MME. GAILLAUX TELLS FULL STORY

Why and How She Shot Paris Figaro Editor

THREAT BY HUSBAND

Idea of Call at Paper Office Came From Remark of M. Caillaux--Lost Head When She Faced Calmette in His Editorial Room

(New York Sun.) Paris, March 27--Mme. Caillaux told today the detailed story of how she killed Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro, and the causes which drove her to the act. In the course of the examination she said she took upon her shoulders the burden of avenging her husband for the attacks on his honor and integrity because she believed his country needed him and she was willing to sacrifice herself for his sake.

Tells Story Coolly. When the interrogation began Magistrate Bouchard asked Mme. Caillaux to describe fully her actions on Monday, March 16, the day Calmette was shot. The prisoner, answered in a very collected manner, laying stress on each point which tended to prove her assertion that she had no intention of killing M. Calmette. She said:

"About 10.30 a. m. Pierre de Fougere, sub-director of the Protocol, telephoned and asked at what hour my husband and myself were going to the dinner at the Italian embassy. I replied about 8.30 and added: 'I'm counting on you to assist me in placing the guests for the official dinner at the Ministry of Finance on March 28.' I then telephoned to my hair-dresser to come at eleven o'clock. My manure came at eleven. Three-quarters of an hour later I went to the office of M. Gaillard, a dentist, and made arrangements with him for another visit on Wednesday afternoon at 2.30."

"It was then, midday, and I went to the Ministry of Finance to fetch my husband in the automobile for luncheon at our home. I told my husband what M. Motier, a lawyer, said about a suit against Calmette. It was to the effect that nothing could be done in the way of a defamation suit, which would drag on for a long time unless the question of deal with the matter was raised and also that the assizes would acquit the defamers in triumph.

Caillaux Made Threat. "M. Caillaux was furious, and exclaimed in an excited manner: 'Since there is nothing that can be done legally I'll smash a threat from him was most serious, as it showed that he meant violence against M. Calmette.'

"It was at this moment that the idea of forestalling my husband's germinal in my brain, driving me to commit an act of violence myself."

Mme. Caillaux's line of defence was now clear. She was convinced that Calmette would publish more letters and her husband's threat acted like a spark to a train of powder. She said:

"The luncheon was deplorable and I decided to dismiss the cook and engage another the next day. When I was left alone my head began to work. I was terrified at my husband's threat. I could see that there was nothing to do but make a last effort to move M. Calmette. These emotions affected me so that I telephoned to the Italian embassy that my health would not permit me to attend the dinner."

Decided to Act. "The feeling grew in me that it was I who should make the final effort; that is, the cause of this horror should be to do or attempt anything to prevent it."

Here Mme. Caillaux stopped and sighed deeply. She seemed to be fatigued. Magistrate Bouchard asked her at what hour she left her house. She replied: "Having been invited to tea at a hotel in the Place Vendome, I put on afternoon dress and left the house at three o'clock. I went first to a servants' agency to engage a new cook to come the next day. Then I went to Gastine Renette's to buy a revolver."

Judge Bouchard asked her if she had then decided to commit an act of violence. Mme. Caillaux replied:

"Not yet, but I was strongly considering the possibility. Moreover, I intended to accompany my husband to Sarthe for the election campaign and needed a revolver because we would be automobiling at night. I gave this reason for the purchase of the revolver at the gun-seller's where I was known, as he had also supplied M. Caillaux with a revolver."

"The gunsmith first showed me an ordinary revolver at ninety-five francs (\$19). The pull was too hard and I hurt my finger in handling it so I chose

