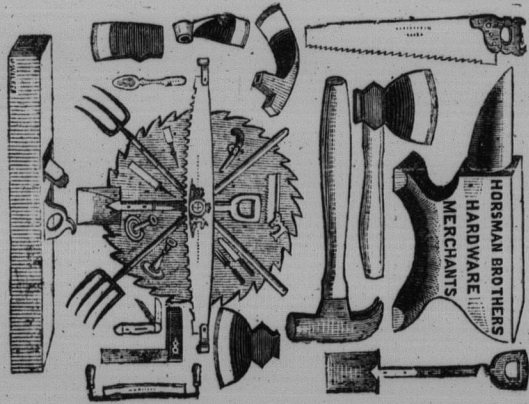

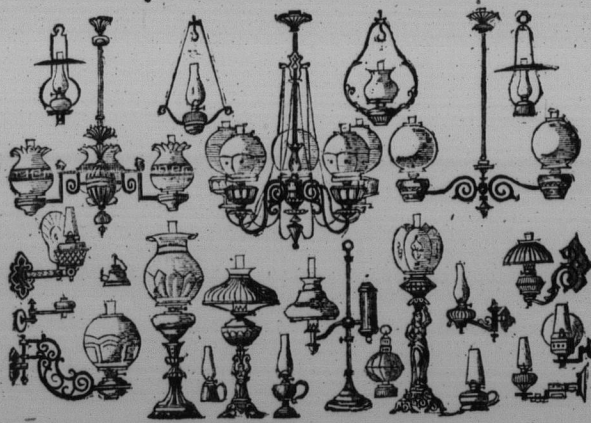

THE FOURTH and LAST DAY.

The Horse Ring and Show of Prize Animals.

Friday, Sept. 18.

The steady rain which set in yesterday afternoon, though of immense benefit to the country, cast a damper on the Exhibition, and no doubt prevented many from going to see it.

Since the year is now crowned with goodness, and peace and plenty abound in our land, let the heartfelt gratitude of all rise to Him who giveth all things.

The attendance yesterday was not much less than on Wednesday, which, considering the rain, is very gratifying.

To-day the attendance was much better than was expected, and the weather cleared up beautifully.

Since it has become the established custom for the President of this and similar Exhibitions to deliver an Address at the close of our annual gatherings, I have much pleasure in following the example of my predecessors.

In the earlier history of our country we were content to meet in our several townships, and there compete with our own neighbours.

Such being the desire of the promoters of our Central Exhibition, they have now with the valued assistance of supporters from all parts of the Province, successfully held their fourth annual Exhibition; and while admitting that in some branches there has been on this occasion a slight decrease in the entries, there has been an increase of the most valuable description marked increase, so that as a whole the Exhibition has been a success.

I may be permitted briefly to reflect in passing on the design of this our annual gathering. It is not simply that the farmer or small exhibitor should have an opportunity to test his stock or products, and to compare them with those of his neighbours.

Returning to the present Exhibition, let us look first at the farmers' department. The display of horses, the entries are unusually large, and the superiority of the animals a marked character.

Looking then at the great variety of labor-saving machinery and implements for farm use, we are at once struck in noticing what perfection has been attained. A glance at the several articles exhibited shows that the skilled hand of the mechanic, combined with the fertile and comprehensive brain, has produced such work as may challenge competition from any part of the world.

In noticing other branches of mechanical skill, if the quantity is not as large as could be desired, everything in its class is of the most perfect workmanship, reflecting credit on the maker.

Among the extra entries, Alfred Armstrong shows a washing machine, wringer, reversible clothes horse, tub, drier and mop combined, step ladder which does away with the use of ropes, also folding wash bench—all useful domestic articles.

Thomas Scott, Elliott, shows a new washing machine—a new invention. It does away with rubbing the action on the clothes being simply by motion—reversible—which is turned round once and three-quarters by means of a lever. It is simple, yet seems to be effective.

K. C. Cuff, Hamilton, shows a meat cutter. The principle is the upper motion, and is made for hand, steam or horse-power.

J. G. Bricker exhibits a grain register, which is attached to the separator, and measures the corn as it is carried away. It has been fully tried and works well.

He also shows a patent machine for separating the grain from the chaff and bran. It is well spoken of.

Andrew Jardine, Hespeler, shows an excellent assortment of sash, moulding and shapening machine knives. They are of excellent workmanship and nicely finished. These goods are rapidly selling.

Moses Bechtel, Blair, shows a fine lot of starker and sharper knives for mouldings. He makes the manufacture of this a specialty, and there is quite a demand for the goods which are made of the best material and are highly finished.

Thos. & Williams, Mitchell, show a Burrham Turbine water wheel.

In the class of engines, A. Robertson & Sons, Guelph, are the largest exhibitors. They show two engines—one five-horse and the other ten-horse-power—both horizontal. They are exhibited as they are built and ready for use, and are well spoken of by the judges. An improvement is a third ball on the governor, which quickens or lessens the speed more effectively.

