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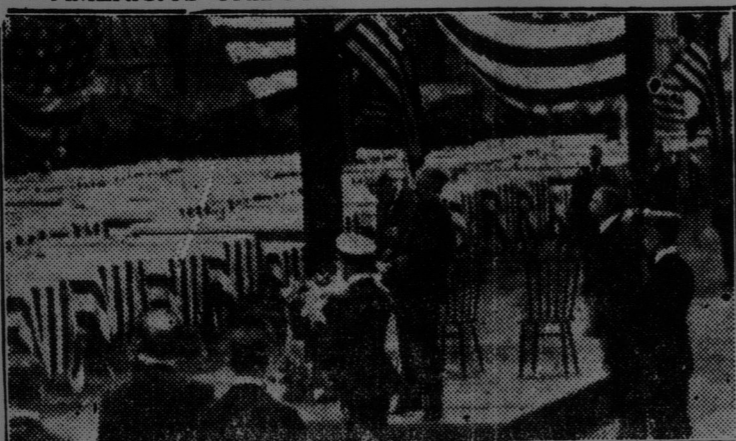

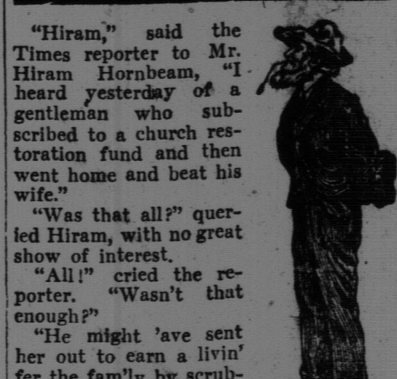

**GIFTS TO NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM**

Rare and Ancient Books Among Recent Valuable Acquisitions — One Was Printed in 1626.

The Natural History Society has been fortunate in receiving many gifts of rarity and value during the last few weeks. Mrs. James S. Harding has added some most acceptable gifts to her recent donations and Rev. George Scott and Miss Jessie L. Lawson have also been among its recent benefactors.

Mrs. Harding has presented to the society three extremely old books of high value. The oldest is dated 1626 and was printed in Geneva in Latin. It is a large volume about fourteen inches by eight inches and the original leather binding has been closely copied in an excellent preservation. The subject matter of the book is a treatise on the meaning and usages of the Catholic sacraments. The title page has the following wording: "Daniels Chamier, Delphinensis, Zanstratiae, Catholicae, Tomus Quartus, De Sacramento. Genevae Typis Roverianis, MDCXXVI."

Two volumes dated 1777 and published by J. Cooke at Shakespeare's Head, No. 17 Paternoster Row which Mrs. Harding has also presented deal with a "System of Geography" and are curious and most interesting in their typography as well as in their reading material. They contain many old engravings and strange old maps, and are bound in their original heavy calf. Some fine specimens of Nova Scotia gold, polished on one side, and a cocoa fibre armband made and worn by the women in the South Sea Islands, are some of the other donations made to the society by Mrs. Harding.

Rev. George Scott's gift will be of special interest to stamp collectors. It is a complete set of the proofs of a new issue of stamps for the Republic of Columbia sent out for approval by the firm of Perkins, Baker and Company, Limited, London, the firm which has designed and engraved the British postage stamps since they were first used,

How much more pregnant of result, for instance, is a really striking poster than the finest Academy painting? Millions see the one; few thousands at most the other. But the original idea of the first of the new art apostles started sign-painting? A conscientious cubist sign-board over the village inn might turn the whole community Puffblows.

To Marry Miss Law. The announcement that General Sir F. H. Sykes is to be married to Bonar Law's elder daughter has aroused keen interest in political and military circles. Sir Frederick has been one of the greatest pioneers of our air service. His services during the war were available to the nation. A soldier by profession, he was one of the first to see the possibilities of aviation in war, and his appointment as commander of the military wing of the Royal Flying Corps in 1912 marked the first step towards the wonderful development of aerial reconnaissance and fighting which at one time in the war gave us the command of the air.

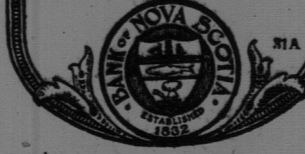

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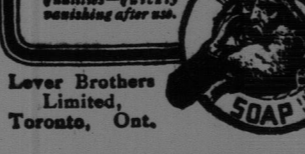

OUTLOOK FOR MONEY MARKET.

(New York Evening Post.) As for the condition of the time money and commercial paper market the belief prevails that there is little hope for improvement in the immediate future. This is based upon the factors now pending which are expected to have an important bearing on the money situation. The first of these is the payment of the June 1 interest and dividend payments. As soon as these are out of the way the banks will be called upon to make arrangements for the second installment on income tax payments June 15. And this, it is pointed out, comes at a time when the banks are making final arrangements for payment of the July 1 interest and dividend payments,

which are generally the largest of the year and which are expected to amount to some \$800,000,000.

But after these funds commence to come back into the market the belief prevails that Wall Street should experience a period of easier money rates, temporarily at least. As sufficient progress should be made in the intervening period six weeks from now in deflating outside loans to ease up the strain on the banks here as well as in the West for funds needed in connection with the harvests.

**HAIG NOT HELPED BY POLITICIANS**

Field Marshal Gives First Interview to Newspaper Man

Objects to Interference of Politicians in Military Plans — Has Prepared Secret History of the War — The Decisive Day.

