County Councus For 1907 ..

The new County Council Act comes into force on the 1st of January next. Under it a return is made in great part to the old system that proved so cumbrous and unsatisfactory in form

Following are the chief provisions of

In and for the year 1907 and thereafter the council of every county or union of counties in this province shall be constituted as follows :-

Every town not separated from the county for municipal purposes, and every township and village, shall be represented in such council by the reeve of such town, township or village municipality, and, in addition to the reeve, by a deputy-reeve, or deputy-reeves, as

If the municipality had the names of more than 1,000 and not more than 2,000 persons on the last revised voters' list of the municipality as quali-fied to vote at municipal elections, then by a dupty-reeve.

If the municipality had more than 2,000 such names upon such list then by a first deputy-reeve and a second deputy-reeve, and

If the municipality had more than 3,000 such names upon such list then by a first deputy-reeve, a second deputy-reeve and a third deputy-reeve.

The effect of the act will be to increase the size of most of the county councils, but none of them will be quite so large as they were prior to the introduction of what is known as the Hardy act.



Objections to the Ontario School Act

Beyond the fact that the minimum salary clause is no longer needed, the short-age of teachers having operated to raise rural salaries up to and, in many cases, above the minimum provided in the Act, there are sound practical objections to the working out of the clause. One is that the schedule of salaries is not planned with any relation to the work to be done in the school. A section with high as in the school. A section with high assessment and consequent high salary may have very few children of school age; the section alongside of it, with low assessment and consequent low salary, may have twice or three time as many children attending school. Another defect is that under the clause the salaries are not really fixed by the weelth of the section. really fixed by the wealth of the section, as intended by the law, but by the basis of valuation adopted in the council. In of valuation adopted in the council. In some cases the assessed valuation may be only forty or fifty per cent, of the real value, in others, as in Lambton, it may be ninety or ninety-five per cent. Under the act the 'cale of salaries in one county will be much higher than in the other, the realfvalue of the property comprised in the school sections being the same.

The Canadian knows of cases in Lambton where the salary called for by the act is out of all proportion to the value which even the very best teacher could render. Some salaries are too high and some too low. There are salaries where the trustees pay more than the act calls for.—

"Chamois" Skins.

Charles C. Druedling has written an article in the Journal of Pharmacy on chamois skins. The commercial article of that name, he says, is really oil tanned sheep or lamb skin lining. The supply of skins from the chamois antmal is very limited. Enough could not be obtained in a year to supply the United States for more than a single day. He made special inquiry on a visit to Switzerland about the annual crop of the chamois skins and ascertained that from 5,000 to 6,000 skins would be a fair average yearly crop. This skin is heavier than the skin of the sheep or lamb, also much coarser. For strength and durability the chamois skin is preferable, but for ordinary use and appearance the oil tanned sheepskin lining would in most instances be preferred.

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