Thos. Worswick, Guelph, shows a very pretty portable four-horse-power engine, upright. It works in a very small compass, and is admirably suited for shops or factories requiring small power. He also shows the Armstrong patent improved heater, lime catcher, condenser and filter (combined) for purifying water for steam boilers. They are highly spoken of wherever used. Mr. Worswick is the sole manufacturer in Canada. He also shows a new pump, patented by himself. It is called "Worswick's Adjustable Feed Pump." By the eccentric motion the lift can be modified at pleasure, so as to graduate the flow of water. It is the only pump of the kind on the continent, and is patented in Canada and the United States. For engines it is invaluable, and has given great satisfaction.

LADIES' WORK—FANCY GOODS, ETC.

The upper portion of the main building, which is devoted to the exhibition of goods in the above classes, was crowded during Wednesday afternoon, the fair sex assembled on such occasions, being the principal spectators. Altogether, the collection was a truly excellent one, embracing, besides the usual assortment of sewed and embroidery work, many special articles. Among the latter may be classed a collection by the Wellington Woollenery, comprising specimens of petroleum from its refined state, as well as lubricating oil manufactured from petroleum, also wool oil. Samples of paraffine wax—in lump and also loose—made from petroleum, are worthy of remark; ooke settlements from the material are also exhibited. As agents for the Ontario Glass Company, of Buffalo, the Wellington Oil Company exhibit samples of glass, and as agents for the Brockville Acid Company, they show a sample of sulphuric acid.

W. T. Tolton, Puslinch, has a collection of medicinal herbs, comprising about 100 species. There are no other exhibitions in this class.

P. H. Gibbs, Guelph, exhibits several collections of stuffed birds. In the native class he shows thirteen good specimens, and for a collection of foreign birds and animals, he takes first prize.

In this class Thomas Pallister, Guelph, comes second. Mr. Gibbs takes second prize for a single specimen. As an extra, he shows also a stuffed Florida Alligator.

Thos. Richardson, Fergus, shows two lizards, besides some other fine specimens of taxidermy.

H. Atkinson, shows about twenty-seven birds of the smaller species.

John Ingle, Nassagawey, has a small case of native stuffed birds, besides a case containing a summer duck and hooped otter. These take first prize.

Sidney Goodfellow, Guelph, exhibits two beautiful specimens of foreign birds.

In shells—Wm. Stephenson, Guelph, exhibits a large and excellent collection, ranging from a pea to a pumpkin. He takes second prize, while Miss M. J. Tolton, with a still more beautiful though smaller assortment, takes first.

The collection of native insects is excellent. Mrs. Henry Duffell, Eramosa, Alex. Young, Berlin, Edward Burgo, Guelph, and Andrew Jardine, Hespeler, being the exhibitors. Mr. Young takes first prize, with two double and one single case of named insects.

The display of minerals is not large. An amethyst from Thunder Bay attracted considerable attention. John Wilkie, Guelph, contributes a case each of small and large specimens of native minerals, a fine collection. Wm. Dyson, Guelph, is the only competitor, with a case of neatly arranged and named specimens. Mr. Wilkie takes first prize. A collection of geological minerals, fossils and ores, by Dunlop and Peterson, of Guelph, takes second prize, and is well worthy of attention. In fancy flowers the display is particularly good. In wax Mrs. Jeffrey, Guelph, takes first prize with a beautiful specimen in the shape of a harp. The second prize is taken by Mrs. B. Ames, Guelph. Other contributors are Miss L. Brown, Brampton, and Miss Heslop, Toronto. Beautiful specimens of feather flowers come from Misses J. & J. Andrews, Guelph—who take first prize; Peter S. Armstrong, Eramosa, who takes second; and Mrs. James Pickard, Miss Jane Choate and Miss S. Choate Ingersoll, show books of pressed native plants. Miss H. Hogg, Guelph, contributes a collection of buttons. Flower wreaths are shown by Mrs. Robert Ballantyne, Guelph, who takes first prize, and Joseph Shaw, Hespeler, who takes second. Mrs. Thomas, Eden Mills, takes first prize for a wreath of silver wire flowers. Mrs. Wm. Cockburn, Aberfoyle, takes second; and Mrs. Robt. Ballantyne, Guelph, first prize for a seed wreath. Mrs. Thomas, Eden Mills, also enters in this class. For hair work, Miss Thomas, Eden Mills, takes first prize, while the specimen of Miss J. Mrs. B. Ames, Guelph, is commended. Miss Lizzie Trimble, shows a wreath in this class. In moss work, Miss S. Strickland, Oshawa, and Miss Lavina Parkinson, Eramosa, contribute specimens, being rural scenes. Several shell picture frames are worthy of attention, the first prize being obtained by Miss Elizabeth Higgins, Southampton. Specimens of tatting are numerous and very pretty. Miss Strickland carries off a first prize. Miss Shaw, Toronto, exhibits a pair of baby's socks knitted with No. 150 spool thread. Two patchwork cushions in the box pattern are very pretty.

