




II. SUN. A partial eclipse. January 31st. Invisible in the Dominion of Canada. May be viewed only in the Antarctic Ocean.

III. SUN. A partial eclipse. June 28th. Not visible in any part of Continent of America; but may be seen in a large portion of South Pacific, and by our fellow-subjects in Victoria, Van Dieman's Land, and New Zealand.

IV. Moon. A total eclipse. July 12th.

Enters Penumbra, July 12, 3h. 22m. p. m.

" Umbra, " 4h. 21m. p. m.

Beginning of total phase, " 5h. 20m. p. m.

Middle of eclipse, " 6h. 10m. p. m.

End of total phase, " 7h. 0m. p. m.

Emerges from Umbra, " 8h. 0m. p. m.

" " Penumbra, " 8h. 58m. p. m.

Magnitude of eclipse (Moon's diameter—1) 1.676. This phenomenon can scarcely be viewed by any in St. John, for the moon emerges from the *Umbra*, just as she rises above the South-Eastern horizon.

V. SUN. A partial eclipse. July 28th. Invisible to all in the Dominion of Canada; but may be viewed in the Arctic Ocean.

VI. SUN. A total eclipse, December 22d. It will be central and total to inhabitants of Caucasian Russia, European Turkey, Greece, Malta, Algeria, Southern Spain and Portugal, Black Sea, Archipelago, Mediterranean, and N. W. across the Atlantic to lat.  $56^{\circ} 11' N$ , and long  $48^{\circ} 5' W$ .

As a partial eclipse it will end at 7h. 45m. in the morning to the inhabitants of St. John; and will end as the sun appears above the horizon in the Counties of Westmorland, Kent, Northumberland, and Gloucester.

### Morning and Evening Stars for 1870.

*Venus* (♀) will be a Evening Star until February 23rd, then a Morning Star till December 7th, after which she appears as an Evening Star.

*Jupiter* (♃) will be a Morning Star until 1st February, then an Evening Star till 24th May—a Morning Star thence till 18th September, after which an Evening Star.

### LIGHT HOUSEES.

*Cape Sable Seal Island Light.*—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen on approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

*Brier Island Light.*—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof—a plain white light.

*Digby Gut Light.*—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—a white light.

*Gannet Rock Light.*—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a dis-

tance of about twenty miles. It is a light of the Fourth order, Holophotal system—fixed white light 15 seconds, eclipse  $5\frac{1}{2}$ , flash  $5\frac{1}{2}$ , eclipse  $5\frac{1}{2}$ . The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

*Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.* This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island, N. N. W. & W., 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W.,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N.,  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., 12 miles.

**NOTE.**—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends ~~Westward~~ from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther ~~Westward~~, six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.,  $18\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W.,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  miles distant.

A new Tower is now being erected in place of the one on the present Tower, on which will be placed a Fifth Order French Dioptric Lighting apparatus. Fixed white light, visible twenty-five miles.

*Machias Seal Island Lights.*—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or American.) Both the buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz.:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E., easterly.

" Gannet Rock Light, E. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., 13 miles.

" Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.

" Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E.

" N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

" Little River Head, N. by W.

" Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ships' Compasses should be well compared and adjusted particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, (or  $1\frac{1}{2}$  points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course

from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S.; but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

This Light, together with the one on Escuminac (now being put up), will be the finest Lights in the Province of New Brunswick.

*Head Harbour Light.*—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American), on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campobello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

*Point Le Preaux Lights.*—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed, and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

A Steam Fog Alarm has been placed in this Station, which will sound twice in each minute.

*Partridge Island Light.*—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed, *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

*Beacon Light.*—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Fourth Order Dioptric Light, visible ten miles, is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

*Quaco.*—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

*Cape Enrage Light.*—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

*West Quoddy Light.*—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St. Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

*Cape Forchu Light.*—On Cape Forchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia), in lat. 43° 39', N. long. 66° 8' W. It exhibits a plain, revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

*Grindstone Island Light.*—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House are as follows:

Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S.  $61\frac{1}{2}$  W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40° W., 6-10 miles.  
The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78° W., 10 miles.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 8-10 mile—it dries at low springs, and has about 24 fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile; it has 1½ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

**Grand Manan.**—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow Tail," on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 108 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white.