(Toronto Mail and Empire.) A few days ago Field Marshal Earl Haig gave to Frank Scudamore, a veteran British war correspondent, what is said to be the first interview he has ever granted to a newspaper man. The interview was designed for circulation in the United States, where a few days earlier a statement by Marshal Petain seemed to disparage the American soldier and especially the methods of training at West Point. Earl Haig spoke proudly of the American soldiers, and said that in recent speeches he had appeared not to give them their due it was because in these cases he had just received the freedom of the city in which the address was made, and as his hearers were for the most part demobilized British soldiers, it was natural that he should devote his utterances to an eulogy of the county regiments. We consider the apology ample, especially when the field marshal proceeded to declare that he yielded to nobody in his admiration for the great American armies that fought in the war.

**Foolish Politicians.** The field marshal then proceeded to a general discussion of the war, in which he made it plain that like all other distinguished soldiers he strongly objects to the interference of politicians in military plans once war is in progress. As far as he was concerned he could recall no useful assistance rendered in the military sphere by politicians. He said that so many of them spend their lives in an effort to attain office that they have not time to study history and learn the factors that make empires. He said that at different times the political chiefs in London, Paris and Rome formed definite opinions as to the line of action that would be adopted by the enemy in certain circumstances and at certain dates, and he adds: "It is noteworthy that in no single instance were these provisions accurate. The definite anticipations they formed were never justified by events." When pessimism might have been justified the politicians were unanimously optimistic. When optimism was natural they were filled with forebodings. Just two months before the Germans signed the armistice the field marshal visited London in order to tell the authorities

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that he regarded the war as being near the last paragraph of the last page.

He said that as a result of the constant hammering the German power of resistance could not possibly last out the year. "But," he says, "the people at home would have nothing to do with my conclusions. They had evidently resolved in their minds that the crucial period of the war—the determining phase—would begin in the first week in the month of July, 1918. Although I received a most friendly hearing I felt that I was regarded as an optimist and that I had not prevailed on them to alter their minds." One can only comment on this, that if the politicians refused to accept the judgment of the commander-in-chief of the British armies on so technical a matter, it is a wonder that the war was won. Perhaps similar conditions prevailed in the enemy armies. The correspondent was struck by the extreme modesty of the house occupied by the field marshal. It is simply a roomy villa on Kingston Hill, close to Richmond, which was secured by Lady Haig for herself and children when her husband was in France. It stands in a pretty garden of no great extent and is one of thousands of such houses occupied by moderately well-to-do business men in London.

**The Decisive Days of the War.** The hall leading to the library where the interview took place bore testimony to the sporting tastes of the owner, for on stands and racks were arrayed guns and rifles, fishing rods, riding whips and golf clubs, and the fact that these personal treasures were thus displayed argued the absence of a gunroom. There is an apartment at Eastcott which might have served as gunroom had it not been

adapted to another purpose, and a more important one. It contains what will undoubtedly prove to be the greatest treasure of the Haig family for all time to come. This is the great war map of the western front on which Haig and his staff worked out their plans throughout the whole course of the war, and on which the changing positions of the opposing forces were recorded from day to day during the struggle. There are, of course, hundreds of smaller maps. The favorite map of the field marshal is that showing the position of the armies on Sept. 27, which he regards as the decisive day of the war. On this map there is this note in Earl Haig's hand, "British broke the Hindenburg line on 27th September, 1918."

**Secret History of the War.** The map room is locked and guarded. The lynx-eyed correspondent did not fall to note that when the host prepared to escort him thither he drew from a locked drawer in his study the key that gives access to the treasure house. There is something else in the house that is priceless. This is the secret history of the war which has been compiled by the field marshal. It will not be made public for perhaps fifty years, or until those who played the chief roles in the conflict have passed away. A copy of this work has been made, and has been placed with the British Museum for safe keeping, in case anything untoward should happen to the original. It is said by the correspondent that Earl Haig is a poor man. He is a poor man, of course, in comparison with Wellington, who received nearly £1,000,000 from his country besides his great estate of Strathfieldsaye, and Apsley House in London. Haig

VIOLATING THE FISHING RULES

Sawdust in Streams; Little Trout Taken — Reported Elopement — The Apple Crop.

(Special to Times.)

Fredericton, N. B., May 29.—Inspector H. E. Harrison of Fredericton has been active this week in enforcement of fishery laws. At Woodstock five mill owners or operators were convicted of dumping sawdust in streams. Four were fined offences and one a second. Two mills were on the St. John river and three on the Presque Isle.

The regulation forbidding the catching of trout less than six inches in length is frequently broken. Three anglers who broke it on Victoria Day are to face charges at Canterbury on June 2. Netting trout also is forbidden and one violator of the law gave up his net to the inspector, but said it was the property of a resident of the State of Maine.

An elopement is reported from the Parish of Kingsclear, by which a wife and six small children have been deserted. The husband and a girl of the vicinity, who left at the same time he did, are supposed to be in the United States.

So far the prospects of the apple orchards of the province are bright. Advice received by A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturalist, are that the blossoms have set well upon the great majority of trees. Included are such varieties as the Duchess, Macintosh, Dudley, Wealthy, Milwaukie and Fameuse. The chief danger apart from high winds and insects will be early June frosts. If the orchards pass successfully through that ordeal there should be a large crop.

