Austria Reported To Have Conceded All To Italy

All Demands Said To Have Been Granted and War Averted

That is Situation as Reported, at Least For The Present -- Developments at Eleventh Hour May Keep Italy Out of War

Rome, May 11—Austria is reported to have accepted at the eleventh hour all the demands made by Italy, thus averting war between the two countries, at least for the present. It is known that an important message arrived from Vienna late last night, and was immediately taken to Foreign Minister Sonnino by the secretary of Prince Von Buelow, the German ambassador, who has served as intermediary in the Austro-Italian negotiations.

After the call of the German attaché, a report was circulated that Austria had accepted all of Italy's demands. This was semi-officially confirmed from German diplomatic circles, it being said that "Austria has made concessions of a most important character."

UNCONFIRMED REPORTS

Paris, May 11—It is being persistently rumored in Paris that Germany and Austria-Hungary have already decided or are about to declare war on Italy in anticipation of such action on her part direct. This report, however, has received no confirmation.

Another rumor is that the Italian government has signed an agreement with the allies, Great Britain, France and Russia, to take part in the war not later than May 26. This rumor also is without confirmation.

Other Reports

Rome, May 11—Although negotiations with the Central Empires still are pending, and there is a bare possibility that the influence of former Premier Giolitti may avert war, military preparations pointing to Austria as an inevitable antagonist are so thorough and vigorous that a conflict seems unavoidable.

Even discussions among the opposition parties have virtually ceased. Only the irreconcilable socialists whose depu-

ties met in the chamber today still oppose Italy's participation in the war, and their attitude is believed to be guided more by a desire for consistency than because of opposition to a war.

Paris, May 11—The Milan correspondent of the Escorial telegraphs that a despatch to the Secolo from Lugano, Switzerland, says the police of Lugano have been instructed to make preparations to protect Prince Von Buelow, German ambassador to Rome, when he passes through that city on his way home.

London, May 11—The press bureau has given out from the foreign office a statement enclosing a sworn statement from two Dutch newspapers in which the charge is made that British prisoners of war were shot by German troops.

The document comprises statements alleged to have been made to the newspaper by two German deserters, to the effect that the Bavarian regiments were ordered by Prince Rupprecht to

take no prisoners, under pain of severe punishment. All had to be shot.

In one case it is alleged that forty British prisoners were buried alive in a hangar, the Germans concerned being named. Another instance deals with twenty-four British prisoners, alleged to have been shot against a wall at a village near the front.

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WASHINGTON MAY BE HEARD FROM TODAY; BUT SOUND FROM THERE IS NOT WARLIKE

Washington, May 11—The sinking of the steamer Lusitania and the situation resulting from that act, continued today, to hold the undivided attention of official Washington. Chief interest centered in the White House where it was expected President Wilson would give his advisory opinion on the Lusitania disaster.

President Wilson returned early today from Philadelphia. One of his advisers said the president's chief aim would be to determine first no matter how vigorous the course adopted.

Specialists who would be that policy of the United States still continued today. President Wilson has for the last three days, been giving constant attention to the matter, realizing that the American people wish a speedy in-

decision as to what action will be taken. Messages continued to reach the White House today, expressing confidence in the president's ability to handle the situation.

Secretary of State Bryan and other officials of the state department today awaited receipt of the German government's note expressing the deepest sympathy at the loss of American lives in the Lusitania disaster, but placing responsibility upon the British government's plan of starving the civilian population of Germany.

Unofficial advice said that the communication had been cabled to the German embassy here. Secretary Bryan had already received a communication from Count Bernstorff, the German ambassador, but this, he said, he regarded as an expression of regret on behalf of the ambassador himself.

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RUSSIAN ROLLER IS HEARD FROM AGAIN

Strong Movement Begun and Austrian and German Forces Are Being Driven Back With Heavy Losses

Geneva, May 11—A Tribune despatch says the Russians have begun a strong movement at Tarnow as well as in Courland, and on the Strv, driving back the Austrian and German forces with heavy losses.

