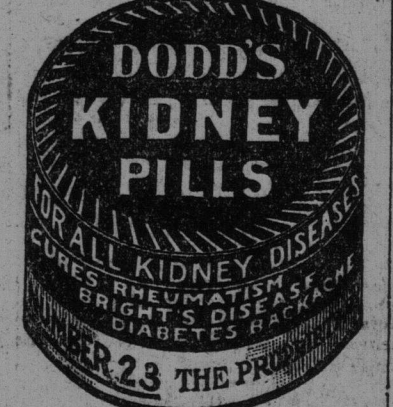

## The Evening Chit-Chat

THAT most women make housework just about twice as hard as it should be is the theory of the man-who-thinks.

He came into the kitchen the other day and found his wife standing by the stove popping corn, and with that as a text, he gave us a five-minute lecture on why women are poor housewives and men would be better off.

"You women never know how to save yourselves. Tell me one good reason why you couldn't sit down and pop that corn. No? Of course you can't. More work to get a chair from the kitchen to the parlor and back again, and a woman's way of doing work. A woman is never willing to make a little initial preparation, use her brains a little for the sake of saving herself in the end, and a man is."

"Every woman must know that standing on her feet too much, is likely to cause kidney trouble and a dozen other things, and yet they will stand up when they might just as well sit down."

"What could you do sitting down that you don't? Well, for one thing, you couldn't get a good purchase! Nonsense. You let me fix the chair and the board just right and you'll get just as good a purchase as you could get by standing up till your legs ached and bending over till your back ached."

"And what about paring vegetables? I've seen you stand over that sink for half an hour paring potatoes and onions and doing that sort of thing. Was there any reason you couldn't sit down?"

"And what about loafing around, and beating cake and a dozen other things that I've noticed, but that I can't think up just now?"

"And then there's another thing. You know just how much it tires you to stoop over and yet look at the things you keep on the floor or down low, that might be where you could easily reach them. There's the bread jar and the cookie jar and the dustpan and broom and the sugar bucket and the milkless jug and a dozen other things that you are using all the time and avoid to have where you can reach them easily."

"Of course some things have to go in less convenient places, but why don't you take care to put the things you don't often use there, and have the things you're using all the time handy. There's those two drawers in the pantry for instance. I've noticed that in the top drawer you keep your towels and aprons and go to it perhaps once a day, and in the second you keep your string and paper and little things like that, and open it a dozen times a day. Now what's the sense in that?"

"If men did housework I can tell you there would be a good deal more system to it and a good deal less time and energy wasted in the long run."

"You are welcome to try right here anytime you want, dear," suggested the man-who-thinks' wife sweetly.

"Anytime you are ready to do my work in the office," retorted the man-who-thinks, promptly.

"Of course we snuffed at that and assured him that he would be quite so ready to theorize if he weren't so sure that he wouldn't have to put his theories into practice. It wouldn't have been safe for his masculine vanity for us to do otherwise."

"But just the same—very much between ourselves, sisters all—don't you think there's a germ of suggestion in our arrangements and our methods as we might be?"

"For those of us who haven't finished our housecleaning yet, would it be such a bad idea to look at the rest of our re-arranging through the eyeglasses of the man-who-thinks' criticism?"

WORK FOR SEVEN YEARS; NO PAY (Continued from page 1)

some time prior to 1820, and in 1823, as the advertisement shows, Mr. Godfrey was in business for himself, selling not only dry goods, but groceries and liquors, as many merchants did in those days.

It may be observed that the "Ready Made Smith" referred to was a brother-in-law of General Williams, of Sussex, the hero of Kar. Also it may be noted that the photograph of Mr. Godfrey, which is here reproduced, was taken in 1823, when, E. V. Godfrey, so well known in this city, and who is himself nearly eighty years old, was only a young man.

Having made this brief note of the career of Robert Godfrey, we may turn to the Courier of August 2nd, 1823, and gather some interesting facts from its columns. One paragraph says—

"The annual meeting of the children belonging to the several schools in this city will take place in Trinity church, on Wednesday next, and a sermon on the occasion preached by the Rev. J. Somerville, president of the College of Fredericton. The amount of the collection on that day will be appropriated to the maintenance of the African school, and which has hitherto been supported by the munificence of the late Lieutenant-Governor; but as in future it depends for its support and continuance upon the liberality of those who may be friendly to such a necessary and useful institution."

