Lake Boat Will Carry as Cargo

HER OWN MIDSHIPS SECTION.

In an address made at the launching of the ship Glenledi from the Wall-sending shipyards, at Jarrow, England, Sir George Hunter said that great sacrifices are being made by both the shipbuilding employers and the workers, to make possible the carrying-on of the shipbuilding industry in Great Britain. According to advice received by Bankers Trust Company of New York from its British Information Service, Sir George said that he had noticed that the president of the Board of Trade had stated it was the duty of the government to tell the truth without fear. Sir George added, that if it was the duty of the government, it was the duty of everyone else interested in the country. One thing, he said that people did not realize, was that but for capital and capitalism everyone would be unemployed. It was only through the reserves of capital that people could get orders and go on building ships at all. They were told by some of the labor leaders and employers that capital ought to make sacrifices. They were making great sacrifices. The shipbuilding fraternity were giving up all their profit, not only part of it. He wished that they might even get 1% profit. The workmen were making sacrifices too. They were co-operating with the employers. On the other hand, the people in the sheltered trades, or as we would say in this country, the protected trades, were not co-operating with them, and were keeping up costs, and were keeping them from stemming the unemployment. He was convinced that they would have to work harder and longer, and until that was realized they would not be able to terminate unemployment. He said it depended mainly on the railway and miners. He could not see how they were going to have a chance of prosperity so long as miners were working only 7 hours a day, whereas in other countries they were working up to 16 hours a day.

The Glenledi is an unusual vessel, because although it will eventually be 379 feet in length and carry 4,825 tons on 18 foot draught in fresh water, it is being built to dimensions suitable for passing through the locks of the Welland Canal, Ontario, by omitting 144 feet of the midship body. This portion will be fabricated at the builders' yard and taken out to the Great Lakes, cut in two, and the fabricated portion built in place by the owners, thus completing her full dimensions of 379 feet.

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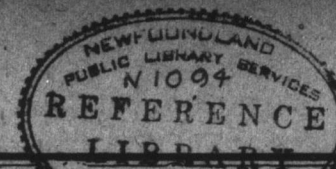

Greece Sending Ultimatum to Bulgaria and moving Troops to the Frontier

House of Commons Adjourning Until November 16--German Miners Call off Strike in Saar District--British Agricultural Industry Criticized by Lloyd George.

GREECE AGAIN BELLIGERENT.

PARIS, Aug. 3. An Athens news despatch says that Greece has sent two regiments to the Greek-Bulgarian frontier, is sending an ultimatum to the Bulgarian Government and expects to send Greek troops into Bulgaria if the ultimatum is rejected. The despatch says the Greek Government has demanded reparation for the murder, recently of a Greek citizen at Stanimaka, Bulgaria, and that reception of the demands was not favourable.

BRITAIN'S FOOD SUPPLY.

LONDON, Aug. 3. The estimates of the Department of Agriculture were adopted in the Commons without division. In the course of the debate Lloyd George suggested that a systematic survey of the country's agricultural resources be made and declared that last year Britain imported £380,000,000 worth of food, which this country was capable of producing. We imported £67,000,000 worth more of meat, butter, eggs and other dairy products last year than we did in 1913 after allowing for the changed value, said Lloyd George. He

said that while Britain could produce the best quality cattle she had gone back in this respect, while other western countries had increased their production considerably.

COMMONS TO ADJOURN

TILL NOVEMBER. LONDON, Aug. 3. Premier Baldwin announced today that the House of Commons would adjourn next Saturday until November 16th.

GERMAN STRIKE OVER.

SAARBRUCKEN, Aug. 3. Work in the Saar mines where 70,000 workers struck last week over the wage question, was resumed today on the normal scale.

EASTERN POTENTATE

AT THE SAVOY. LONDON, Aug. 3. The Maharajah of Patiala, native ruler of one of the largest States in India, arrived here on Sunday, and, with his party, will occupy the entire fifth floor of the Savoy Hotel, comprising thirty suites in all one hundred rooms, at a cost of one thousand pounds

Regatta Musings on the Past

CARDINAL DIED PRACTICALLY PENNILESS.

QUEBEC, Aug. 3. The late Cardinal Bevin, one of Senior Princes of the Catholic Church, and for many years Archbishop of Quebec and Catholic Primate of Canada, died practically penniless. He had no personal estate and his will leaves only a few small bequests to charity.

NOMINATION DAY IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

FREDERICTON, N.B., Aug. 3. Ninety eight candidates were nominated today for the forty-eight seats in the next Legislature, the members of which will be elected when the people of New Brunswick go to the polls next Monday, August 10th. Nomination proceedings were held today at the shiretowns of the fifteen counties of the Province and also at the four urban constituencies, two of which have been constituted since the last general provincial election. In the four urban constituencies there are straight fights between Government and Opposition candidates and the same is true of twelve of the fifteen counties.

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE NEAR SOUTHAMPTON.

LONDON, Aug. 3. Nearly 200 animals are affected in an outbreak of foot and mouth disease at Fratley, near Southampton. Officials are slaughtering the infected animals and burning the carcasses. The landing of foreign cattle at Southampton has been stopped, and vessels carrying livestock diverted to other ports.