*Richibucto Head Light.*—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat.  $46^{\circ} 39' 40''$  N., long.  $64^{\circ} 43' 30''$  W. of Greenwich.

*Cape Jourimain.*—A new Light House is now in course of erection at Cape Jourimain. Character of light not yet determined on.

*Point Encuminac Light.*—This Light House is situated in Miramichi Bay, north latitude  $47^{\circ} 4' 30''$ ; west longitude,  $64^{\circ} 50' 30''$ . It is a fixed bright light, elevated seventy feet above high water. A Third Order French Dioptric lighting apparatus is now being placed on this Tower, which will be visible for twenty-five miles.

*Miscon Island Light.*—This Light House is situated on Birch Point, north latitude 48° 1' 00"; west longitude, 64° 30' 00". It is a fixed red light, elevated seventy-nine feet above high water.

*Shediac Lights.*—On Point DuChene Wharf, in the summer, north latitude  $46^{\circ} 14' 6''$ ; west longitude  $64^{\circ} 31' 5''$ . It is a fixed light.

*Miramichi River*.—Light House on Portage Island, now in course of

Two Beacon Lights on "Preston's Beach," about five miles above Escuminac Light. Two Beacon Lights at Oak Point. Two Beacon Lights at "Grants." All fixed white Lights.

River St. John Lights.—Green Head, Sand Point, Oak Point, No Man's Friend, Oromocto Shoals, and Wilmot's Bluff.

## RATES OF PILOTAGE.

*Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John—passed 27th July, 1869.*

One dollar per foot for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and One dollar per foot for removing or taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such vessels, the sum of Two Dollars per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Bay of Fundy to another, vessels not exceeding 100 tons burthen, registered at any port within the Dominion, Steamboats, and Vessels propelled by steam, trading and plying between this port and any port or ports in North America, and all Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding one hundred tons, One dollar and Fifty cents; for vessels over one hundred, and not exceeding two hundred tons, Two Dollars; for vessels over two hundred, and not exceeding three hundred tons, Three Dollars; and for all vessels over three hundred, and not exceeding four hundred tons, the sum of Four Dollars: and twenty-five cents additional for every fifty tons each Vessel may measure over four hundred tons.

*First Distance.*—From Partridge Island to Musquash Head, bearing North West, One dollar per foot.

*Second Distance.*—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preaux, bearing North West, One dollar and Twenty five cents per foot.

*Third Distance.*—From Point Le Preaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West, or North Channel, bearing South East, One dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

*Fourth Distance.*—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island, bearing South-East, One dollar and Seventy five cents per foot.

*Fifth Distance.*—Any where outside of and beyond the fourth distance, and within a bound ranging with Mount Desert and Cape Sable Seal Islands, bearing Northwest and Southeast, being the outer cruising bound, Two dollars per foot.

### HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On vessels of 30 and under 50 tons, 2s. 6d.; vessels of 50 and under 75 tons, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150, and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200, and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300, and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; decked vessels under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British vessels under that tonnage, trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any port in Nova Scotia to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30, and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50, and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75, and under 100 tons, 10s.

### Time for going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.





**POSTAGE.**

All Letters sent to any part of the Dominion and P. E. Island, are liable to a uniform rate of three cents per half ounce, according to the following scale, if prepaid:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight.....	\$0 8 6
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce.....	..... 9
A Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and a half ..	12
A Letter exceeding one ounce and a half, and not exceeding two ounces...	15
A Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding two ounces and a half..	18

And so on, adding three cents extra for every additional half ounce.

If unpaid, such Letters will be liable to a rate of five cents per half ounce.

The same scale of reckoning by half ounces is applicable to Letters to and from the United States, but the rate on such Letters is six cents per half ounce.

Postage on Drop Letters, one cent.

On Packet Letters, to and from the United Kingdom, the scale of rates is as follows:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight ...	\$0 12 ½
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding an ounce.....	25
And so on—adding 12 ½ cents for every additional half ounce.	

Letters via New York, when so addressed, are sent weekly: postage 15 cents.

Letters for the West Indies, Cuba, Central America, South America and Japan, can be sent daily via New York, if so addressed and prepaid.

Letters for British Columbia and Vancouver, 10 cents; Red River, 6 cents; in all cases to be prepaid.

It is advisable that all Letters should be prepaid, and by Postage Stamps.