The water colors show well. Messrs. Smith, Hamilton; Chapman, London; Griffith, Westminster, and Smith, Montreal, are prominent exhibitors. A skating rink scene by Mr. Smith of Montreal, is difficult to handle, owing to the number of figures, but he has done it well. Some of Mr. Griffith's flower and fruit pieces are very fine.

Miss Heslop, of Toronto, shows a very accurate model in wax.

A pen and ink sketch by Charles T. Cotton, Hagar in the wilderness—is really creditable, and so is Miss Palmer's Greek head. F. H. Gibbs, Guelph, has a well executed piece—representing old withered trees.

Miss Stevenson has a very good water color, representing a castle and shipping. Miss Palmer's group of terriers and rabbits is remarkably well done.

Miss Patterson, Guelph, has a well executed landscape representing a foaming rapid.

Miss Palmer's Picture of "Grace Darling", is bold, free and life-like.

Miss Strickland and Miss W. Starnocott are large exhibitors of Water Color pictures and crayons, and some of their pieces are really excellent.

Miss K. Macdonald has a spirited sketch in water colors.

Miss F. Saunders has a good crayon, after Ross Bonheur—going to the horse fair; also two well executed dogs' heads.

C. T. Cotton has an excellent copy of Boulton Abbey in the olden time.

Miss F. Saunders has a well executed deer's head in crayon, and Miss Murphy a capital storm scene, also in crayon.

Miss M. Leslie has a neatly copied head in pencil.

The specimens of oblique embroidery by Miss M. J. Tolton, Eramosa, is recommended. Miss L. Brown, Brampton shows a specimen of fancy braiding, and Miss E. Higgins, Southampton, a cone picture frame of neat pattern. A model house by Mrs. H. Wilmot, Guelph, attracts and holds the attention of all spectators. The design is unique and the execution admirable in every detail. The arrangement of the figures and the furniture of the house as seen from the front, are worthy a professional. In the moss work class, Mrs. James Pickard, Guelph, shows a somewhat similar specimen in frame. It takes second prize. Miss Lizzie Torrance, Guelph, shows a well executed specimen of head work, the pattern being in colors on a cushioned chair. A neat specimen of worked shippers is sent by Miss McMillan, Galt, and takes first prize. Other specimens are contributed by Mrs. James Pickard, and Miss Higgins, Southampton. Shippers complete are sent in by Miss Armstrong, Guelph, and Miss Susan P. Wadon, Brampton, the former excellent. We cannot particularize further in this department, suffice it to say the display is truly excellent.

**The United Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada.**

The first General Conference of the United Methodist bodies in the Dominion of Canada met for business in the Metropolitan Wesleyan Church, Toronto, on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. This new Conference is, by its provisional constitution, at present limited to 220 members, comprising an equal number of ministers and laymen. These delegates have already been elected by ballot—the ministerial by ministers at their late Annual Conference, and the lay by laymen at their recent District Meetings. They represent a wide field of occupancy; coming, as we find them, from Ontario, Quebec, British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland.

The proportion of representatives in the General Conference is at the rate of one minister and one layman for every eight ordained ministers in the several bodies now amalgamated.

On motion, the Hon. Mr. Wilmot, ex-Governor of New Brunswick, was unanimously chosen chairman *pro tem*; and the Rev. Alexander Sutherland and Mr. Benjamin Hopkins were appointed Secretaries *pro tem*.

The 37th hymn was sung, and the exultant psalm was read, after which the Rev. Dr. Jeffers offered prayer.

Governor Wilmot made a few remarks, thanking his brethren for the honor conferred upon him. He anticipated a pleasant and harmonious time, and he trusted that the Divine blessing would richly rest down upon them and their deliberation.

The Conference adjourned shortly after 11 o'clock, Rev. Dr. Douglas closing with prayer.

At 2 o'clock the Convention re-assembled, when, on motion, it was agreed that the Conference should proceed to elect by ballot, and without debate, a President for the ensuing four years. The result of the vote gave Dr. Ryerson 89, Dr. J. C. 64, and the balance in scattered votes. The venerable Chief-Superintendent of Education, who was deputed to elect, was introduced to the chair by Hon. Mr. Wilmot, who retired from his temporary honors with the utterance of a few graceful compliments on the choice of the Assembly.

The President asked Conference to elect its Secretary, who might be either a minister or a layman, and the Rev. D. D. Currie, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., was elected.

On nomination, the Revs. Wm. Scott and Benjamin Hopkins were elected Assistant Secretaries, and the Rev. John Bredt, Journal Secretary.

After a short session of devotion, the President briefly addressed his brethren.

A Committee was then appointed to prepare, and submit for adoption on the morrow, a draft of rules and regulations for the guidance of Conference in its debates and modes of procedure.

The Conference adjourned at 11 Thursday morning at 9.