U. S. NAVAL MEN POPULAR IN AUSTRALIA.

MELBOURNE, Aus., Aug. 3. Over 250,000 persons here attempted on Sunday to crowd upon the vessels of the United States fleet lying at Victoria Docks, with the result that forty-five men and women were crushed and mangled. Ambulances from all the local hospitals were called out to treat casualties which were for the most part of a minor nature.

REFERENDUM ON NEW WAGE AGREEMENT.

GLACE BAY, Aug. 3. Miners of Nova Scotia, who are members of District 26 of the United Mine Workers of America, will on Wednesday take a referendum vote on the new wage agreement concluded at Halifax on Saturday, and which the miners executive is recommending to membership for acceptance.

SHOOTING AFFRAY IN DENVER.

DENVER, Aug. 3. Two young women and a man were shot and killed last night by a holdup man when he attempted to hold them up while they were sitting in a parked automobile. Another youth was shot through the head. The shooting started when one of the young women in the car screamed as the bandit pointed his revolver through the machine demanding the occupants to hand over their valuables.

Preserved Lettuce Stalks

reboil and drain off the liquid. Prepare a syrup with 2lb. of loaf sugar, 3/4 pint of water, and 2oz. of ground ginger tied in a muslin bag. Put these ingredients into a pan, stir over low heat until the sugar has melted, then boil fast to 230deg. Fahrenheit, or the thread degree. This is reached if, when dipping the thumb and finger into cold water, then into the syrup, and back at once into cold water, a thread is formed when the finger and thumb are drawn apart gently.

Remove all scum. Pour this syrup while boiling over the lettuce stalks, and when cold put into jars and cover.

A COUNTRYWOMEN'S RECIPE.

Lettuce stalks, which become large and thick when the vegetable is going to seed, can be used for making delicious imitation preserved ginger.

Take 2lb. of lettuce stalks, 6 pints of water, 1lb. of sugar, and 2 table-spoonfuls of freshly ground ginger.

Remove the leaves from the lettuce stalks, wash the stalks well, and cut into 2-inch lengths. Drain and put them into an enamel or aluminium pan with the water, sugar, and ginger, bring to the boil, then simmer gently for 20 minutes. Remove any scum, and put them aside for 2 days, then

The same thing exists under the second option. Here is Lord Rothermere willing to pay another ten thousand dollars, and to undertake that the only condition on which he shall have a right to the refund of that ten thousand dollars will be the failure of the Reids to make title to the property. Under the second option, the Reids did fail to make the title in one sense—I think according to the English standard they failed to make title, but not according to our standard. Anyhow the result was that Rothermere forfeited the \$2,000, and he spent hundreds and thousands on a cruise of this property; and it is absurd in view of that to suggest that he was not a willing purchaser, and especially in view of the fact that Mr. Cowley had said that he was. Then Major MacDonald comes to

St. John's. The first option terminated some time in July and MacDonald came to St. John's in the early part of August, and he was here when, on the 14th August, the Reids held a meeting of their Board, and passed what we have referred throughout as the August Minute; and the resolution with regard to the Gander made it quite clear that it was intended to proceed with the sale to Lord Rothermere again if possible. The minute says that: "It was VOTED to proceed with the proposed sale of the Gander Valley property through the Trust on the lines already communicated to the Trust in London by cable."

Now, the only correspondence by cable between the Trust and the Reids in connection with the disposition of the Gander property, was in connection with its disposition to Lord Rothermere. But, on the other hand, if the Rothermere negotiations failed, the Trust was to

Deal with the Gander from the point of view

of raising sixty thousand pounds on its mortgage, or, as the correspondence shows, by sale to Col. Walker and his associates. The fact that Lord Rothermere was still in view is clear from the memorandum left with Mr. Paddon by Major MacDonald, when he was here at this time. That is No. 732, J.A. Mgd. 117: "Copy of Statement made and handed to Mr. Paddon by Major MacDonald at St. John's in August, 1920." Your Lordship will remember that Major MacDonald de-

posed in his evidence that he was taken down to see Mr. Paddon by Mr. R. G. Reid, and at Mr. Paddon's request made in the presence of R. G. Reid, he undertook to present him with a statement and that he prepared this statement at Reid's office and showed it to the Reids before he brought it down. In that statement on the last page, he says:

"Before it is finally decided to close with this group for the ultimate sale to them of the properties a final offer will be made to Rothermere as it is felt that a sale to him would be desirable in view of the other business it is likely the Reids interests will have with him and his associates."

Now then, when Major MacDonald was here it was obviously the intention to deal with Rothermere, and we find that with Reid's concurrence, in fact at his request, again in spite of what has been said by learned counsel for the defence, he opened up negotiations again with Mr. Cowley, Lord Rothermere's representative, and we find that in September the negotiations takes on a serious turn again and Mr. Cowley shows that Lord Rothermere is not only willing but very anxious to purchase the property. In fact, I think your Lordship will find in taking the correspondence as a whole

That Rothermere was a very anxious buyer.