Printed Books and Pamphlets, under 48 ounces in weight, can be forwarded by Post in New Brunswick, at the rate of one cent per ounce; Periodicals, one cent per four ounces.

Transient Newspapers require to be prepaid—two cents each. Newspapers for subscribers do not require to be prepaid, the charge being one cent on delivery; prepayment can be made either at the Office where mailed, or by the subscriber at the Office where delivered, at the following rates: For a paper issued once per week, five cents per quarter; twice, 10 cents; and so on.

Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Books, to pass at the above rates, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides or ends.

No words or marks (except the name and address of the person to whom sent), shall be written on any Newspaper, Pamphlet, Book, Periodical, Parliamentary or Government paper.

Any violation of these Regulations will subject such Newspapers, Pamphlets, Periodicals, or Books, &c., to be treated in every respect as Letters.

Book Postage to United Kingdom, under 4 ounces, 7 cents; 4 ounces and under 8 ounces, 12 ½ cents; 8 ounces and under 1 lb., 25 cents; 1 lb. and under 1 ½ lb., 37 ½ cents; 1 ½ lb. to 2 lb., 50 cents.

Periodicals printed in Canada can be sent to United Kingdom for 2 cents. To Newfoundland, same as England.

**REGISTRATION.**—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is 2 cents; to England, 8 cents.

**PARCELS.**—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout the Dominion, at a rate of  $12\frac{1}{2}$  cents per half lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 8 lbs., nor the size to exceed 2 feet in length or breadth, and 1 foot in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Registration fee 5 cents. Parcel must be pre-paid by stamps. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

**POSTAGE STAMPS.**—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of  $\frac{1}{2}$ , 1, 2, 8, 6,  $12\frac{1}{2}$ , and 15 cents; all bearing as a device the effigy of Her Majesty.

Pattern, and samples are transmitted between the Dominion and the United Kingdom at the same rate as per book post. The pattern or sample must be open at the end or side, except in case of seeds, drugs, &c.; which can be sent in closed transparent bags.

Persons remitting money should obtain a Money Order, as the Department is not responsible for the loss of a letter containing money; and in no case should a money letter be sent without registration.

When Money Orders exceeding \$100 in aggregate amount are issued in one day and to the same person, by one or more Offices upon another Office, the Postmaster of the Office drawn upon (if necessary) may delay the payment of such Orders for six days.

All Money Orders shall be drawn upon Printed Forms supplied by the Post Office Department; and no Order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular Printed Forms.

The Commission to be charged upon Money Orders shall be as follows:—

On orders not exceeding \$10, 5 cents. Exceeding \$10, and not exceeding \$20, 10 cents. Exceeding \$20, and not exceeding \$30, 15 cents. Exceeding \$30, and not exceeding \$40, 20 cents. Exceeding \$40, and not exceeding \$50, 25 cents. Exceeding \$50, and not exceeding \$60, 30 cents. Exceeding \$60, and not exceeding \$70, 35 cents. Exceeding \$70, and not exceeding \$80, 40 cents. Exceeding \$80, and not exceeding \$90, 45 cents. Exceeding \$90, and not exceeding \$100, 50 cents.

The person to whom an Order is payable, can have it paid to a second person by writing on it, "Pay to the order of \_\_\_\_\_ (the name of the second person to fill the blank), for value received."

Sterling Orders, payable in the United Kingdom, Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, are drawn at the following offices:—Bathurst, Chatham, Dalhousie, Fredericton, Moncton, Newcastle, Richibucto, Sackville, Shediac, St. Andrews, St. John, Sussex Vale, and Woodstock; and the Post Offices at Grand Falls and Hillsborough are authorized to issue Orders, payable in Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland.

Sterling Orders are drawn at the rate of \$4.89 to the Pound Sterling, besides the following commission:—Orders on the United Kingdom—Orders up to £2, 25 cents; from £2 to £5, 50 cents; from £5 to £7, 75 cents; and from £7 to £10, \$1. Orders on Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, up to £5, 25 cents; from £5 to £10, 50 cents.

Trackmaster—Gavin Rainnie.

This Railway, 108 miles in length, extends from the harbour of St. John, Bay of Fundy, to the harbour of Shediac, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence. It was constructed at a cost of about five million dollars, and is run by the Government.

From Dorchester, 109 miles from Saint John, travellers are conveyed daily, by four-horse coaches, 100 miles to Truro, and thence, 64 miles, by Railway, to Halifax, Nova Scotia.