NEW 'PHONE WORK IN THE PROVINCE

(Special to Times.)

Fredericton, May 29.—J. E. Marshall of the construction department of the N. B. Telephone Company has been here from St. John for the last day or two and the work which he has mapped out for this season, while it does not include lines in any new territory, comprises nineteen new circuits covering 853 1/2 miles with a total wireage of 702 miles. The estimates for this work run up to about \$85,000 and he says it will require some 9,000 new cross arms on existing pole lines in addition to those now in place which can be used.

The longest of the new circuits extends from Fredericton to Newcastle and two covering that territory have just been completed. Three crews which have been on that work are now engaged on three new circuits from Fredericton to St. John. Two new circuits from St. John to Westfield, then westward to the west coast, have already been completed and two to Keewick will be run from here soon. One from Andover to Fort Fairfield, Me., has already been completed and others which will be finished in about ten days include two from Florenceville to Andover and two from St. John to Westfield. Those which are to be undertaken include two from St. John to St. George and two to Rothesay and one from Rothesay to Norton, the two additional circuits from St. John to Fredericton and thence to Newcastle furnishing a new avenue for messages to follow from the north shore to the winter port city.

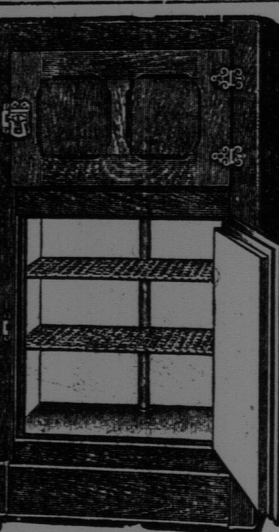

### American Aid To Central Europe Urged by Davison

Congress Should Make \$500,000,000 Grant, Banker Says—Southeastern Europe Scene of "One of the Most Terrible Tragedies of Human Race."

Speaking before the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church in Des Moines, Iowa, the other day, Henry P. Davison, chairman of the board of governors of the League of Red Cross Societies, said that "one of the most terrible tragedies in the history of the human race is being enacted within the broad belt of territory lying between the Baltic and the Black and Adriatic Seas." In this area are the new Baltic states, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Ukraine, Austria, Albania and Serbia.

Mr. Davison asked that Congress immediately appropriate not exceeding \$500,000,000 for the use of the countries of central and eastern Europe. He requests that congress call upon the president to appoint a non-political commission of three Americans, distinguished for their character and executive ability, which should proceed at once to survey the conditions in these countries and to allocate materials to them without interference and by exercise of its own prerogative.

Following is the text of Mr. Davison's address:

As chairman of the convention of Red Cross Societies, composed of representatives of twenty-seven nations, that met recently in Geneva, I am custodian of authoritative reports recording appalling conditions among millions of people living in eastern Europe.

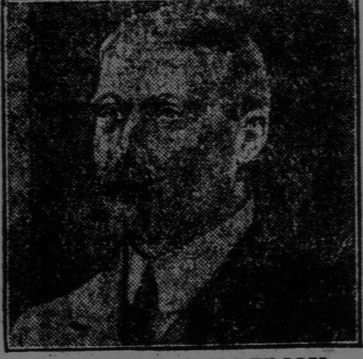
Whatever our attitude towards the League of Nations or our apprehensions regarding foreign entanglements, I feel it is essential that the people of the United States realize that one of the most terrible tragedies in the history of the human race is being enacted within the broad belt of territory lying between the Baltic and the Black and Adriatic Seas.

The area includes the new Baltic states—Poland, Czechoslovakia, Ukraine, Austria, Hungary, Roumania, Montenegro, Albania, and Serbia.

The reports which come to me make it clear that in these war-ravaged lands civilization has broken down. Disease, bereavement and suffering are present in practically every household. Food and clothing are insufficient to make life tolerable.

### RUSSIANS CONFIRM REVOLUTION UNDER SOVIET

Representatives of Co-operatives Make Report

Economic System Failure — Traders Defy the Laws — Iron Discipline for the Workmen, With Frequent Strikes.

Washington, May 28.—Deterioration of every branch of economic life in Soviet Russia continues and not even the slightest improvement in any direction is in sight, according to the report of two representatives of the Russian co-operative organization of London who were delegated to visit Moscow to ascertain whether it is possible to establish trade relations with Bolshevik Russia.

The whole plan, of course, involves many practical considerations, the most serious of which is that of obtaining the money, whether by issuing additional Liberty bonds, an increase in the floating debt, or by taxation. But I think we could properly say to the treasury department:

"We know how serious your financial problems are. We know the difficulties which are immediately confronting you, we know the importance of deflation, and we know that the government must economize and we also know that the American government advanced ten billion dollars to its allies to attain victory and peace. Certainly it is worth making the additional advance in order to realize the peace for which we have already struggled—for nothing is more certain than that until normal conditions are restored in Europe, there can be no peace."

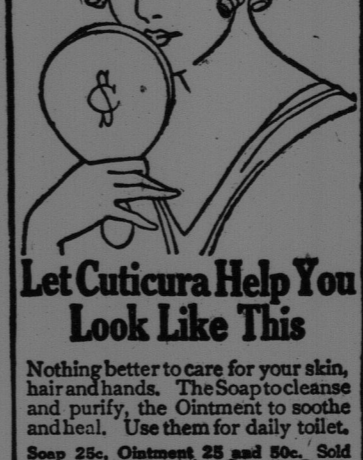
When the true bearings of the situation have been taken into consideration, it is not for me perhaps to give in detail a formula for solution of the world's ills, but as I have been asked many times, "What would you do?" I am glad to give my own answer.

