TWENTIETH YEAR

THE DEFENCE OF CANADA IS GEN. HUTTON'S SCHEME

Commanding Officer's Report is a Startling Document for the Much-Talked-of Canadian Militia to Read.

He Recommends the Practical Abolition of Our Corps as They at Present Exist, and the Creation of a Canadian Regular Army.

Also, He Would Have a War and Naval Department for Canada, with a Commander-in-Chief—A Report to Make Lieutenant-Colonel Denison Lift up Both Hands.

Ottawa, March 27.—(Special.)—The annual report of the Department of Militia and Defence was laid on the table of the House to-night. The report of Major-General Hutton opens with a "narrative of the events of the year 1898," which recapitulates the changes in establishment, appointments, camps of instruction, etc. With respect to the latter the Major-General says: "I personally inspected a camp of instruction at Aldershot upon Sept. 15 and 16. I regret to say that the standard of military knowledge, the system of organization, the equipment of the troops and other matters connected with the camp were far from satisfactory. The standard of military efficiency was generally not equal to that which my experience with similar troops in other parts of the empire had led me to expect, and was certainly inadequate to the national requirements of Canada.

Results of System.

"This condition of things was not, in my opinion, due to the troops themselves, but to the faults of the system and organization under which they labor. By the employment of a carefully selected and well-instructed staff, by an improved system of degree of military training, it may be safely predicted that the camps of instruction in 1899 will better satisfy modern militia requirements."

The Toronto Field Day.

With regard to the Toronto field day last September the General says: "It was satisfactory to note the great interest and military spirit displayed by all ranks. I hope that during the current year it may be possible to develop a system of practical instruction for the troops of the Dominion generally, which the officer in command of No. 2 military district has initiated to the great benefit of the city corps and under his command."

Proposals for 1899.

The Major-General's annual report contains proposals for the current year, 1899, in which he says: "I beg to recommend, as essential to the efficiency of the troops under my command, that the whole of the active militia be embodied for training during the current year. I attach the greatest importance to this embodiment being carried out, as it affords the best opportunity for the troops to become familiar with the regular system of company, regimental and brigade training, which can be carried out under proper supervision."

Under His Personal Command.

"The troops thus concentrated would be formed into brigades and divisions, with a properly constituted staff under my own personal command. The most suitable officers available would be selected to command and to fill the requisite staff appointments. An opportunity would thus be afforded for giving practical instruction to those senior and responsible officers upon whom the command and administration of the troops would devolve in case of national emergency. It is, moreover, of great importance to have the training carried out even by personally becoming acquainted with the efficiency and military value of all regiments under my command."

Instruction in Tactics.

"Relying upon the military instincts and zeal of the troops, I propose to carry out a higher degree of training than in previous years, and during the last two days to include tactical instruction, in which the city regiments shall be invited to take part."

Twelve Days Too Short.

"The period of training sanctioned by the estimates of 1898-9 of 12 days is for rural corps admittedly inadequate, more especially for the field artillery and cavalry. I trust that the training to be carried out during the summer and fall of 1899 may be

Mounted Rifles For Manitoba.

He recommends that a regiment of mounted rifles should be raised for Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, with headquarters at Winnipeg.

Montreal is Again.

The general recommends the establishment of Montreal as a military centre, and the building there of barracks to accommodate one squadron Royal Canadian Dragoons; one company of garrison division Royal Canadian Infantry; one company of the Royal Canadian Artillery; and one company of the Royal Canadian Engineers. He also recommends the establishment of a permanent military headquarters in Montreal for the district staff, also requisite.

To Improve Military Bands.

Under the head of "Regulation," the General recommends regulations for clothing and recruiting, and the establishment of a pay department. He urges the organization of an army medical service and recommends the re-organization of the band of the Royal Canadian Artillery, and that a good permanent military band be maintained in Montreal, forming a military school of music for improving the existing military bands.

The Yukon Troops.

He recommends the recall of the troops from the Yukon, or if it is desirable to maintain there, to increase the permanent force equal to the number of men in the Yukon, as it is found to be impossible to supply the troops with the necessary equipment for officers and non-commissioned officers with reserved force.

Military Situation in Canada.

In concluding this portion of his report the Major-General recommends an amendment of the Militia Act system, and offers his views on the present condition of the military forces in Canada, which he says they can only be characterized as "unsatisfactory in the extreme."

