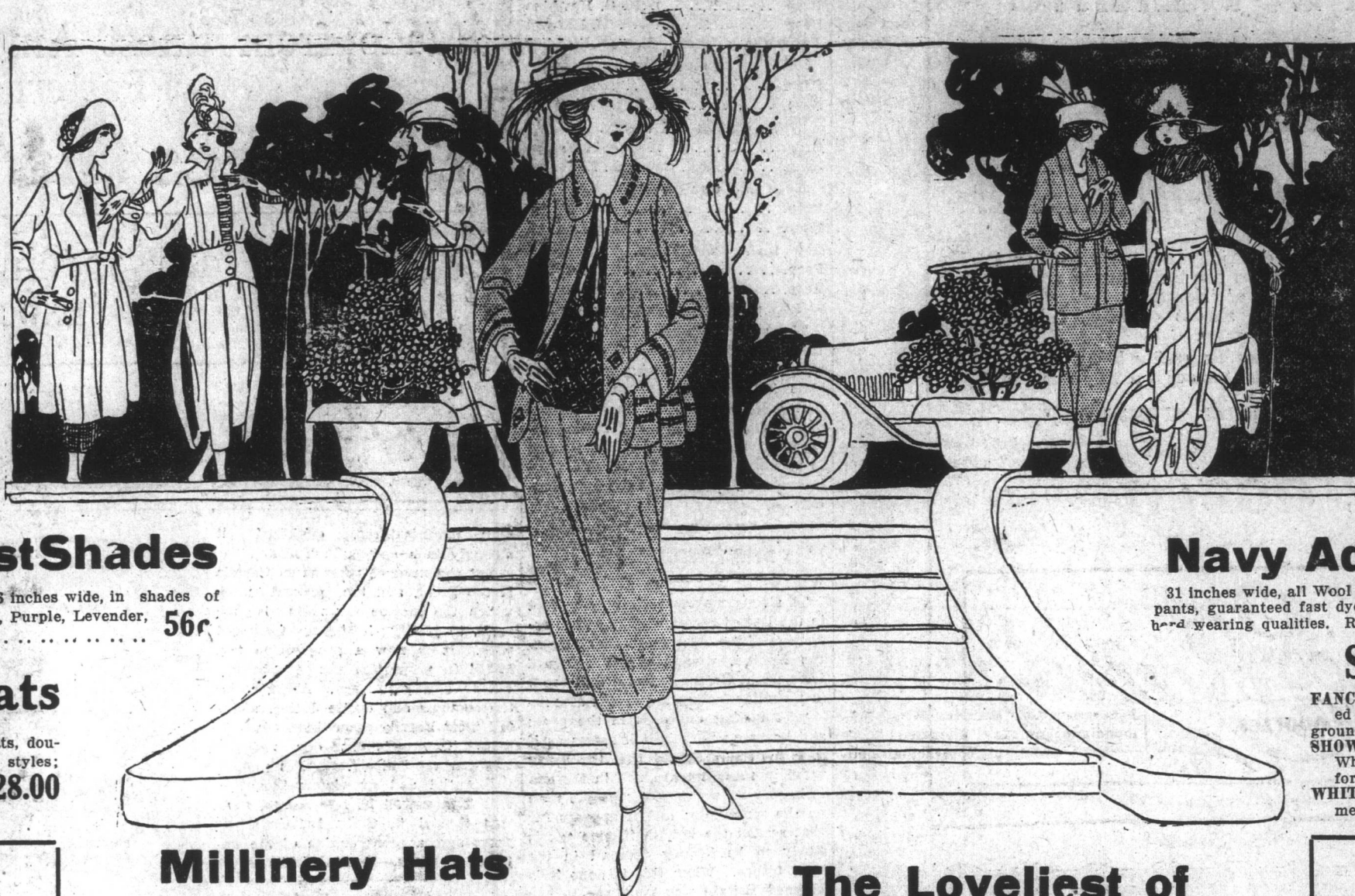

The Income Tax.

