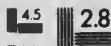

NEW TESTAMENT BOOKS.
LESSON I.

- Q. Tell some characteristics of the First Gospel.
- A. Matthew is a biographical book, written by Matthew an apostle. It contains 28 chapters. The inaugurating address, (the sermon on the mount) the thirty times repeated Hebraic statement "kingdom of heaven," the tracing Christ's genealogy but to Abraham, etc., point to Matthew as written for the Jews to prove Jesus Christ is the promised Mess'ah.
- Q. Tell something of the Second Gospel.
- A. Mark is a biographical book, written by John Mark, He was not an apostle but was the companion of Peter. It has 16 chapters. It contains no genealogy or miraculous conception, believed to have been written for the Romans. Its key note is Service and Power. "Immediately" or "straightway" it proceeds to portray Christ as found overcoming disease, demons and death; conquering the grave he becomes Lord of all.
- Q. Give some characteristics of the Third Gospel.
- A. Luke, the third biographical book, was written by Luke, a Greek. He was not an apostle but the companion of Paul. The book has 24 chapters. The receiving of publicans, the publican's prayer, the good Samaritan, the tracing of Christ's genealogy back to Adam, all breathe a gospel for Gentiles; Christ the Saviour of all, the light of the Gentiles and the glory of Israel.
- Q. What is the special purpose of the Fourth Gospel?
- A. John, the fourth biographical book, was written by the Apostle John. It contains 21 chapters. It deals chiefly with the Deity of our Lord. It gives no genealogy, baptism or temptation; instead it gives the pre-existence of the Word, the Incarnation, the new Birth, the Bread of Life, the Water of Life and the Life more abundant. He writes that we may believe that Jesus is the SON of GOD, and believing have LIFE through His name.

LESSON II.

Q. Give some characteristics of the Fifth New Testament Book.

A. Acts is the fifth New Testament book. It is historical and was written by Luke. It contains 28 chapters in which are given us some of the acts or doings of Christ's first Spirit-led disciples. It describes the founding of the first Gospel Church, the appointing of officers, the gospel given to the Gentiles and missionary zeal. There is no benediction or amen for we are still writing the acts of Christ's disciples.

Q. Give a brief outline of the Sixth New Testament Book.

A. Romans, the greatest of the Pauline epistles, was written by the Apostle Paul to the church in Rome. It contains 16 chapters. It proclaims that all are sinners, chapter 3; justification by faith through His blood, chapters 4 and 5; the mode and meaning of baptism, chapter 6; His care for His saints, chapter 8; His grace in Christ, chapters 9 and 11; the way to be saved, chapter 10; the way the saved should live, chapters 12 to 16.

Q. Tell some characteristics of the Seventh and Eighth New Testament Books.

A. I. and II. Corinthians are Pauline epistles, written by Paul to the church at Corinth. The I. contains 16, the II., 13, chapters. They portray the church as the body of Christ, treat on the relation of husband and wife, of strong toward the weak, of the Lord's Supper, the resurrection and life hereafter.

Q. Tell some characteristics of the Ninth New Testament Book.

A. Galatians, Pauline epistle, was written to the church at Galatia and contains 6 chapters. It portrays Christ's redemption; for us, Christ not law, Spirit not flesh, Calvary not Sinai.

LESSON III.

- Q. Name and describe the Tenth New Testament Book.
- A. Ephesians is a Pauline epistle containing 6 chapters. It was written to the saints at Ephesus, deals with sovereign grace, shows the relationship of Christ and His church, and names the Christian armor.
- Q. Name and describe the Eleventh New Testament Book.
- A. Philippians was written by Paul and is an epistle containing 4 chapters written to the saints at Philippi. Its keynote is joy in the Lord.
- Q. Name and describe the Twelfth New Testament Book.
- A. Colossians, Pauline epistle written by Paul to the saints at Colosse. It contains 4 chapters, shows Christ Head of His church, His Word for all, only one Mediator.
- Q. Give some characteristics of the Thirteenth and Fourteenth New Testament Books.
- A. Thessalonians I. and II. The I. contains 5 chapters, the II. 3. They are written by Paul to the church at Thessalonica and considered the earliest of his epistles. Their key note is Christ's coming, they counsel how we should live while waiting His appearing.
- Q. Name and describe the Fifteenth and Sixteenth New Testament Books.
- A. Timothy I. and II. Pauline epistles. Book I. containing 6, and Book II. containing 4 chapters, were written by Paul to Timothy near the close of the apostle's life. They give qualifications of church officers and pointed advice to young Christians.

