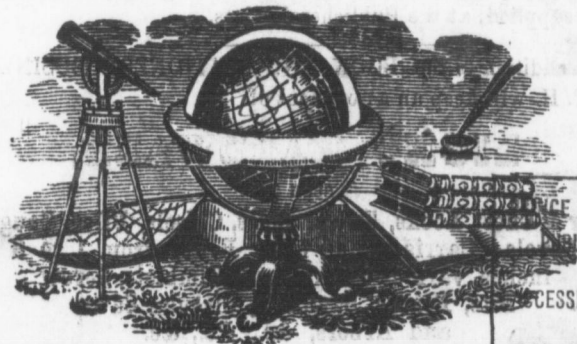

ECLIPSES.

There will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon, this year:—

I. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, February 27th, in the evening, on the southern limb. It will be visible here for a short time before it ends. The moon will rise partially eclipsed at 5h 27m, and the Eclipse will end at 6h 57m.

II. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, March 15th. The sun will rise partially eclipsed, on the southern limb, and will end here at 8h 25m.

III. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, August 24th, invisible in this Island.

IV. A total Eclipse of the Sun, September 7th, invisible in this Island.

TRUE TIME.

Two kinds of time are used in Almanacs—*clock*, or *mean time* in some, and *apparent*, or *sun time* in others. *Clock-time* is always *right*, while *sun-time* *varies* every day. People generally suppose it is twelve o'clock when the sun is due south, or at a properly made noon-mark. But this is a mistake. The sun is seldom on the meridian at *twelve o'clock*; indeed, this is the case only on four days of the year: namely, April 15, June 15, Sept. 1, and Dec. 25. In this Almanac, as in most other Almanacs, the time used is *clock time*; and the difference in the time of the sun's coming on the meridian is given in the fifth column;—this affords a ready means of obtaining correct time, and for setting a clock by using a noon-mark, adding or subtracting as the sun is slow or fast.

Old-fashioned Almanacs, which use *apparent* time, give the rising and setting of the sun's *centre*, and make no allowance for the effect of refraction of the sun's rays by the atmosphere. The more modern and improved Almanacs, which use *clock-time*, give the rising and setting of the sun's *upper limb*, and duly allow for refraction.

only a few very long particles, though few of them are visible in the naked eye, their number is immense. Arrago believes that they cannot be seen from any distance than passing within the influence of our planetary system, and Kepler held that they were as numerous as the stars in the sky. They shine by the light of the sun, and in all their appearances show that they are composed of ice. They are not seen by us, but are a multitude of enormous ice-cornices and snow with incomparably rapidity, and have, in some instances, been known to separate into two distinct bodies. Some of the most remarkable events have been witnessed of late.

On the 1st of January, 1847, a comet was discovered by Mr. Schumacher, which he supposed to be nearly twice that size, and which, for its revolution around the sun, was calculated to be 2,000 years, and the apogee was distant, 50,000,000 miles. It was seen, which was long termed a comet, was observed while the planet was in the constellation of Leo. Another, that of 1845, was remarkable for the length of its tail, which at one time was 200,000,000 miles long; its nucleus was small, and its motion at the rate of 1,000 miles per hour.

COMETS.—Comets, so called from a Greek word signifying *hair*, consist of the *nucleus* or *head*—which is sometimes surrounded by a nebulous covering, called the *envelope*, or *coma*—and the *luminous train*, commonly known as the *tail*. They move round the sun in extremely elliptical orbits, and return in their path, some at short, and others

only after very long intervals. Though few of them are visible to the naked eye, their number is immense. Arago believes that there cannot be less than *seven millions* of them passing within the influence of our planetary system, and Kepler used to say they were as numerous as the fishes in the sea. They shine by the light of the sun; move in all directions; constantly change their appearance; are of such thin, transparent substance, that stars may be seen thro' them; are sometimes of enormous dimensions, and move with inconceivable rapidity; and have, in some instances, been known to separate into two distinct bodies. Some of the most remarkable comets ever known, are those of 1680, 1811, 1843, and those known as *Halley's* and *Beila's* comets. That of 1811 is supposed to require more than *three thousand* years for its revolution around the sun; its perihelion distance was computed to be 98,700,000, and its aphelion distance, 40,121,000,000 miles. Its envelope, which has been termed a *head-veil*, was *bluish green*, while the nucleus itself was *pale red*. Another, that of 1843, was remarkable for the length of its tail, which at one time was 200,000,000 miles long. Its nucleus was small, and its motion at the rate of 1,317,600 miles per hour.