Here we have him turning down the proposition in July, and he has hardly turned it down on account of the title being bad, when here we have him looking for another option. In spite of the fact that Reid has withdrawn a huge acreage from the area that was to go under option, and in spite of the very poor information that Reid gives regarding that area that has been withdrawn, he still continues negotiating for the reduced area; and he is prepared to pay \$222,000 for the reduced area, and to spend two thousand dollars on an option, and thousands of dollars on a cruise. It is abundantly evident, and we would not need Cowley to swear to it in order to convince us that Rothermere was most anxious to purchase the Gander if it turned out to contain as much timber as represented by the Reids. It was nothing from Mr. Cowley personally on the matter, it would be quite obvious from his conduct that he was a most anxious negotiator, and very desirous of obtaining the land; but we have his definite assurance on it, that they would have purchased at this price if the timber had shown up at the amount represented, or even within a reasonable amount of the timber represented.

There can be no doubt then that Lord Rothermere was a willing purchaser, and that we had brought him to the Reids, and if the Reids' representations had been anything like true, we could have put through a very satisfactory sale for them.

Now, my Lord, I find it difficult at times to bear in mind all the points that we have to deal with, but one point that I feel that I must bear clearly in mind is that if your Lordship could not find that we are entitled to a commission, then we are thrown back to quantum meruit, and for that purpose only I want to call your Lordship's attention to a position that I have commented upon several times, namely, the meagreness of the assistance that was given to us by anybody connected with the Reid Company, from start to finish. The defendants have had a lot to say about the manner in which we treated them, and the way in which we regarded our obligations towards them; but they seem to have forgotten that they too owed certain obligations to us.

In regard to this particular matter of the meagreness of the assistance that we received from the Reids, one from the correspondence that there was a conspiracy at the Reid office to block our efforts at every turn; because it did not matter how much was involved, what information we asked for or how we asked for it, the information that we were given was only of a most meagre and indefinite nature; so that when the second Rothermere was signed, it was signed with bare schedules and when the Blakstad agreements were signed, they were signed with bare schedules. All through the whole negotiations there was absolutely no information available to us, although we repeatedly sought it; and I do not think there was any case in which this was so apparent as

In the case of the second Gander Option.

If your Lordship will be good enough to look at No. 751, there was a message from the Trust to Harry Reid, St. John's, on the 8th September, 1920, in which we say:

"Your suggestion South Harbour greatly interesting Rothermere and materially assisting negotiations stop. Can you offer any assistance and what kind in order to mark port 'serviceable and can you inform us if 'suitable ships can navigate Placentia safely stop Gander our cable 7th September, when you reply state definitely acreage Timber Estates and 'Reid Blocks offered Rothermere.'"

We had been dealing with this matter since March, and in the negotiation of this second sale some months later, we are still befogged as to what we are selling, and as to what our

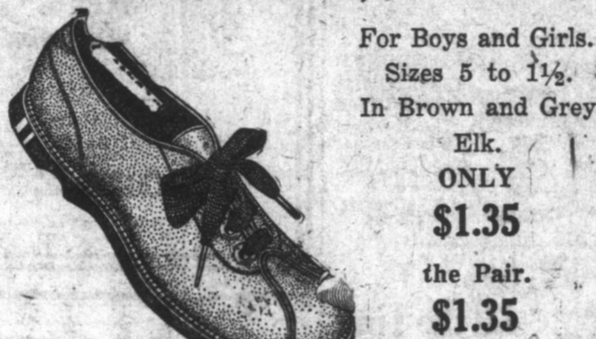

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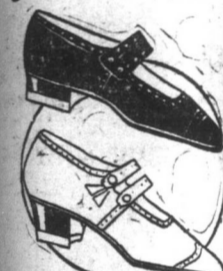

"Think you have misunderstood our telegram. Therefore repeat it. Now that is different to the acreage given on the 11th, where it was 188,000. That message was sent on the

"Our last telegram is incorrect. 'Acreage 450,000 should be 326,000 'and has been reduced 181,000 should be 188,000."

Now, we say that by the representations as to the timber contents of this property—a wild and reckless statement made without any knowledge as to whether it was true or false, is a statement which, if it is not contained in a binding contract, would be termed fraudulent in law; and in making it the Reids were guilty of misconduct—of a misrepresentation, which, when it was discovered to be untrue, resulted in Rothermere throwing over the option.
What was the offer? An option is simply an offer made by a vendor, and made irrevocable for a fixed time. There is no particular virtue in an option. The Reid people in signing that document said to Rothermere: "I offer you that property until the 30th December for a fixed sum of \$222,000, and I agree that I will not withdraw this offer until the 30th December." Rothermere, it is true, is not bound to exercise that option; but the offer is irrevocable on the part of Reid; and for this option for a limited time Lord Rothermere pays \$222,000.
I would like to dispose of rather a minor point, and that is—
Why did Reid pay us \$200 out of that option money. It was not purchase money—it was option money. It was not part of the sale price; but it would have become part of the sale price, of course, if the sale had been effected. I mention it because it has a bearing upon other matters, especially the Humber and the Railway.
We made an arrangement with Lord Rothermere under which we fixed a price and under which he was prepared to purchase the Gander upon the representation of the Reids. We have proved that he was willing to purchase, had the representations been

