

THE CIRCULAR TUNIC. There is nothing richer to wear with the various separate waist and coat models than a plain skirt of black cloth, or velvet. The accompanying model has a two-plece foundation, over which is draped a three-plece tunic, lapping in front.



Front gore (C) is arranged on a length-wise thread.

In making the foundation, first pleaf the back gore, creasing on slot perfe-rations, bringing folded edge to small "o" perforations and stitch. Turn un-der edge of front gore on slot perfora-tions; lap on back gore to small "o" perforations, notches even, and stitch, leaving edges free above large "O" per-foration in front gore for opening and terminating stitching at double "oo" perforation near lower edge of front gore; press pleats. perforation near lower edge of front gore; press pleats.

Now join tunic gores, first finding the line of double "oo" perforations indicating the center-front. Arrange on the skirt, centers even; then stitch upper edges together Adjust either a straight strip of canvas 2 inches wide or a webbing to position undermeath the upper edge of skirt for a stay; stitch upper edges together.

The skirt may be worn with a sash or basque girdle.



### WEEK-END CABLES TELL OF TERRIFIC FIGHTING

Paris, Oct. 25, 11.51 p.m.—The German masses at La Bassee ap pear, from the desperate efforts which they are making, to be trying to shake themselves loose from the close grip of the Allies, who menace their communications from there and from Armentieres. The intense ardor of the battle was undiminished today. Both armies received reinforcements, but the Allied lines withstood formidable shocks and delivered severe counter-attacks.

The furious nature of the conflict can be gathered from the fact that in front of one British infantry division, in a very small space, over 1,500 German bodies were found after an engagement, while 600 German prisoners were taken by the British in the course of one

La Bassee, which forms a promontory near Lille, is a very important point, covering railroads which the Germans seem determined to capture at whatever cost, but the Allies' resistance hitherto has

Both sides have suffered terribly. The Black Watch and Royal Irish regiments have been in the thickest of the fighting, and the British casualty list is very great, although much smaller than that of the Germans, who encountered them in solid formation.

There has not been a minute's respite in the conflict since Friday morning, except during the darkest hours of the night, but even then the artillery of both armies kept up a continuous duel. The battle continues its course with unabated violence near the

Belgian coast, and the Germans have been able to force themselves across the Yser, which is a sluggish, shallow river, where the Allies opposed them with a strong defence along every foot of the ground. Of the battles on the centre and lef t wing the German report does not speak, but the French declare they are maintaining their positions in the Argonne and on the heights of the Meuse, and have destroyed three more German batteries. From unofficial sources it is learned that the French have made some

advance in the mountains along the Alsace border. In Poland a very heavy battle is now in progress between the fortresses of Ivangorod and Radom, where the Germans and Austrians, who were defeated in their first attempt to cross the Vistula before the former city, have made a stand against the Russians, who have followed in the hope of destroying them.

In London is announced the sinking of a German submarine off the Dutch coast by the British destroyer Badger. Until very lately the Democrats have been serenely confident that the divided opposition would give them an easy victory and would insure the re-election of United States Senator Benjamin F. Shively. Now they are worried, Shively has been told he must come to the state and make some speeches. At this writing he is heading this way.

The republican candidate for United States senator is Hugh T. Miller, originally a college professor, then in the state legislature and later lieutenant governor under J. Frank Hanley.

Behind him are Jim Watson, who stands for all that is bad in reactionary republican politics, and former Vice-President C. W. Fairbanks, whose political record is not yet forgotten. Both are on the stump for Miller.

The Republicans are attempting a revival of Mark Hanna's "full dinner pail" campaign of 1896. While the rural element, which is 60 per cent of the population, is prosperous, the industrial communities have had a touch of hard times and the republican managers are appealing to this discontent and holding out vague but generous promises that prosperity will return if they are returned to power.

Beveridge is getting the crowds. Since September 14 he has been making an automobile canvass of the state, averaging from three to ten speeches a day.

In favor of Shively the Democrats are using President Wilson's letter of indorsement saying that Shively had helped him in carrying out his policies and asking that he and the whole democratic delegation in the house of representatives be returned. Bryan has been in the state with a few speeches to the same effect. As to the outcome of the election, predicting is difficult. Beveridge is no doubt the strongest candidate and the best man. He is brilliant and stands for those things in the economic and political development of the nation, which, in the end, must prevail. He is opposed by shrewd opportunists on the one hand, who are not above holding out hopes of ancient graft to those "business men" who are affiliated with special privilege and wish to use the government for their private gain.

President Wilson carried Indiana two years ago with 281,890 votes. Roosevelt got 162,007, and Taft 151,267. I expect to see a marked decrease in the democratic vote. Some of the Wil-

son Democrats will vote for Beveridge and some of the Roosevelt vote will drop back to republican regularity. Beveridge will poll a larger vote than his oppon-ents anticipate and if Shively wins he will find that his margin of safety was much smaller than he supposed
