





Mr. Justice Kent-Prisoner at the Bar: You have been found guilty. It is true the killing resulted in the charge against you was not intentional and was the result of carelessness; but carelessness in charge of a car and driving at excessive sped. I have considered seriously all these elements and that the result was unintentional, but the safety of the public must be assured. The sentence of the Court is that the prisoner be mprisoned in His Majesty's Penitentiary for one year from this date. The verdict was then confirmed and the jury dismissed, after which the Court closed.


