DESPERATE FIGHTING AGAIN.

Lord Methuen's Column Routed 2500 Boers From the Heights Near Gras Pan.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—This afternoon the War Office posted the following despatch dated Cape Town, 12.30 p.m., from Gen. Forester-Walker:

Lord Methuen reports that he moved yesterday (Saturday) at 3.30 a.m. with the Ninth Brigade, the Mounted Corps, the Naval Brigade and two batteries, the guards following with the baggage.

Near Gras Pan, about ten miles north of Belmont on the railway line to Kimberley, 2500 Boers with six guns and two machine guns opposed him.

The action began at 6 a.m. Our batteries fired shrapnel very accurately till the heights seemed clear. Then the naval brigade and infantry advanced to the assault.

The fighting was desperate until 10 a.m., when the heights were carried. The Boers retreated on the line, where the Ninth Lancers were placed to intercept them. The result was not known at the time of telegraphing.

The artillery took immediate advantage of the enemy's retirement.

Early in the action 500 Boers attacked our rear guard. The brigade met this and also protected the flanks. The naval brigade acted with the greatest gallantry and suffered heavily, but no particulars are yet known.

The enemy showed the greatest stubbornness and must have suffered grievously. Twenty were buried. It is known that 31 were killed and 48 wounded. More than fifty horses were found dead in one place. One battery fired 500 rounds.

Our force must halt one day at Gras Pan to rest and replenish ammunition.

The force worked splendidly and is prepared to overcome any difficulty.

The Naval Brigade, the Royal Marines, the Light Infantry and the 1st Battalion of the North Lancashire Regiment especially distinguished themselves.

Regarding Thursday's fight, 81 Boer killed are accounted for. Sixty-four wagons were burned. A large quantity of powder, 50,000 rounds of ammunition and 750 shells were

POTATO SHIP ON FIRE. Steamer Imperial, owned by Walker & Son, was partly burned Saturday morning. Ont. 25.—The steamer Imperial, running between Windsor, Amherstburg and Pelee Island, and owned by Walker & Son, was partly destroyed by fire about 6.30 o'clock this morning, while lying at dock here. The crew were at breakfast. The watchman reported smoke in the engine-room. Before the crew could do anything, the flames burst out, and in a few minutes the upper works with a cargo of potatoes and fish from Pelee Island, the fire from spreading until the upper cabin was completely destroyed by the fire. On reaching this depot the first section stopped for the purpose of shunting on to the switch. The back section, which had been following in the rear quite unknown to the train crew, crashed into the front one. The collision resulted in one of the cars being crushed into kindling wood, as well as tearing up about fifty feet of the track. The men fortunately escaped without injury. It was lucky for the G. T. R. that the accident occurred at this spot, as trains through the town have been held up with a large gang of workers and the debris was cleared away by 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The two broken cars were burned.

MORINE IS ASKED TO RESIGN. Minister of Fisheries in the Newfoundland Cabinet is Out With Premier Winter. St. John's Nfld., Nov. 25.—Governor McCallum to-day called upon Fisheries Minister Morine to resign from the Winter Cabinet. Premier Winter having demanded his resignation, alleging that internal differences existed. Mr. Morine had previously declined to resign on the Premier's demand, asserting that it was unjust. Responsible for the request, to take over his personal regret, while thanking Mr. Morine for his valuable services.

A WIDOW'S SON KILLED. Fourteen-Year-Old Hilsen of Ad-Ad-Ad Was Shot in the Abdomen and Died. Tottenham, Ont., Nov. 25.—A sad case of accidental shooting, which terminated fatally, took place Saturday evening. Bernard, the 14-year-old son of Mrs. Bernard Hilsen, Ad-Ad-Ad, was shot in the abdomen and died. He was carrying a number of companions, and after he had crossed a small stream, one of the party handed him his gun, muzzle foremost, to take over. He reached for it and as the owner let the charge go the bullet struck the boy in the abdomen, penetrating the abdomen of young Hilsen, where medical attendance was procured, which, however, was of no avail, as he died about 10 o'clock that night. Much sympathy is felt for his widowed mother.
