The Hon. Joseph Howe, Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia, has passed away. His appointment to the Governorship of his native Province was gazetted on the 10th ult., and it was a promotion at which all men rejoiced. Whatever may liave been his political views, antagonisms and errors, it was felt that his former services to Nova Scotia deserved a litting recognition which nothing short of the highest position would satisfy. He will be remembered by friend and foe as man of genial churacter and large hyrtcliness, at all times kind and espectful.

From Calais to Calcutta by RAILWAY-TIME TABLE -Rail.

The ambitious designs attributed to Rusia in connection with its present operations against Khiva have had the effect of drawing unusual attention to the Indian possession of. England, and affairs connected therewith. It is not now supposed that the Czar has any immediate designs against India, but rather that the ssession of Persia is aimed at so that Russia may have an outlet on the Persian Gulf, and by the circumvention of Turkey obtain another on the Mediterranean Sea, and thus encircle the whole of the East, from the confines of Hungary and the Adriatic Sea to the borders of Afgahnistan, within its powerful and inexorable grasp. A glance at the map will show how specious is this conjecture. Suppose this scheme were carried out, it would make the Bear a power on the Red Sea and in the East, and completely shut England out from acpletely shut England out from access to her Eastern possessions by the Overland Route, and force her to accept the only alternative, the old and tedious route round the Cape of Good Hope. In this way Russia's aggression upon India would be very greatly facilitated while at the same time she would obtain control of the times the would obtain control of the times times the would obtain the times times the would be well as the times times the would be wel great national highways of commerce etween Europe and Asia, and enrich herself with the tolls therefrom Thus a twofold advantage would be gained-an almost incalculable increase of power and prestige, and a proportionate increase of wealth.

The leading minds of England and India seem to be fully aware of the importance of checkmating these ambitious designs of Russia, and with that of ject in view it is now proposed to bring these Eastern countries threatened by Russia, into closer relations and thus strengthen the mu tual interest. It is conceived that the most effectual means of securing this end will be to construct a railway from Peshawur, the terminus the railway system in the north-wes of British India, to Herat, an important and strongly fortified city in the west of Afghanistan near the Persian trontier, and thence through Persi and Asia Minor to Constantinople Belgrade, Pesth, Vienna, Frankfor Cologne, and so on to Calais, formin a great overland railroad 6,409 mile ng, whereby the time between London and Calcutta-532 hours b the fastest route at present (via Mar seilles, the Suez canal, the Red Se and Bombay R.R.)-will be reduced to 214 hours. The length of the proposed line from Peshawar to the Golden Horn would be about 2,500 miles and would cost about £30,000,-000 stg. or \$150,000,000 This vast sum of money would doubtless be forthcoming as soon as the project was shown to be practicable. munerative in could scarcely fail to be, as it would attract almost all the local traffic along the route besides an immense amount of through traffic, and become the channel wherebe transported to Europe in return be transported to Europe in return for the manufactures and productions of the latter. As to its practicabili-ty there can scarcely be two opinions. It is not so long as the Union Central and Northern Pacific Railways which cross this Continent, and it is about the length of the proposed Canada Pacific line. The route is not more

Pacific line. The route is not more difficult, then the latter, while it would have the advantage of being at let o secure a larger and cheaper supply of labor in its construction. There is every reason to suppose that the rulers of the countries through which this road would pass would be friendly to its construction and willing to give it a helping land, as it is so much in their interest. Turkey has already inagmated a railway system in Asia Minor, and Persia is partly traversed by the iron horse.

A casual observer will at once see that such a line of Reilway would present a powerful barrier to Russian aggression. It would have this ten-

It would have the tendency for two reasons—first, because of the impetus which it would give to the developement of the countries through which it passes, it would soon have alongeide it a numerous and industrous population ready at any time to resist aggression, and secondly, it would enable England and her affiles to trumport their troops to any point where designs hoattle to their interests were manifested.

We published a felegram lately amnouncing that M. de Lesses, of Suez Canal fame, had proposed to the Russian Government a scheme of which it was said the CAr approved, for a railway across Central Asia, starting from Gwenburg, on the Jurnal River, where it would connect with the existing European lines of Railway, to Sumarchand, L.500 miles, and thence to Poshawar S50. This would make it 2,500 miles in length or about 200 miles also starting from Gwenburg, on the Order of the Carlot of the Ca
