

# THE KICKERS KICKED AS USUAL.

Riflemen Who Couldn't Hit the "Bull" |

The Funny Part Was That the Offiances Had Just Made Ten "Bulls" Straight, and Was Somewhat Embarrassed-Nevertheless, as in Duty Bound, He Kicked - The

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—(Special.)—The Dominion Rine Association matches were continued to-day in good weather, and the scoring was high all round.

W. H. Davidson of the Sth Royal Rifles of Quebec was put up to kick at the defectiveness of the ammunition. Capt. Davidson had just come from the ranges with a possible of 10 "bulls" to his credit at the 600 yards range, and, therefore, he had some difficulty in making but a case. However, speaking for the army of kickers, Capt. Davidson kicked on general principles, affirming that many of the shells are far from perfect. He suggested, however, that the ricochet shot and the double target be done away with.

The Corby Cup was won in 1895 by Lieut, Munro, 44th; in 1896 by Capt. W. H. Davidson, Sth R.R., and in 1897 by Capt. McMicking, R.L. This year the three shot for absolute possession and the plum fell to Capt. Davidson with 75. The scores in the match were:

COL. HENRY'S ARREST

Is Likely to Lead to Sensational Developments in Dreyfus Case. Paris, Aug. 31.—The arrest of Lieut.-Col. Henry, on the discovery that he is the au-thor of an important letter which figured in the Dreyfus case, is one of the most sensathe Dreyfus case, is one of the most sensa-tional developments in the whole of this extraordinary affair. . Colonel Henry has been, throughout, the fighting champion of the army against Colonel Picquart, with whom he fought a duel. This new develop-ment evidently entirely alters the aspect of both the Dreyfus and the Zola cases, and practically nullifies the evidence of Generals Pellieux and Bolsdefire, and the declara-Pellieux and Boisdeffre, and 'he deciarations of the Minister of War, M. Cavagnae in the Chamber of Deputies. In fact, some people believe that perhaps the real turning point in the Dreyfus case has been reached, and that the arrest of Colonel Henry w'll lead to a revision of the trial of the prison-

point in the Dreyfus case has been reached, and that the arrest of Colonel Henry will lead to a revision of the trial of the prisoner of Devil's Island.

It appears that so soon as M. Cavagnac assumed the office of Minister of War, he charged the official bureau to make a thorough research of the Dreyfus case, and lit was this inquiry which resulted in the discovery of documents lately read in the Chamber of Deputies, by M. Cavagnac, showing that proof of the guilt of Dreyfus was forged. When Colonel Henry was summined to the Minister for War and was questioned by M. Canagnac, in the presence of General Boisdeffre and others, he at first affirmed the authenticity of the noriminating document. But, when discrepancies were pointed out, he at first admitted adding sentences and finally confessed to fabricating the whole letter. It is affirmed, however, that this discovery has not changed M. Cavagnac's belief in the culpability of Dreyfus, but the Minister is determined to punish all the guilty parties, no matter what their rank or position may be. Colonel Henry is to be tried by court-martial.

Colonel Henry confessed to having committed forgery, "owing to the absolute necessity for finding proofs sgalust Dreyfus," and it is understood that the document in question is the letter which has hitherto been alleged to have been written by the German Military Attache to the Italian Military Attache in October, 1896. Finally it is said that when the interpellation in the Dreyfus case was coming up in the Chamber of Deputies this letter was secretly communicated to the court-martial and was the chief evidence upon which Dreyfus was convicted.

The anti-Dreyfus papers are dumbfounded at the arrest of the Colonel, while, on the other hand, the papers which have been supporting the proposition to reopen the Dreyfus case are jubilant. They now demand the immediate release of Colonel Picquart, who is imprisoned on charges connected indirectly with the Dreyfus affair, and they also insist upon a revision of the

and they also insist upon a revision of the Dreyfus triat. When Count Esterhazy was informed of the arrest of Colonel Henry and of his admission he exclaimed, "This is too terrifying."