Plans For Three New Churches in North End

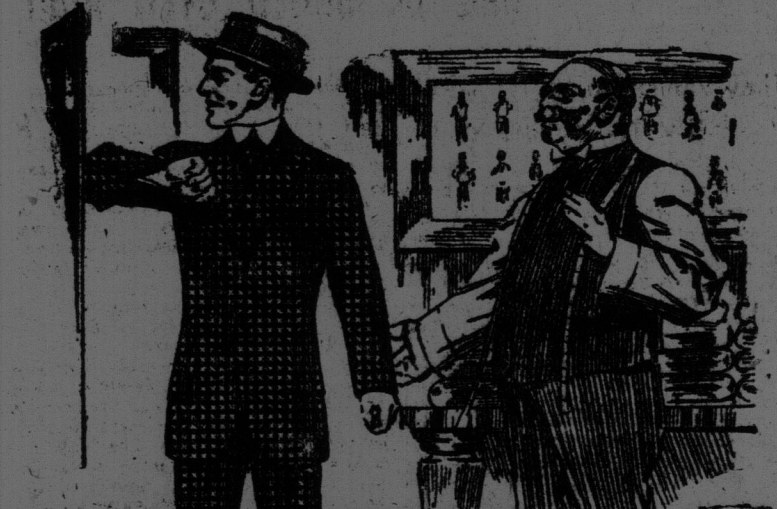
Seventh Day Adventists in Douglas Avenue, Methodists in Millidgeville Avenue and Baptists Near Victoria Street Site

Among the buildings which are to be erected in the North End this year, is at least one new church, this by the seventh day Adventists. The Methodist plan on a church building in Millidgeville avenue, perhaps this year also, in the members of Victoria street Baptist church have for several years been contemplating the erection of a new building to accommodate the increased congregation.

The Methodist Ministerial Association of the city have two lots on Millidgeville avenue in view. They feel the site is a church there with the increase in population within the last few years and the prospects of a larger number of people in the near future.

The members of Victoria street Baptist church have long felt the need of a new church. The present building is a little more than 600 people, while the congregation consists of about 400 members, according to the pastor, Rev. H. Scoble, and it is felt that they need a church which will seat at least 200. It has been proposed to build not from the present church a plain building which would seat 1,000 or more, but the body of the church and erect a stately for the accommodation of 600 or more.

It is estimated that the new building would not be very expensive as it is intended to have it as plain as possible with the addition of accommodations for a larger number of people. The plan for the new church has been under consideration for some time and it is not known when the proposal will be acted upon.

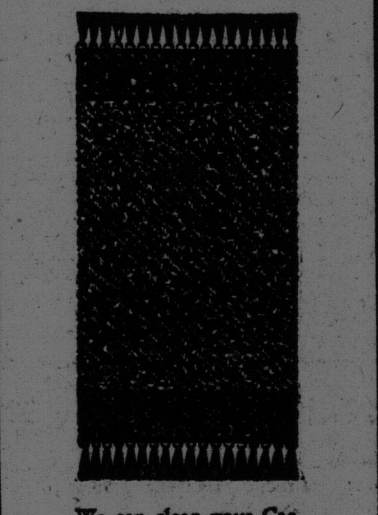

MME. CAILLAUX TELLS FULL STORY (Continued from page 2)

"The editor sent a reply that he would be unable to receive me unless he knew my name. The attendant brought a blank for me to inscribe my name. I refused to do so, as I did not want the attendant to know my identity, and so I inserted my card in an envelope. It was then 6:10 o'clock. 'M. Calmette did not keep me waiting long. I heard him say, 'Let Mme. Caillaux enter.' The words gave me a shock. I arose. 'What,' I said to myself, 'he speaks my name aloud before an attendant. All the people in the Figaro office tonight and all Paris tomorrow will know that I have come here. I cannot drink back now. This man can do nothing as it ought to be done.' 'Instinctively I had withdrawn the revolver from the case and held it in my hand inside my muff. I was already on the doorstep when a attendant announced in a loud voice: 'Mme. Caillaux.' I was at that moment in front of M. Calmette's desk. The room was much longer than it was wide and was feebly lit by an electric table lamp. Calmette turned, placed his hat on the table and said, 'Bonjour, madame.' I was deeply excited and full of emotion, but nevertheless found strength to reply, 'Bonjour, monsieur. You are doubtless aware of the object of my visit.' 'Not at all,' he replied. 'Please sit down,' pointing to a chair. 'At this moment I lost my head entirely. My husband's throat, my long neck, this half light, this man who had so deeply injured my husband and me, the man who intended to continue this work, this deadly enemy of my husband, was there before me. 'Quickly I pulled out the revolver and fired, aiming low, for I did not wish to kill him. Was I even aware I was shooting? No. I was drawn on by the sadness of the woman, by the surprise of the trigger and automatically I fired an extra shot, always aiming low. The magazine emptied. I was trembling, my hands were shaking. I saw the two bullets which it had hurled into the air. They were found at the bottom of a bookshelf. He asked: 'But did you mean to kill him?' 'Oh, no, Judge.' '—You yet fired six times. '—Without being aware of it, Judge. '—With what intention did you go to see him? '—To demand explanations. '—That you took a revolver. '—To give him warning somewhat brutally in case his explanations were unsatisfactory. I have told you how the hearing of my name called drove me to distraction. The surroundings in which I found myself have prevented me from asking for explanations. I repeat that I did not intend to kill M. Calmette. '—Mme. Caillaux did not add any expression of regret at the death of her victim. Although she wept silently, she did not shed a tear today as she told of the tragedy. At the conclusion of the examination Mme. Caillaux started to return to St. Lazare in charge of detectives. She made no effort to conceal her face as she was leaving the Palais de Justice, saying to the photographers: 'Now, are you satisfied with the magnanimous light flared. One photographer accused himself by saying, 'It is not a magnanimous light, Madame.' which she replied, 'I understand that, but now that I have been so nice perhaps you will not annoy me again.' 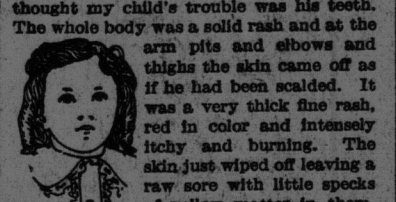
RECENT DEATHS