LESSON IV.

- Q. Name and describe the Seventeenth New Testament Book.
- A. Titus, a Pauline epistle containing 3 chapters written to Titus. It gives qualifications of bishops and guidance for young Christians.
- Q. Name and describe the Eighteenth New Testament Book.
- A. Philemon, a Pauline epistle of 1 chapter. It deals with relation of masters to servants.
- Q. Name and describe the Nineteenth New Testament Book.
- A. Hebrews, generally for convenience classed with Pauline epistles, writer unknown. It contains 13 chapters and is the key of Leviticus offerings. Its theme is redemption. Here we see how the sacrifices of Jewish ritualism meet their great antitype in Christ the Lamb of God, our Sacrifice, Offerer, Altar and Priest.
- Q. Name and describe the Twentieth New Testament Book.
- A. James. This epistle was written by James. It contains 5 chapters. The themes of the book are: obedience, bridling of the tongue and showing of faith by good works.
- Q. Name and describe the Twenty-first and Twenty-second New Testament Books.
- A. Peter I. and II. were written by Apostle Peter to Christians away from home. The I. book has 5 chapters the II. 3. Their keynote is "precious"—precious blood, precious promise, precious Christ who will come again.
- Q. Name and describe the Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth New Testament Books.

- A. John's epistles I., II. and III. were written by the Apostle John. The I. contains 5 chapters, the others 1 each. Their theme is love. He defines what true love to God is. This is love that we walk after His commandments.
- Q. Name and describe the Twenty-sixth New Testament Book.
- A. Jude. This epistle was written by Jude or Judas, surnamed Thaddaeus. It contains but 1 chapter, in it he deals direful doom to hypocrites and councils Christians to build on faith.
- Q. Name and describe the Twenty-seventh New Testament Book.
- A. Revelation is the only prophetic book in the New Testament. It was written by the Apostle John and contains 22 chapters. It portrays a mighty conflict but glorious victory for the Lamb who leads, feeds, gives power and light to an innumerable company, until, overcoming by the blood of the Lamb, white-robed and palm-branched they stand before the throne of God.

LESSON V.

SICK ROOM READINGS.

- Q. Give a reason why we should arrange sick room readings.
- A. Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. II. Tim. 2:15.
- Q. Give verses for a sick aged saint.
- A. And even to your old age I am He; and even to hoar hairs will I carry you: I have made, and I will bear; even I will carry, and will deliver you. Isa. 46:4. I am continually with Thee: Thou hast holden me by my right hand. Thou shalt guide me with Thy counsel, and afterward receive me to glory. Psal. 73:23-24.
- Q. Give some verses appropriate for a dying father, a Christians.
- A. There is none like unto the God of Jeshurun, who rideth upon the heaven in thy help, and in His excellency on the sky. The eternal God is thy Refuge and underneath are the everlasting arms. Deut. 33:26-27. Leave thy fatherless children, I will preserve them alive; and let thy widows trust in Me. Jer. 9:11.
- Q. Give some other readings appropriate for dying saints.
- A. Phil. 1:21-23; Psal. 23; John 14:1-3, 25-28; Rev. 7:8-17; II. Cor. 4:14-18; II. Cor. 5:1-9; I. John 3:1-2; John 17:24-26.
- Q. Give some verses for souls wanting assurance.
- A. If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. Rom. 10:9. Fear thou not; for I am with thee; be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen

thee; yea I will help thee; yea I will uphold thee with the right hand of My righteousness. Isa. 41:10. The Lord loveth judgment, and forsaketh not His saints; they are preserved for ever : Psa. 37:28; also Rom. 8:22-39; I. John 17:25; I. Pet. I:3-9.

Q. Give verses for one wanting to be a Christian.

A. Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. Rom. 10:13. Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved, Acts 16:31. God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life, John 3:16—also Matt. 11:27-30; Isa. 55:6-8; I. Tim. 1:12-16; Eph. 2:12-18.

Q. Give some Scripture for an unconverted sick one.

A. Isa. 55; John 3:1-19; Rom. 2:1-16; 3:10-23; Heb. 2:1-4; Rev. 20:11-15; Matt. 25:31-46.

LESSON VI

SCRIPTURE APPROPRIATE FOR BEREAVED ONES.

