When we demand the free and unlimited coinage of both gold and silver at the present legal ratio of 15 to 1, without any other nation, we demand the standard silver dollar shall be a full legal tender, equally with gold for all debts, public and private, and we favor legislation which will prevent the demonetization of any kind of legal tender money by private contract.

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WILL GO TO OTTAWA TO-DAY.