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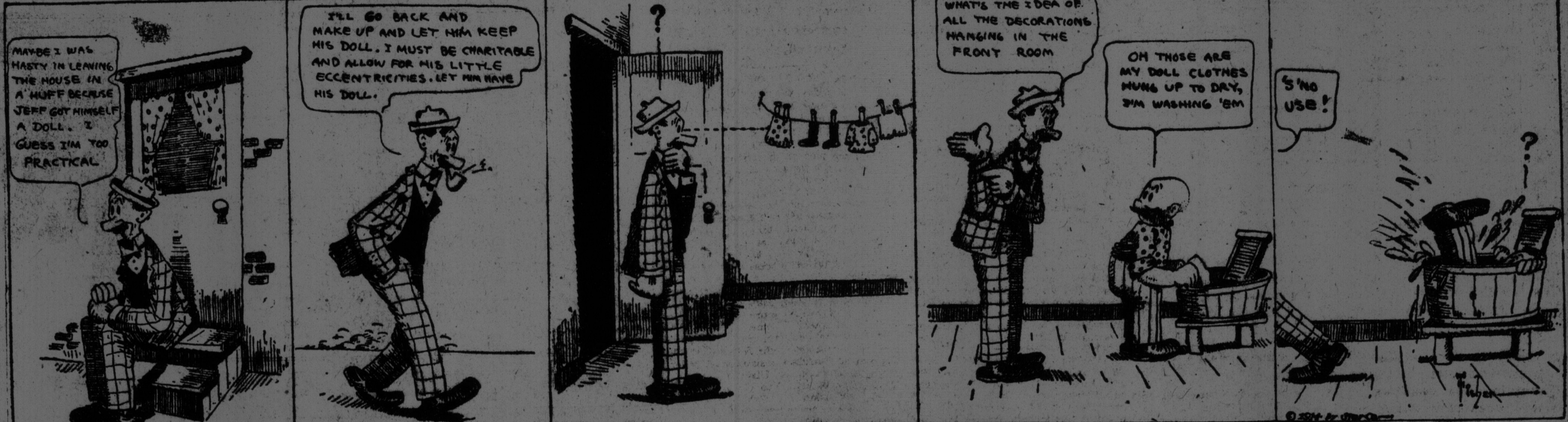

International Boxing Association

(FROM T. S. ANDREWS)