Above all things, I would say that constructive action in this matter may be regarded as altruistic by those who are so minded; it may be regarded as ordinary decency by those who desire, or it may be regarded withal as good common sense business, in the interests of commerce and trade and of the American people.

Accordingly, I would ask: Would appropriate \$500,000,000. (1) That congress immediately pass a bill appropriating a sum not to exceed \$500,000,000 for the use of central and eastern Europe.

(2) That congress call upon the president to appoint a non-political commission of three Americans, distinguished for their character and executive ability, and commanding the respect of the American people.

People Kept Down by Massacres. "The Bolsheviks, although the word means 'majority,' are not a government majority, but comprise some three million of the lowest type of humanity, one hundred and sixty million of their fellow human beings. The Bolsheviks, having possession of the factories, munition works and supply plants, have the nerve centres of the country, and any resistance which would be offered cannot make way without external aid," declared Mr. Stevenson, adding, "If once the Russian people were freed and allowed to vote, the Bolshevik regime would vanish like smoke, but they are kept down by machine guns and massacres."

Czarism Comparative Paradise. Every type of Russian, from prince down to storekeeper, farmer and humblest workman, says that the Czar's regime was paradise as compared with the present.

Compulsory labor and the collection of products as taxation in kind is reported to be greatly irritating to the population. The peasantry sell agricultural produce very unwillingly, according to the report, and the peasants deliver raw materials only under the compulsion of the Communist Party.

Defy the Laws to Trade. The distribution of all commodities, should by law, be carried out exclusively according to the plans of the provincial supply committees through the co-operative unions.

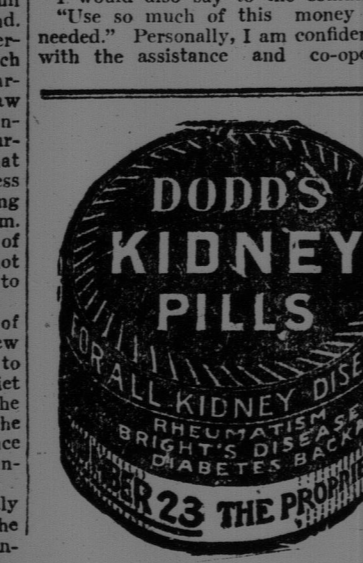

**SAYS THEY MUST  
HAVE HAD BIG  
PROFITS BEFORE**

(New York Evening Post)

What is described in the despatches as a "wave of price-cutting" at department stores throughout the country, with the American way of doing things. The overnight reductions reported as ranging on certain articles from 20 to 50 per cent, may fairly be characterized as mere fact of such instantaneous reductions proves several things. One of them is that the profits previously made or expected from the sale of this merchandise, at the former scale of prices must have been very large to admit of such reduction. Another and more obvious inference is that the people who really lost their heads, in the lately prevalent notion that no limit could exist for the rise of prices, the substance of which is the general public, but the manufacturers, middlemen and merchants.

This second consideration, we presume, explains why the "price-cutting" seems thus far to have converged on buying. If cost of raw material were the determining influence, then the fact that wool costs 40 per cent. more than a year ago and cotton 37 per cent. more would seem to warrant the high prices for finished goods. But this week's events show that what has happened was the result of the accumulation of very large stocks in the hands of the dealers in clothing, to the extent that they accumulated very large stocks in the firm conviction that they could sell them at the greatly advanced prices. The consumer, however, had a word to say regarding this.

But if the public chose to go on wearing its old clothes and the prospect opened of the season ending with great stocks of unsold goods on the merchants' hands, then the further prospect opened of the necessity for granting extension of the bank loans which had been created in the expectation of their prompt repayment from the receipts of the retail sales. With other demands on credit what they are, such a situation could not be accepted by the banks. The cut in prices, therefore, had to be put in force on a scale sufficiently large to insure disposal of the accumulated merchandise.

To what extent the same process will be applied in other necessities depends on the question, how far dealers in such goods have indulged in similar misjudgment of their market. The National Association of Manufacturers, which held its final session in this city yesterday and whose resolutions reach through many industries, declared itself by formal resolution "in hearty accord with all sensible efforts to reduce prices of commodities." This was explained as meaning that "the manufacturers see the necessity of reducing prices for their varied products as much as conditions of production will permit" and the Journal of Commerce states that the feeling of many delegates was that "this modification should be in the neighborhood of 25 per cent."

Such a decision might not be altogether voluntary; for the attitude taken by the Federal Reserve Board, in its conference with bankers this week at Washington, has clearly foreshadowed not only discrimination by banks against borrowers for non-essential purposes, but discrimination against borrowers who want credit for the purpose of avoiding sales of goods below the prices which they had expected to obtain. In this regard we are plainly at the beginning of a process of readjustment. From the financial viewpoint the reassuring fact is the evidence that there are hosts of buyers, able to meet the market when they believe that prices are again at a reasonable level.