Another very interesting item reads—"Messrs. Wheeler and Simonds, who were appointed to wait on their Excellencies Lord Dalhousie and Sir James Kemp, by the Association formed in this province, to promote the object of a canal from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the Bay of Fundy, retired yesterday from Halifax, and we are happy to learn that their reception was gracious, the magnitude and utility of the object of their mission acknowledged, and the written answers they received from the Governor General such as to give additional strength to the expectation that this measure, so important to British American interests, will receive the support necessary to its completion."

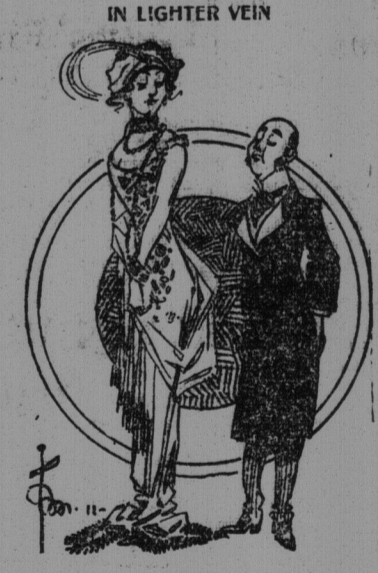

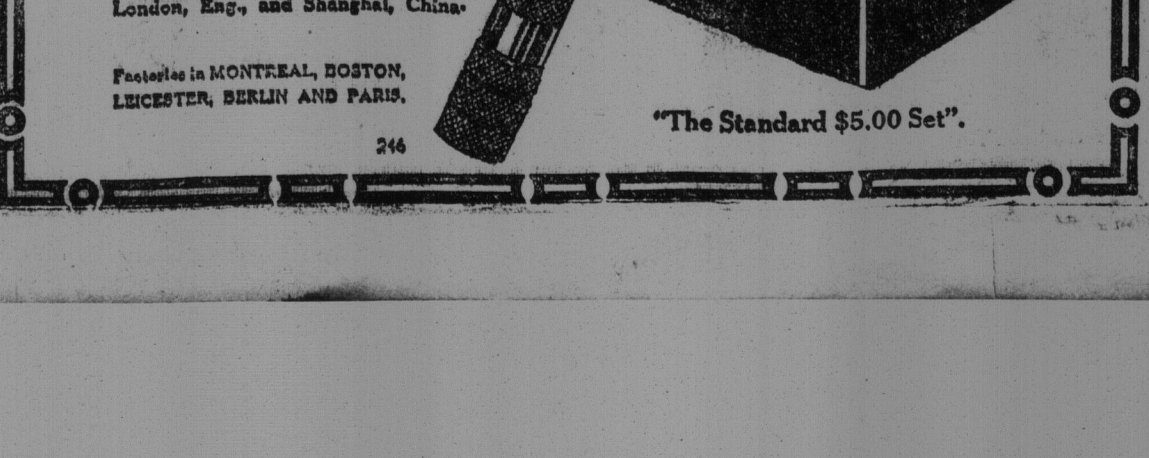

## Daily Hints For the Cook

**DROP CAKES.** Three-quarters cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 3/4 cup milk, 2 1/2 cups flour (bread or pastry), 2 teaspoons cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon lemon extract. Drop on well-greased pan a desertspoonful in each place, a little way apart. Before baking sprinkle with a little sugar and cinnamon. If baked in a very hot oven they will be light and puffy as one could wish.

**GRAHAM BREADS.** Take about 1 pint of fairly thick sour milk, 1 rounding teaspoon of saleratus, 1 of salt, 2 table-spoons of molasses (1 use 1 of sugar and like it better) and graham flour to make a stiff batter. Have gum pans smoking hot and buttered when you drop in the batter. Bake about 20 minutes in a good hot oven.

## BANDMASTER JONES IS DEAD

Although he said but little about his loss at any time, he felt it keenly, and, it is said, he was never the same man after it. Among the pieces of music thus lost and which can never be replaced were many marches and waltzes. There was also a piece of music played during the trooping of the colors, called The Meeting of the Waters, which Bandmaster Jones had dedicated to Lady Warwick. This was played when her ladyship presented the colors to the 3rd Royal Warwickshire Regiment. Another was a waltz called the Palladium Waltz, and dedicated to the 62nd. There was also a march called the Semper Paratus March.

**Born 1835**

Frederick Howell Jones was born July 13, 1835, in Swansea, Glamorganshire, Wales. He enlisted in the 54th Regiment of Foot (the West Norfolk), April 5, 1852. The regiment was sent to Canada next year, but returned to England again in 1854, landing there about 17 years of age, and yet when volunteers were called for to bring up the powder from the magazine he stepped to the front. The task called for almost superhuman endurance but at last it was almost all got out and thrown over the ship's side.