Petrograd, May 11—An official statement last night said: "In the region of Usok Pass the enemy made a fruitless attack on Saturday. Serious enemy columns attacked impetuously a position held by two of our companies in a sector of the Javorina mountain chain on the slopes above Usok. The enemy's losses were so heavy that heaps of bodies interfered with the fire from our trenches."

"Our troops, in spite of the enemy's machine gunfire, left their trenches and swept the enemy from the whole region."

"On the same day, after a desperate fight, the enemy forced a Russian detachment near the village of Zalevki to retire to the left bank of the Dnieper. Our vanguard having crossed the Dnieper, attacked the enemy on the Chabourki front to the mouth of the Strv. We took 1,300 prisoners, one gun and many machine guns."

ALLIES ADVANCE ON GALLIOLI PENINSULA

London, May 11—The allied troops on the Gallipoli Peninsula continued their advance on Friday and Saturday, according to an Athens despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. They are reported to have occupied important positions in spite of stubborn resistance by the Turks. The latter's losses are estimated at 45,000. The hospitals at Constantinople are said to be so crowded that wounded are being sent to Konieh, Asia Minor.

MORE SERIOUS FOR THE TURKS

Toronto, May 11—A London special to the Globe says that Athens reports that the Russian Baltic fleet, which is under continuous bombardment in the Southern Baltic, in the region of Danzig, is reported to have left from the town of Gdansk. The town of Gdansk has been abandoned by the Turks and that 2,000 wounded Turks have arrived at Constantinople.

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Touching War Incident in Fredrickton—Electrical Power From Minto Coal Mines

Fredrickton, May 11—Private Frank McMinimian of this city, who is with the 1st Battalion, Dorset Regiment, writes that his brigade participated in the severe fighting at Hill 60 and received many congratulatory telegrams on their work. The letter was addressed to Private McMinimian's mother, who died last week.

A meeting of the provincial government has been set for this evening.

Fred Brown, convicted of pocket peddling of liquor has been fined \$150 or seven months imprisonment.

A letter received today from Bandman Sioat of the 12th Battalion, mailed at Folkestone on April 28, says "we are still here. All the members of the battalion are going to the front except the colonel and five officers and the band."

The water in the river today is about on a standstill. The drives are reported making good progress.

The board of trade last evening heard a report from a committee on cheap power for Fredrickton. The committee seemed to think the most feasible plan would be to have an electrical power generated at Minto coal mines, twenty-seven miles from here, and transmit it by wires. It was decided to spend \$800 in investigation by experts.

Fishermen Missing

Halifax, N. S., May 11—The American schooner Patriot, which arrived last night, reports two of her crew, Andrew Silva and Charles Antonio, missing in their duties at sea since Saturday morning. Another of the crew was found after twenty-four hours missing.

Fabala Inquiry May 20

London, May 11—The board of trade has fixed May 20 for the beginning of the inquiry into the sinking of the British passenger steamship Fabala on March 28. The inquiry will be held in Westminster.

WAS LIFE BELT SUPPLY SHORT?

Startling Suggestion in Despatch From Queenstown

THE LUSITANIA TRAGEDY

Reported Reason Why so Many First Cabin Men Passengers Were Lost—Cunard Office Reports Deaths 1,134

Queenstown, May 11—The body of Albert Thompson, Toronto, brought in by an admiralty trawler last night, was found drifting with wreckage near the coast not far from the scene of the Lusitania disaster, which leads to the hope that additional bodies may be found in that vicinity. Seven unidentified bodies also were landed at Baltimore, forty-seven miles southwest of New York, but the weather conditions are such that it is considered probable many more will be found in the immediate vicinity. All hope of finding further survivors now has been abandoned.

The current of from two and one-half to three knots races around Old Head, Kinshale, and this has been suggested by a stiff east wind which at the end of eight or nine days, may carry bodies ashore around Cape Clear, on the West Irish coast. The bodies, if they are still afloat, would have brought bodies ashore on the Atlantic coast of Cornwall, England.

The Cunard Steamship Company, after much trouble, has sent a tug to the scene of the disaster, which will be run into the nearest cove and inform Cunard officials here if a single body is found.

