TEMPERANCE SENTIMENT.

There can be no doubt that temperance sentiment is steadily advancing in all parts of our country. The people are becoming convinced that the common use of intoxicating drinks is a source of endless trouble and injury to all classes of society, not only to those who indulge in such drinks, but to a much larger number of persons who innocently suffer from the cruelty and crimes of drinking men. As this sentiment becomes stronger and more deeply rooted in the public mind it naturally gives rise to reformatory measures which find their way into the laws of our land and bring about very beneficial results. Prince Edward Island has already by legislative enactment established prohibition in that progressive province, and the measure of success and prosperity that has followed in the wake of this movement has been exceedingly encouraging. New Brunswick is at present putting forth efforts to prevent licensed liquor dealers from sending their dangerous wares into counties which by the adoption of the Scott Act have proclaimed their desire to prohibit intoxicating beverages from their precincts. These are steps in the right direction, and we think the time has come when similar measures should be adopted in Nova Scotia. We have for the most part a sober population who desire to promote the peace and comfort of our homes and to throw around the rising generation influences adapted to secure the moral and social welfare of our children. These are the true friends of our country and their wishes and efforts should be respectfully considered. The temperance laws we already possess should be impartially and rigorously carried into effect by those who have been appointed to perform this work, and all our citizens should cordially support the officers of the law in the discharge of their duty. There is also room for improvement in our temperance legislation, and we hope our provinces will not be behind any other section of the Dominion of Canada in the manifestation of sobriety and purity in every department of civil and social affairs.

Rural Convention of Annapolis

The convention of the Rural Deanery of Annapolis was held at Digby on Monday, and was successful in every way. It was called at the instance of the bishop of Nova Scotia, and at his express desire, not only the clergy, but also the church warden, lay-delegates to the Diocesan Synod, and Sunday school workers of the respective parishes were invited to attend. It is a plan whereby the Bishop hopes to get in better touch with a class of church people in the diocese, whereby they may help him and him, them, and that all together bishops, clergy and laity may work untiringly in the common cause of the church. About two dozen present from parishes outside Digby and those together with parishioners resident in Digby, made quite a large gathering. After a hymn and opening prayers by Rev. J. J. Harney, the bishop addressed the meeting. As hinted above his great desire is to get to know his people and more particularly what they are thinking about, in connection with the Church and her work, both at home and abroad, also that they may get to know and discuss schemes which he from time to time might bring before them as the result of his own thought and planning at rural conventions such as these. His first toned on the Cathedral scheme because of some misconceptions which seem to prevail in different parts. Then he enlarged on the aims and objects of the Women's Auxiliary, a branch of which he desired to see started in every parish. Even so small a number as two, or even one, could form a branch. But his chief object in calling them together was to lay before them a "Canon" which it was proposed to bring before the next meeting of the Diocesan Synod. As the laity were interested and prepared to back it up, by working it. Hence his great desire to get at their minds on the point. The chief object of the Canon would be to unify existing schemes and to provide means of bringing the needs of the church and her work before the people with a view to eliciting more adequate support. As he went through the Diocese the thing that struck him most painfully was the beggary stipends of the clergy. And if the work of the church is to be done as it should some remedy must be found. No other Christian body asked their ministers to begin to live on what the members of the Church of England in the Diocese of Nova Scotia seem to expect their clergy to live on and do their work. In many cases not six hundred dollars a year was allowed and out of this a horse had to be kept before the man could even begin to live. Was it any wonder that he could not find many calls which seem to be peculiar to a clergyman met before the men to fill these positions when it is practically a starvation wage was all that was offered, whereas the cost of living had increased for the clergyman as for the layman, and he found it almost impossible to make two meet. The Bishop then read the proposed "Canon" in detail, and after questions and discussion a resolution heartily endorsing it was passed unanimously. Sunday schools and their work was also somewhat discussed, but the time at the disposal of the convention was too short to permit it to any great length. It is hoped to have such a gathering as this once a year in each Rural Deanery, and if this inaugural meeting occurs, anything, much good should be the result. At 7.30 p. m. Evensong was held in the Parish church, the Rev. C. P.