truth; we have proved that the representations are false, and that as a result of the false representations, Lord Rothermere did not exercise his rights under this offer from the Reids—and that simply is our case.
Now, have we proved that the representations were false? The first comment that I have is that here is a large corporation—the Reid Company, with a Natural Resources Bureau, which until recently had the services of Messrs. Forbes, Hatch, Powell, Palmer, and numerous experts on the various natural resources. Now the figures on the Gander have been challenged. Mr. Reid told us in the correspondence that Mr. Forbes was going to have cruises made away back in 1919—he was going to have proper data obtained in regard to all the Reids' areas; and we have not had a single witness called here to challenge our figures. That is the first comment.
That being the position, I submit that your Lordship has to decide whether we have made out a prima facie case in regard to the Gander. We are not bound—although I submit the case is amply proved—we are not bound even by Turner's cruise. If it is found that Turner's figures are out of hundreds of thousands of cords even, our case is still the same. Our case is that the area did not contain the timber, and as a result of that the option was not exercised.
The question is: was there a really substantial departure from the truth in that representation—a really substantial departure. Now, what do we find in regard to Turner's report? I do not know whether your Lordship has read the Turner report in full?
HON. MR. JUSTICE KENT—I have not.
MR. EMERSON—I think in all fairness to Mr. Turner, your Lordship should read the report, because it has been suggested that Rothermere was not a really willing purchaser; it is suggested that Rothermere and his associates already had knowledge of the area, and that if the knowledge led them to believe that the figures were anything like what are in Turner's report, they would never have signed the option, and forfeited the \$10,000; and therefore Turner's figures are wrong.
The Turner Report
is really an excellent document. MR. EMERSON—In so far as the report goes, it is a fair, generous report, and it has to be taken in conjunction with the fact that at the time when the Rothermere second option was signed, the Reid Company, in possession.

Now, your Lordship will remember that at the time that the first option was made the acreage was very considerably greater, and here without offering us an indication as to what areas have been taken out of this Gander property, we find them offering us a very considerably reduced acreage to Lord Rothermere, and they were saw why it is removed, or what the amount removed. They seem to think that Lord Rothermere is prepared to buy any areas so long as they are Reid Blocks. Is that not where the acreage is or what it is they are selling. Now in reply to our

And in our message No. 761 we had said to Reid:
"What is the estimate wood pulp and timber on properties offered for sale."
And we say on the 18th, not having had a reply to our message of the 18th, we say to the Reids:
"Are you able to indicate generally from which part Timber Estates land with bad title has been withdrawn from offer stop Adjoining Rothermere timber and wood pulp proportionate to present and past acreage offered stop Immediate reply is required by telegram."
To which we get the reply:
"Timber on land of acreage withdrawn our offer owing to not clear title as far as we can ascertain according to average total area."
Now, right up to this point and further, right up to the 25th and 26th September, we have no idea of what acreage has been withdrawn, what the total is that we are selling, what the cordage is on the lands; there is a complete and unpardonable indifference not only towards the owners' interests, but also towards our interests; and, as I said before, it does not seem to have occurred to the Reids that we had any interests or rights; they seem to have forgotten that they were under a duty to respect the legal rights of an agent of the Trust, that they were bound to display an intelligent and honest interest in the work that they handed over to us to perform; and it is absolutely scandalous that this Company—the Reid Newfoundland Company—should think that they have discharged their legal obligations towards when they send us messages of this nature.
Now, another thing which has been completely forgotten. My learned friend has insisted upon the position in regard to the option, and he says that there would have been no cruise of this property called for if the large acreage had not been withdrawn. There is no talk of a cruise until Rothermere is satisfied that he cannot find out what property has been withdrawn from the offer. On the 17th September, 1921, we wrote to Reid: "Gander definite offer will be made 'total area Tuesday stop Delay caused by Caird Director Anglo not available for confirm stop Cowley stated 'thinks we shall consider it fair but adds cruise must be made now stop 'Have advised them Wednesday last 'day of negotiations unless you extend time stop"
In other words, because of the withdrawal through defective title, and that indifference to their interests and to ours and because this area is not defined as to area and is not defined as to cordage—this area which has been withdrawn by the Reids, this withdrawal has caused a feeling of apprehension, which makes this cruise necessary, which cruise ultimately disclosed that the area did not contain the timber as represented.
Now, my Lord, I submit that in view of the difficulties that were gratuitously placed in our way by the Reid Company, the option which was signed on October 1st was a most remarkable achievement on the part of the Trust. We had already dealt with these wealthy and experienced business men, in connection with a matter in which they were very experienced, very expert, and they had thrown up a previous option because the Reids had not shown title. We started in to deal with them a second time, and in the middle of our dealings we find that the Reids withdraw a large portion of the area from the offer, in such a manner as to cause very grave doubts in the minds of the would be purchasers, and in spite of that, and in spite of what must have been a very grave suspicion as to the Reids' integrity in the matter, we were able as a result of our negotiations, not only unaided by the Reids; we were able to get these people to sign an option, under which they were to forfeit some ten thousand dollars under all circumstances except that in which the Reids would not show good title to the area involved.
Now, my Lord, that brings me to the consideration of the legal aspect in connection with the Gander. I think I am justified in saying that my learned friends have completely betrayed the issue, owing to the manner in which they have dealt with the apparently to them, marvellously mysterious word "Option."