"A strong movement is now on foot in the United States, aiming at the reduction of the income tax. Sir Augustus Nanton, who has just returned from Great Britain, reports that there is a similar feeling there. He says:—
"From what one sees in the press and hears on the street it seems as if it is generally agreed that too heavy taxation retards trade and in the end is harder on the working people than on the well-to-do; and it appears for that reason the British income tax is likely to be largely reduced in the near future. When this is done it is claimed Britain will soon regain her old position of being able to compete with the world for trade and that unemployment will be a thing of the past. I have always been a believer that those that were well off should pay full taxes, but if government go too far they simply take for government use the money that would otherwise go into trade and help the working people."
Though opposition to any tax which bears lightly on those of small income was difficult in war time, there have been many voices of protest against the income tax in Canada during the past year or so. Only last Monday J. F. M. Steward, a prominent Canadian manufacturer, criticized it strongly in a speech in Toronto. But the need of revenue in Canada is too great, and the ground upon which the income tax rests is too solid, to justify it being tampered with. It is now a progressive tax, levied in proportion not to income but to ability to pay. Along with the customs and excise duties, which fall most heavily upon those of small means, it rounds out our national taxation very nicely. It has yielded substantial and growing returns, so that it may well be referred to, as it was termed in Great Britain many years ago, a great engine of the national revenue.—Monetary Times.

X-Rays in Tyre-Making.

HOW WEAK SPOTS ARE EXPOSED.
The amount of stretch in the canvas threads in a motor-car tyre is being measured by a special X-rays process in one of the largest English motor-tyre factories.

Test tyres are made with specially woven canvas in which at regular intervals a thread rendered opaque to

the X-rays, is worked in; these threads are woven in both directions, so that when an X-rays photograph is taken of the canvas a check pattern caused by the opaque threads is seen, and before the canvas is used for tyre-making this pattern is perfectly regular.

The making of the tyre, the moulding of the rubber on the canvas base, and the various processes are apt to produce a strain too strong for the

yarn, and any undue stretch is seen at once in the X-rays photographs by the distortion of the check pattern caused by the stretching.

Apart from tyre manufacture, this new process is now being employed in the textile industry to study the effects of different processes on the woven material.

Airman's Lighthouse.

If it materializes, the airman's lighthouse which it is proposed to erect on the summit of Mount Afrique, in the centre of France, will possess the most brilliant light on earth, seeing that it is estimated that the lantern will be of 1,000,000,000 candle-power. The most powerful lighthouse around the British Isles is that at St. Catherine's

Point, of 15,000,000 candle-power, while the United States claims to have one of 60,000,000 candle-power, at Navesink, New Jersey. What a single light of 1,000,000 candle-power is like may be imagined when one remembers that the aggregate of all the street lamps of the City of London, probably the most brilliantly-lighted square mile on the earth, is only equal to 1,250,000 candle-power, or about one-eighth-hundredth of that of the proposed French airman's lighthouse.

Directional Wireless.

SPECIAL LECTURE BY EXPERT.

A lecture on this special phase of Wireless Engineering will be given by Mr. A. Coade, the Wireless expert from Ottawa, who is at present examining a number of wireless men for their First Class Canadian Wireless Operators Certificates. Those who successfully pass this examination will be eligible for Wireless positions on all British Ships. This subject should prove of especial interest to the inhabitants of this Maritime Nation of ours, as it enables ships to locate their positions on the foggiest days or darkest of nights by means of Cross Bearings from Shore Stations. It has therefore materially minimized the danger of ships being dashed to pieces on treacherous rocks which abound along these coasts. Directional Wireless was also used to great advantage on our aeroplanes during the war, and in the raids over "Hunland," enabled our machines to locate their position and to return to their dromes safely after dropping their bombs. This lecture which is under the auspices of the British Radio and Electrical Engineering Institute will take place tomorrow night at 8 o'clock in the Grenfell Hall. WINTER TRAVEL BY DOG TEAM.