Militia Not An Army.

The military force of Canada is not under the existing system an army, in its true sense, it is but a collection of military units, without cohesion, without staff and without those military departments by which an army is moved, fed, or ministered to in sickness.

Stores Are Too Short.

With regard to arms, stores, etc., he says: "With the exception of blankets and tents, there are not sufficient stores to enable a military force of any size to be placed in the field. A reserve of arms and ammunition is required based upon the recognized scale. The custody, maintenance and issue of warlike stores and military equipment is in the hands of a civil department. The anomaly of placing in the hands of civilians the custody of military stores has already been pointed out. A system which removes from the knowledge and supervision of a general in responsible military command all these stores which have been provided by the Government for the use and efficiency of the troops under his command, will, I trust, be amended."

An Ordnance Store Corps.

"The difficulty can be met without extra expense by converting the existing civil department into an ordnance store corps which could then adopt the war office regulations for their custody and maintenance of stores, etc., be under military supervision. There are no stores of reserve clothing. The military administrative departments enumerated above would be required at the very outset of the emergency and it is absolutely impossible to organize them at short notice upon the standards from their technical character, require a most thorough knowledge on the part of the personnel if they are to fulfil their functions successfully. It would be unreasonably to expect that the officers and men could be expected to attend the training of the very responsible administrative duties which only careful preparation by previous training can fit them to discharge with any hope of success."

No Factor of Defence.

"The fact, however, that the training of rural battalions has not been made a more definite and certain regular and efficient factor of the whole militia undetermined by the training of the rural troops is an annual fixture it would be folly to suppose that the militia of Canada as a whole can attain the satisfactory standard of military knowledge, or be reckoned as a solid and dependable military force. The period of 12 days allowed for training of all arms is all too inadequate for infantry, but when it is taken into consideration the fact that it is only a matter of time before the militia will be called upon to take the field, it is not surprising that the militia is not a factor of defence."

Principles of Defence.

Under the heading, "Principles Governing the Defence of Canada," the General says: "It may be assumed that two factors govern the future organization and administration of the Militia Act system, and these are: (a) The defence of Canadian soil. (b) The power to participate in the defence of Canada in the event of a general war. It is justly claimed for Canada that she is now a nation. In establishing this claim it is necessary to show that the Canadian people are not a collection of separate provinces, but a united people, and that the responsibilities of self defence, the maintenance of law and order, and the duty of a State. It would indeed be hardly consistent with the responsibility of Canada as a nation, and a vigorous nation, were to abdicate the responsibility of self defence, and to leave the defence of the country to the strong arm of the Mother Country to supply that which her own sons are so eager and willing to furnish for themselves."

To Aid the Empire.

If public opinion has been rightly judged, there is at the present time, a universally held determination to uphold at all costs the integrity of the Empire, and at all hazards to maintain its interests against the aggression of any foreign power."

TARTE'S TART TRICK

How the Minister of Public Works "Worked" The Hansard Report.

HIS WHISPERED MURMUR

Was Inserted, Although the Keen-Eared Scribe Did Not Hear or Write it Down.

Mr. Davin Makes a Kick in Commons and Explanations Are Made—Dr. Spruille, the Veteran Member For East Grey, Dresses Down the Government, and Shows How They Got into Power on Specious Promises.

Ottawa, March 27.—(Special.)—There have been more speeches to-day and more variety in them than on almost any day since the opening of the session. Three Liberals and four Conservatives spoke, the most distinctive address of the day being that of Dr. Spruille, who made one of the very best speeches he has ever delivered in Parliament, and was warmly congratulated by his friends at its conclusion. The Liberals have come back into the debate and are answering the Conservatives, and as more than a dozen of them are slated to speak, it does not look as if the debate would be closed when the House adjourns on Thursday night over the Easter holidays.

MR. TARTE HAD NERVE

Instructed a Hansard Reporter to Insert Words Not Heard in the House.

Ottawa, March 27.—(Special.)—On the opening of the House to-day, Mr. E. J. Demers, the newly-elected member for Lewis, was introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Solicitor-General Fitzpatrick, and took his seat amid ministerial cheers.