There are indications that the heavy death toll among the passengers in the Lusitania was due to a scarcity of life belts, many of the men having given the life preservers they had obtained to help- less women.

Greaves Arrested

London, May 11—A Renter despatch from Athens says that the torpedoing of the Lusitania has aroused profound indignation throughout Greece. The newspaper Hestia says: "While undertaking to give lessons in principles of humanity to the crew of the Lusitania, the Germans commit the greatest crimes against humanity."

Figures Now 1,134

London, May 11—The Cunard Company last night made the following official announcement: "The number of passengers aboard the Lusitania was 1,255. The crew numbered 651. The survivors number 772. The death toll numbers 1,135. These figures are subject to slight variation."

SEA DISASTER HAS NOT PREVENTED SAILINGS

New York, May 11—No general cancellation of the sailings of steamers of passengers from New York to European ports has followed the sinking of the Lusitania, according to agents here. NAMES OF 2,955 SO FAR IN CANADIAN CASUALTY LIST

Ottawa, May 11—The rolls of dead and missing Canadians following the battle of Ypres, increase steadily in the latest casualty lists received at the militia department.

FRENCH, DESPITE GERMAN ATTACKS, MAKE FURTHER GAIN

Paris, May 11—In the face of severe German counter attacks, the French have made further gain north of Arras, where the allies are striking against the Germans over a twenty-six mile front, according to an official statement issued by the French war office today.

Another German raid has been launched against Dunkirk, killing twelve persons. Not only has the French pressed forward north of Arras, but they took German prisoners and were successful in checking a German counter assault.

St. John Young Man Who Joined Calgary Rifles—War News in Soldiers' Letters

Arthur Merritt Magee, son of Mr. and Mrs. John B. Magee, of Mechanicburg street, is the latest St. John boy reported wounded. The word was conveyed in an official form post card from France to his mother, which says that he was wounded but is doing well.

Mr. Magee, who is twenty-three years old, was a member of the staff of the Royal Bank of Canada and was attached to the branch in Calgary when war was declared. He enlisted with the first contingent. So far his name has not appeared in the official casualty lists published here and his family has not been notified yet by the department.

How Tippett Was Wounded

In a letter to his brother, Harry Tippett of Fairville, "Bud" Tippett tells of being through the big battle of Neuve Chapelle. He is with the signalling corps and was engaged in laying a cable under fire and had several narrow escapes, one of his comrades being killed at his side.

War Horse Shipments

FEAR MORE GIRLS WILL BE OUT OF EMPLOYMENT

New York, May 11—The Vacation War Relief committee, organized last fall to aid working girls out of employment, finds itself, it is announced, in serious straits financially at a time when its greatest effort is demanded. Instead of being able to provide work for hundreds of young women who, it is believed, will be thrown out of work during the summer, the committee has been obliged, owing to the lack of funds, to close one of the workrooms where girls were given temporary employment during the winter, and others may be closed for the same reason.

The clothing made at these workrooms is not placed on the market in competition with manufacturers. Recently the young women have made more clothing than there is demand for, and great quantities of the clothing are accumulating.

Mrs. Made Weimore, chairman of the committee, said that indications are already manifest that the number of unemployed girls would be greatly increased in the summer months.

CANADA IN THE WAR

MORNING NOTES OF THE WAR

Lieutenant Arthur Asquith, son of the prime minister, who joined the para-volunteers at the outbreak of war has been wounded, but not seriously, at the Dardanelles.

The saloons in Liverpool, Eng., were closed at six o'clock last evening on account of anti-German riots.

Victoria, B. C. is under martial law as the result of renewed attacks upon German establishments. A guard has been placed around the government house to prevent any disorderly scenes, due to the fact that Mrs. Barnard, the wife of the lieutenant-governor, is the daughter of a German.