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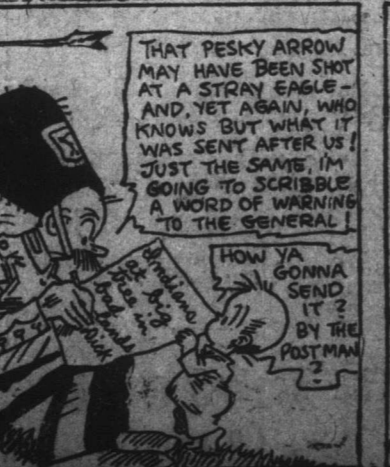
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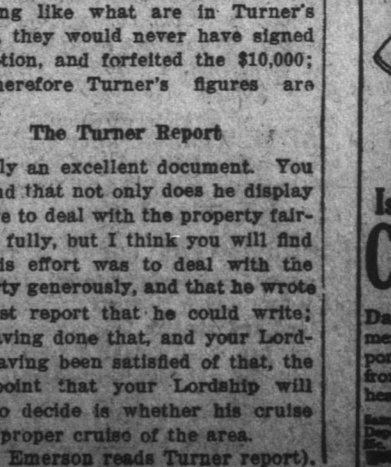

ing the necessary minute of the Board, resolved that two representatives of the Reid Company should accompany Turner on his cruise; and they did not do it.

Apparently a man named Palmer, of whom we know nothing, spent a few days in Turner's camp. He never did any cruising, in fact, if my recollection of the evidence is accurate, he hardly left the camp. These figures of Turner's were sent from Grand Falls to England, and a copy of the report was sent to the Reids here. There is no evidence that they made any effort whatever to check the figures in Mr. Turner's reports, either from the information they had previously to the signing of the option or by information that they had or ought to have had after the signing of the option.

Here is this huge area which has been practically condemned by Lord Rothermere's cruisers, because of the small quantity of timber; here is an area which the Reids value at millions, and we have absolutely no evidence that any attempt was ever made to check up Turner's figures.

Now, are those figures accurate? My learned friends have suggested that Mr. Turner did not cruise properly, but it is abundantly clear that he cruised in the manner in which Mr. Gilmour, another experienced cruiser, had been cruising similar areas in this country for the purpose of purchase by his principals; and he described to your Lordship how he performed this survey. He, what



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they call, "strip cruised 17"; and in strip cruising the area, I think he told us that the lineal length of his strips aggregated over one hundred miles. He would run a length of 50 many hundreds or thousands of yards, and count the trees on each side of the main line, and then he would work transverse lines, or lines across and on that average it up. I do not see what more he could have done, except my learned friends expected him to count every tree on the area. I do not know, I cannot imagine, nor have my learned friends suggested any more accurate method than that which Mr. Turner used.

MR. HOWLEY—He only did that on part of the area.

MR. EMERSON—He did that on nearly the whole of the area—he did that on the whole of the area, except for two lots, and on these lots which were burnt and barren, and there was no necessity for him to strip cruise it. Now there were two that he did not cruise, and those were 243 and 244. 238, it is true, was not specifically strip cruised, but 238 is in the 1867 burn, and it is included in the description of the total area which that burn covers.

Now, the total acreage of 243 and 244 is 44,369 acres. I had a calculation here which is not quite accurate, but I will check it up as I go along, and your Lordship will read it in the report. In the Turner report your Lordship will find that the highest cordage in the whole area is to be found in lot 76, which is a very small lot of only 3600 acres—about six square miles, and on the 6 square miles it works out at about

16 Cords to the Acre, a Very High Average.

Now, if we allow that these two areas, lots 243 and 244, contain the very highest average that Turner found on the whole of this area, we find that to his total of 614,620 cords must be added 709,834 cords; and that gives us a total of 1,324,454 cords, to which must also be added the 128-cords of young growth, which we will give them, so that they will have the full benefit of everything that is in the report.

MR. HOWLEY—I do not wish to interrupt my learned friend, but what about the islands of wood in the burnt area?

MR. EMERSON—Those have not been proved to exist. The report only said that there might be the absolute figure that can be deduced, by giving Reids the benefit of everything that is on the area, is 1,533,354 cords. That, as against the representation that there were 2,700,000 cords, plus 250,000,000 f.h.m. or saw logs, the equivalent of about 250,000 cords, or let us say altogether three million cords—and under the most favourable circumstances we cannot find more than one and a half million cords.

Now, my lord, there are not entitled in connection with those two areas to the 16 cords an acre. I submit that it would be reasonable to give them the average that was found by Mr. Turner under his strip cruise, and the average works out at about nine cords per acre. Now, if we give them nine cords per acre on these two lots instead of the 16 cords; instead of the 709,834 cords we have 399,321 cords. I may say, my Lord, that I am not an expert at arithmetic, and if I find that my calculations are wrong I will tell your Lordship. That 399,321 cords added to the Turner total—as I say, 399,321 added to 1,452,000 and 128,000, gives us a grand total of 1,141,841 cords. And I submit that under the most favourable circumstances your Lordship cannot find that they are entitled to a consideration of any greater amount than that; but even if they are, the absolute maximum to which your Lordship is entitled to go is 1,452,354, and that is under half of the amount that they represented.

Now, I would like to refer your Lordship to the evidence of Mr. Cowley on commission taken in London, on page 21 of his evidence. (Reads evidence.) There we have Mr. Cowley saying—you may take it from me, if our cruise of the territory proves quite satisfactory to us, we shall be prepared to complete the contract. I think that explains the indefinite language that appeared in some of the messages. (Continues reading evidence.) And that was the end of it, and they never had anything more to do with it afterwards.