Mr. Charlton again introduced for about the dozenth time his bill to amend the Criminal Code by raising the age of consent.

Before the orders of the day were called, Mr. Davin rose to a question of privilege, and called attention to the official report of the debate last Friday in which he found it printed that the Minister of Public Works had interrupted his speech by saying, "And a scallawag is a scallawag."

Continuing, Mr. Davin said: "These words were not so far as I know, pronounced by the Minister of Public Works. If they were, they were an interruption in my speech, and, as the suggestion is made that he had inserted them then, I am told that the Minister of Public Works saw that he had not inserted the words that I had used. I may have made a mistake."

BREWERS' BILL DISCUSSED

In Committee of the Whole House at the Ontario Legislature Last Evening

GOVERNMENT HAD 10 MAJORITY

Mr. Marter Moved the Six Months' Hold-Messrs. Foy and German Criticise the Bill

The Ontario Legislature went into committee late last evening on Hon. Mr. Harcourt's bill respecting the brewers' and distillers' and other licenses, but not until the whole financial policy of the Government had been arranged by Mr. Marter, who Government ministered all their forces by spoke for three hours. The members for North Toronto concluded his speech by moving an amendment to the Attorney-General's motion, that the Speaker leave the chair for the purpose of the committee. The Government ministered all their forces by votes or pairs, with the customary result, that they had a majority of 10. The figures were: For the amendment, 27; against, 37. Not much progress was made with the bill when the committee reported. A large number of other measures were advanced a stage or finally disposed of.

Brewers and Distillers Licenses. The Attorney-General asked what would the brewers in the country districts say if the Government lessened the tax on but as a means of increasing the revenue of his way to fixing the amount in accordance with either the suggestions of Mr. Foy or Mr. German.

Member For North Toronto. Mr. Marter (North Toronto) made a speech generally condemning the financial policy of the Government, and pointing out the fact that in spite of their boasted surplus the Government had to resort to what was practically direct taxation. The Government, he said, occupied their present position on false pretences.

Unnecessary Taxation. Mr. Marter enlarged on the lack of economical management and neglect of the railways, and on the fact that the Opposition both in and out of that House. These supplementary taxes were unnecessary. The Government certainly might have waited until they saw the result of the present year's taxation. They were not justified in their present course, for the amount of \$2,750,000 that last year was only \$2,750,000. They must, he argued, be something more than this, something that had not yet come to the surface. He ridiculed the Provincial Council's suggestion that all the corporations and businesses proposed to be taxed should be taxed on the basis of their net income.

Not For the Public Benefit. There was, he repeated, no necessity for these supplementary taxation bills. It was not a temporary impost, for whenever the Government took extra money for these purposes they also took it. Nor would the public receive any benefit from the money would be used for the purpose of the Government.

Scandalous and Iniquitous. Mr. Marter said that a great wrong had been done to Toronto in the manipulation of these revenue bills. The city had, in fact, been deprived of \$47,000 assessed taxes annually. By legislation the Government wished to deprive the municipalities of the right they had hitherto enjoyed—the taxation of companies to which the cities had given franchises. This the hon. member termed "scandalous" and "iniquitous." The electorate would bear this in mind, and the answer would be given at the poll, where no one need expect to be returned as a supporter of the Government that had done the worst act that had ever been inflicted on the cities. (Opposition applause.)

TO GET ONTARIO'S SUBSIDY

Government Will Aid the Ontario, Hudson Bay and Western Railway Company.

What This and the Rival Company Have Asked From the Provincial Legislature.

The Ontario, Hudson Bay and Western Railway has asked for \$2000 and \$4000 per mile for land for 50000 a mile in cash, or \$5000 and \$4000 acres per mile. The Hudson Bay Railway Company, the company endorsed by the Toronto Board of Trade.

hostile aggression or foreign interference. (a) For the defence of Canada soil there are two essential things, garrison troops for the protection of certain pre-determined strategic centres.

DEFENCE OF THE LAKES. As a most important element in the defence of Canada, the necessity of the naval defence of Lakes Erie and Ontario. The Militia Act of 1880 contemplated the formation of a naval militia brigade and I strongly recommend that steps should be taken with that intention.

CHANGES REQUIRED. The following changes are required in order to carry out the principles indicated above: (1) The position of the general officer in military command to be amended.

