Petrograd, May 11—An official statement last night said:--"In the region of Uzsok Pass the enemy made a fruitless attack on Satur-day. Serried enemy columns attacked impetuously a position held by two of our companies in a sector of the Javorina mountain chain on the slopes above Tomnitza. Philadelphia, May 10—President Wilson gave to a gathering of 6,000 naturalized Americans tonight the first intimation of the course which the United States government probably will pursue in the ituation resulting from the loss of more than a hundred American ities on the British liner Lusitania. He spoke by implication, but bis hearers interpreted his remarks as meaning that, while the United States would remain at peace, it would seek to convince Germany of the injustice to mankind of the tragedy of last Friday. "America," said the president, "must have the consciousness that on all sides it touches elbows, and touches heart, with all the nations of mankind. The example of America must be a special ex-mple. It must be an example not merely of peace, because it will to fight, but because peace is a healing and elevating influence of the world, and strife is not. "There is such a thing as being so right that it does not need to convince tothers by force that it is right." The president made no direct reference to the Lusitania tragedy, but the

The presi-dent pointed out the true goal of right American citizenship to be loyalty, not to the country of one's birth, but to the land of one's adoption.