Passengers arriving this morning, (April 10) on the steamer Kyle, tell of the great handicap business as well as other people were put to during last winter owing to the immense quantities of snow that fell. Among the passengers was Mr. W. A. Frobie, a merchant at Bonne Bay, who is on his way to Halifax on business. Being unable to take a train for several days, owing to its inability to cross the mountains, he was obliged to employ the services of a dog team and drove the forty miles intervening between his home town and the railway depot at Deer Lake, where he came the remainder of the distance by train to Port aux Basques. Considering the lateness of the season this constitutes a record by this means of travel. Another passenger arriving here was Mr. Phil Forghash, an extensive buyer of furs who has frequently journeyed from New York to his home town, to remote sections of Newfoundland in quest of furs. When the train he was riding on came to Millertown, mountains of snow prevented the train from going any further. After waiting for some time, and anxious to proceed on his journey, Mr. Forghash secured the services of a man who hitched up a team of eleven dogs to drive him to Howley. It took them 18 hours to make the 46 miles between the two points, and for this service the traveller was obliged to pay the sum of \$45. "It was not the price that bothered me," said the fur buyer to the Herald, shortly after he stepped from the Kyle, "it was the desperate experience of ploughing through the mighty banks of snow, which blew with biting fierceness into your eyes, freezing on the eyelashes and at times taking one's breath away. Dog Team! Never again for mine!"—North Sydney Herald.

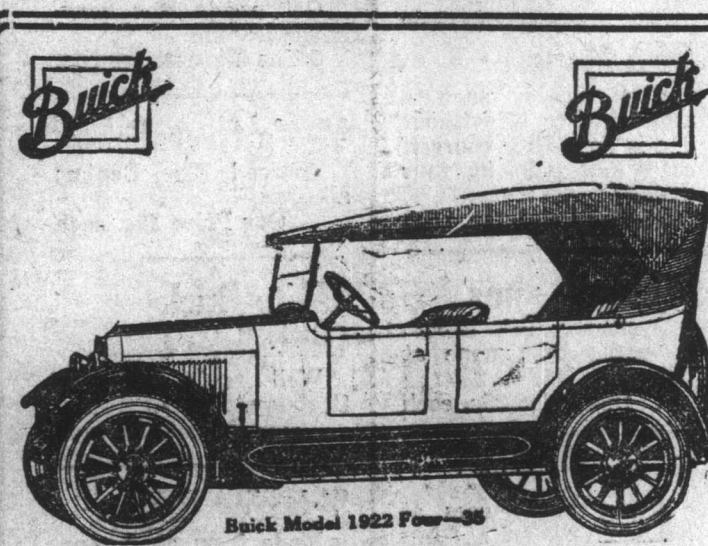

At the House.

ESTIMATES AGAIN DEBATED.
The Estimates were again before the House yesterday afternoon and some progress was made in putting them through. Question time although interesting, was not so to the extent that had been expected in view of the nature of some of the papers for the Government which were on the Order Paper.

ENQUIRY INTO GUARANTEES.
The Prime Minister told Mr. Moore that the total amount given out in the way of poor relief at Rose Blanche was \$78.82. This amount had been delivered by the relieving officer, but whether in cash or supplies, Sir Richard Caslin was told that no money for the purchase of Fishery Supplies would be given to the Union Trading Co. this year. He was told that all Government guarantees would be fully enquired into. In this connection there would be no discrimination.

The reply to the question concerning the reason for the cessation of the publication of signatures to the Board of Trade petition was a quibble, pure and simple. The Prime Minister said that no representations were made to him by the Captain of H. M. S. Cambrian to the effect that the publication of names should cease. This was common knowledge, the fact being that the representations of the Cambrians Captain had been made to the Governor, who passed them on to the Prime Minister. The answer led Sir Michael Cashin to ask why the publications had been stopped. The Prime Minister, after some hesitation, replied that the gentlemen who signed the petition were not anxious to find themselves associated with some of the signatories. The Prime Minister could not say definitely where Hon. Mr. Coaker is at the moment. The latter part of the question asking if a commission would be appointed to search for the missing Minister and if its chairman would receive a knighthood was overlooked.

SMALL REDUCTIONS.
When the House went into Committee of the Whole of Supply, the Prime Minister moved the passing of the Civil Government vote. He explained that the Legislative Councilors would have their remuneration reduced from \$250 to \$120, that the Leader of the Government in that House would have his salary cut in two, and that there would be a total saving of \$3,040.

