

Boots and shoes, in which Canada was beginning to build up a trade, are affected for the worse. The duties are mixed, specific and ad val-orem, and tell heavily against the cheaper lines. Apparel bears 20 to 25 percent. Printing paper not under 20 x 25 inches is very lightly taxed. The duty on rubber boots and shoes is 25 percent, and, as this branch of trade was growing. 