Milwaukee, Wis., March 26—Strong efforts are being made to bring about an international boxing organization, similar to the Olympic association, and it will not be surprising if something tangible results within the next year. The new York commission is anxious to see something of the kind realized. Writing from London regarding the matter, a well posted authority there says: "Nothing further has been heard about a reciprocity arrangement between the National Sporting Club of London and the French boxing Federation, but I have good grounds for stating that an announcement will be made soon. If the British governing club and the big Paris union get into agreement it will be a big step towards an international body of control. With the New York commission already exchanging ideas with Paris, it ought not to be very long before the rest of the American states' boxing commissions fall into line. Then it may be taken for granted that Australia will follow suit. Every country interested in the boxing game will by that time be a member of the international board. If ever it is formed, the board will need to go slowly, otherwise dissensions will arise. A give-and-take policy will surely be adopted, for by no other means can an international commission exist. What has been proved possible in amateur athletics can surely be realized with professional boxing. The International Olympic Council work harmoniously together and there is no reason why a similar result should not occur from an international boxing commission." Snowy Baker, an Australian boxing promoter, who is now in London, is authorized to work along the same lines, and if possible, establish a working agreement with the French and British boxing associations.

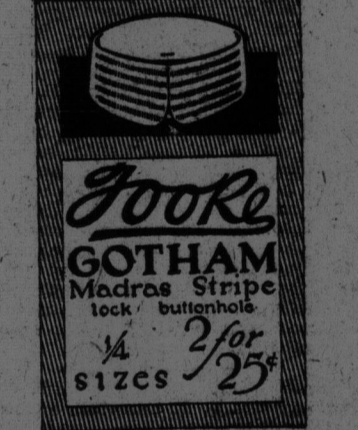

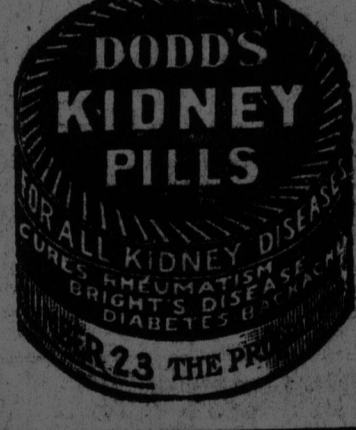

THE MAY QUEEN. Hearing in the matter of the winding up of the May Queen Steamship Company Limited, on petition of Keith A. Barber, one of the shareholders, was continued this morning before Mr. Justice McKeown. Mr. MacIntyre, accountant, and William McMullin, formerly freight agent for the company, were examined. Recorder Baxter, K. C., and Francis Kerr, appeared in support of the application, and D. Mullin, K. C., and G. H. V. Belyea appeared contra.

The United States immigration officials said that the man was not allowed to go because he had been drinking and could not answer the inspectors' questions satisfactorily and that they since learned that he was a native of Nova Scotia. The sale of the three harbor fishery lots this morning did not add a great amount to the city's exchequer. The lots were not sold at the same time as the others because it was thought that the government's plans for dredging would destroy their usefulness, but an arrangement was made for the dredging to stand over for another year and accordingly the lots, Numbers 4, 5 and 6, Navy Island, were offered for sale. Auctioneer T. T. Laatlum presided; Mayor Frink and Commissioner Agar were present as members of the fisheries committee and the city chamberlain was in attendance. The attendance of spectators and bidders was small and the offer of the lots was not received with any great display of excitement. After a few small bids they were knocked down to Andrew Lamoreaux for \$25 for the three. The same lots last year brought \$402.

EGGS CHEAPER

Eggs are steadily on the down grade. This morning in the country market there were large quantities on hand and from 24 to 26 cents was asked. The average price was 25 cents retail. It is believed from present indications they will be in abundance for Easter and that prices will be easy. Butter still continues none too plentiful, though prices were not changed today. Poultry was particularly scarce, and for fowl some dealers asked as high as 48 a pair according to quality, while other lines of poultry were equally high. The market today was none too plentifully supplied with country produce.

JOE PAGE BACK FROM RAILWAY TOWN AND IS CHEERY OVER OUTLOOK

Next Move is to Pictou County and Advance Reports Are Favorable

Joe Page returned this morning from Moncton where he had been for the last two days in connection with the formation of a maritime province professional baseball league. He said that those with whom he talked in Moncton were very enthusiastic and entered into the plan with the anticipation of making the game go. The prime supporters of the scheme are prominent business men of Moncton, including W. McMillan, L. B. Read and W. S. Smith, backed up by practically all the sport followers of the town. As a start towards the arrangements for the league, the matter of grounds has been practically decided and the exhibition grounds diamond will probably be used. It is only a short distance from the centre of the town. It is easily put in shape after a rain.