I think it is abundantly clear that the Gander failed because of the Reids' misconduct in connection with the representations, and we were deprived of our commission because of these representations, which were, I submit, or would be considered in different circumstances as being a fraudulent statement in that it was made recklessly, and without regard as to whether it was true or false. Suppose, instead of being an option it had been an agreement for sale and purchase, under which the Reid Company made a representation that there were 2,700,000 cords of pulpwood on this property, and it was proved afterwards that that representation was as false as we now know it to be, and Rothermere sued for rescission of the contract and obtained a judgment, would we not be entitled to our commission? I do not think that your Lordship will have any difficulty whatever, after I have referred you to the authorities

on the subject, in finding that that is the correct position. That if this had been an agreement for sale containing a representation such as is contained in this option, and Rothermere had sued for rescission, we would have obtained our commission, even though he was successful.

MR. HUNT—Does not clause 11 particularly refer to the matter?

MR. EMERSON—It particularly refers to a claim under the option. It says that there shall be no claims as between Rothermere and Reid under the option because of the failure to make good the representation as to the cordage.

MR. HUNT—And that there may be further negotiations.

MR. EMERSON—Yes, I could never quite understand the argument that was opened by Mr. Hunt and followed by Mr. Howley that the parties agreed that they could negotiate further, and that the position was affected by that—these was nothing to stop them negotiating further whether that provision was in the option or not. It strikes me as a particularly foolish provision to have in any document.

MR. HUNT—It was put in by Messrs. Parkers and Hammond.

MR. EMERSON—It was put in at the request of Budd, Johnson and Co.

MR. HUNT—Well, they are both English solicitors.

MR. EMERSON—Well, I have no brief for English solicitors, I don't think they are any better than ourselves.

I do not think I have any more to add to the facts in connection with the Gander, and I would ask that I might leave my authorities over until the morning, and I will probably then get through more quickly than if I started now.

The Court adjourned until Tuesday, June 14th, 1925, at 10.30 a.m.

TUESDAY, July 24.

MORNING SESSION.

MR. EMERSON—My Lord, before I go on to the legal aspect of the Gander claim, I find from my notes that there are one or two matters to which I feel that I should refer and which I omitted yesterday. They will not take any length of time.

The first is that Mr. Howley, in his argument on the October option, stressed considerably the statement in that option that representations in regard to cordage and acreage are believed to be true—or to be substantially true, I

think are the exact words—and he argued from that that the Reids were not making an absolute representation. Now, it is an elementary principle, I submit, that all contracts were a representation is made which is believed to be true, that belief must be founded upon a reasonable set of facts which have been ascertained into by the representor. The representation must not be made recklessly, and must not be made without having some regard to the real facts. Now, the mere belief by the Reid Company that these representations are true is not sufficient unless the belief is founded upon some information, and they have—I was going to say failed to produce anything to justify their belief—I think I could put it in this way, they have almost refused to produce anything which in any way justifies their statement that they believed this representation to be substantially true. If this were a contract for sale and their representation was put in, even accompanied by the words "The Grantor believes these representations to be true," and an earnest difference between the representation and the true facts were found to exist, there is no question but that the Court would term it a fraud as being a statement made recklessly and without regard to whether it was true or false. There is, therefore, nothing in the document in regard to this representation which at all protects the Reid Company from the consequence of its untruth.

Now, my Lord, my learned friend also expressed some wonder to why this claim on the Gander is not founded upon those cables which passed in April, 1920, where the Directors of the Reid Company suggest that we get five per cent, and the Trust replies and insists upon its ten per cent. Well, my Lord, I think that he has almost indicated to me what the reply is, and it is this, that at this time we were operating under the oral agreement, and we repudiated the idea. The cables show in themselves that there must have been some commission agreement, because otherwise why should the Reid Company, without any introduction of the matter, suddenly send forward the message to the Trust offering five per cent. commission, when we were supposed to be operating under an option. Then my learned friend pointed out that no claim was made for this for months after the option terminated. Surely that has no value as an argument. At the same time the option went off and for months afterwards we naturally expected that an

other opportunity would arise of earning this commission. The relationships between the parties were quite friendly; in the ordinary course of events negotiations would probably have been begun, and were, in fact, begun, with other parties, but when the matter was taken out of our hands and when relationships are broken off and all the agreements made with us have been terminated wrongfully, then we ask for our legal rights. It does not then become a question of carrying on in the hope that we may sell the property at another time, and, in fact, had the friendly relationships continued and had the opportunity arisen to sell the property again, it is quite on the cards that in view of the fact that our work has twice come to nothing, owing to the default of our principal, we would have insisted upon an increase in the commission to which we would be entitled on a sale, but the mere fact that because friendly relationships continued and it was anticipated that an opportunity to sell the property again would arise does not, I submit, take away our rights to sue when the defendant companies have broken their agreement in connection with it.

The final point that I missed yesterday to which I would like to refer is the reference which Mr. Howley made to the correspondence to show, in an argument which I submit was exceedingly strained, that we expected that Rothermere would not exercise the option, and reference is made to various letters in which we point out that we are keeping, as it were, several strings to our bow; if the Rothermere negotiations go off we will see Mr. Morgan or Mr. Grant Morden or somebody else. Surely that is only evidence that we were active and intelligent agents, that we were prepared for the emergency if the Rothermere negotiations go off, but there is absolutely nothing in any of the correspondence which shows that at this time we anticipated that the Rothermere negotiations would not bring results.