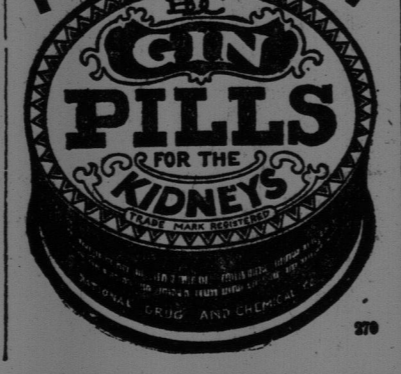

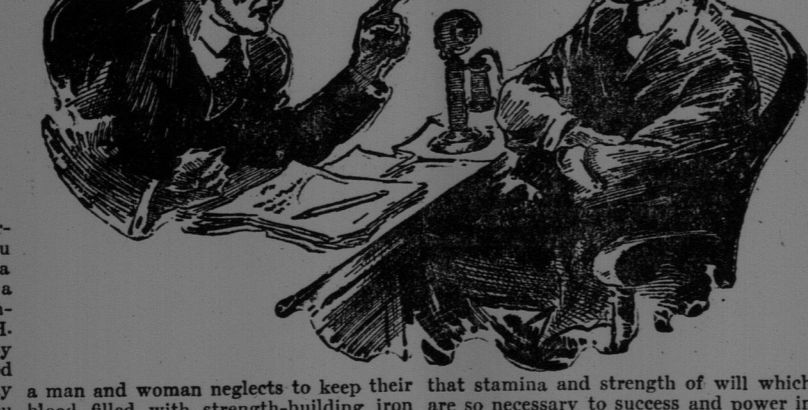

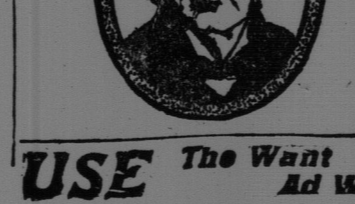

## FOCH TELLS HOW THE WAR WAS WON

Waited Patiently for the Tide to Turn

Victory Represents Moral Superiority on Part of Conqueror, He Says — The More Obstinate Will Win, Is Secret of Success.

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)  
"I won the war by smoking my pipe," said Marshal Foch in the course of a recent talk with a French Journalist. He

meant to say that in the mood induced by tobacco he was able to work out those problems of strategy that eventually resulted in the German defeat. But he meant also that having arrived at certain definite conclusions the fact that his plans did not go smoothly from the start did not agitate him. He smoked his pipe patiently and waited for the tide to turn. History is likely to rate Foch even more highly as a strategist than the present generation. We are too close to the problems he had to solve to appreciate their magnitude. No other general in all history had so many men at his command. No other general was ever confronted with such a huge and formidable enemy. To no other great general did the moral quality of warfare ever appear so important as it did to Foch. War to Foch was not an exact science or a branch of industry. He does not believe, as the Germans were taught to believe after the Franco-Prussian war, that a war can be decided wholly by means of plans carefully made long in advance.

**Character Wins Wars.**  
Besides being a conflict between men's bodies, war to Foch, is also a conflict between the souls of the opposing nations.

He would not subscribe to the cynical doctrine of Napoleon that God is on the side of the heavier battalions. Foch believes that knowledge, reasoning, the greatest tactical and strategical qualities, however necessary they are, are nothing if character is lacking. In a recent work entitled, "Foch as a Military Writer," Charles Le Goffic recalls that on the occasion of a retreat, Ney was attacked by artillery on his flank and faced his columns to the right and cried to Jomini, who begged him to get back to first principles: "I don't care anything for your sacred strategy. I know only one thing, I never turn my back to cannon." The words were heroic, but the action was foolish, as Ney was soon to realize. It would not be for Foch, the greatest living strategist, to show contempt for strategy. One cannot defy circumstances. But if in order to produce good results character needs to be supplemented by knowledge and reason, they in turn, according to Foch, are conditioned by two abstractions from the realm of morals: duty and discipline, and the worship, more or less exclusive, which is rendered to them.

**Ideas Conquer Matter.**  
Thus, says the writer, Foch restores to war that nobility and that high idealism which it had lost in the hands of the Germans. He subjects force to the great principles of ever-living morality. Ideas, according to him, have once more triumphed over matter. Foch, too, might say that he won the war by never for a moment doubting that he would win it. He had no faith in the policy of attrition and obviously does not agree with Haig, who thinks that the campaigns of 1915, 1916 and 1917 were responsible for the victory of 1918. A war of attrition is a war that wears out the Germans in the long period of deadlock, according to Foch, Foch never wavered in his confidence of eventual victory. He wrote again and again to the president using such phrases as: "Victory represents moral superiority on the part of the conqueror and moral depression on the part of the conquered," and "To will more strongly and more persistently than the enemy is the supreme resource. He often recalled a saying of Frederick the Great: "The more obstinate will win. That is the whole secret of success."