In the Lower House, seasonal pay of outport members had been reduced to \$600 and that the city members to \$600. The cost of the publication of debates will be decreased by \$3000, and the vote for new books for the Legislative Library will be taken out. The saving in the Lower House is \$12,650.

This vote was passed and the House was about to proceed with the Department of the Colonial Secretary, when Mr. Walsh rose to make some observations on the Estimates.

A WARNING UNHEEDED.

Mr. Walsh first referred to the warning which the Opposition had sounded when the Estimates were increased two years ago. The seeds sown then by the Government were now bearing fruit. If they really intended to reduce the Estimates, they should begin at Government House and work down. There should be no discrimination. He did not think it was much good to cut down the Estimates by two hundred thousand and then to give way to the same old habits of squandering as soon as the House had closed. Mr. Walsh resented the inference of the Government that the blame for the guarantee of fishery supplies last year should be placed on the shoulders of the Opposition. He also resented the imputation that his district was responsible for great losses. He referred to the small returns which the Union Trading Company had made for the large amount they had received. He said there should be an immediate investigation into this matter. If it was correct that several supplying merchants received payment from the fishermen and did not make returns to the treasury, they should be compelled to make good immediately.

SHOULD GIVE FULL QUOTA.

The Legislative Councilors, he said, should not accept any remuneration at all. They were all gentlemen who could afford to get along without the small salaries they received each session and they should be ashamed to receive the money of a poor people. The Mounted Police should, said Mr. Walsh, be disbanded, but the vote should remain and should be given out in the shape of old age pensions. Referring to the oil question, he said that we should not be compelled to pay fifty or sixty cents per gallon when the price in the United States was sixteen cents per gallon. A Government purchasing agent should be sent away to obtain the necessary amount of oil for the prosecution of the fishery and this should come in duty free and should be sold at cost price. If something of this nature was not done it would again be necessary to dole out paper relief. The Government has added to the depression of the country by unwarranted interference with trade and by criminal extravagance.

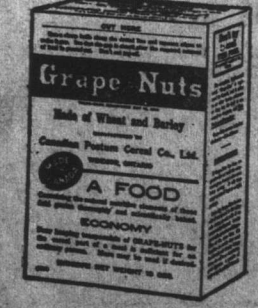

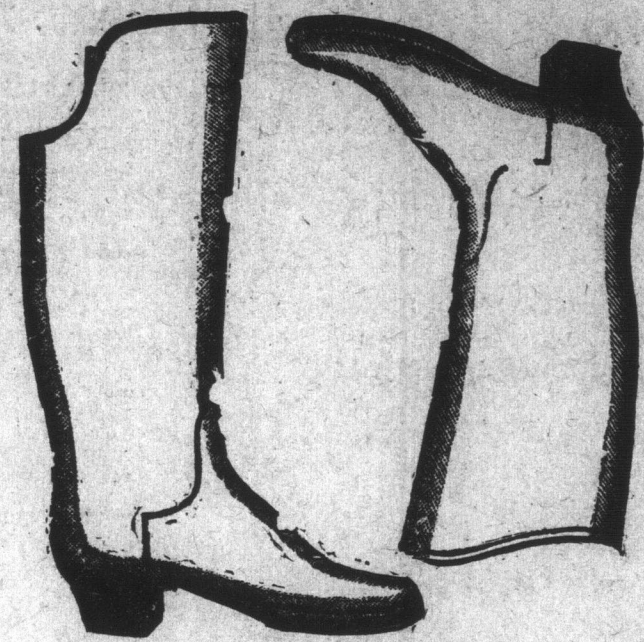

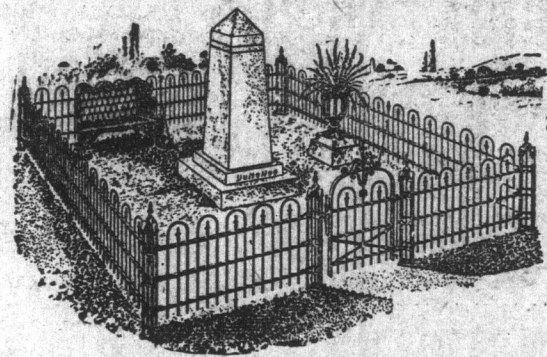