Now, in the course of my arguments yesterday, my Lord, you referred me to the letter of September 25th, 1920, from Cowley to MacDonald, in which he speaks about

The value of the property.

I would just like to say, my Lord, in case there should be any misapprehension, that it has to be borne in mind when we talk about the value of the property that, so far as the Reids are concerned, the value of the property is the value of the timber on the property. So far as the Reids' lots are concerned, it is true that he was buying the freehold, but it was the freehold without the minerals. In regard to the Timber Estates, which was a very large proportion of the Gander Deal, he was only buying the right to cut timber under Crown leases and had no right to the land at all. I submit, then, that the real meaning of the Cowley letter is that the failure of the Reid Company to show the quantity of timber will be the only thing which could interfere with their exercising the option, and that it was the report on the timber which decided them to simply proceed by his own evidence.

Now, my Lord, the legal aspect of the Gander has to be looked at from several points of view. In the first place we have to bear in mind what the Trust was at this time, and I think that my learned friend has completely missed the point which his authorities were quoted to prove when he does not consider that we were not in the position of, say, a house agent to whom a house has been given to sell. It is true that we have a great many of the attributes applicable to such an agency, but we are far more than that. In the cases which have been quoted by my learned friend a property has been handed over to a stranger—that is to say, a stranger so far as the principal is concerned—he is an agent, as it were by profession, and this property which is referred to in the various authorities, is simply one of the many instances in his business, and the question arises in these cases as to whether, under the circumstances of this particular contract dealing with a particular party, handed over to his general agent, who is not the particular agent of the principal, as to whether that transaction, as viewed in the light of the contract, was one which entitled the agent to a commission when the sale did not result from his efforts; and, another thing, all these cases are simply cases of the Court giving a construction to a particular contract, and in none of them is there any principle laid down for which my learned friend has contended, that under all circumstances where a property is handed over to an agent for sale that the agent must of necessity make a sale before he is entitled to his commission. No such principle has been laid down, and certainly no principle has been laid down, that the agent loses his right to his commission when the going off of the sale is due to the default of the principal. Now, my Lord, the Gander is only one of several assets which had been handed to us to deal with, and the handing to us of those several assets to deal with was more than the mere appointment of a commission agent. Mr. Reid himself in his correspondence generally and specially has laid it down that the Trust

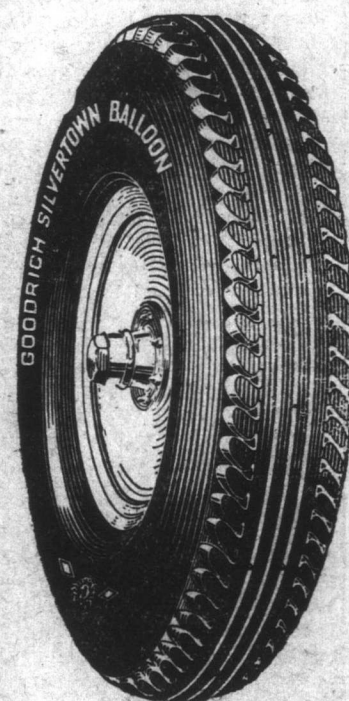

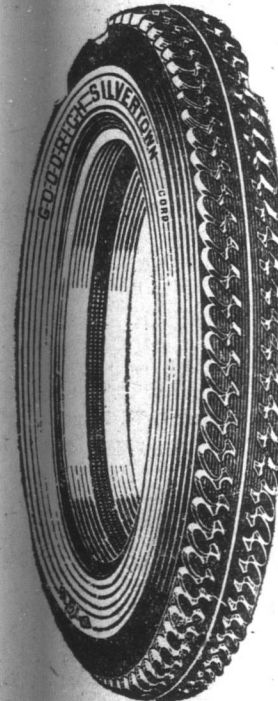

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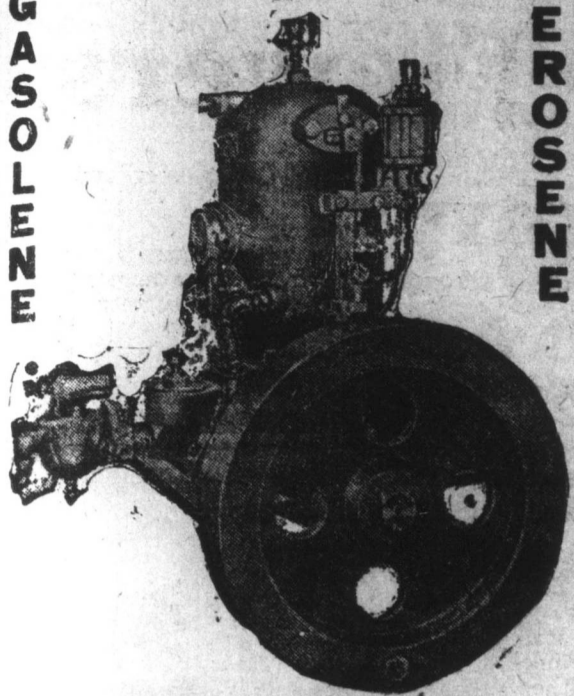

Reid Newfoundland Company in the preparation and negotiation for sale or bonding of the property."