**War Won By Faith.**  
After the armistice Foch said: "The war was won by faith." To Andre de Maricourt, another French writer who has had several interviews with Foch, the Marshal said that from the age of seventeen he thought of revenge. That was after he had seen the Germans in Metz, and he added: "You know very well that when a man of ordinary capacity concentrates all his faculties and all his force on a single object he must obtain it, but for this, these essentials are necessary: To be strong he must be objective and never subjective. I mean that in order to act he must never lose himself in impressions. The facts alone count and we must stick to the facts." It was after this that he made the re-



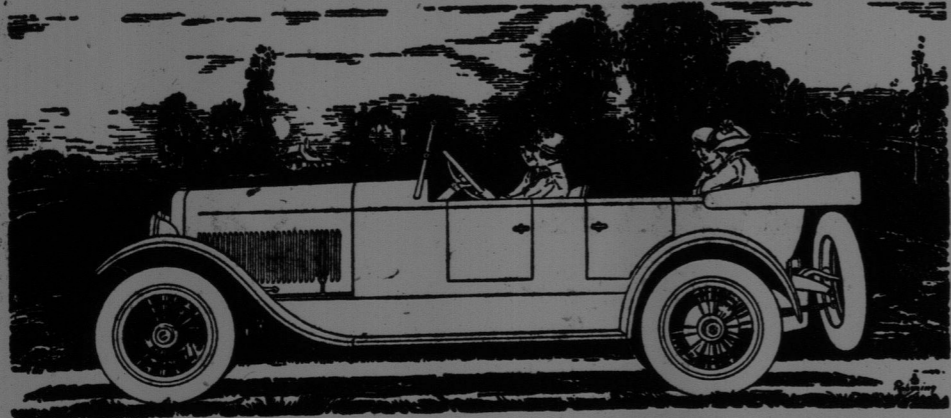

"The latter would never have been so impressed as to make war without first trying to neutralize Russia. Or if he had had to swallow the pill all the same, I promise you that he would have conducted the war very differently." People had often asked him, he said, if he expected a long war, and he said, "I know nothing about that. It wasn't my business. The future never belongs to men and it is a loss of time and thought and so of energy to diagnose it to the detriment of the needs of the moment."

**Divine Interposition.**  
To Foch the evils of each day were sufficient. He handled each day's problems as they arose, never for a moment doubting what the end would be. He did not know how to handle the forces at his command. He was dealing with human beings and not with chessmen. He had to camouflage to his soldiers. He had to get them to do the same thing they had been doing, and at which they had been beaten, to a different tune. ### HURLED A KNIFE AT PATRON'S HEAD

Toronto Chinese Restaurant Keeper Charged With Wounding.

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)  
Haggling over the price of a meal which he had consumed in Harry Chow's restaurant at 209 York street, Saturday night, Fred Skeene, precipitated a quarrel which culminated in a badly-gashed head for himself and the arrest of Chow on a charge of wounding. ### MAKING COURTS MORAL HOSPITALS

Judge Lindsey, known to fame as the promoter of the juvenile court idea, is now advocating the institution of what he calls chancery courts, a system which has been in operation in his home state long enough to show that it works. The procedure of these courts, it appears, attempts to try society along with the criminal. "I am not a maudlin sympathizer with criminals," says the judge, "but I am a sincere sympathizer with victims of circumstances, and when a person is placed on trial I am for placing society on trial at the same time."  
"To find the cause of crime is as important as to punish the criminal. A doctor, when he treats a typhoid case, does not stop there; he seeks to find where the typhoid comes from, good and bad, but just as people; and in what are known as bad people you cannot cure badness without knowing the cause."  
Judge Lindsey says the chancery courts will be moral hospitals.

After all the ideas is merely an extension of the maxim that the proper study of mankind is man, and his social environment. It is properly enough an affair of courts, which have in the past been concerned with the administration of laws which often placed property rights above personal rights. Lord Lytton relates that his father told him how from an high, he saw a young woman condemned to death for stealing a small ball of cloth, and how the woman's child was torn from her arms as she was led to the scaffold. Society hardly did its duty by the child in that case.

Such courts as Lindsey advocates would do much to develop a social conscience and an intelligent understanding of the influence of now little understood social forces, which make or mar human lives.

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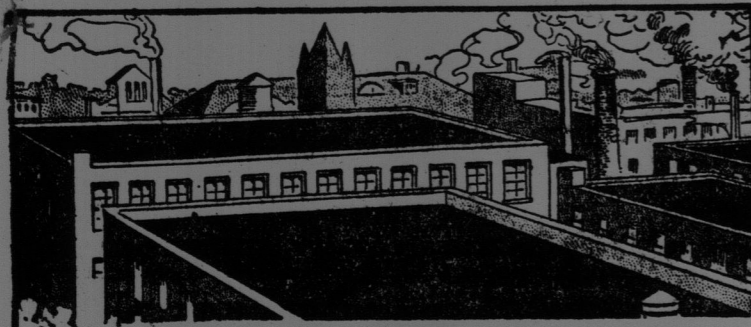

### TO BUILD 20,000 HOUSES IN YPRES

Contract for Reclamation of Shell-Torn Areas Is Let and Work Is Under Way.

The government of Belgium has decided to rebuild the entire city of Ypres, leaving none of the ruins caused by the war except the Cloth Hall, the Cathedral and the Cloister, which are to serve as monuments.

There has been a popular demand that the two ruined cities of Ypres and Dixmude be left as they are, as a monument to those who lost their lives in the neighborhood, but this was opposed by the former population of the area, who desire to have their property restored. This has been particularly true of Ypres, which before the war had 18,000 inhabitants, who are returning in some numbers and starting to rebuild.