Continuing the celebrations of the 100th anniversary of the German street Baptist church last night a congregational social was held at the rooms of the Brotherhood of the church. Reports of the work of the last five years were given, from the membership standpoint by the church clerk, Stanley E. Fisher, and Donaldson Hunt, secretary of the trustee board, gave an account of the work of the trustees and a financial statement, while T. H. Belyea gave a report of the Sunday school. In the course of an interesting musical programme solos were given by Walter Edgson, Miss Andur, Percival N. Bonnell, Mrs. Porter, wife of Dr. Porter, a brother of the pastor of the church, who is visiting St. John from Dallas Texas, and by Mrs. Griffiths. Addresses were given by Dr. Porter, Rev. D. Hutchinson, D.D., and Rev. F. H. Wentworth, Waterloo Street Baptist. Selections were also given by the orchestra, and refreshments were served by the ladies of the church.

BRITISH LIQUOR REGULATIONS

London, May 10, 10.30 p. m.—The House of Commons this evening passed the second reading of Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George's bill to amend the Defence of the Realm Act. The bill originally was designed to place a heavy surtax on wines, spirits and beer, but under pressure from the Irish party the provisions were amended to giving the government control of the sale of liquor in areas where munitions of war are being made.

Under the bill a central committee will be set up for Scotland and England. It will act on the recommendations of local committees of employers and workmen in the districts affected.

Mr. Lloyd George has promised to appoint a committee to inquire into the charges of drunkenness among workmen, and all parties, including the Laborites, have expressed their satisfaction with the bill.

The government will absolutely control the sale of liquor in selected districts, including that dispensed in clubs and grocery stores. A commission under the chairmanship of Lord Dundee will deal with the question of compensation to the liquor dealers for their losses.

CHANGE TO JOIN MOUNTED RIFLES
 Major McLean, Here Today, Wants 30 Men—Army Service Corps Here to be Recruited

Once again the call sounds for men in St. John to serve their king and country overseas. Major C. H. McLean, squadron commander of the 6th Mounted Rifles, stationed at Amherst, N. S., was in the city today, and said that he required about thirty men for his unit. He would like to hear from any volunteers. They could address applications to him at Amherst.

Regarding the draft from the 6th for overseas duty with the 55th Battalion, Major McLean said that there had been a fine spirit of willingness on the part of the men to serve where they were needed. Of course the preference was for mounted duty, but that was not the desire of those who joined the colors of the 5th as soldiers was shown by the hearty response made to the appeal for men to fill the gaps. With the soldiers of this unit the answer was voluntary, but was substantial. The whole machine gun section to a man volunteered. As to what the future plans of this unit were, regarding their summer training and location, Major McLean was unable to say, but they were progressing most favorably in their drill and today were at a high standard of efficiency.

Army Service Corps
 That No. 7 Co. C. A. S. C. is to be brought back to its former strength before the depletion of the ranks by the transfer of so many of the unit to No. 5 Co. under Major P. T. McKean, is the belief of those in touch with militia circles in St. John. Some local provisional officers are now taking a course in Halifax to qualify for commissions and the expectation is that when this has been completed a call for volunteers will be made to join the unit which will be mustered at Sussex. The officer commanding the company at present is Lieut. Gunter Frederick, but there are only a few men left to its strength. Lieut. Hendy of Halifax, of the C. P. A. S. Co. is now in Sussex, directing the army service operations there, and is being assisted by Staff Sergeant Patterson, Quartermaster Sergeant Devennie and others, while S. Q. M. Sergeant Jennings is attending to the local office work.

Regimental Badges
 Thus far only a few citizens have subscribed to the fund for the purchase of the badges for the 26th. Further donations could be welcomed, and the Women's Canadian Club would be glad to receive contributions.

Many Soldiers Ill
 Amherst News—Owing to the increased number of sick soldiers in our hospitals it has been found necessary to procure the services of another building for the use of the military. This will make three buildings devoted to a medicinal cause outside of the regular Highland View Hospital. The house recently secured for this purpose will be known as the "Convalescent Hospital."

