The law in New Zealand provided that the number of hours during which a person could be kept at labor each week should not exceed 58. It required a half holiday during the week without specifying Saturday, but they felt that the half holiday should have some relation to the Sabbath Day in order that employes could enjoy rest and attend church. They desired to prevent late hours for clerks on Saturday nights, and he was convinced that the physical and moral well-being of the community would be greatly increased by the adoption of the half holiday on Saturday, which should apply to all establishments having three or more employes. Representatives of workingmen and labor unions attached a great deal of importance to such a provision, which



The Works Committee yesterday after noon adopted a draft agreement prepared by the City Engineer and City Solicitor, between some party or parties unknown, who are said to be anxious to build a \$60,000,000 canal, and the corporation of

The agreement provides that a ship anal with all necessary appurtenances canal with all necessary appurtenances for the conveyance of ships between Georgian Bay and the city of Toronto shall be constructed, upon such conditions as may be approved of by the Legislature. The canal to be commenced within six months after such authority is obtained, and to be completed within 10 years after the incorporation of the company, or within such further period as may be authorized by Legislature. The company to spend \$500,000 upon the work within 18 months from the date of incorporation of the company, and \$5,000,000 within five years. in five years.

The City's Percentages. The company to pay the city the following percentages on the gross receipts from the sale of electric heat, light and power to purchasers for use in the city, where the same is conveyed under or through any part of the city; Up to \$1,000,000 per annum, 5 per cent.; \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000, 7 per cent.; \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000, 12 per cent.; on over \$3,000,000, 15 per cent. The books of the company to be open for inspection by the city audisor at all times, and the system of bookkeeping to be approved of by the City Treasurer. The price for power not to exceed two cents

approved of by the City Treasurer. The price for power not to exceed two cents per horse power.

The company to have the right to construct, lay and operate underground wires, conduits and appliances for the distribution and supply of electricity for the purpose of light, heat and power throughout the city. The company to restore the roadbed to the same condition as before the openings were made. The openings to be made only at such times and places as the City Engineer may direct. The company to indemnify the city against any damages that may be sustained by the opening of the streets.

At the expiration of 30 years from the date of the agreement, the city shall have the right to purchase the interests and the assets of the company, plant, etc., used for the carrying on of their business in Toronto, so far as relates to the supply of electricity. the carrying on of their business in Toronto, so far as relates to the supply of electricity. If the city and company fail to agree on a price, three arbitrators to be called in to fix the price. One to be appointed by the city, one by the company, they to appoint the third. If either party be dissatisfied with the award, the city may take possession of the electric system by paying into court the amount of such award. In determining the value the profits likely to be derived from the enterprise are not to be taken into consideration, but only the actual value of the plant, etc., necessary for the operation of the electric system, without any regard to land property or rights acany regard to land property or rights acquired or used in connection with the sys-

A \$10,000 Deposit. The company to deposit with the City Treasurer \$10,000 as soon as they ask permission to open the streets. This amount to remain on continuous deposit and draw 4 per cent. interest.

The company not to sell heat, light or power in the city until the \$5,000,000 is expended. If the canal is not constructed in 10 years the wires and conduits and appliances of any kind upon the streets shall become the property of the city, without compensa-

WHAT "GENTLEMEN" MAY DO.

They Need Not Pay Tradesmen's Bills, but They Must Play Cards Fairly. Indeed, the passing of any paper between any creditor and debtor is held to remove the obligation from the list of debts of honor and places it among the so-called "tradesmen's debts," the non-payment of which involves no loss of "gentifhommerie" or of "honor." Debts of honor, that is to live in. Landlord—And you are therefore going to move?—Boston Transary, loans based merely upon versions. loans based merely upon ver-obligations and bets, must be at all cost, according to d at all cost, according to ethics governing the "code of or," even if the debtor has to obtain the money by means of methods which verge not only upon the dishonorable, but even on the criminal. It is for this reason that we sometimes hear of young men going to the length of stealing their mother's jewels or of forging the reason. men going to the length of stealing their mother's jewels or of forging the name of their nearest and dearest relatives, as did the eldest son of an English peer the other day, for the sake of paying their debts of honor, failing which, they can no longer hope to retain the social status of a gentleman. One has heard of men committing suicide, like young Count Aloys Hardegg a tew weeks since at Vienna, and the last Marquis of Hastings, years ago in London, because they were unable to pay their "debts of honor," but one has never heard of a gentleman taking his own life because he could not pay his tailor.

Connection with a divorce suit, far from detracting from the 'status of a gentleman," is, on the contrary, rather a feather in his cap, excepting in cases where the co-respondent prefers to speak the truth and acknowledge his guilt rather than perjure himself in the witness box "like a gentleman," The most mortal of all sin in the eyes of society, the one that entails above everything else the forfeiture of the title of gentleman and of all honor, is unfair play at cards; and it is no secret that the majority of the great families in Europe would infinitely prefer to have a murderer among their relatives than a man convicted of the offence which resulted in the social ostracism of Sir William Gordon Cumming, of the Duke of Roxeburghe's son-in-law. George Russell, and of Major the Hon, Walter Harbord, brother of Lord Suffield These perhaps are the principal.

Twice or thrice, in 1851-52, I was taken to see him by Mr. G. H. Lewis, but I soon found that the alternatives were-listening in silence to his dogmas, sometime absurd, or getting into a hot argument with him, which ended in our glaring at one another; and as I did not like either alternative I ceased to go. With Tyndall, however, the case seems to have been different—possibly because of greater tolerance of his political creed and his advocacy of personal government. The rule of the strong hand was not, I fancy, as repellent to Tyndall as to me; and, indeed, I suspect that, had occasion offered, he would not have been reluctant to exercise such rule himself. Though his sympathies were such as made him anxious for others' westers that direction welfare, they did not take the direction of anxiety for others' freedom as the means to their welfare; and hence he was, I suppose, not in pronounced antagonism with Carlyle on these matters. tagonism with Carlyle on these matters. But divergent as our beliefs and sentiments were in earlier days, there has been in recent days mutual approxima-tion. A conversation with him some years since, made it manifest that personal experience had greatly shaken the faith he previously had in public administration, and made him look with more favor on the view of state functions held by me. On the other hand, my faith in free institutions, originally strong (though always joined with the belief that the maintenance and success of them is a question of popular chargreatly decreased by the conviction that the fit charcter is not possessed by any people, nor is likely to be possessed for people, nor is likely to be possessed ages to come.—McClure's Magazine.