DRAINAGE OF THE HUMAN SYSTEM.—Erasmus Wilson, a distinguished physiologist, counted out the perspiratory pores on the palm of the hand, and in a square inch found 3,528, with each of which a little tube a quarter of an inch long was connected; making the length of tube in a square inch 882 inches, or 73½ feet. On the pulp of the fingers the number of pores was a little greater; on the heel the number was 2,268,

and the length of the tube 47 feet. Taking 2800 as an average of the number of pores in the square inch over the whole surface of the body, and 700 consequently as the length of the tube in inches, the number of square inches of surface in a man of ordinary size being 2500, there would be 7,000,000 pores, and 1,750,000 inches of perspiratory tube; that is, 145,833 feet, or nearly 28 miles. How important the necessity of attention to the skin, lest this drainage be obstructed.

BRITISH NAVY.—The British fleet in commission on the 1st of January, 1857, numbered 261 ships, 5087 guns, and 48,798 men, as compared with the last year of the war, Jan. 1, 1856, when the strength was 325 ships, 6231 guns, and 63,335 men. The difference between the war and peace fleet, according to the above figures, is a reduction of 64 ships, 1153 guns, and 14,537 seamen, marines, and boys.

AN INCH OF RAIN ON THE ATLANTIC. — We have been struck with that passage of Lieut. Maury's "Physical Geography of the Sea," in which he computes the effect of a single inch of rain falling upon the Atlantic ocean.

The Atlantic includes an area of twenty-five millions of square miles. Suppose one inch of rain to fall upon only one-fifth of this vast expanse. "It would weigh," says our author, "three hundred and sixty millions of tons; and the salt which, as water, it held in solution in the sea, and which, when that water was taken up as vapor, was left behind to disturb equilibrium, weighed sixteen millions more tons, or nearly twice as much as all the ships in the world would carry at a cargo each. It might fall in a day; but occupy what time it might in falling, this rain is calculated to exert so much force—which is inconceivably great—in disturbing the balance of the ocean. If all the water discharged by the Mississippi river during the year were taken up in one mighty measure, and cast into the ocean at one effort, it would not make a greater disturbance in the equilibrium of the sea, than would the fall of rain supposed. And yet, so gentle are the operations of nature, that movements so gigantic are unperceived."

EGGS FOR BURNS.—The white of an egg has proved of late the most efficacious remedy for burns. Seven or eight successive applications of this substance, soothe the pain and exclude the burned parts from the air. This simple remedy seems to us far preferable to collodion, or even cotton.—*Scientific American.*

Work, work, work! I hear
you say; and I'll tell you
what, reader, it is a blessed
thing to be able to work; and

though it may sometimes be
hard, it would be "harder
still to have no work to do."
Daniel Webster, with all his
deep wisdom,—and he had
more than one man's share,
—never said a truer thing
than this: "I say, sir, it is
employment that makes peo-
ple happy." So now let us
be at it. May has important
duties, and we must discharge
them. Put in the seed for
the garden vegetables as early
as possible. Grafting is best
done early in May, before hot
suns prevail. If suckers
come out, do not cut them off
until October, as their leaves
help the action of the sap,
and shade the trunk of the
tree. Look out for and de-
stroy the caterpillars—nests
and all. Wash your trees
with soap-suds, if you have
not done it. I do not advise
any thing stronger on fruit
trees, as it is apt to hurt
them. Plant fruit and forest
trees before the leaf buds
come out. Encourage your
family to raise flowers. Deep
ploughing is said to be the
best preservative against in-
jury from drought.