Lieut. Tingley Wounded
 Lieutenant Frank Harvey Tingley, wounded in France, is the youngest son of A. J. Tingley, the well known I. C. official of Moncton and Mrs. Tingley, and is twenty-four years of age. Since the Canadian expedition left Canada last fall, he has held various responsible positions in connection with the 2nd Brigade of Artillery, to which the Moncton Battery belongs, and for several months past has been attached to the 8th Battery under Major Anderson. When last heard from, he was acting as "Observing Officer" for the 8th, being stationed in a special "dig-out" a few yards behind the infantry trenches and about a mile from the position occupied by the guns of the battery.

KINGSTON WILL EDUCATE CHILDREN OF HER SONS WHO DIE AT FRONT
 Kingston, Ont., May 11—The city council last night decided to erect an incinerator for the burning of the city's garbage. The civic utilities will consume and pay for all the steam generated. The council also decided to give to the children of all Kingston soldiers killed at the front a high school education.

POLICE FORCE CHANGES
 Two more policemen were missing from the local ranks this morning. Policemen Jones and Wade. The former left for his home in Woodstock, owing to his wife's illness. Jones joined the force about two months ago, and Wade last December.

Martin R. Bowes was sworn in this morning and will join the force immediately, replacing ex-policeman Wade. He is a resident of Golden Grove, and is quite well known throughout the city.

TO THE CAMPS
 Yesterday's Amherst News says:—Eighty-two of the 6th Mounted Rifles will leave this week for Sussex to go into camp in that town prior to being sent to France as reinforcements to the Canadian Regiments that suffered such heavy losses in the battle of Ypres. One hundred and twenty-five men of the 40th Battalion are under orders, so it is understood, to leave Amherst this week. From all parts of Nova Scotia, men in this battalion have received orders to mobilize at the huge military camp at Aldershot.

ANOTHER SUCCESS
 The three act comedy, The Chaparron, so successfully presented last week in the Seaman's Institute for the benefit of the Girls' Club of the Playgrounds Association was repeated last evening in City Hall, Carleton. There was a large attendance and the audience greatly enjoyed the evening. Miss Emma Heffer, under whose direction the entertainment was given deserves great credit for the success with which it was presented.

CARDS TOURNAMENT
 In their rooms in Coburg street last evening the members of St. John Council, K. of C. conducted a successful cards tournament. There were many entries, and much interest was evinced in the play. J. O'Neill won. The prize was a fountain pen.

PLAN TO GET THE FIELD KITCHENS
 Project of Presenting Four to 26th Battalion Being Taken Up Energetically

Today's despatches contain the information that Lieut.-Governor MacGregor of Nova Scotia had presented to the Nova Scotia regiment field-kitchen equipments, the gift of the people of that province. While the sister province has "stolen a march" on New Brunswick in this splendid contribution, there is a movement on foot to make a similar gift to Colonel McAvity's men. At a meeting held a few mornings ago, a local committee was selected to take preliminary steps in organizing a campaign that should place four field-kitchens with the 26th Battalion, if not before it sails for the old country, at least before it crosses the channel into the war zone. The plan is to have small but energetic committees in each of the cities and important towns of the province who will solicit and receive contributions. The whole scheme will be explained through the medium of operating newspapers, and by printed matter generally. It is also hoped to enlist the assistance of the motion picture theatres of New Brunswick and thus bring the matter before everybody in a short space of time.

The amount necessary to purchase four field-kitchens is slightly in excess of \$5,000, and really not a large sum when the whole province of New Brunswick is the field of operation. The funds, it is thought, should be forthcoming in a short space of time and, indeed, in order to secure them in good season, the cash should be quite readily subscribed.

The advantages and comforts brought about by the inclusion of field-kitchens in a regimental outfit are obvious. Instead of men eating out of their haversacks until it is possible to light fires and secure hot food, these marching kitchens with fires continually burning, dispense hot soups and stews to the men at all hours if required, but particularly the mid-day meal, which, under ordinary army conditions, would be a cold one. It is thought, therefore, that if the sum of \$5,000 will ensure this to our boys of the 26th Battalion, eager to stand in defence of dear ones at home, it will be quickly subscribed. The campaign has really not commenced yet, but will be heard of more within the next few days.
