The town population of Soviet Russia is said to be dying out in the literal sense of the word, the yearly mortality rate in Moscow having reached 118 per thousand. Typhus is raging in the villages, and to a still greater extent in the towns along the railways. Medical aid in the towns is scarce and is almost non-existent in the country villages. There are no drugs at all.

Compulsory labor and the collection of products as taxation in kind is reported to be greatly irritating the population.

The peasantry sell agricultural produce very unwillingly, according to the report, and the peasants deliver raw materials only under compulsion.

Only the official press of the government of the Communist Party is in existence.

The report states that all industry and trade is socialized and nationalized, and is under the control of special central bodies under the direction of the supreme soviet people's economic council. At the mills and factories there are no raw materials, fuel or organized labor. The workmen who remain are bound by an iron discipline and every breach of regulations, even of such as are practically impossible of observance is punished by fine or arrest, On these grounds and mainly in matters relating to the food supply strikes occur which are always suppressed in a pittless manner.





He says: "Without claiming the intervention of a miracle, I say that when at a moment in history a clear view is given to a man and he finds later that that clear view has determined movements of enormous consequenses in the conduct of a formidable war—then I hold that that clear view which I think I had at the Marne, on the Yser and on the 26th of March, 1918 comes from a providential force in the hands of which one is an instrument, and that the victorious decision descends from on high, from a will that is superior and divine."

TO BUILD 20,000 HOUSES IN YPRES

Contract for Reclamation of Shell-Torn Areas Is Let and Work Is Under Way.

The government of Belgium has decided to rebuild the entire city of Ypres, leaving none of the ruins caused by the war except the Cloth Hall, the Cathedral and the Cloister, which are to

serve as monuments.

There has been a popular demand that the two ruined cities of Ypres and Dixmude be left as they are, as a monument to those who lost their lives in the neighborhood, but this was opposed by the former population of the area, who desire to have their property restored. This has been particularly true of Ypres, which before the war had 18,000 inhabitants, who are returning in some numbers and starting to rebuild.

The Royal Commissioner, recently appointed for the reconstruction of the Ypres arrondissement, outlines the government programme as follows: It will be necessary to clear and excavate the city and the principal surrounding villages, to build about 20,000 houses, and to restore the roads, the water and gas installations. The contract for this work has already been let and the work begun. The building material outlined from the ruins will be re-sold to the government by the contractors and will be used in the foundations of the new city. Bricks, for example, will be bought by the government at the fixed price of thirty francs a thousand.

Only the most necessary buildings are to be constructed, and schools, churches and stores are to be left to the last. All building is done by the government and the owner of the property is required to pay nothing. If the owner, however, wishes any particular plan followed this can be done, provided he is willing to bear any extra expense entailed, otherwise the plans for the building will be drawn up by a committee of architects. There are nineteen architects at present assigned to the arrondissement. Where the owner of a plece of land is known to have died without heirs the ownership reverts to the government, which will then dispose of it at auction or otherwise the plans for it at auction or otherwise the dispose of it at auction or otherwise.



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