THE SWISS ORGANIZATION. He refers to the organization in Switzerland as a good model for Canada and in conclusion says: "It would be necessary for the troops comprising an army to be trained in the manner in which they are trained in Switzerland."

FACTS ARE GIVEN. Some interesting facts are given in appendix "B" as regards the expenditure upon military defence which is undertaken by foreign nations, by Great Britain and by the United States.

War Eagle Sold Up To \$3.60 On Local Board—Payne Also Advanced Yesterday.

MINNEHAHA LEDGE AT 200 FEET.

East Kootenay Shipping Ore to Trail—Review of Rossland Development Work.

In the local mining market to-day business was on the whole quiet, but the feeling was firm. War Eagle advanced sharply on the news from the west regarding the management's existing shipping policy. Payne and Cariboo were also stronger.

Good News Re Minnehaha.
A private wire just received in the city announces that the Minnehaha management has caught the lead in the drift at the 200-foot level. It will be remembered that the shaft is a vertical one, and that the ledge was formerly intersected by drifts at former levels. The tapping of the ore body at the 200-foot level makes the Minnehaha two-thirds as deep a mine as the Cariboo. The ore at the 200-foot level is reported high grade.

Republic Canadianized.
E. Strachan Cox has received the following wire from Montreal: "Republic capital, \$2,500,000; \$2,000,000 to present shareholders; \$500,000 in treasury. New certificates will be issued within two weeks. Transfer office at Montreal; company controlled here."

Since the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass railway the mines of East Kootenay are beginning to ship ore to the West Kootenay markets. The Fort Steele Inspector says:

Seven car loads of ore were shipped to the Trail market last week. The 81st Eugene shipped six cars and the Lake Shore one. About 140 tons in all were shipped.

Wabigoon News.
The Wabigoon, Ont. Star contains a description of the independence mine, which lies on Carlton Lake, in the Manitowish district, between the Upper and Lower Manitowish lakes. The main shaft is down 80 feet at which depth there is a body of no less than 41 feet 6 inches of mineralized ore. There are 2000 tons of ore on the dump, which the management claims runs \$10 to the ton, and the owners expect to make something good out of it.

Development in Rossland Camp.
The following items are taken from The Miner's weekly review of development work in Rossland camp:

Le Roi: On the Le Roi they are progressing as fast as possible with development work and in a very short time, probably the beginning of this week, will increase the output to 200 tons or over per day. Yesterday's shipments of ore amounted to over 400 tons, but that represented some cars that had been left over from the average shipments during the week were about 350 tons. Work on the Black Bear shaft is progressing rapidly and also on the Black Bear tunnel, so as to put it in such a shape that all the timber can be gotten in that way. Two new 80-horse power engines are to be put in to take the place of the old ones in the Black Bear shaft. At present the main shaft is not being deepened, but the management is drifting as fast as they can on the ore bodies at the 800-foot level.

Commin-Kootenay: In the Commin-Kootenay, the upraise from No. 4 tunnel to No. 3, where a fine body of ore was recently discovered, is being rapidly completed and should be completed this week. The corporation is driving ahead on tunnels of No. 4 and is raising up from No. 1 to No. 4. About 40 men are now at work on the property.

Wanda and Trail Creek: This company has during the past two weeks sold 50,000 shares of its independent stock in a position to resume work. It is fully equipped with cabins, blacksmith shop, tools, etc., and arrangements for shipping entered into for a contract for 50 feet of work.

Virginia: The management is reticent as to the progress of the work on this property and is not inclined to take either its stockholders or the public into its confidence. There is said to be a nice showing of ore in a distance of 30 feet, and a drift was run from the shaft on this level for a distance of 140 feet further in order to reach the side line of the iron mask. The iron mask has been located in the shipping ore bodies at the east end. It was stated on the streets yesterday that on the 500-foot level a ledge of ore had been encountered. Drifting is in progress on this level. The superintendent of the Virginia was seen yesterday and stated that he had nothing to report.

Maseco: This is one of the properties operated by the Big Three companies. The 2 tunnel is being extended by two shafts, and is now in a distance of 30 feet. There is no material change in the character of the rock passed through since the last report. The mine in No. 2 is being driven 60 feet. Work will be resumed on this mine this week, as the Ledgerwood hoist is in position and is ready for operation. Three shafts are at work in No. 3 tunnel, which is now in 530 feet, and good prospecting is being made. It is not expected that the ledge will be encountered in this tunnel for at least 200 feet. During the past week small strings of ore have been encountered.