The Royal Commissioner, recently appointed for the reconstruction of the Ypres arrondissement, outlines the government programme as follows: It will be necessary to clear and excavate the city and the principal surrounding villages, to build about 20,000 houses, and to restore the roads, the water and gas installations. The contract for this work has already been let and the work begun. The building material outlined from the ruins will be re-sold to the government by the contractors and will be used in the foundations of the new city. Bricks, for example, will be bought by the government at the fixed price of thirty francs a thousand.

Only the most necessary buildings are to be constructed, and schools, churches and stores are to be left to the last. All building is done by the government and the owner of the property is required to pay nothing. If the owner, however, wishes any particular plan followed this can be done, provided he is willing to bear any extra expense entailed, otherwise the plans for the building will be drawn up by a committee of architects. There are nineteen architects at present assigned to the arrondissement. Where the owner of a piece of land is known to have died without heirs the ownership reverts to the government, which will then dispose of it at auction or otherwise, but for the present no construction is to be done on any piece of land whose owner is not accounted for.

when he cited French profiteers as a reason for turning a deaf ear to the appeal in behalf of a starving mid-Europe. "The time has come," said Borah, "when the American people should let two things be known: that they do not propose to underwrite a situation in Europe based on a profiteering custom, and, second, that before they undertake to feed and clothe Europe, Europe must settle down and go to work." But that is all now asked for Central Europe—a chance to settle down and go to work. There are no profiteers in typhus-stricken Latvia and the Ukraine, or among the starving children of Vienna and Budapest, or among the unemployed masses of Warsaw and Lodz. But everywhere among the sixty-five millions between the Baltic Sea and the Mediterranean men are idle and children are starving because there is no coal for the furnaces, because there are no rails and cars for the railways, because there is no cotton to spin and iron to mould. Congress has not been asked for a dime. It has been asked to invest half a billion dollars in the form of food, machinery and raw materials to be transformed into manufactured products. The peoples of Central Europe cannot get back to work in a vacuum. They must have something to work with and upon.

The Borah school of statesmanship does not believe in complete isolation from Europe. It believes in helping out Europe with the most generous supplies of fatherly counsel. It exhorts the people of Central Europe to work, and merely leaves them to find the food and machinery and materials. It warns France against surrender to imperialist ambitions, but it will not offer American cooperation in the League of Nations, which is the only alternative to continental militarism. The Borah school of statesmanship has no objections to calling the tune but it will not advance a penny towards paying the piper. It would confine America permanently to the happy role of observer it has been playing up till now. We observe with sympathy when Central Europe starves and we observe with displeasure when France goes in for militaristic adventures, but it is beyond our province to cure Central Europe of her economic ills

or to make a try at curing France of her militarist errors. In this thought Borah can be happy: the more we confine ourselves to observing Europe the more there will be for us to observe and sympathize with or reprove. There will be more economic chaos in Central Europe there will be more militarism and imperialism in France.

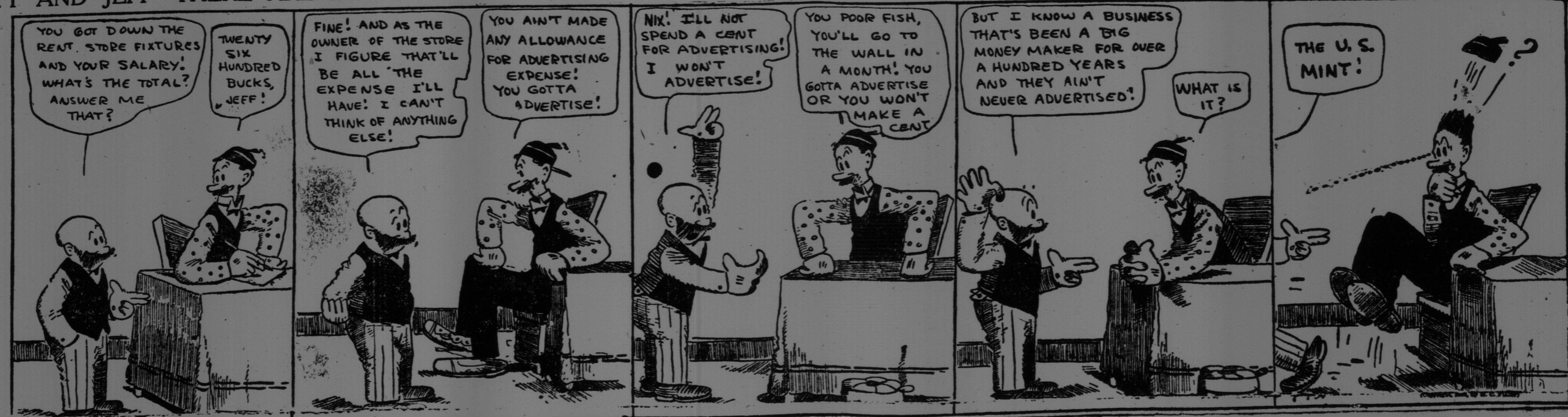

REFUGEES RECOUNT RUSSIAN HORRORS

French Men and Women Show Effects of Hunger on Arrival Home - Disease Follows Reds.

Paris, May 29 - Harrowing tales of Russian hardships are being told by French refugees who arrived at Havre. For a year they managed to keep alive on soup and vegetables which the Soviet government rationed to them in small quantities. However, relatives and friends who met the refugees at the steamship were hardly able to recognize them, so emaciated were the men and women who had endured starvation in Bolshevik Russia.