FROST BITTEN FEET.—This is one of the cases in which an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure. But if the ounce has not been taken, and the frost has, much depends upon timely remedies. The feet should be put immediately into cold water, and thawed out very gradually. The sudden thawing does more injury than the frost. Apply sweet oil to the injured parts, and keep quiet until the system hastime to repair damages.

**POULTRY MANURE—HOW TO SAVE AND USE IT.**—Poultry manure, one of the most valuable fertilizers made upon the farm, is too often allowed to go to waste. The hens and turkeys roost upon trees, under the shed, in the waggon-house, or wherever it happens. To save the manure, these birds must be taught to roost in one place. Turkeys readily take to elevated poles near the house or barn, and these should always be provided for them. Sweep up their droppings every few days, and put it in a box or barrel, and keep dry. Hens will roost under cover, and a hen-house should always be one of the farm buildings. The floor, if not of boards in a loft, should be such that it can be cleaned easily and frequently. It is well to keep plaster or dried peat under the floors. Put the sweepings in old barrels as fast as they accumulate. In a dry state they will keep a long time without much loss. It is customary to mix these droppings with wood ashes, without much attention to definite proportions, at the time of planting, and drop them in the hill for corn and potatoes. If care is taken to keep the seed from contact with the manure, they produce very satisfactory results. But this is not the best way of using it. Two or three weeks before planting, mix the contents of the barrels with about three times their bulk of moist loam or peat under cover. When the mass is well heated, shovel it over, and mix with it as much more loam or peat, and let it lie until wanted. This may be worked into beds prepared for garden seeds, or dropped, a handful to the hill, for field crops, and will always tell a good story at harvest time.

**CARE OF PIGS IN WINTER.**—It is bad for the swine that the city societies to prevent cruelty to animals do not extend their offices into the country. We wonder how some pigs survive the winter treatment they often receive. They are fed at irregular intervals and with unequal supplies in quantity and quality. They have no suitable shelter, and are often confined in muddy pens without any opportunity to keep themselves dry and clean. The pig is a luxurious liver, if you give him a chance, and will keep himself clean and comfortable. No animal will pay better for warm quarters and plenty of straw. This can usually be had in any quantity and at small cost about the farmer's premises. The sty should have its full share, and as often as it gets worked up fine, it should be thrown out, and be replaced. Then it is exceedingly profitable that the feeding trough be kept under cover. Swine do not enjoy eating in the snow and rain more than other animals. Give them a chance to follow their instincts, and then see just how much they love snow banks and rain storms. Then the feeding should not simply be the refuse of the family, but substantial food, at regular intervals, and in quantities adapted to their weight. All pigs want to be kept in good thriving condition until they are put up for fattening. Money is sunk in trying to make pork out of stunted pigs.

**TO PREVENT STOVES FROM RUSTING.**—A correspondent asks how to prevent stoves from rusting. One who speaks from long experience recommends common stove blacking, and no kind of oil but elbow grease. Much depends upon the condition in which stoves are put away, and upon the place of deposit. If thoroughly polished—the elbow grease not spared—and set in the garret or upper chamber, they will ordinarily go through without damage.

**THE FOLLOWING**

**Under Regulations and Restrictions to be prescribed by the Minister of Customs.**

Carriages of travellers, and carriages laden with merchandize, and not to include circus troops and hawkers.

Locomotive and Railway passenger baggage and freight cars, running upon any line of road crossing the frontier, so long as Canadian locomotives and cars are admitted free under similar circumstances in the United States.

Menageries, horses, cattle, carriages, and harnesses of.

Travellers' baggage.

**THE FOLLOWING GOODS,**

**When the produce and growth of any of the B. N. A. Provinces, may be imported free of duty, viz.:—**

Animals of all kinds; Fresh, Smoked and Salted Meats; Green and Dried Fruits; Fish of all kinds; Products of Fish, and of all other creature living in the water; Poultry; Butter, Cheese, Lard, Tallow; Timber and lumber of all kinds, round, hewed or sawed, but not otherwise manufactured in whole or in part; Fish Oil; Gypsum, ground or unground.

**TABLE OF PROHIBITIONS.**

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars together with a forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz.:

Books, Drawings, Paintings, Prints, and Photographs of an immoral or indecent character.