Southern Belle and Snowshoe: These are two of the properties of the Big Three Company. Work is being carried on as usual, with a tone of eight miles. The tunnel is being extended, and is now in a distance of 225 feet, and some excellent copper ore is being met. The mine is being constructed, and is now down to a depth of 80 feet, following the hanging wall. There is considerable ore in the mine, which carries a good percentage of copper. Work is being continued on a depth along the hanging wall until a depth of 100 feet has been reached. Then the ore body will be crossed to the foot wall.

Jumbo: In tunnel No. 3 at a depth of 120 feet a strike of iron ore has been made. This has been crossed for a distance of about 10 feet. The ore is similar in character to that encountered in the upper levels of the property. It is thought that in the centre of this ore body will be found pay ore, and on the other side of this pay ore a casing of low grade ore has been encountered.

Victoria Triumph—Olau's Jeldness returned yesterday from a visit to Sophie Mountain and while there he inspected the Victoria-Triumph workings. He inspected the recent strike and also all the development work that was done during the past winter. Mr. Jeldness is very much pleased with what he saw on the 100-foot level. The strike there was made after a crosscut had been run a distance of 20 feet and a drift of 22 feet. There he saw an ore body three feet wide in a vein that is seven feet in width. The ore consists of copper pyrites and oxides, carrying good values in gold. The ore, he says, seems to be higher grade and more extensive than a shipping grade. All the ore in the Victoria-Triumph, he says, are of a high grade. There are other explanations of the property that have good showings of ore.

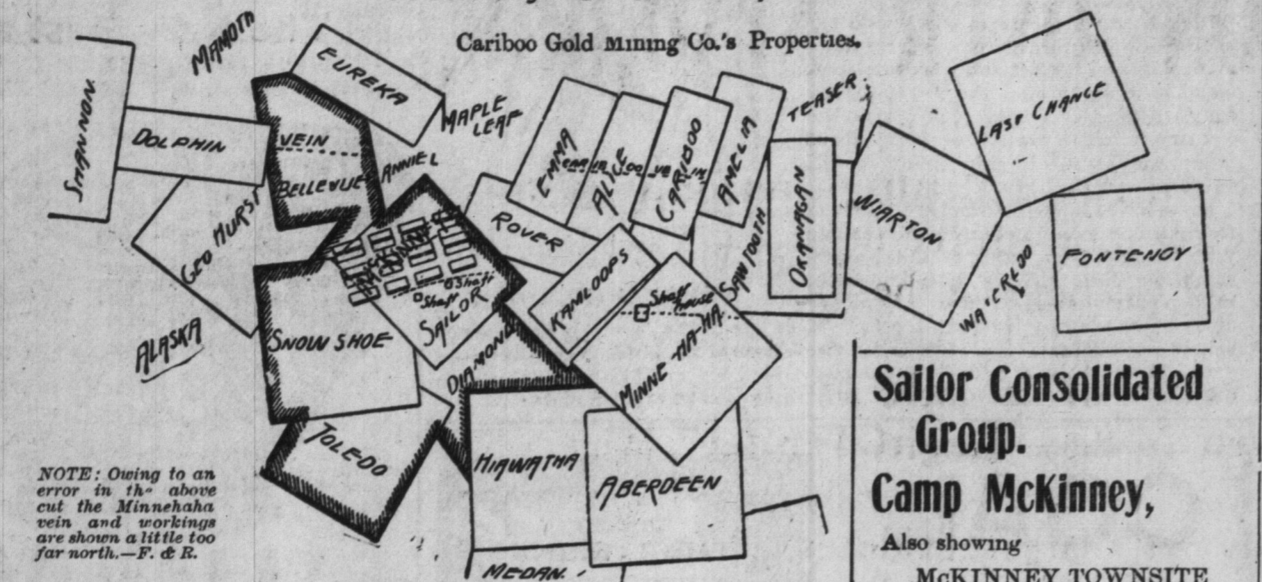
Mr. Jeldness says there are two parallel mineral zones in that section, one of these is located the Victoria-Triumph and on the other the Velvet. There is a quite a distance, he says, between the two mineral zones, and two others outside of them. Mr. Jeldness believes from this peculiarity of the formation that when the depth is reached the mineral zones will be narrow and the minerals in them become concentrated. The ore bodies will be larger, and that this will produce bonanza mines. This theory is being borne out in the lower workings of the Velvet.