Dr. Marcou, one of the refugees, who was pressed into the hospital service by the Bolsheviks, said infectious diseases were increasing at an astounding rate in the cities under the sway of the Red terror and in all the territory through which the Bolshevik wave has swept. "The most remarkable thing about it is the resistance of the famished people to disease," he said. GENERAL CURRIE

Sketch of Leader of Canadians in War—Teacher, Business Man, Soldier.

Following is a sketch of General Sir Arthur Currie who is coming to St. John.

Inspector general military forces of Canada and principal military counsellor to the government.

Born: Naperton, county of Middlesex, Ont., December 9th, 1875, son of William Currie.

Began his military career by joining the 8th Regiment, Canadian Garrison Artillery (Active Militia of Canada) at St. John, N. B., in 1897.

Received his commission in this regiment in 1900, passing through all ranks until he was given the command of the 8th Battalion in 1909.

He held this command until November, 1913, when he left the Regiment and assisted in the formation of the 9th Regiment, Grenadier Battalion of Canada.

During the time he was in command of the 9th Regiment it attained a very high standard of efficiency, winning in 1912 and 1913 all the first and second prizes in Garrison Artillery competitions conducted under the auspices of the Dominion Artillery Association.

He was twice married, both wives being dead. Today about 11 o'clock, N. LeBlanc visited Chartersville in a car called at the Charters house, finding Mr. Charters dead in bed.

On small trees the young caterpillars may be best destroyed in their beds by crushing with a piece of sod or old sack.

On trees that are too large for the nests to be reached readily the simplest and best way to control these caterpillars is to spray the trees with some form of stomach poison early in the season.

The method of killing these caterpillars in their tents by burning them with a swab soaked in kerosene is to be discouraged as quite a number of trees have been killed by the tent fire.

The apple tent caterpillar sprays a true sticky web and can be distinguished from a caterpillar by its web.

CARRANZA IN MEXICO

STORY OF HIS CAREER

Rose to Power in Mexico Over Graves of Rivals—His Methods of Government.

(New York Evening Post)

Venustiano Carranza, Mexico's most rigid radical, the unyielding and unflinching man who, consistently and unhesitatingly, has never allowed himself to be misled by the good of Mexico for the most remarkable of all Mexican military and political careers, combining as he did a new vision of Mexican statesmanship with the conventional Mexican programme of gaining power by revolution only to lose it again in due course of counter-revolution.

Carranza came up conventional through a public school education and study of law and a limited practicing life, the experience of ranching, which no Mexican is complete to, the positions of judge, senator and governor of Coahuila, and, finally, president, after the revolution waged by the Constitutionalists against the followers of Huerta, who had murdered Madero and taken his power.

Was Sixty-one Years Old.

Carranza was born Dec. 29, 1859, Cuatro Ciénegas, state of Coahuila, or his people were contending with a "Trouble with his eyes" prevented him from going on with law and was the cause of his ranching.

The 600 followers whom Carranza immediately gathered for the rebellion against Huerta's provisional government grew into a real army when Francisco Villa came over to his side as general, and things would have gone well had not the country gotten involved through Huerta's blunders, with the United States intervention, the rest of manifold misadventure and help made Carranza no more than a trouble dragged along rather than would have been necessary had Carranza not been particularly stubborn and aggressive, and to over-estimate his own military abilities.

The fighting went on and Huerta, signed his provisional presidency on July 15, 1914, and fled to Spain. A month later Carranza made Huerta's entry into Mexico City, a serious and active conqueror.

In the meantime President between Villa and Carranza had been growing and reached a climax Sept. 23, 1914, when Villa declared open war on Carranza. After this, as for some time before, General Carranza was the chief general.

The Villa general met at Aguascalientes in November, 1914, and the Villa general met at Aguascalientes, a conventionalist government. The central changed hands several times and was finally under Carranza's control until the summer of 1915.

The beginning of the end of Villa-Zapata party as a military power followed swiftly, the heavy defeat by Villa by General Alvaro Obregón. Villa was forced to give Torreón and concentrate his dwindling forces in northern Chihuahua, where Carranza's occasional forays and raids which culminated in the attack on Columbus, M., that resulted in the invasion of Mexico territory by General Pershing.

In the diplomatic exchanges that followed President Wilson and Carranza agreed to a recognition of Carranza as the head of the de facto government by the United States in October, 1915. He insisted on the respect by the United States for Carranza's recognition to his government of the real rights of invasion. He maintained his position despite the cries raised by the Statesmen.

The Carranzas differ in that the apple tent has an unbroken white stripe down the back, while the forest tent has a row of white spots.

THE NEW TAX

Ottawa, Ont., May 29—The Department of Inland Revenue has given the following rulings in regard to exemptions on the new sales tax:—Sausages, fresh only; ham and bacon, subject to tax; glucose, exempt; bread, exempt; milk, exempt; milk, condensed and evaporated, exempt; milk powder, if made from whole milk, exempt; peas and split peas, exempt; vegetables, exempt if in natural state; fruits, exempt if in natural state; groats, subject to sales tax.

It is to be hoped, then, that no time will be lost in arranging the proposed conference, and that the case of the maritime provinces will be formulated, presented and pressed upon the federal authorities at the earliest possible moment. So far as Nova Scotia is concerned, the government will have the unanimous support of the people in their effort to secure just recognition of their rights.
