A London Times Correspondent Hunts the Yellow Sea For Sign of Combats.

Signalling Seen But Dense Fog Prevents a View of Operators.

Latest Report From Inside Port Arthur as to Food and Garrison.

Wei-Hai-Wei, March 30.—I have just returned from a cruise taken by a Chinese junk that the Russian and Japanese fleets have been in contact on the morning of Monday. I covered one hundred and thirty miles, but failed to find any evidence of either fleet although the same vessel reported flashing signalling for a short period early Tuesday morning. This was shortly before 4 o'clock, and we were in the direction of the Russian fleet. It was a very dense fog prevented our steamer approaching within gun range of Port Arthur, and the fog also made it difficult to navigate the North Yellow sea. It would seem, therefore, to be improbable that the Japanese would have close to Port Arthur as the fog would have prevented them from seeing us. It is not, however, impossible that they have been there and are not afraid to use their swift and powerful gunboats.

Latest reports from inside Port Arthur that can be relied upon, were brought here by a Japanese merchant who arrived on a Chinese junk late in the evening. He stated that the food supply there is sufficient for at least a month. The garrison, he declared, is in a state of high spirits. In the last bombardment fully 2000 men were killed. There were no small arms fire, but there was no doubt that the Japanese were doing a thriving business playing between here and Port Arthur. The Japanese diet provides war funds and will now adjourn.

Tokyo, March 30.—The Emperor, has conferred the Order of Kite and the Order of Rising Sun on Commander Kikuchi Takao, who was killed during the Japanese attempt to bottle up the Russian fleet at Port Arthur Sunday night. A movement has been inaugurated to erect a monument to the memory of Commander Takao.

Specialists concluded his labors today and his medical inquiries revealed that the patient will finally adjourn tomorrow. Almost the entire financial programme submitted by the Cabinet was approved although several changes were made. The amount to be raised by special taxation was reduced from \$24,000,000 to \$22,000,000.

The government has the right to borrow the money realized by sale of the savings price certificates, but the management, sale and redemption of the certificates is wholly in the hands of the banks. The changes in the coupon tariffs become effective after six months. The changes include confectionaries, preserves in sugar, silk, fabrics, alcohol, kerosene, sugar, molasses, syrup, de coco, acetone, and all alcoholic beverages containing over thirty per cent of alcohol.