Evening Star—The Evening Star will soon join the list of shipping mines of the camp. Four or five tons are being taken

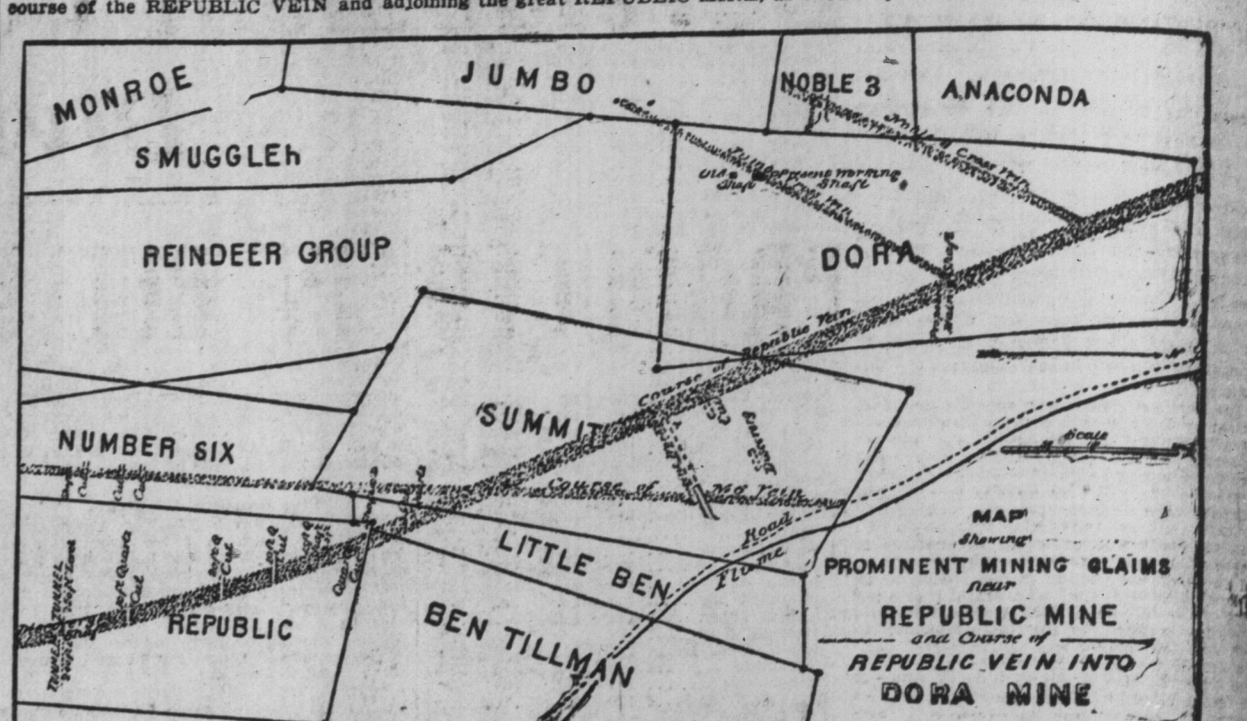

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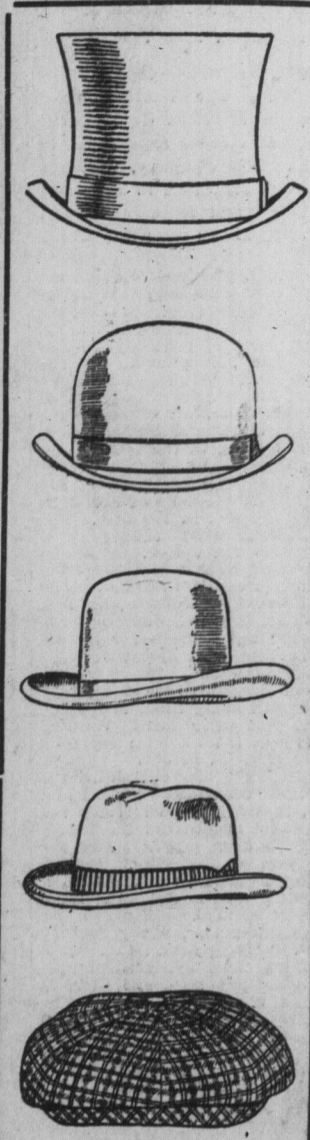

WHEAT MARKETS BUOYANT

Sharp Advances in Chicago Pit Yesterday.