- Q. Give a reason for believing that God's Word has something suitable for every sick room and every bereaved home.
- A. All Scripture is given by inspiration of God that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works. II. Tim. 3:16-17.
- J. Give some Scripture appropriate for children bereaved of father.
- A. In Thee the fatherless findeth mercy. Hos. 14:3. Thou art the Helper of the fatherless, Psalms. 10:14. When my father and my mother forsake me, then the Lord will take me up. Psalms. 27:10; also, Ex. 22:22-24; Heb. 13:5-6; John 14:15-27.
- Q. Give some verses appropriate for widows.
- A. A Father of the fatherless, and a judge of the widows is God. Psalms. 68:5. The Lord preserveth the strangers; He relieveth the fatherless and widow: Psalms. 146:9; also, Isa. 41:10-14; I. Pet. 5:7-10, John 13:7; Jer. 49:11.
- Q. Give some verses appropriate for bereaved parents.
- A. Jesus said "Suffer the little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God." And He took them up in His arms, put His hands upon them, and blessed them. Mark 10:14-16; also, Matt. 18:10-14; 19:13-14; Psalms. 127:1-3; II. Sam. 12:15-23.
- Q. Give readings appropriate for mixed mourners.
- A. For sisters, John 11; others, Psalms. 20; Psalms. 23; Psalms. 18:28-36, I. Thess. 4:13-18; Psalms. 90; Job. 14; I. Cor. 15:47-58.

- Q. Describe Bimlipatam Field.
- A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. R. E. Gullison and Miss Ida Newcombe; other workers, 10; churches, 1; church members, 67; S. Schools, 2; average attendance, 100; population, 260,000.
- Q. Describe Bobbili Field.
- A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. M. L. Orchard, Mrs. M. F. Churchill, and Miss Bessie Churchill; other workers, 3; churches, 1; church members, 160; S. Schools, 3; average attendance, 106; population, 260,000.
- Q. Describe Chicacole Field.
- A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. I. C. Archibald and Miss M. E. Archibald; medical work, Dr. (Miss) Ivy Gibson; other workers, 10; churches, 1; church members, 79; S. Schools, 4; average attendance, 100; population, 293,000.
- Q. Describe Palconda Field.
- A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. J. C. Hardy and Miss W. Eaton; other workers, 3; churches, 1; church members, 21; S. Schools, 1; average attendance, 20; population, 215,000.
- Q. Describe Parla Kimedi Field.
- A. Missionaries, Miss Maude Harrison and Miss E. Gaunce; other workers, 8; churches, 3; church members, 130; S. Schools, 2; average attendance, 50; population, 325,000.
- Q. Describe Rayagadda Field.
- A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. W. S. Tedford and Miss Cora Elliott; other workers, 3; churches, 1; church members, 19; S. Schools, 2; average attendance, 15; population, 87,000.
- Q. Describe Savara Field.

A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. J. A. Glendinning; other workers, 7; churches, 1; church members, 137; no S. S. reported; population, 300,000.

Q. Describe Sompert Field.

A. Field just opened; missionaries, Miss Martha Clark and Dr. Zella Clark; population 150,000.

Q. Describe Tekkali Field.

A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. Gordon Barss, Miss Alberta Patton and Miss Lois Knowles; other workers, 5; churches, 1; church members, 65; S. Schools, 1; average attendance, 30; population, 230,000.

Q. Describe ~~Vizagapatam~~ Field. **Vizianagram**

A. Missionaries, Rev. R. Sanford, D. D., Rev. and Mrs. H. Y. Corey and Miss Laura Peck; other workers, 8; churches, 1; church members, 129; S. Schools, 6; average attendance, 120; population, 280,000.

Q. Describe Vizagapatam Field.

A. Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. W. V. Higgins, and Miss Helena Blackadar. This field with its High School, that last year had 793 students, recently came to our hands. The school is under the care of Mr. D. Lazarus, a native Christian.

The Telegu church (Nov. 1911) reported 23 members and the English church, 19. There are also two Sunday Schools, with about 200 scholars.

Two churches, one Telugu, the other English, were organized there last year. There is a population of about 400,000 on this field.

Number of churches, 13; number of S. Schools, 23; number of missionaries, including ministers' wives, 39; missionaries on furlough, 4, viz.—Rev. and Mrs. S. C. Freeman, Sackville, N. S., Miss Flora Clarke. Moncton, N. B., and Miss Barbara Mould.