To whom was this letter written? On the seventh of February by Mr. Reid to Sir Frederick Williams Taylor, the General Manager of the Bank of Montreal, which was the Reid Company's bankers. "The Trust has already succeeded in disposing of my 'old storage property in St. John's' and has organized a strong group 'with whom negotiations are now pending . . . for the sale or lease of other timber or pulp lands." Now, it is not correct that "to this end I established the Newfoundland Banking & Trust Corporation." Reid did not establish it, it was established for him, but when it was established he took it over, adopted it as his own, and made it part of the Reid system, put it in the position of servant and agent combined. He paid moneys towards its upkeep, paid moneys towards Director's expenses, and undertook as well to pay it certain commissions in the case of sales being made, and it does not lie with Reid, after having adopted this organization, after having made it, as I say, his combined servant and agent, either to misrepresent facts that we are unable to earn our commission, nor does it lie with him to take these properties out of our hands, without proper notice or the payment of damage for so doing. Now, on that point, my Lord, your Lordship will remember that I interrupted my learned friend the other day when he was arguing the Question of the Revocation of authority and my interruption was to the effect that he had not pleaded the revocation of authority, and I think your Lordship indicated at that time that unless there had been a termination of the agency or a revocation this case would not go on. That is quite true. The whole foundation of this case is the termination of the agency or breach of the agency agreement. But my point is this, that our case is that the agency agreement was wrongfully terminated, was terminated without due notice, and that our claim to a large extent rests upon that. But my learned friend's defence on the question of revocation is entirely different.

Mosquitoes Killed by Simple Method

A new method for killing mosquitoes and preventing their breeding has just been tried out by Percy Viesco, Jr., entomologist of the city Board of Health of New Orleans and proved 100 per cent. effective, says The Times-Picayune. 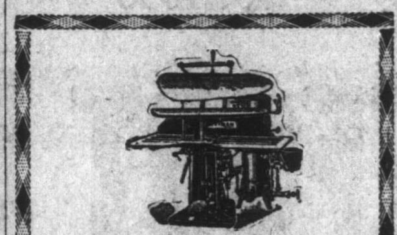

RAY CONSOLIDATED COPPER.

Reasons for Recent Strength. N.Y.—Ray Consolidated Copper shares have been heavily bought the past two weeks. The stock has given a better account of itself than any other copper, until general weakness of the past two days developed. There are four different reasons for this advance. First there was a pool that went stale months ago, with several thousand shares in its hands which recently has again accumulated stock; second, Ray shows about as good a developed tonnage of ore per share as any other company, and with copper advancing in price and its costs coming down the stock has appeared a good buy on the general face of things; third, there is a rumor that finally Ray and Inspiration are about to be merged; and, fourth, there is a rumor that Ray can be expected to go on a dividend basis in the fall.

Ray is producing at the Ray and Chino properties about 11,000,000 pounds of copper a month. Costs are coming down at both properties, but it will probably be late this year or next before dividends are resumed.

Portia Arrives From Westward

S.S. Portia, Capt. Connors, arrived from the Western Coast Service at 8.45 this morning, after a round trip passage of eleven days. She brought three carloads of freight, consisting principally of cod oil in casks, and the following passengers: Misses French, Shields, Tucker, Neesh, English and five in steerage. Thirty-six passengers who came down the coast boarded the train at Argentia. Capt. Connors reports that after leaving St. John's on Tuesday morning last, dense fog prevailed, and several stops had to be made during the day to pick up the ship's position. Everything went well until 9.30 that night when the ship struck Point La Haya Rock, an account of which has already been given in the despatches forwarded. Capt. Connors states the ship after striking rested on a flat shoal and there was no bump, and with the water smooth at the time, there was no cause for alarm. The crew then shifted the cargo aft, and the forward tanks were emptied. About one hour later the ship slid off into deep water under her own steam apparently undamaged. The Portia remained in the cove all that night until the following morning, when she proceeded into St. Mary's, her first port of call. When the ship was found to be in a seaworthy condition the service was continued. Captain Connors wishes to thank publicly the officers and crew of the Portia, for the splendid discipline displayed while the ship was stranded. There was no commotion whatever on board. Capt. Connors reports the fishery all along the coast is very good, the bankers have arrived well fished, and there is every prospect that the voyage will be the best in years. During the past week fish struck in at St. Lawrence and Burin, hook and liners doing well. The Portia is now moored at the Dry Dock pier where a survey of the damage caused will take place to-day.

Serve jellied salmon salad in hollowed-out tomatoes, garnished with sliced cucumbers. Cottage cheese balls rolled in chopped nuts make a nice garnish for a salad or greens. Before setting camp utensils over the fire, rub the buttons with soap to prevent an accumulation of soot. Tomatoes and peaches make an excellent salad. Garnish with chopped celery and serve with French dressing. Grated raw carrots seasoned with onion, paprika and lemon juice make a very wholesome salad. Serve with mayonnaise. Fresh greens by putting them in cold water with a little lemon juice. Allow them to remain there for a few hours.

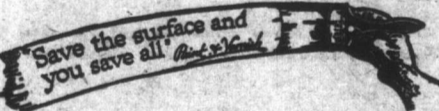