I have always advised you
to look well to your kitchen
garden;—it saves the beef
and pork barrel, and gives
you wholesome food.

June is the month of roses

Whew! warm work this, thermometer away up among the nineties! Warm work in the middle of the day! Then let us take an early start in the morning. Come, now, as the sailors say, look out for squalls, and get the ground tackle ready—sickles, scythes,

rakes, forks! Hurrah for the hay-fields!

The three H's — Haying, Harvesting, and Hoeing — must all have their attention this month. I have told you before this, you must tickle your land with the hoe, if you want your crops to laugh at harvest time. Nothing else will do. It keeps down weeds, allows the air, dews and rains to penetrate to the roots, and helps against drought. Haying is almost a trade by itself; to know when to cut at just the right time, how to cure to save all the juices, requires thought and judgment, skill and attention. Watch insects on your trees, their habits, &c., and learn how to destroy them.

BUTTER.—Will salt preserve butter? No. It is a great mistake. Every pound of salt put in butter over what is needed to give it flavour, instead of bringing a cash return to the butter maker, proves a positive loss of 25 per cent. a pound. Butter is not preserved by salt. It will keep just as long and just as sweet as olive oil, without salt, if no other substance is incorporated with it. It is the caseine of milk that spoils the butter, and unless free from that no art can keep it sweet. Butter should be churned at 65°, and immediately afterward reduced to 40°, and the less it is touched by human hands the better. It must be worked cool, either with or without washing, as that is a mooted question, until absolutely free

The Harvest Moon, and the Hunter's Moon—the first occurring in September, and the latter in October—it may not be amiss to explain to our

younger readers here. In the month of Sept. the moon rises on six or eight successive nights apparently about the same time. This annual peculiarity in the moon's rising was observed by the ancients long before astronomers were able to explain the cause. On account of the convenient light it afforded them in harvest time, it was called the *Harvest Moon*; and that in October—for a similar peculiarity is then observable—the *Hunter's Moon*. The causes of these phenomena are now well understood, and can be explained with a globe. But moon-gazing will never keep the pot boiling—so let us to business.

The superstitious man will go to the priests of *Orpheus* every month to get himself initiated into their mysteries; and if his wife is not at leisure to accompany him, marches in the front of several old women, who bring his children after him in their arms. Upon *extraordinary* occasion, he hires a set of priestesses to come and purify him all over.

of butter-milk or particles of sour curd; add then just enough, and no more, salt to suit the taste of the consumer. The salt must be pure. and one ounce to ten pounds of butter will be sufficient. Then pack the butter solidly in any cask of sweet wood, or stone pot, so as to exclude the air, and just so long as the air is excluded the butter will remain sweet.

My friend, I want you to take a little bank stock—it

pays well—and the bank I want you to invest in will be handy, and give you great accommodations. A small sum invested in these will yield good interest. When the snow comes this and next month, tread it well down about your trees and bushes, to protect them from the mice.

SOAP FOR WASHING. — Two and a half pounds of bar soap put in with one ounce of borax into four quarts of water; set the vessel in a warm place, but not hot enough to boil. When all is dissolved, it is quite ready for use. Soak the clothes over night, and use the mixture as other soap. It whitens the clothes, takes less rubbing, and leaves the hands in a better condition than common soap.

POLICE COURT.—This Court is composed of His Worship the Mayor and one Councillor (the Councillors taking their turn weekly), or, in the absence of His Worship, two Councillors—the Councillor for the week presiding; it is open for business, in the City Hall, every day (Sundays and Holidays excepted), from 11 o'clock a.m. to 2 p.m. City Licenses are issued from this Court, by the Mayor and City Clerk. The Police Station attached to this Court is at the rear of the City Hall, and is accessible day and night.

MAYOR'S COURT.—This Court, established for the purpose of adjudicating in cases of Small Debts, is composed of His Worship the Mayor, with two Councillors; or, in the Mayor's absence, three Councillors. Its sittings are held at the City Hall, on the first Friday in each month, with power to adjourn to the following day. The last day of issuing Summonses for these monthly sittings, is the Wednesday week previous to the said first Friday. 