The women and children who had been got into the boats as soon as the fire had broken out, had been keeping as close to the ship as they dared, but now they were ordered further off for there some powder left which in spite of all efforts could not be reached. The water about the ship was fairly swarming with sharks, which seemed to be waiting for the inevitable ending of the tragedy. When the explosion came, however, the ship still floated, and only two men were injured. They soon recovered. For nine days the crippled ship staggered over the waves, and at last they landed in Port Louis in the Mauritius amid a perfect ovation from the inhabitants.

On Feb. 23, 1865, Bandmaster Jones was promoted corporal, winning his sergeant's stripes July 6, 1869, which shows that his progress was slow in those days. In 1871 he made a second trip to India, but was invalided home in 1875. Soon after that he was promoted to the position of bandmaster to the 1st Warwickshire militia, the name of which was afterwards changed to the 3rd Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment. This position he held till he came to this country in 1888.

**Came to Canada**

Upon coming to Canada he went to Seaford (Ont.), where he held the position of bandmaster to the 33rd Regiment till he came to St. John, N. B., in 1892. From the time he came to this city he was bandmaster of the 62nd, and caretaker of the drill hall. Owing to ill health he had resigned both offices on Jan. 5th, 1910. He therefore served the flag for fifty-seven years and nine months a day.

**His Family**

On Oct. 22, 1868, he married Rebecca Chapman, and they had five sons and five daughters. One of the daughters, Laura, died of the cholera in India. The names of the surviving members of the family are: Mrs. Charles H. Henderson, New York; Fred C., Princess street, A. L. of Boston; W. H., caretaker of the drill hall; E., leader of the Nickel orchestra; Mrs. Edgar P. Logan, and Mrs. William H. Charlton, of this city.

Since coming here Bandmaster Jones' painstaking work had recommended him to the notice of his superior officers, and many flattering recommendations were received by him from time to time. The 62nd Band also held his merits in high esteem and on Christmas day, 1905, presented to him a gold watch, besides many other means of appreciation.

It may be interesting to note that the 54th Regiment of Foot was raised in 1753. They fought in the war of the American revolution with distinction. The regiment was present at the battle of Brooklyn in 1776. Major John Andre, who was executed by the Americans in the autumn of 1780, was a captain of this regiment, and Major General of the forces under Sir Henry Clinton. On Dec. 24, 1802, while stationed at Gibraltar, the men of the 54th saw the Duke of Kent, the father of the late Queen Victoria, from being murdered by the troops who had mutinied. For this service His Royal Highness presented to the regiment a magnificent piece of silver plate, suitably inscribed.

**AT MOUNT ALLISON.**

In Beethoven hall, St. John, Saturday afternoon, T. B. Kider, head of the manual training department, and Dr. Solomon of the hospital, were present. Many inspected the house science apartments afterwards. Yesterday afternoon the evening Davis, Heblman, Madam Clodius, soprano; Miss Eydell, head of Mount Allison voice department, and the Bostonia Societies gave excellent concert.

Mrs. J. Harvey Brown died at her home in Moulton last evening, aged 67 years. Her husband, son, and daughter survive.

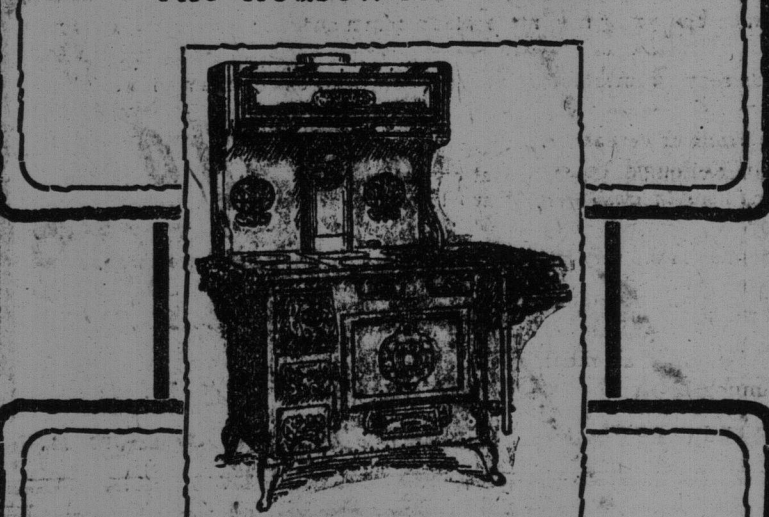