Opening Was Above Saturday's Close and Prices Rose All Day—Liverpool Cables Up—Reports of Crop Damage in the Southwest—Notes and Gossip.

Monday Evening, March 27.
Liverpool wheat futures to-day were strong, and closed 1/4 to 1/8 per cent higher than Saturday's close.

Paris wheat declined 10 to 15 centimes to-day, and flour 10 to 20 centimes.

Chicago saw an active session in the wheat pit to-day. The strong cables caused futures to open at a fractional advance over Saturday's closing figure.

Imports of wheat into the United Kingdom the past week: Wheat, 224,000 quarters; maize, 175,000 quarters; flour, 216,000 quarters.

Exports at New York to-day: Flour, 5550 barrels and 11,776 sacks; wheat, 163,636 bu.

The Liverpool grain and provision exchanges will observe the Easter holidays by closing Friday, March 31, Saturday, April 1, and Monday, April 3.

Visible and Afloat.

As compared with a week ago, the visible supply of wheat in Canada and the United States has increased 75,000 bushels; that of corn has decreased 60,000 bushels, and that of oats has increased 240,000 bushels.

There are now on passage to the United Kingdom 26,000,000 bushels of wheat and flour, and 6,000,000 bushels of corn.

Australasian Crop.

20,780,000; 1895-6, 23,111,000 bushels. Victoria, South Australia, and New Zealand crops are double those of last year, and South Australia less than half of last season. This year's crop shows an aggregate surplus of 24,000,000 bushels, with only 10,000,000 required for intercolonial trade, leaving 14,000,000 bushels to be exported to Europe, or carried forward into next crop year.

India's Crop.

The Bengal Presidency is reported to have a better wheat crop than last year, the crop being estimated at 135, against 105 in 1898. A London cable to Chicago says that the condition in all India is 7 1/2 per cent better than a year ago.

Russian Exports.

Beerholm says: There has been more disposition on the part of Black Sea shippers to sell wheat, but their price is still tentatively too high, and is persisting to discover how and why Russia, with an officially reported crop of 440,000,000 bushels, and a consequently assumed export surplus of at least 160,000,000 bushels, should be so slow to let her wheat go, and be satisfied with exports at the rate of 40,000,000 bushels per annum, which is the rate since Aug. 1. (As Russia has already exported 100,000,000 bushels of wheat, her export ratio for the year is evidently in error.)

United States Winter Wheat.

With respect to the condition of the winter wheat, The Chicago Times-Herald publishes reports from over 450 counties, 12 important fall wheat States, and summarizes them as follows: They show that the crop is very promising, and that the yield in 1899 are as low as 35,000,000 to 40,000,000 bushels. The Washington estimate for 1898 was 13,000,000 bushels.

The Cincinnati Price Current says that the details of the March report of Statistics of the United States of wheat crop of 1898 was 56.9 bushels, which makes his estimate equal to 640,400,000 bushels. This wheat per bushel is the lowest in 12 years; the highest average weight was in 1887 and 1891, in both of which years it was 38.5 pounds.

The large deliveries and exports of wheat and flour during the current crop year indicate that the Government estimate of 575,000,000 bushels was rather under than over the actual quantity in bushels of 60 pounds.

On Saturday 100,000 bushels No. 2 red wheat about all the stock of this grade now in Chicago, was sold to go to St. Louis. The Modern Miller says: Over the whole winter wheat belt the wheat plant is backward, but gives promise of a fair average crop.

The Toledo Market Report says: While we are not crop-killers or calamity-howlers, there is in our judgment, sufficient evidence of a great loss in the coming crop. The Chicago Inter-Ocean says: It is generally believed that there will be enough damage done to the wheat crop to more than offset the increased acreage, and that it will be impossible to raise another bumper crop this season.
